The Church Council has had a busy year. We began by having a retreat in June at the Van Evera's cabin on the Brule. In addition to having a wonderful time, we also initiated the long range planning process. This began by appointing a long range planning committee, which will present a draft of a long range plan at the annual meeting in May. The committee has worked very hard and has solicited input from all Pilgrims in developing the plan. We hope to begin implementation during Pilgrim Rediscovery Month next September.

The Church Council also worked with the Stewardship Committee and the Trustees to develop a new approach both to the stewardship campaign and the development of a budget. At our November meeting we had the difficult task of balancing the budget, and everyone was able to work together to come up with a balanced, workable budget.

In addition to long range planning and increased involvement in the budgeting process, the Church Council has also agreed to coordinate the Bazaar in the future and to work with BOND to develop an organized attempt to listen to all members of Pilgrim.

This year has also seen the arrival of Jody Ondich, our new associate minister. With about six weeks of cramming she absorbed as much information about Pilgrim as she could before Jack went on sabbatical, and she filled both jobs admirably during his absence. We are looking forward to many more years with Jody and her many talents.

Jack was finally able to take his well deserved and long postponed sabbatical. It is good to have him back sharing his many varied experiences with us.

Pat Wellborn, our office manager for the past twelve years retired in the fall and has been ably replaced by Yvonne Schmidt, who was able to take over this complex job without missing a beat.

May next year at Pilgrim prove to be an even better one than this past year.

SENIOR MINISTER John H. Kemp

A year ago at this time the Search Committee was interviewing four excellent candidates to be our Associate Minister. Their unanimous choice, Jody Ondich, likewise was called by unanimous vote of the congregation in June. She began her ministry with us August 15, and her energy and deep love for the church has been contagious since day one! I am pleased to have Jody as a colleague and friend. I'm also grateful for the half-time interim ministry of Virginia Kennedy-Bergfalk, who served with us in 1993 through July, sharing with us her sensitive spiritual gifts. Pilgrim also has been blessed richly by the skills and gracious spirit of Yvonne Schmidt, our office manager since September.

Also a year ago, a committee under Pearl Fuller's leadership was working hard planning the ten day summer visit of twenty-one friends from our partner church, Central United Reformed Church in Bath, England. Many Pilgrims shared in the hospitality of this exchange visit, held biannually for many years.

My year was highlighted by a long-awaited sabbatical, two months in the fall and one in the winter. The variety of short-term events I chose both nourished and refreshed me. Several week-long conferences on the church and ministry offered fresh insights; my two weeks at the Quakers' Pendle Hill retreat center outside Philadelphia was a rich experience in that faith tradition; three weeks as a volunteer at Biloxi's Back Bay Mission allowed me to share in the life of one of our UCC's fine homeland ministries. (Many of us heard about it through their shrimp boil which we hosted a few years ago.) During the sabbatical, Jody Ondich and our lay leaders gave us leadership in ways we all appreciate!

My report a year ago spoke of the Council's beginning a planning process. In the past year our excellent Long Range Planning Committee has carried out that process creatively and energetically. Their report to us this Annual Meeting offers a strong sense of direction as we move toward the 21st century.

Our worship life is enriched by Pilgrims of all ages! We have enjoyed the increasing participation of our children in music led by Jane Nelson. Our choir continues its fine tradition of sacred music. We continue to search for ways to include a wider variety of music, including contemporary hymns (as in the service led by our Peace and Justice Committee in January). We welcomed several pulpit guests during the year: our own Mary Van Evera (on Laity Sunday, June 13); Susan Henderson (August 8), new pastor of Central United Reformed Church in Bath, England; Ty Schroyer (October 24), Director, Domestic Abuse Intervention Project; Judy Megankia (November 11), Regional Coordinator, Kerygma Bible Study; Brooks Anderson (January 16), Pastor, Immanuel Lutheran Church, Proctor; Armin Schmidt (March 13), Executive Director, UCC Council for American Indian Ministries.

