Mr Vogler and members of Pilgrim Church:

I have been asked as Secretary of, ~~and on behalf~~ of the Religious Education Department to ^{read yearly} ~~make the~~ report ~~this year~~ of the activities of our Young People's work.

Our Sunday school is divided into six departments, each with its own staff, *The enrollment in the Sunday activities is about 400.*

The Cradle Roll, since its members are too young to attend Sunday School, need only a superintendent. Mrs Duncan Macdonald serves in that capacity. Keeps track of the littlest ones and finally sees them thru the "White Gate" and into the Beginners Department, where ^{W Seymour} Mrs Smith with her assistants ~~Mrs R L L Durham~~ and Mrs PoGrBeurne minister to their needs, spiritual and otherwise until they are ready to join the "readers" or first grade children and are promoted to the Primary Department. In the Beginners Dept. they have their first group lessons about God and His World.

The Primary with its large enrollment is grouped into six classes. Mrs J O Leveille, Mrs C L Kohlhaas, Mrs W D Avery are teachers for the girls; while Miss Judith Eng, Miss Ruth Hartley and Miss Elizabeth Thompson have boys classes. Miss Thompson is Superintendent of the Primary and Ruth Hartley is the pianist. For three years the children remain in the Primary Department - getting a larger conception of God's World and the mission of Jesus, learning meantime some of the beautiful Bible stories and psalms. On Children's Day, at the end of their third year, the children are presented, as a gift from the Church, with a fine Bible which they learn to use in the Junior Department.

Mrs E L Armstrong, Junior Superintendent, prepares and leads the Worship Services and guides this very lively group in its Sunday School activities. Mrs Armstrong is ably assisted by Mrs O E Harris as pianist, Mrs A W Taylor, Mrs B F Davis, Miss Helen Cant, Mr Robert Thompson, Mr C L Gold, & Mr J F Thompson as teachers. Memory work again plays a part in the study of the Juniors and certain selections must be learned before a certificate of promotion to the Intermediate Department is given.

As the boys and girls progress in the different d

Seventh, eighth and ninth-grade boys and girls make up the personnel of the Intermediate Department. There has been a great increase in the attendance in this Department during the last year. Accounted for, of course, by the excellence of the teaching staff. Mrs Johnson has had very fine, instructive Worship Services. Mr Page is always to be counted on for splendid help with the music, and classes under the leadership of the following teachers have shown sustained interest; Mrs O L Coleman, Mrs M G Gillespie, Mrs F B Hubler, Mrs Duncan Macdonald have girls classes, while Mr Brewer Mattocks, ~~III~~, Mr W Gordon Hegardt, Mr H W Clark are the leaders of the boys work.

The Senior Department numbered so few ~~one~~ members this year that with the exception of the Sophomore Girls, who with Mrs Savin have been exploring some Social Problems, have joined the Inter-College Class for discussion and study with Mr Mayer, Mr Northup and Mr Zoerb as leaders.

Another group which has been a marked success is called the Fireside Forum. This group meets each Sunday evening at seven o'clock and includes young people of Senior High School age and older. Mr & Mrs Vogler meet with this group every Sunday and are much beloved by all the members of the group.

The missionary work of the Sunday School this past year has been most interesting. Beside the eight weeks of intensive study of China, with its picture maps, Chinese village and Mission Compound, its book reading and finally a delightful play, ~~this~~ group provided very generous baskets at Thanksgiving and some 225 presents for needy children at Christmas time. Each week we are trying to follow and learn more of "Jesus Way of Life" and endeavoring to find the right interruptions that will stand the tests.

If you want to know that all five of the Pilgrim Scout Troops are the best in the city come in and see them in action.

As it would be unfair and impossible to crowd the history of any large group activity into one volume - so is it unfair and impossible to think of this report as an adequate picture of our Young Peoples Department. ^{We} So you are invited to renew your Youth and come to Sunday School with us occasionally.

This is the Sixty-third Annual Meeting of
PILGRIM CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH

The year 1933 will be remembered by most of us as a year of difficulty, but in spite of adverse conditions Pilgrim Church continued to function and appears to have made progress in all of its departments and closed the year with no outstanding obligations.

There has been a substantial gain in membership and an increasing number of non-member attendants at our services which I feel is due largely to the splendid work of our pastor and the choir.

The fine spirit of co-operation on the part of the ladies of the assembly and the good work done by each of the several groups has contributed greatly to our success.

During the past year we lost by death six of our members, among whom was Mrs. Kimball one of our three remaining charter members. Mrs. Kimball was born at Sutton, N. H. in 1845 and moved to Duluth in 1870 and in 1871 when Pilgrim Church was organized she was among the charter members. During all of the years that this church has been in existence, until shortly before her death, she took an active part in its affairs and was one of its most devoted members.

Rev. Charles N. Thorp who was pastor of this church from October 1912 to October 1919 and who was instrumental in the construction and equipping of this building was a visitor here last summer and occupied our pulpit on Sunday, August 13th.

As in past years we continued our support of the Finnish Congregational Churches at Cloquet and Hibbing and also joined with the local churches in the affairs of the Duluth Council of Churches. We also sent delegates to the State Congregational Conference held at Winona in May.

The growing number of members of the Sunday School, Fireside Forum and Scout Troops and the interest taken generally by the young people in the various organizations provided for them is particularly gratifying. In providing these organizations for the young people we have taken the position of leadership and assumed the obligations of maintaining them in a manner which will retain their interest and later on enlist their active support in the larger affairs of the church and realizing the necessity of maintaining this position, joined with the proper co-operation on the part of the members, we should succeed in making this church an increasing influence for good in this community.

