

As our church school grows, so do our range of offerings for the children's education, and I am grateful to the many volunteers who make our program one of the broadest in this city.

I am also pleased by the range of our adult educational and fellowship opportunities. The Sunday morning adult offerings continue to be well attended; the weekly St. Ann's bible study started by Shep continues under Margaret Morris's guidance; the women of Search have made their way through the book of Job, When Bad Things Happen to Good People, the book of Luke, and are beginning Hunger for Justice. The Adult Fellowship group offers opportunities for us just to have fun together. I have high hopes of the new Hospitality Committee. I would encourage them to define their role in a broad manner to encourage opportunities for hospitality and fellowship within the church.

As we move through this interim period, we need to maintain our regular program, but there are other tasks we must consider as well. While the pulpit committee does its work, we also must be working; deciding where we want to 90 from here as a congregation, looking at our past, and developing a vision for our future in broad terms, so that we may hire a minister who will provide leadership in going where the congregation wants to go. This is a time for talking and even arguing about who we are as a church, and what the important tasks of the next few years will be. I know that this church has a tendency to shy away from dissent and conflict because of the experience with the merger. I think it is time to affirm that conflict may be both necessary and constructive in determining the future of this church, as long as it is approached in a loving and open manner. In the coming months, we must feel able to talk together freely, to find out where there is consensus and where there is a diversity of opinion. That is part of the specific ministry we must perform among ourselves at this time. (over (over)

The greatest number of changes involved our staff. Dr. Shepard resigned in his new pastorate in New Jersey. Liz Oettinger joined us in August of 1980 and we were privileged to participate in her ordination in October. Her enturing the Search group has become important and meaningful to many women. We have made several changes in the building. In 1980 there was a successful \$50,000 capital fund drive and we were able to make necessary repairs on the built over the walkway at the back of the church. We have also made several program changes. In 1979 we began an adult education program in October and in December we sponsored a Hmong refugee family.

We have had two delightful Christmas pageants. We have changed the wording of our Covenant to reflect a more equalitarian viewpoint. We have established a Board of Christian Outreach and a Personnel Committee. The Adult Fellowship Group is now a well-established group.

Some of our undertakings have not been successful. Our attempt to establish a task force to search for ways to serve the needs of older people, possibly including a continuum of care facility did not get beyond a few meetings. Sunday morning radio broadcasts were discontinued after a brief period. Efforts to organize an "18-30" group continue to be in the fledgling stage.

Traditionally there are several references to our financial situation in the annual report and this year is not likely to be an exception. It is an inescapable fact that we are moving closer to the time when "something" has to be different. On January 1, 1979 we listed a total active membership of 589 and we approved a budget of \$132,759.00. On January 1, 1983 we listed a total membership of 585 and we approved a budget of \$183,204.00 with income projected to be \$155,320; a deficit of \$27,884. Our membership has not increased but our expenses have increased almost 40 percent. These facts speak for themselves.

Where do we go from here? We are in an exciting and challenging time. A planning process. Our question was, "Over the next five years, I think the major emphasis at pilgrim Church should be:". Responses included: deepening the worship life of the church, becoming more involved in social action, developing the church as a caring, close-knit community, and working to involve the present members more actively in the life of the church.

There is much to be done and the directions can be found in these responses.

We have again enjoyed the seasonal pleasures of the picnic at the end of the Sunday School year, the hospitality of "Homecoming" in the fall, the meaningful service of Thanksgiving (shared with Peace Church), and the traditional religious holidays. In addition to their Christmas Pageant, the children have been taking a more visible part in our church service. Ms Morris has specific training and experience in the interim ministry and has extensive experience in Christian Education and outreach activities as well.

- 5. Attend to financial state of the church.

- 7. Approach former members who may wish to return.
 8. Develop a lay ministry.

- 9. Share previous interim experiences.
 10. Consider updating hymnal.
- 10. Consider updating hymnal.

Our concern, however, is that our commitment to peace as a congregation needs further implementing to allow personal responses to the life issues. needs further implementing to allow personal for Peace that allows the congregation We have therefore worked out a Covenant for Peace that allows the congregation as a whole to express itself along four lines as indicated below. We will be asking for a vote on the Covenant at the Annual Meeting. During the course of the coming year further concrete lines of action will be suggested for individuals, families and the congregation to follow if they wish. Examples include lifestyle changes, political action and study/education groups.

COVENANTING FOR PEACE

1. Prayer and Spiritual Examination

Prayer is at the core of peacemaking. It is both a recognition of our own sin and a celebration of Christ's victory over the darkness of human folly which contributes to violence, hunger and other peace-destructive concerns. Prayer leads us into examination of our lifestyles, the re-examination of our values, the commitment to justice as Christians that requires of us biblical reflection and action in the world.

2. Education

This part of the covenant of peace commits us to learn, to move from passivity to informed awareness and responsibility. Education in peace requires of us a movement from narrow "one cause" explanations of peace toward an "inter-relationship of causes" worldwide.

3. Evangelism

We covenant together to spread the gospel of peace, taking the message of the urgency of peace in our time to our immediate community in a concrete manner that can draw other persons into dialogue and action within the covenant for peace.

4. Public Witness

The fourth element of our covenant for peace requires of us to bear active public witness to the imperatives of peace. This involves the demonstration of our commitment in lifestyle changes, in acting differently toward others, in living a life that demonstrates peace and not merely gives lip service. With Christ as our model, our covenant for peace needs to actualize itself concretely inside and outside of the confines of our congregation.