Beyond Pilgrim, I chair United Seminary's Continuing Education Advisory Committee, Co-Direct the Eastern Association UCC Make a Difference Endowment Campaign, and serve on the Arrowhead Interfaith Council and BOND Boards. Also in our Pilgrim family, Judy Casserberg was a delegate to last summer's UCC General Synod and serves on the Conference Minnesota youth delegates; Clyde Johnson serves on the Eastern Association Council and Minnesota Conference Peace and Justice Network Coordinator. Last summer Jody Ondich completed a term on the UCC Executive Council. In community ministries, Dennis Falk serves on the Boards of United Campus Ministry and Habitat for Humanity; Jackie Falk was Treasurer of BOND; Steve Cushing and Kristyn Hoffman are on CHUM's Executive Committee, Kris as Treasurer. On April 23rd, Pilgrim hosted some 200 delegates to the UCC Eastern Association's Annual Meeting. In these ways many Pilgrims serve the church beyond our congregation.

In the coming year I look forward to the implementation of our planning goals and objectives, to new members becoming involved in our life, to more opportunities to build relationships and community in our church life. As always, pastoral care remains a priority in ministry as does the leadership of worship that offers meaning to as many Pilgrims as possible.

May God be with us all as we serve in ministry together.

The Peace and Justice Committee had a couple of very good events this last year, and has good ideas for the next. I especially enjoyed the worship around the Martin Luther King Junior holiday — it really fed the spirit! Stay tuned for more from them this next year, too.

I am enjoying Duluth, I am loving the people of Pilgrim church. It feels like home, and that is very nice indeed. Thank you once again for your warm welcome and energizing spirit. May this next year together be as blessed and as creative as the last 9 months have been.

"The Whole People of God" curriculum has been used in the Sunday School program again this year, and the response again is very favorable from both teachers and students. Having added Karen Post as our Sunday School Coordinator and Jane Nelson as our Children's Music Director is tremendous for our program. The children have shared many of their songs with us during worship, and have been flourishing under Jane's guidance. A wonderful Christmas pageant was held in December. Special thanks to Dawn Silvestrini and Deb Wagner for all of their hard work in organizing the pageant. Church School Sunday will be held on May 22.

The Youth program has been having a busy year. This year our Confirmation program has changed from a one-year to a two-year program to include both 8th and 9th graders. Many youth activities have been held, including the Halloween Carnival, bowling events, and meetings. But the primary focus this year has been in fundraising for the upcoming trip to participate in a Habitat for Humanity work camp in New Orleans. Cookies have been baked, meals made, and shares of stock sold so that the youth can attend this work camp. All of the parents of youth should be commended for their encouragement and support of this project.

The Adult Education programs were fewer in number this year, but the ones that were held were excellent. They covered a variety of subjects including school issues, health care, and domestic violence. I am now completing my second year as Church School Coordinator. This year I also volunteered as a teacher in the 1st and 2nd grade class. I had planned on teaching for only one unit but I found it so enjoyable that I stayed with it for the whole year.

Teaching a class allowed me to gain some hands-on experience with our curriculum, "The Whole People of God." This was our second year using it and materials for next year have already been ordered

Our Church School year began in July with a Peace Camp. Joan Semenchuk and Virginia Kennedy-Bergfalk headed up the coordination and many adults pitched in to help with teaching music, snacks, and guest speakers. The children learned how to interact peacefully and respect others.

Church School itself began on September 12. We have about 65 registered students with an average attendance of about 45 children. A change in grading structure will allow each group of children to stay together for most of their church school years. For example the current 1st and 2nd grade will become a 2nd and 3rd next year and a 3rd and 4th the following year. It is hoped this will develop better group cohesiveness and lead to a stronger youth group.

The annual UNICEF Carnival was held once again at Halloween. Our youth raised \$124 at the carnival and an additional \$29 was collected by children trick-or-treating for UNICEF.

