The Building and Grounds Committee begs to submit the following report:

During the past year only the necessary expenditures were made to maintain the buildings and equipment in usable condition.

A severe wind storm loosened and removed several slate shingles from the roof. These were all replaced at a nominal expense because of a small stock of these shingles which are now stored in the church basement.

The wall at the rear of the church, which forms a part of the coal bin and ash storage space, was repaired.

 $\mathbf{0}_{ne}$ of the area spaces at the basement window at the front of the church was repaired.

The cleaning and painting of the walls of the Chapel and several of the Sunday School rooms, the stair halls, recreation room in the basement, together with the varnishing and painting of the floors was done mostly by the Custodian.

Only minor repairs were required for the heating system, thus maintaining the plant in proper operating condition.

Some small minor repairs and adjustments were made to the organ and organ equipment.

Thanks to the co-operation of the church office and the Custodian, the building and equipment is well maintained.

In the Manse, new linoleum was laid in the kitchen and minor repairs made to the stoker for the heating plant, together with a few other small items of replacement.

During the coming year it is recommended that all woodwork on the exterior of the church building be repainted and that the shrubbery at the rear of the Manse be removed, the concrete sidewalk repaired and that section of the property re-graded.

The church has added 44 new members and we lost 21 dismissed (of whom 5 had not been active in the church for many years), 2 dropped by request from the rolls and 10 by death.

It is probably superfluous to report on the activities of the different organizations in the church as most of them will be well covered in the individual reports. The men's club has had a very successful year and the high light was the joint meeting with the methodist men's club held at the First Methodist Church in the spring. The Pilsrim Century Club has been very active and a number of functions and parties have been sponsered by this organization. Now that there is some food rationing the church could put one of these suppers on at any time and no doubt there would be a crowd.

Our country is still at war and we are proud of our service flag which contains the names of many of our young people. We have one gold star. Richard Luce died in service. He was very prominent worker with the young people during the years before he joined the army. As for the war the outlook is much brighter than it was a year ago and we are praying that it will be over by the time this report is written next year.

The every member canvass was carried out on December 6th under the able direction of Mr W C Lounsbury. It was a success. The minister has had a project during the year, aside from his other duties, and that was to lift the church debt. Up to the last report \$6,000 of the \$9,000 has been pledged.

During the year we lost 10 of our faithful friends and members. The following members passed away: Mrs J P Johnson, W W Sanford, David C Dudley, Mrs Charles Neimeyer, Mrs L H Syck, Richard Luce, Mrs J H Davis, Mrs C C Salter, Mrs F E House and Mrs Amanda Cederberg.

REPORT OF DEACONS, Annual Maeting for the year 1942.

The regular mont ly meetings of the Board of Deacons were held and well attended. The average attendance was slightly less that eleven, in addition to the minister. The regular meeting for May was not held, but there was a Special meeting in April. As usual there were no meetings in July or August.

The scard during the year suffered the loss, y removal from the city, of two valuable and loyal members, Mr. W.H. Woodbury and Mr.H.E. Reynolds. The church will long continue to miss Mr. and Mrs. Woodbury and Mr. and Mrs. Reynoldswhose services and devotion to Pilgrim Church were unfailing. Our beloved member, Mr. C.C. Salter, lost his wife during the year.

At the February and March meetings there were interesting discussions of the church benevolences, which resulted in the adoption by the Board of resolutions that, while it should never be required as a condition of affiliation with Pilgrim church that one must contribute financially to the support of the church, it was sin cerely hoped that each member would find it both his conscientious duty and his pleasure to contribute such amount annually to the church budget as he is fairly able to, and that in addition thereto each member of the age of 14 years or over would likewise find it his pleasure to contribute the sum of \$3.00 per annum for the church benevolences, and that the minister or standing committee should briefly advise candidates for admission to mhurch membership of the substance of such resolution. This, of mo course, was simply for a guide to the minister and standing committee and not the action or rule of the church.

At the Special meeting in April, it was unanimously decided not to combine with any other church in services during the monister's va cation, but

to secure supply ministers for those Sundays.