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE PILGRIM CONGREGATIONAL
CHURCH AND CONGREGATION:

The Trustees of Pilgrim Congregational Church
beg leave to submit this as their Annual Report for the year
1933.

We approached the end of this year with a great
deal of anxiety, feeling that we might find it impossible to
maintain our long standing record of coming to the annual
meeting with all bills paid, but thanks to co-operation on
the part of the various organizations of the Church in holding
down expenditures and to the very efficient activity of our
Treasurer in getting in funds, we are able to again state that
we come to this annual meeting with all bills paid and a small
amount of cash on hand.

The Every-Member Canvass was made last year on a
tentative budget of \$21,602.64. After the Every-Member Canvass,
when it was realized that this budget could not be met and after
a number of meetings of the Trustees and Pastor, the budget
was reduced to \$19,867.64. The actual expenditure under this
budget, as shown by the Treasurer's Report, was \$19,185.96 or
\$681.68 less than the budget upon which we were working.

The Treasurer's Report of December 31, 1932 showed
cash on hand of \$617.63 and the Treasurer's Report of
December 31, 1933 shows cash on hand of \$210.26. Therefore,
we spent during the year the difference between these amounts
or \$407.37 more than we received from all sources, the total

amount paid out being \$19,185.96 and the total amount received from all sources being \$18,778.59.

The Every-Member Canvass was made this year on a tentative budget of \$21,867.64. To meet this we have:

This estimated income of \$17,259.90 is \$1,926.06 less than the actual expenditures of last year and \$4,607.74 less than the tentative budget upon which the Every-Member Canvass for this year was made. The tentative budget for last year was \$21,602.64 or \$265.00 less than the tentative budget for this year.

The permanent budget upon which we acted last year was reduced below the tentative budget by \$1,735.00. If we can make a like reduction for this year or an increase of expected income for that amount, it would probably accomplish our purpose.

The actual expenditures for 1933 were \$681.68 less than the budget as finally adopted, as shown by the following tabulation:

Fire insurance on the Church building in the sum of \$142,000.00 and \$8,000.00 on the contents, subject to 80% co-insurance, is in force. There is \$12,000.00 fire insurance on the Parsonage. We also carry compensation, burglary, robbery and general liability insurance in amounts deemed by us to be ample.

The Trustees desire to congratulate the various organizations of the Church for their faithful and effective work during the year of 1933, and we confidently expect this same faithful and effective work will be continued throughout the New Year just beginning.

In view of the fact that the tentative budget upon which the Canvass was made has not been under-written and therefore should not be adopted at this time, we recommend that authority be given to the Trustees to take such steps as they may deem necessary to balance the budget by either securing additional pledges in amount sufficient to meet the tentative budget or if in their judgment this cannot be done, by making reductions in the budget of estimated expenditures.

To The Members of Pilgrim Church:

Your trustee in charge of church property begs leave to submit the following report touching upon the physical condition of said property, and the repairs and improvements which have been made thereon during the past year.

The church structure itself we now believe to be in a fairly satisfactory physical condition. We do, however, wish to seriously emphasize the necessity of immediately establishing a sinking fund for the accumulation of an amount necessary to replace the present heating plant on the property, which is now becoming somewhat inefficient and costly to operate. It is our belief that the saving in fuel costs which the newer type of plant would effect would over a ten or twelve year period pay for its installation. Church structures such as ours demand a certain type of heating equipment which will accommodate itself to the peculiar needs of such properties. There have been immense strides in the development of more modern heating units for such purposes and we must before long avail ourselves of the greater efficiency and lower costs which such units provide.

Aside from the general maintenance work involved in the operation of such a property as ours we have changed certain plumbing in the kitchen to avoid an annual freeze-up which has been somewhat costly. There have been certain repairs of banquet chairs and serving equipment and in this connection let me advise you that the ladies insist upon an early replacement of a large portion of these banquet chairs which we have been using at our church suppers and other functions. These chairs have already served long and faithfully, and although not the most durable type of construction have given very good service.

At the request of Miss Rogers, our organist, the console of the organ has been moved back two feet in order that she may more effectively direct the choir.

Some attention has been given to the pointing up of our stained glass windows. There has been a demand that we cover with a Tiffany glass the stained windows on the south side of the main auditorium to partially avoid the bright glare in the eyes of those sitting on the north side of the auditorium who face these windows during Sunday morning services.

This item of work we will attempt to take care of as quickly as our other more serious budgetary requirements are met.

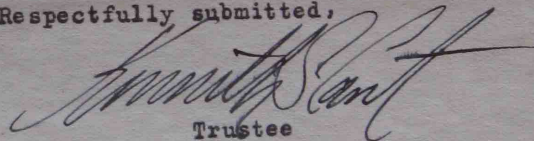
On the outside of the church there has been some replacement of broken concrete slabs in the sidewalk, together with some small amount of painting and electrical equipment replaced.

With the assistance of Mr. Finlayson, the grounds to the east of the church structure have been more attractively beautified during the past season and a fine sod and grass plot has been developed.

At the parsonage we have resurveyed the heating equipment and with the advice and recommendation of our consulting engineer member, Mr. Charles Foster, we replaced and rearranged a good deal of the piping and radiation and installed an automatic fuel stoker. We are now advised by Mr. Vogler that the plant is working very efficiently, the fuel cost has been greatly reduced, and the heating perfectly distributed, whereas in the past it was very difficult to maintain an even temperature throughout the home and it was almost impossible to fire the furnace with any degree of efficiency.

We will welcome any suggestions that you may care to give us relative to the care and operation of the church property.

I herewith submit the report of the Women's Assembly for the year 1933.