Our Church School children also became more involved with Stewardship this year. The children drew pictures depicting what church means to them, these were made into buttons and passed out to the congregation for Stewardship kick-off on October 31.

Our Christmas season began with the annual Advent workshop coordinated this year by Barb Watry. A fun event where families can really work together to get into the Christmas spirit.

The Christmas program this year was coordinated by Jody Ondich, Deb Wagner, and Dawn Silvestrini. The children told the Christmas story using a variety of new songs and old favorites.

We have been privileged to hear our young people sing on many occasions this year. Under the direction of Jane Nelson, the children's singing has really developed. There are plans for perhaps starting a youth choir next year.

Easter again had the children searching for their own special egg. It is fun to see all the children in their fine Easter clothes rushing madly about in search of the true meaning of Easter!

The Church School held its annual Open House on May 1st, this year we coordinated it with a Christian Board of Publication book fair. An opportunity for the parents to meet the teachers, see the classrooms and purchase some fine books.

The Church School year ends on May 22 with Church School Sunday. This year a short musical is being planned followed by the annual planting of the flower bed out front.

I have enjoyed again my journey with you. It is a journey of hope for the future as I watch our young people grow in faith in a caring community.

CHRISTIAN OUTREACH BOARD John Merrill

The Board of Christian Outreach has budgetary and organizational responsibility for Pilgrim's outreach to others. The board is also responsible for interpreting the work of the wider United Church of Christ to our congregation, and for educating our membership about needs in our local and global community.

Nationally and internationally, Pilgrim continued its strong commitment to Our Church's Wider Mission (OCWM). These contributions help provide direct assistance to those in need around the world. Over 60% of our Basic Support remains in our Minnesota Conference to support ministries in our own state (including Duluth) and provide services to our churches,

Pilgrim continued its support of Central Hillside United Ministries (CHUM), the Twin Ports Ministry to Seafarers, United Campus Ministry, the Arrowhead Council of Churches, United Theological Seminary and Northland College.

Through the special community needs budget, the Board of Christian Outreach tries to respond to needs in Duluth. Our emphasis has been on supporting those organizations that rely on contributions from churches. Due to budget reductions the Board forwarded recommendations for funding local organizations to the Pilgrim Fund Distribution Committee. This resulted in the following local organizations being funded:

DIACONATE Kate Baldwin and Bob Lindquist, Co-Chairs

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The Diaconate is a Board of Pilgrim Congregational Church that has 15 lay members. This year's membership included Huck Andresen, Kate Baldwin, Cy Brown, Paul Cutler, Betsy Fochs-Hanlon, Bill Johnson, Peg Kirsch-Lee, Bob Lindquist, Bill Mickelsen, Jane Nelson, John Clark Pegg, Jack Setterlund, Jane Shull, and Pam Tyler. Harriet Fredin served with us for five months. Steve Watry joined the roster in January.

The Diaconate is responsible for providing lay leadership for the spiritual activities of the church. In addition, the Diaconate sees that the routine functions of worship proceed in a smooth manner. The special functions of the Diaconate fall into three general categories: worship, membership nurture, and membership development.

The Stephen Ministry, begun in 1992, continues to be a strong program of the Diaconate. Pilgrim's membership receives ongoing care from a team of competent Stephen Ministers. The Diaconate appreciates the many hours that these people have donated to others. In the late Spring of 1993 a committee was formed to recruit a new Stephen Leader. The search conducted at that time was not able to find a candidate. In September at the request of the Stephen Leaders the Diaconate called a new committee. Bill Mickelsen, Jane Shull, John Clark Pegg and Kate Baldwin met with Mary Lemke and Gertrude Jacobson to write a policy book for Stephen Ministry at Pilgrim Church. This document is designed to facilitate communication, to clarify budget issues and to ensure a smooth transition of leadership. The final paper was adopted in January and will help the Diaconate as we search for a new Stephen Leader. A heartfelt thank you to Mary Lemke for three years of intensive service as a Stephen Leader. Mary resigned from the Program on April 30th to pursue her many other interests.