At the December meeting the Board unanimously adopted a resolution suggesting regulations governing the recreational facilities of the church and providing that a copy of the suggested regulations be furnished to the head of each organization of the church. It was also agreed to recommend to the Trustees that no part of the church be rented for use at any time which

would interfere or conflict with stated meetings of any regularchurch organization During the year the Board of Deacons purchased and caused to be forwarded to men in the service affilliated with Pilgrim Church, seven dozen devotional books, at a total cost of \$52.50. The many responses indicate that this slight attention on the part of the church was greatly appreciated. view of the fact that the Deacon's fund had not been depleted by calls for

help, it was felt that the funds on hand could be used to no better purpose. While the passing of Deacon Frank E. Blodgett did not occur until after the end of the year, his fatal imlness began durung the year covered by this His services as a deacon, his unfailing attendance at the church sebvices and his manifest love of Pilgrim Church characterized a membership of nearly half a century. His presence among us will be greatly missed.

Report of the Board of Trustees

As is customary, I am submitting to the members of Pilgrim Congregational Church a report as to the financial status of the Church at the end of 1942.

The outstanding and unpaid accounts are in the amount of \$ 421.61

The Every Member Canvass was definitely successful, and many thanks are due to the Director, Mr W.C.Lounsbury, and his able assistants, with a large amount of preliminary work done by Mrs Manley.

At the end of the day of the Every Member Canvass, the pledges to the financial support of the Church were in the amount of \$15,044.20, but by efficient supplementary efforts, the total amount pledged for the year 1943 was \$16,059.50. This, in consideration of the intensive drive for subscriptions to the mortgage retirement fund, should meet with the approval of the congregation, and I am attaching hereto a copy of the revised budget, as prepared for me by Mr C.D.Stillman, the very efficient Treasurer of the Church, and recommend its adoption.

You are undoubtedly familiar with the stromuous effort which has been made for the collection of funds necessary to pay up the balance due on the church mortgage. This campaign has been stressed with a deal of effort and a prospect of ultimate success. I am submitting to you herewith a statement of the status of the mortgage retirement fund:

You will note that out of the cash subscriptions to the fund, the sum of \$5,500 has been paid on the mortgage, leaving a balance of \$3,440. The Treasurer of the Church has now in his hands a cash balance in this Retirement Fund of \$705.75, together with unpaid pledges in the amount of \$2,832.50, which together amount to \$3,538.25. The interest on the mortgage, estimated as of the date of the final payment, is \$125.00. The date of the final payment depends, as can readily be seen, unent, is \$125.00. The date of the unpaid pledges, and it goes without saying that the sooner these pledges are paid, the sooner the whole mortgage can be discharged, although I must call your attention to the fact that even in the event of the payment of the pledges, the fund is lacking in the amount of \$26.75, which must be subscribed in order to complete the entire payment on the mortgage.

It may not be necessary to applaud the work done by the Women's Assembly of the Church, but it should be noted that they have subscribed to the Church budget the sum of \$500, to the benevolences \$400, and paid into the Mortgage Retirement Fund the sum of \$300.

The thanks of the Board and the thanks of the congregation are due to Mr C.D.Stillman, the efficient Treasurer of the Church, who has, throughout the past year, as well as years preceding it, given a great deal of his time to church work, church books and reports.

The thanks of the Board of Trustees are hereby given to Mr McQueen, to Mrs Manley, and all the other efficers and employees of the Church, and its various organizations who have been so energetic and efficient.

Religious Education Committee held eight meetings in 1942. No meetings were ald in June, July, August and December.

We feel that we have made definite improvements in our Church School during the year. These are shown by the fact that we have a larger staff of regular teachers and have drawn less often from our substitute list. Our staff now consists of seven supervisors, one assistant supervisor, twenty-eight regular teachers, and nine-as our teachers have been very faithful and regular.

A Nursery Department was organized because of the large enrollment in the Kinder-

The enrollment in the Church School is feeling the same decrease as the city schools. We find our fourth grade is the smallest but that the enrollment increased in the lower, as well as in the higher grades. The average enrollment for 1942 was 223, against 243 for 1941.

In June - 17 were promoted from the Gradle Roll to the Beginners.

It is very gratifying to note the large increase in our Senior High Department. Only one was graduated in this department in 1941 against 18 in 1942.

There were 24 children confirmed in 1942 at the close of a series of 12 study periods, six of which were led by Miss Leland and six by Rev. McQueen.

A Palm Sunday Communion Service was again served by the Deacons for the young people of the Church.

