The reports from the churches were for the most part cheering and indicative of growth; the most encouraging results were reported from the needlest fields. The total membership was reported as about eight hundred.

An unusual feature of business was the passing, by the committee on credentials. on the standing of all ministers present except that of Rev. Alexander Milne; all others present having come into the Conference during the past year. Another singular fact was that four of the ministers present were born abroad; one in England, one in Scotland, a third in Turkey, and a fourth in the Hawaiian Islands.

After receiving the new churches of Grand Marais, Backus and Hackensack into the conference, Rev. H. R. Harris gave an outline of his experience of seven years on the frontier in a parish seventy miles long by forty miles wide, but he had his wife to help him. She was duly licensed to preach, and preach she did, holding one hundred and eighty nine services in three years. This conference gladly extended her license to preach; we may have an opportunity to hear her some day.

Rev. W. J. Conard followed with a paper on "The Wisdom of Yoking Small Fields Together", a question which seemed to have only one side (our own church and the First in Brainerd were so yoked from 1875 to 1878). After discussion of the two addresses came the call to luncheon which was served by the Ladies' Union in the church parlors, and was greatly appreciated as it deserved to be. This was followed by a few informal addresses, Mr. Milne calling on Rev. Mr. Morehouse to respond to the toast "A New Comer"; Rev. Mr. Conard to "A Tramp Abroad"; and Mr. Wm. S. Woodbridge to "The Deacons."
At two P. M. came the Woman's Hour" conducted by Mrs. Wm. S.

Woodbridge; half of the time was given to the foreign work, the other half to the work at home. Mrs. Coman C. Ames gave an interesting sketch of Medical Missions, followed by Miss L. Ella Roe with a brief summary of what our own American Board is doing in this special direction. After a solo, Kipling's Recessional by Miss Roella Lovett, Mrs Siehl of Minneapolis, assistant state treasurer of the Minnesota Woman's Home Missionary Union, brought the greetings of that society.

As was fitting the next address was on a missionary topic, "The Triumphs of the Gospel in the Pacific" by Rev. Theodore W. Gulick the son of missionary parents, born in the Hawaiian Islands where his father and mother were missionaries for forty five years. Few names stand higher on the roll of missionary heroes than does the name Gulick.

At four o'clock came a discussion on the question "How shall we Organize the Men for more Efficient Work in the Church?" Mr. E. A. Schulze and Mr. C. E. Lovett conducted the discussion clearly and forcibly, showing the great need from the stand-point of the men as well as from that of the church, for an awakening of the men to the real work of the church. It is hoped that some tangible results will come from this before long.

At the close of the afternoon session, on the invitation of Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Mitchell, the delegates and such of their friends as were able to go, enjoyed a trip on the bay in launches, followed by a dinner at the Duluth Boat Club, and this thoughtful attention on the part of Mr. and Mrs. Mitchell was greatly appreciated.

In the evening Dr. Merrill gave one of his stirring addresses on Home Missions, but his range of vision was no narrow one, it included the world. Rev. J. A. Lumley closed the general exercises of the Conference with an address on "The Ultimate Supremacy of the Kingdom of Jesus Christ."

After reading and approving the minutes the Conference adjourned to meet next year at Biwabik.

The thanks of the Conference as well as of Pilgrim Church are due to Miss Rogers, Miss Swan, Miss Lovett and our church choir for furnishing the music; and to the Mayflowers for so tastefully decorating the church.

A Letter from our Missionary Pastor.

It is a pity that more of our members did not hear the remarkable letter from our missionary in Turkey, the Rev. H. M. Irwin, which was read at mid-week service, last Thursday evening. Along with the letter was an account of a splendid work for boys and young men which he has inaugurated in Talas, and which has been attended by marked success. It is evident that Mr. Irwin is a man of unusual calibre, one to be proud of as our representative. Two extracts from his letter which follow will give an idea of the soundness of his principles, and the wisdom of his methods.

"In this country profession of mouth is easy, so easy in fact, that we take no stock in it until we see it backed up by a considerable time of straight living.

There is no place like the treasury of a station in which to learn what the people really are All young missionaries, in my opinion, should have a siege of These oriental people are so glib of tongue when it comes to matters of religion, that it takes plain every-day dealing in business to learn what they really are. More than once I have caught men who professed all sorts of holiness and even perfection, trying to play sharp tricks. On the one hand it is very discouraging and shattering to one's faith in mankind when one meets such cases, on the other it is equally encouraging when one meets straight forward, honest dealing, as is frequently the case. For in this country there is so much crooked slippery business, and has been for generations, from the government down, that it speaks well for the missionary work when one meets cases where everything is done frankly, openly and above board—straight. The principles of business rectitude to which we are accustomed in Americans. in America, (in action we get far from them many times, but we are taught them anyhow), are not the result of fifty years training, but of generations, and we shall be a supported by the support of the result of the supported by the support of the support of the supported by the support of shall have to keep on digging for years, yea, generations before we get this people where we are. But with patience, perseverance and the help of God, it can be

"There is certainly a decided change in the lives of the boys and especially of some. As the work goes forward we look for a greater improvement. We look for no false religious pretensions, but for lives, straight, pure and manly. On this foundation we hope to build Christian character, if indeed one can separate them, for me it cannot be, except in thought. Plymouth church, West Duluth, is now without a minister, Rev J. A. Lumley, having resigned his charge and accepted a call to a church in Ohio.