The Diaconate worked hard in October on its budget request. Our Church's new stewardship process requires each board to take an in-depth look at its expenditures. In an effort to cut our budget by 25% the following reductions were made: individual subscriptions to MN Conference Newsletter Voyager were canceled for our next subscription reorder, pre-printed bulletin covers were eliminated with our next reorder in June, our advertising budget was cut by \$150 and the Stephen Ministry budget was cut by \$100. It is our hope that these items can be reinstated in the future.

The biennial review of the membership rolls were completed in 1993. Letters were mailed to 22 persons; all were placed on the inactive roll.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Robert Reichert

The Board of Trustees are generally responsible for maintenance of church property and matters of finance and budget. This was a good year in all of these areas of Trustee concern.

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A new budget and fund-raising process was initiated. The result was a balanced budget that was adopted by the congregation prior to the beginning of the 1994 fiscal year. This significant accomplishment was achieved through commitment and hard work of many people.

Early in the process, the Trustees established goals for increased pledging and budget reductions. A new stewardship committee chaired by Pat Rood and Patricia Clure, along with a commitment of the entire congregation exceeded the fund-raising goal. All of the boards and committees responded to the need for budget reduction.

The church has significant financial assets primarily in the Second Century, Parsonage and Pilgrim Funds. The first distribution from the Pilgrim Fund was made during the past year, and a distribution for the current year has been authorized. Trustees are responsible for overall management of these funds. Daily management was transferred from Norwest Bank Trust Department to Putnam Mutual Funds held at Paine-Webber.

Several building projects were undertaken to maintain the church property in good condition. This work included painting exterior wood, including windows and doors, roof repair, disconnecting roof drains from the sanitary sewer, and reconnecting to the city storm drain, recarpeting the nursery and crib room, and entrance floor mats. Other work that is planned or underway includes a barrier-free restroom on the first floor, improvements to the parlor, Salter Hall and the main kitchen, a new phone system, and sidewalk repair on Twenty-third Avenue East. Also, the kitchen is now being inspected and licensed annually by the County Health Department. Funds for the improvements have come from a variety of sources, including bequests from Helen G. Ramshaw and Caroline Marshall, a distribution from the Pilgrim Fund, memorials, and personal contributions.

I want to thank the Stewardship Committee, all of the Boards and Committees, and the entire congregation for the excellent response to the need to produce a balanced budget in a timely manner. Peter Bagley has done an outstanding job as Treasurer for the past four years. His work has been greatly appreciated by the Trustees.

I have appreciated the opportunity and challenge of serving as Chair of the Trustees for the past year. I also want to thank Bob Heller who preceded me as Chair of the Trustees for all of his hard work as both Bob and I complete our terms on the Board.

Other members of the Board of Trustees are: Jesse Bradley, Doug Britton, Patricia Clure, Triss Harwood, Gay Lynne Liebertz, Rick Sailstad, and Marge Whitney. My thanks to all for your dedication, hard work and a good year.

STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE

Thanks to all who participated (pledged) and supported (worked hard) on our rejuvenated stewardship drive '1994 Campaign for Pilgrim' conducted in November 1993. Overall giving through pledges increased an average 8.6% with total pledges of \$198,513.

In last year's report, Robert E. Heller noted that, "It is apparent that the stewardship of the Church needs to be re-examined and rejuvenated if Pilgrim is to be able to meet its obligations in the future." To that end, an ad hoc committee on stewardship was formed in April 1993 facilitated by Kay Slack. The committee met two times in April and submitted eight recommendations to the Board of Trustees and the Church Council.