Our church again sent Christmas gifts to the Longville Church School- enough for 45 children and 8 adults. 15 gifts were sent to the children in the class for the deaf at the Adams School. 30 gifts were distributed to county children. Fourteen baskets were provided for needy families at Thanksgiving time.

Pilgrim Fellowship has a membership of 37. The fall programs were devoted to the study of better relations with our South American neighbors, with movies showing South American life, and outside speakers on special topics. Four members of Pilgrim Fellowship went to Camp Iduhapi in Juhe to the State Congregational Leadership Camp. At this time Roy Magney was elected one of four delegates from the State to the Interdenominational Christian Youth Council which was held at Lake Geneva in August.

An attempt has been made to contact students at the State Teachers College and interest them in our Pilgrim Fellowship program, which is intended to include college age as well as High School age young people.

The supervisor of the Beginners' department was sent as a representative from Pilgrim Church to the School of Christian Education at Faribault the latter part of July. We feel that more of our teachers should avail themselves of the epportunity to go to this Training School and hope will take advantage of this chance another year.

Dr David Henry Gray , National Secretary of Young People's work, came to us last spring and gave a very fine talk to the Church School toachers on Sunday afternoon, and to the young people at the Pilgrim Fellowship meeting in the evening. He is an inspiration to listen to.

Our Committee again sent out booklets to all families represented in the Church School, giving information necessary to parents about the School. This booklet has been used as a model in other localities, we hear. Our greatestaim has been to interest parents in our Church School, They are always welcome to visit and the supervisors frequently call, especially when a child is to take part in the service.

A sheet of "Church School News " is included in the Church bulletin the last Sunday of the month. We are very glad for the opportunity of informing people of what we are doing.

Our children of today are the church leaders of tomorrow and it is our responsibility to see that thay have as good a Christian background as we know how to give

Report of the Music Committee

The Church Music budget was cut \$ 200.00 this past year and it looked for a while as though we couldn't keep it within the figure set or near it. However, Miss: Rogers managed to "get by" and spent only \$ 29.00 more than to \$ 2000.00 allowed. With this amount we can barely manage a chorus choir for eight months of the year. We cannot buy necessary music- nor can we have the vestments eleaned and laundered properly.

The seige of rats in the choir loft servously damaged all the choir books and they must be replaced or repaired. The vestments are wearing out rapidly and whether they will hold together to cover the choir members for "the duration" depends upon the length of "the Auration."

Two or three years ago the music committee made an exhaustive study of hymn books for the church and recommended the purchase of new ones at the cost of about \$ 600. Until the time comes when this can be done there will be an increasing shortage of books in the congregation.

We are grateful to Mr C.L.Edson for his services in directing the Children's Choir which sang for Palm Sunday, Church School Day and the Christmas Services.

We also wish to thank Miss Ruth Rogers for her inspirational leadership, as the director of our church music and of our fine choir. No words could adequately express our appreciation for the service which she has given Pilgrim Church.

The Women's Assembly of Pilgrim Church is a very active body. It is composed of (1) the Advisory Board which meets preceding the Assembly to discuss and dispose of routine business, (2) the General Assembly, made up of all the women in the church, which meets monthly for luncheen, good fellowship, devotionals, and a splendid presmoothly and properly, and (4) the Christian Service Council, under the able leadership of Mrs B.S.Savin.

The Council meets in the morning of Assembly Day for worship, study of local and foreign missions, and community service. The Women's Assembly allocated \$ 200.00 of its 1942 budget for the work of the Christian Service Council. Under the community interests the council sent gifts of money to the Lighthouse for the Blind, the International Institute, the Holiday Bureau, Council of Churches, Goodwill Industries Auxiliary, Red Cross, Y.W.C.A. camp fund, and the Girl Scout and Boy Scout Camp funds. To our State Association the Council sent funds for its quota and for its Home and Foreign Mission interests. Mrs Savin, as cheirman of the Christian Service Council and her co-workers for 1942; Mrs W.D.Avery, association president, who encourages good fellowship between individual churches; Mrs A.C.Oberg, secretary, Mrs A.L. Wiltse, chairman of Community interests; Mrs H.W.Nichols, chairman of the box committee; Mrs Albert Baldwin, subscriptions for Minnesota Congregational magazine; and last but far from least, Mrs W.E.Tracy, chairman of programs for both the Council meetings and the general Assembly meetings deserve our appreciation and thanks.