At last mid-week service, a letter was granted to Miss Carrie B. Russell, who will unite with the Congregational church, of Fargo, North Dakota.

Rev. James Robert Smith, formerly pastor of Pilgrim church, Superior, and now of Quincy, Illinois, delivered a lecture in Superior, last Wednesday evening, at which he was given an enthusiastic reception by his old parishioners and friends.

The annual report of our missionary pastor, Rev. Herbert M. Irwin, was delayed in transit and arrived too late to be read at the annual meeting. Extracts from the report are published in this number of the Bulletin, but it needs to be read in full to get an adequate idea of the splendid work which is being done by our representatives on the foreign field.

The annual meeting of the Congregational church, at Biwabik, of which Rev. H. R. Harris is the pastor, was held last Tuesday evening. The financial report showed that two hundred dollars more was raised during 1908, than in the preceding year. Besides being pastor of the church, Mr. Harris is superintendent of the Sunday School and has under his charge two other outlying stations, where he preaches at stated intervals.

A pleasant feature of the annual meeting of the church, last Tuesday evening, was the presentation by the members of the Ladies' Union, of a loving cup to the retiring president, Mrs. T. J. Davis. The gift was typical of the high regard in which Mrs. Davis is held by the members of the congregation and of their appreciation of her work as president of the Ladies' Union during the past year. Mrs. S. W. Clark, the new president, presented the cup and Mrs. Davis responded briefly expressing her thanks.

Annual Meeting of Pilgrim Church.

The thirty-eighth annual meeting of the church was held in the parlors on Tuesday evening. January nineteenth. Promptly at half past six two hundred fifteen people sat down to the bountiful supper prepared by the ladies and those coming in after the supper swelled the number to about two hundred twenty-five, making this one of our most largely attended business meetings in recent years.

After the supper and an enjoyable social hour the business session was begun, the pastor acting as moderator. The meeting was opened with the singing of the hymn "Blest Be the Tie that Binds," followed by reading of Scripture and prayer by the pastor. The annual reports of the officers of the church, of the pastor and of the presidents and treasurers of our various organizations were then submitted and were listened to with great interest.

'inese reports which cover fully our church activities for the past year are on file with the clerk and can not on account of their length be reproduced in the Bulletin. They all bear witness to a growing financial strength in the church and an interest in its work.

The Christian Endeavor Society, through its president, Miss Ethel Myron, and the Sunday school, through Mr. Andrew Nelson, superintendent, reported a very gratifying increase in the membership of these organizations.

Mrs. Robert Smith, superintendent of the primary department of the Sunday school, recommended in her report the establishment of a "Cradle Roll," a new department to care for the very little children in the school.

The report from the Ladies' Union, submitted by Mrs. T. J. Davis, the retiring president, was heard with special interest as it evidenced the remarkable activity of the ladies during the year which enabled them to pay off the last fifteen hundred dollars of our mortgage debt leaving the present courch property, for the first time in its history free of all incumbrance. As noted elsewhere in the Bulletin, Mrs. Davis after reading her report was presented with a silver loving cup from the ladies of the church.

The Board of Trustees, through its chairman, Mr. Oscar Mitchell, reported that notwithstanding an increase in the annual budget the business of the church had been managed more easily during the past year than ever before, owing largely to the activity of the finance committee of which Mr. Ward Ames is chairman, in securing a considerable increase in the amount of our current weekly pledges. Mr. Mitchell stated in his report that since the previous annual meeting and without formal authorization by the church the trustees had voted that the salary of the pastor for 1908 be increased to three thousand dollars, and that this sum had been duly paid. He also requested that this action be ratified by the church and recommended that the salary of the pastor for 1909 be made three thousand dollars. By a unanimous vote of those present the action of the trustees was ratified as requested and their recommendation adopted.

The report of Mr. E. G. Chapman, clerk, showed an accession of eighteen members during the year and a loss of seventeen, three of these being by death.

On account of the approaching tenth anniversary of the beginning of his work here the pastor in his report took occasion to review briefly the growth of the church during the past ten years as shown by an increase of membership from 364 to 429 and a greatly enlarged financial strength, evidenced by the increased amount of expenditures for our home work and for missions being a grand total for the ten years of \$88,430.00. Of this amount our expenditures for 1908 were \$10,667. A gratifying feature is the great increase in the percentage of our gifts for missions, being nine and three-quarters per cent of the whole in 1898 and twenty-six and three-quarters per cent in 1908.

