The Church owns, free of incumbrances, its Church property and Parsonage, and comes to the annual meeting with all bills paid.

Insurance is carried upon the Church Building in the sum of \$132,000.00 and upon the contents in the sum of \$18,000.00, or \$150,000.00 in all. The policies expire, part of them in January and part in December, 1923.

The condition of the Church property is first class and the business affairs of the Church are in excellent condition.

The total disbursements for the year, as shown by the Treasurer's report, were \$15,124.38, with a balance of \$13.33 in the Treasury.

The Trustees desire to again express their appreciation for the splendid work that has been done by the various business organizations of the Church and to bespeak the continued co-operation of the various organizations having to do with the business affairs of the Church.

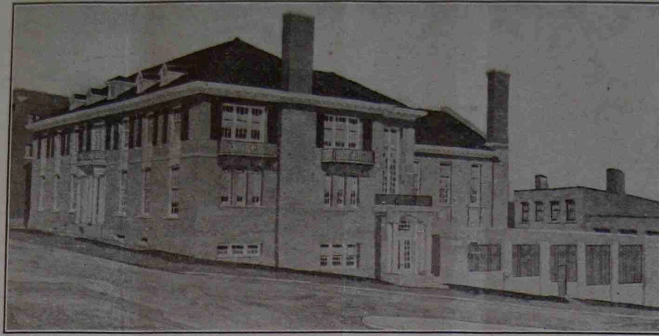

The present membership of the Friends in Council consists, for the most part, of business and professional women of many and varied occupations.

Our monthly Church suppers have afforded us the welcome opportunity to meet in a most pleasant and helpful relationship. Following these suppers, we have held our meetings, where the Program Committee provided those best qualified to inspire us to higher efforts of service.

Miss Hill contributed an inspiring resume of her work in the Child Welfare field of this County. Miss Ella Roe, one of our own members, who has been an ardent worker for the Serbian Relief, gained our earnest desire to co-operate with her by her sympathetic plea for the Serbian need. Miss Dutcher, Reference Librarian of the Public Library, (also one of our own members) reviewed in a most interesting manner Boyger's inspiring book, "The Great Hunger." Miss W. White (a member) contributed a most carefully studied paper on the present conditions in Jerusalem. Miss Brandon, of England, talked to us of her work in connection with the African missions and inspired us all with a desire to send even

to the remote heart of Africa
the message of Christian cheer
and service.

Our aim has been two-fold; first
to be a substantial factor in the
missionary work of Pilgrim Church,
and secondly - to constitute ourselves