One of the projects adopted by Congregational women of America was, "The Women's Sacrifical Gift." Filgrim women participated in this project and raised \$ 131.00.

The programs presented under the direction of Mrs Tracy, at both the Assembly and the Christian Service Council meetings have been most informative and inspiring.

At the Assembly meetings we have heard excellent book reviews by Rev. McQueen; a musical program by Miss Irene Thomas, pianist, and Miss Margaret Farquharson, vocalist; a Lenten Meditation entitled, "A Voice in the Wilderness" by Rev. McQueen; a stimulating discussion "Faith Is The Answer" by Mrs Clarence Nelson, of Trinity English Lutheran Church. At this meeting, two of our members, Mrs Keith Fawcett and Mrs Donald MacGregor presented a musical program. In May we heard an informal discussion by Mrs Ann Albright and Mrs Annie Winfield of the African M.E.Church on "Why I Want to Be a Christian". The concluding thought at this meeting was that there will be fewer problems when both colored and white people have more faith and understanding. In November Miss Wygal, secretary of Religious Resources of the National Y.W.C.A., gave an informative address on "Religion in War and Post-War Times". We closed our year with our lovely Christmas luncheon, followed by a delightful program before a stately Christmas tree in Salter Chapel. We heard violin selections by Miss Marie Blewett, accompanied by Miss Ruby Ann Mattson; Christmas Carols sung by a group of ninth grade East Junior High girls, and two beautiful Christmas stories read by Miss Leland. The election of officers for the ensuing year completed the meeting.

The all-Assembly fall musical tea, which has become a custom anticipated with pleasure by the community as well as the members of the Assembly, was held in September and proved to be its usual success. Mrs W.C.Lounsbury and Mrs W.S.Smith were in charge of arrangements. The attractive tea tables attended by each of the six groups made a pleasing setting for the musical program arranged by Mrs Spicer.

The following report speaks for itself. The Box Committee packed a very fine lot of clothing for Rev. Tuomisto's parish in Cloquet and for Rev. Vananen's parish in Hibbing, in June. A special box of men's suits and sweaters was sent to Pleasant Hill Academy in Tennessee.

Again in October a smaller amount was sent to Mr Tuomisto to be distributed

We received letters of acknowledgment from all, andthegifts were greatly appreciated. The total value was estimated at about \$ 375.00. Those who halped with the packing were: Mrs R.G. The Bible Study and Lenten Meditation conducted in the spring and fall were, under the leadership of Miss Leland, a source of spiritual help and nourishment.

The Women's Assembly started the year with a balance of \$ 66.89 in the checking account and \$ 2.04 in the Savings account. We voted a budget of \$ 1,800.00.The larger items to be expended being, \$ 500.00 to the Church budget, \$ 400.00 to the Church benevolences, \$ 200.00 to the community interests and mission services of the Christian Service Council, and \$ 125.00 to the housekeeping account. We have finished the year with all bills paid, and the balance of \$ 383.17 in the checking account, and \$ 6.21 in the savings account.

The General Assembly is divided into six working groups, identified by a number, each functioning as a separate unit. The pledge system has been followed, money so raised being put toward the Assembly budget. All groups pledging makes the raising of our budget more businesslike, and leaves more time for fellowship, good programs and welfare work. Three hundred dollars has been pledged and made by most of the groups. Group 3, under the supervision of Mrs W.L.Bloedel and Mrs W.B. Arper, had a most successful year, giving to the Women's Assembly \$ 315.00 and \$ 25.00 to the Christian Service Council, making a total of \$ 340.00.

The Women's Assembly hopes to continue its work of helpfulness and service.

Report of the Building and Grounds Chairman

The Building and Ground Committee begs to submit the following report:

During the past year only necessary expenditures were made to maintain the buildings and equipment in usable condition,

Severe wind loosened and removed several slate shingles from the roof. These were all replaced at a nominal expense because of a small stock of these shingles which are now stored in the church basement.

The wall at the rear of the church, which forms a part of the coal bin and ash storage space and lef the area spaces at the basement window at the front of the church was also repulsed.