Marge Whitney, Chair of the Trustee's Finance Committee, formed the stewardship committee in June 1993. Members of the committee are Patricia Clure, Pat Rood, Karl Honigman, Carol Tierney and Cliff Grindy. The committee began meeting in July to prepare for the '94 campaign. Using the ad hoc committee's recommendations we developed a strategy for a successful campaign. Our strategy was to take the campaign to the Church leadership, boards and committees first and then to the general membership. Only one campaign would be run over one month taking the results as the 1994 budget cap. That is, the budget was to be finalized based on the results of the drive, not the other way around. We personalized the letters to members through the use of the office computer system and the most able help of Yvonne Schmidt, the Office Manager. The Personnel Committee is composed of Dale Baker, Kenneth Pride, Doug Britton, Joan Morrison, Barb Watry, and Bill Mickelsen.

Our responsibilities include interviewing each employee twice each year, recommending employee compensation to the Board of Trustees, evaluating and recommending changes to existing job descriptions, creating job descriptions for new positions, updating the policy manual, and acting as a sounding board for employee concerns and grievances.

We said a reluctant good-by to Pat Welborn and worked with the Trustees to fill the vacancy in the office manager position last summer. We welcomed Yvonne Schmidt to that position.

The committee was in consultation with the search committee concerning the job description for the Associate Minister.

The members of the committee had meetings with each staff member to review their work. We regret that due to budget constraints we were unable to offer salary increases to the staff in 1994. For the same reason we determined that there was no funding for junior high or senior high youth workers in 1994.

The committee also worked with the Senior Minister as he developed his sabbatical plans.

The committee commends to the congregation the very competent staff of Pilgrim Church.

LONG RANGE PLANNING COMMITTEE Steve Downing

This is a summary of a much longer report that the Long Range Planning Committee has submitted to the Church Council for its consideration.

The Church Council, during a retreat held in the Summer of 1993, determined that there was a need for Pilgrim Congregational Church to develop a long range plan that would help guide the church in its decision making processes and serve to focus the church and its members on specific goals over the next five to seven years. The Council then identified seven individuals (Kate Baldwin, Nancy Burns, Steve Downing, Denny Falk, Clyde Johnson, Peg Johnson, and Joan Morrison) willing to serve on a Long Range Planning Committee. The charge to this committee and these individuals was to develop a Long Range Plan and present that plan to the Church Council for its consideration. The Church Council asked that the report be available for the Church Annual Meeting in May of 1994.

The Long Range Planning Committee tried very hard to listen and be open to the ideas and thoughts of all members of Pilgrim Church. Early in the process all of the various Church Boards were invited to submit to the committee their 'wish lists' of things they would like to see occur. Input from church members with respect to their long range hopes for Pilgrim was actively solicited throughout the planning process. An all church retreat was held on February 26, 1994 to help the committee identify those areas that would be particularly useful for Pilgrim to focus on. Using the input from the church membership at large, the various church boards, and an analysis of Pilgrim's strengths at the Long Range Planning Retreat, the Long Range Planning Committee recommends that the Church Council and Pilgrim Church seriously consider adopting the following four goals as the core components of any long range planning initiative that the Church Council and Pilgrim embark upon over the next 5-7 years:

- 1. Pilgrim Congregational Church will expand its outreach role in the community by developing concrete missional objectives and by visibly participating in selected community outreach activities.
- 2. Pilgrim Congregational Church will offer a wider variety of dynamic worship opportunities to praise God and to foster a sense of belonging to a community of faith. We will maintain the quality and enrich the variety of the music program.
- 3. Pilgrim Congregational Church will systematically maintain, enhance, and develop relational groups which enable members of the congregation to experience a sense of belonging.
- 4. Pilgrim Congregational Church will develop a plan to maintain and enhance the church building and its surrounding property to facilitate the congregation's mission and to improve the church's visibility.

BOND Patricia Clure and Jackie Falk

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The purpose of BOND remains two-fold: first, strengthen community by strengthening member institutions internally; and second, to build community across organizational lines to effectively address community visions and concerns, thereby developing community leadership.