Reports were also presented by Miss Mary E. Murdoch, president of the Friends in Council; Mr. W. I. Prince, president of the Brotherhood; and Mrs. H. B. Paull, secretary of the Women's Missionary Society. In absence of Mrs. Paull her report was read by Mrs. W. G. Hegardt, and Mr. Milne read the report of the Mayflower society in absence of Miss Ruth G. Borland, the president. The financial statements which were submitted are published elsewhere in the Bulletin.

After hearing the reports the meeting proceeded to the election of officers and the following were elected: Trustees to serve for three years, Mr. Oscar Mitchell and Mr. W. G. Hegardt; deacons to serve for three years, Mr. T. H. Hawkes and Mr. Charles A. Smith; clerk to serve for one year, Mr. E. G. Chapman; treasurer of the general fund to serve for one year, Mr. H. W. Nicholls; treasurer of the benevolent fund to serve for one year, Mr. W. W. McMillan; members of the standing committee to serve for one year, Mrs. W. A. McGonagle and Miss L. Ella Roe; and members of the music committee to serve for one year, Mr. J. P. Johnson, Mrs. E. W. Matter and Mrs. Albert Baldwin. Orficers of the Sunday school to serve for one year were also chosen as follows: Superintendent, Mr. Andrew Nelson; assistant superintendent Mr. E. A. Schulze; superintendent of the primary department, Mrs. Robert Smith; secretary, Mr. Eugene H. Harbison; treasurer, Mr. Alonzo W. Taylor. The matter of selecting ushers for the ensuing year was referred to the Brotherhood. The present missionary committee was continued for another year, the members being, Mr. W. S. Woodbridge, Mr. W. I. Prince, Mr. W. G. Hegardt, Mr. Charles A. Duncan, Mr. George A. Gray, Mr. Ward Ames and Mr. Charles A. Smith. The pastor is also ex-officio a member of the committee.

The election of officers and other proceedings were conqueted with entire harmony and good feeling and all went from the meeting with an added sense of pride in the past from the meeting church and with an increased hope for her history of Pilgrim church and with an increased hope for her future usefulness.

Report of Our Missionary Pastor.

My particular work is that of treasurer and secretary of the Cesarea mission field or station, which is larger than any other field in Turkey, for besides our American missionaries we have thirty-five or more native helpers, with each of whom I have to keep separate accounts. Last year \$22,500 passed through my hands; this year \$17,500.

In addition work of all kinds falls upon the treasurer. from the ordinary repair upon a defective chimney, prescribing for a sick horse, or opening boxes from America and distributing their contents, to transacting business with the government. In such details most of my life is spent—not specially religious work you may think, but it brings me in contact with many people, and gives an opportunity to reach them.

Occasionally I find time for a preaching tour in the surrounding villages; have made two such tours this past year, one in the spring, the other in the fall. The first trip was not altogether enjoyable as my object was to reconcile two factions in the congregation. The fall tour was of quite a different kind, covering a number of our out-stations, among them two churches well-manned by native pastors, and in thriving

Another branch of work to which Mrs. Irwin as well as myself are giving time is our Boys' Club at Talas, an account of which to July 1st last I have previously given you. With the re-opening of this work in September there was a considerable falling off in attendance for which we were both sorry and glad; sorry because so many of the young men had passed from under our immediate influence; glad, because it showed the liberty that has now come to Turkey. Talas, five miles from Cesarea, is a town with no work for young men, and yet under the old regime they could not go away without permission from the authorities; practically they were forced to stay at home. Under the new liberty of travel about thirty young men belonging to our organization have left for other places. Our belief that we have touched the lives of these young men for good rests among other things, on this fact: two years ago it was not safe to leave outside or unguarded anything of value that could be easily carried off; now for weeks at a time things are left out and are untouched.

We are now negotiating for the rental of a building in Cesarea itself-a city of 60,000 people-in which to start a similar work for young men and boys. A friend in America, who visited us a year ago, has offered the money for this

work, and the possibilities of good are great.

Now a few words in regard to the wonderful revolution in Turkey. Parliament is an accomplished fact, and with it have come liberty of travel and speech and improved educational facilities. There is good prospect, too, of reduced and equitable taxation and the establishment of new industries; these things give promise of prosperity and progress, almost

Pray for us that we may still further break down the prejudice of centuries, and gain the great object for which the missionaries in Turkey have planned and toiled and prayed for three-quarters of a century. - Herbert M. Irwin.

A portion of the missionary funds of the Friends in Council, the Society of Christian Endeavor and the Sunday school, were turned over to the treasurer of the benevolent fund of the church and by him disbursed. For this reason the sum of \$103.22 is duplicated in the above summary, and should be deducted from the total receipts to arrive at the net amount of receipts for 1908.

An analysis of the financial statements of the various treasurers shows that they had on hand Jan. 1, 1908, missionary funds to the amount of about \$270.00, and that there was collected during the year for strictly missionary purposes from all sources about \$1,810.00. The disbursements of all departments of the church for purely missionary purposes, both home and foreign, were about \$2,035.00. This does not include receipts on account of the "deacons fund" of \$87.00, and disbursements on account of the same fund amounting to \$34.00.