The cleaning andpainting of the walls of the Chapel and several of the Sunday School rooms, the stair halls, recreation room in the basement, together with the varnishing and painting of the floors was done mostly by the Custodian.

Only minor repairs were required for the heating system, thus maintaining the plant in proper operating condition. Some small minor repairs were made to the organ and organ equipment,

Thanks to the co-operation of the church office and the Custodian, the building and equipment is well maintained,

In the Manse, new linoleum was laid in the kitchen and minor repairs made to the stoker for the heating plant, together with a few other small items of replacement.

During the coming year it is recommended that all woodwork on the exterior of the church building be repainted and that the shrubbery at the rear of the Manse be removed, the concrete sidewalk repaired and that section of the property regraded.

The Church added 44 new members and we lost 21 dismissed (of whom 5 had not been active in the Church for many years), 2 were dropped by request from the rolls, and

It is probably superfluous to report on the activities of the different organiz - ations in the church as most of them will be well covered in the individual reports. The Men's Club had a successful year, the highlight being the joint meeting with Methodist Men's Club held at First Methodist Church in the spring. The Pilgrim Century Club was very active and a number of successful parties and functions were sponsored by that organization. The family night suppers were continued by the church and proved to be as popular as ever. Now that there is some food rationing the church could put one of these suppers on at any time and no doubt there would be a crowd.

Our country is still at war and we are proud of our service flag, which contains the names of our men in the Service. We have one gold star. Richard Luce died in service. He was a very prominent worker with the young people during the years before he joined the army. As for the war-the outlook is much brighter than it was a year ago, and we are praying that it will be over by the time this report is written next year.

The Every Member Canvass was carried out on December 6, under the able direction of Mr W.C.Lounsbury. It was a success. The minister has had a project during the year, aside from his other duties, and that was to lift the church debt. Up to the last report \$ 6,000.00 of the \$ 9,000.00 has been pledged.

During the year we lost 10 of our faithful friends and members. The following members passed away: Mrs J.P.Johnson, W.W.Sanford, David C.Dudley, Mrs Charles Neimeyer, Mrs L.H.Syck, Richard Luce, Mrs J.H.Davis, Mrs C.C.Salter, Mrs F.E.House and Mrs Amanda Cederborg. Report of Deacms, Annual Meeting, for the year of 1942

The regular monthly meetings of the Board of Deacons were held and well attended. The average attendance was slightly less than eleven, inaddition to the minister. The regular meeting for May was not held, but there was a special meeting in April. As usual there were no meetings in July or August.

The Board during the year suffered the loss, by removal from the city, of two valuable and loyal members, Mr W.H. Woodbury and Mr H.E. Reynolds. The church will long continue to miss Mr and Mrs Woodbury and Mr and Mrs Reynolds, whose service and dovotion to Pilgrim Church was unfailing. Our beloved member, Mr C.C. Salter, lost his wife during the year. She, too, was greatly loved by the entire church.

At the February and March meetings there were interesting discussions of the church benevolences, which resulted in the adoption by the Board, of resolutions that, while it should never be a condition required for affiliation with Pilgrim Church that one must contribute financially to the support of the church, it was hoped that each member would find it his pleasure and his consciontious duty to contribute such amount annully to the church budget as he is fairly able to, and that in addition thereto each member of the age of 14 years or over would likewise find it his pleasure to contribute the sum of \$ 3.00 per annum for the church benevolences, and that the minister or standing committee should briefly advise candidates for admission to church membership of the substance of such resolution. This, of course, was simply for a guide to the minister and standing committee and not the action or rule of the church.

At a special meeting in April, it was unanimously decided not to combine with any other church in services during the minister's vacation, but to secure supply minister ters for those Sundays.

At the December meeting the Board unanimously adopted a resolution suggesting regulations governing the recreational facilities of the church and providing that a copy of the suggested regulations be firnished to the head of each organization of the church. It was also agreed to recommend to the Trustees that no part of the church be rented for use at any time which would interfere or conflict with stated meetings of any regular church organization.

During the year the Board of Doacons purchased and caused to be forwarded to men in the service, who are affiliated with Pilgrim Church, seven dezen devotional books, at the total cost of \$ 52.50. The many responses indicate that this slight attention on the part of the church was greatly appreciated. In view of the fact that the Deacon's fund had not been deploted by calls for help, it was felt that the funds on hand could be used to no better purpose.