Our purposes and goals remain the same. We are getting a better picture of what addressing those needs looks like in Duluth as opposed to the higher level of immediate need in the inner some of Duluth's needs when speaking about economic development, shared his perceptions of were directed to that issue his ideas have broader application. He spoke of how the American Dream in a sense has become a nightmare for everyone. A nightmare for those who have not achieved it, because of what they are forced to do without, e.g. adequate health care. And a nightmare for those who have achieved it because of the burden it becomes to sustain it. As we at Pilgrim continue to define self-interest, perhaps the question is not "Of what are we deprived?" but rather "What burdens us?"

This month begins a Pilgrim-designed Outreach Listening Process that will bring a team of 8-10 listeners to listen to the congregation over the course of three years. What we learn in general terms we will take back to the Council who will determine what concerns might require action, then prioritize and delegate them.

Three task forces are active in the community:

The <u>Health Care Task Force</u> seeks stabilized funding for the highly successful Health Care Access office, formed over a year ago through the efforts of BOND.

The <u>Housing Task Force</u> has been working in alliance with the Homeless Organizing

Project to convert Lakeside School into low and moderate income housing.

The newly-formed Economic Development Task Force is meeting with local independent banks to explore the creation of a locally-responsive, socially-responsible development fund through which we could obtain banking services and our money would stay in local use.

Due to Pilgrim's budget cuts, only part of our BOND dues were paid out of the budget. The BOND Core Team has committed to raise the balance of the dues by participating in the fall All-Church Bazaar. We will count on your support!

STEPHEN MINISTRY Mary Lemke and Gertrude Jacobson, Leaders

Stephen Ministers for all or part of this year included: Mardi Bagley, Kate Baldwin, Harriet Fredin, Gerry Heller, Dorothy Honigman, Roy Magney, Peg Mickelsen, and Charlie Nichol.

The Congregation has understood and accepted our program much better during the past year. Requests for care have come to us from Congregation members as well as from clergy. Favorable comments from care receivers about the nature and quality of care given by Stephen Ministers and Leaders have increased considerably as we've had opportunity to serve more people.

Mardi Bagley, Stephen Minister, gave a good summary when she commented that, "the number of hours we spend in Stephen Ministry is irrelevant compared to the amount of good we do." Keeping this in mind, we'll also share some statistics. From the beginning of our care-giving in May, 1992 to March, 1994, Stephen Ministers completed a total of 258 care-giving visits and 220 caring phone calls, amounting to a total of 308 hours of service. This is in addition to attending supervisory meetings twice a month after completion of training. In one year's time, our current group of 9 ministers and leaders will contribute more than 324 hours to peer supervision of care-giving assignments, and in related continuing education. With the exception of planned vacation time or absence due to major family emergencies, there has been a record of "perfect attendance" at all supervisory meetings and training sessions since the beginning of the program. This is a good testament to the high motivation of persons who chose to serve the Stephen Ministry program, and also underscores the value of both the initial training and on-going supervisory process.

The present strong demand for our service indicates the need to train an additional group of Stephen Ministers. Also, new leadership is called for, as this responsibility needs to be rotated and shared by more Church members to keep the program viable. Gert and Mary have recommended that the Church select two new Stephen Leaders to be trained this summer, to begin immediate service after completion of training. Mary Lemke, whose term as Stephen Leader was to have expired June, 1993, will terminate her services as Leader on April 30, 1994. Gert Jacobson, who stayed beyond her July, 1993 term of service, will finish her Leadership duties in September, 1994.

Funding for the program during 1993 was provided by gift funds. In 1994, money for Stephen Ministry was included in the Stewardship drive and has already been supplemented by more than \$270.00 in cash paid by Stephen Ministers and Stephen Leaders who contributed their own funds in support of continuing education opportunities.

The Stephen Ministers and Leaders are most grateful for the support and encouragement of the Congregation and the cooperation of the clergy. We especially thank Jack Kemp, who exceptional caring attention to the pastoral care needs of <u>all</u> members of the Congregation. As beginning to the present.