While the passing of Doacon Frank E. Blodgett did not occur until after the end of the year, his fatal illness began during the year covered by this report. His services as a deacon, his unfailing attendance at the church services and his manifest love of Pilgrin Church characterized a momborship of nearly half a century. His presence among us will be greatly missed.

The treasurer of the Deacon's Fund reports a balance on hand at the end of the

year of \$ 45.09.

In addition to their regular obligations the ladies gave \$ 300.00 toward the Church debt which put that effort over the top.

The minister and several members of the Church have been active in organizing the Duluth Round Table of the National Conference of Christians and Jews. Our Church is the headquarters of this organization. Mr H.U.Moore is its chairman, and Mrs Manley is giving her spare time as its secretary. I consider our part in bringing the work of the National Conference to Duluth a most worthwhile service

From the reports at this annual meeting you will learn that all departments of the Church have been very much alive in 1942. All this activity represents a great deal of devotion and energy spent by our members and friends in Christian work. I sincerely appreciate your loyalty, your work and your prayers which have

made these achievements possible.

I wish to express my gratitude to Mrs Manley, Miss Leland, Miss Rogers and Mr
Revals for their co-operation and real help in carrying the work of the Church the

As we enter the second year of our struggle for our existence as a Nation let us be more mindful of our duties as Christians in a time of war. Let us always remember our men and we men in the service of the country and their families here at home.

Report of Chairman of Board of Trustees

As is customary, I em submitting to the members of Pilgrim Congregational Church a report as to the financial status of the Church at the end of 1942.

The outstanding and unpaid accounts are in the amount of \$421.51.

The every member canvass was definitely successful, and many thanks are due to Director W. C. Lounsberry and his able assistants, tegether with a large amount of preliminary detail work done by Mrs. Manley.

At the end of the day of the every member canvass, the pledges to the financial support of the Church were in the amount of \$15,044.20, but by efficient supplemental efforts, the total amount pledged for the year 1943 was \$16,059.50. This, in consideration of the intensive drive for subscriptions to the mortgage retirement fund, should meet with the approval of the congregation, and I am attaching hereto a copy of the revised budget, as prepared for me by Mr. C. D. Stillman, the very efficient Treasurer of the Church, and recommend its adoption.

You are undoubtedly familiar with the strenuous effort which has been put forth for the collection of funds necessary to pay up the balance due on the church mortgage. This compaign has been stressed with a deal of effort and a prospect of ultimate success. I am submitting to you herewith a statement of the status of the mortgage retirement fund:

You will note that out of the cash subscriptions to the fund, the sum of \$5,500 has been paid on the mortgage, leaving a balance of \$3,440. The Treasurer of the Church has now in his hands a cash balance in this Retirement Fund of \$705.75, together with unpaid pledges in the amount of \$2,832.50, which together amount to \$3,538.25. The interest upon the mortgage, estimated as of the date of final payment, is \$125. The date of final payment depends, as can readily be seen, upon the

time of the payment of the unpaid pledges, and it goes without saying that the sooner these pledges are paid, the sconer the whole mortgage can be discharged, although I must call your attention to the fact that even in the event of the payment of the pledges, the fund is lacking in the amount of \$26.75, which must be subscribed in order to complete the entire payment on the mortgage.

It may be unnecessary to applaud the work done by the Women's Assembly of the Church, but it should be noted that they have subscribed to the Church budget the sum of \$500, to benevolences \$400, and paid into the Mortgage Retirement Fund the sum of \$300.

The thanks of the Board and the thanks of the congregation are due to Mr. C. D. Stillman, the efficient Treasurer of the Church, who has, throughout the past year, as well as years preceding it, given a great deal of his time to church work, church books and reports.

The thanks of the Board of Trustees are hereby given to Mr. McQueen, to Mrs. Manley, and all the other officers and employees of the Church, and its various organizations, who have been so energetic and efficient.

The Women's Assembly of Pilgrim Church is a very active body. It is composed of (1) the Executive Board which meets preceding the assembly to discuss and dispose of routine business, (2) the General Assembly, made up of all the women of the church, which meets monthly for luncheon, good fellowship, devotionals, and a splendid program, (3) the various chairmen and their committees who see that we function smoothly and properly, and (4) the Christian Service Council, under the able leadership of Mrs. B.
