

#### Conference of the Lanmen's Missionary Movement

The Minnesota Conference of the Laymen's Missionary Movement held at Minneapolis, February fourth to seventh, is said by men competent to judge, to have been the most remarkable series of religious meetings ever held in the Northwest. The Conference had been planned during the past six months by a local committee of fifty or more leading business men of Minneapolis, headed by exmayor David P. Jones, and it brought toge her during the various meetings not less than one thousand earnest Christian laymen, representing eight religious bodies, and over fifty cities and towns of this state.

The principal speakers during all the meetings were four laymen who had studied the Foreign Missionary work at close range and who told of what they had seen rather than what they had heard. These men were David F. Wilbur, an exmember of the U. S. Congress, now Consul-General at Halifax, Nova Scotia, and formerly U. S. Consul at Singapore; Col. Elijah W. Halford, founder and editor of the Chicago Inter-Ocean, private secretary to President Harrison during his entire term in the White House, later an officer in the army and stationed in the Philippines; Wm. T. Ellis, a Philadelphia journalist, who recently made a trip of thirty-five thousand miles around the world for the purpose of studying Foreign Missions; and J. Campbell White of New York, who spent ten years of his life as a Young Men's Christian Association worker among the University students of Calcutta. The three men last named gave addresses at the opening meeting of the conference following the dinner at the West Hotel, on the evening of February fourth, when four hundred and sixty-five men, all that could be accommodated, had seats at the table and nearly as many more tried to secure tickets. All these four men and others who spoke missionaries on furlough, mission board secretaries and so on, had each a message of value and added to the interest of the meetings, but the man who towered above them all, simple, clear, with unerring logic and beautiful spirit was J. Campbell White.

The underlying thought of all the nine meetings was this-The evangelization of the world in this generation, and on this one question in some form or other, all the great thoughts and utterances of the conference, as well as the facts and figures presented, centered. Some of these were: the vastness of the work proposed - one thousand million souls in non-Christian lands; over against this put the words of Him who said "All power is given unto Me in Heaven and Earth." But never forget that while Christ can win the world, He cannot win the world alone.

Thirteen thousand missionaries now abroad can probably evangelize three hundred and twenty-five millions. It is estimated that each missionary, with the usual average of ten native helpers, can in fifteen to twenty five years, carry the Gospel message clearly to twenty-five thousand people, and lay the foundation of Christian education and civilization. This has been done in scores of instances in the last twenty-five years; what man has done, man, with God's help can do.

This leaves in non-Christian lands unprovided with the Gospel message, six hundred and seventy-five millions. Twenty-seven thousand missionaries, each covering a district containing twenty-five thousand people, would be required on the basis given above to carry the message of salvation to these six hundred and seventy-five millions. Remember that God has opened every door and thrown down every barrier; that the Bible, or portions of it, is now printed in five hundred and thirtyfour languages and dialects of the earth; that an average contribution of three dollars per year from each member of the protestant churches of America, would furnish our share of the money needed to send sufficient missionaries to carry the story of God's love to six hundred millions of God's children, who have never heard His name. But given the money, can we find the men and women, who will give their lives to this work? The Acts of the Apostles is still an unfinished book; the age of heroism has not passed away; the voice of Christ can today awaken responses in the human soul, as full and deep as when he called Saul on the road to Damascus. Nothing, absolutely nothing, stands in the way of the fulfillment in this generation of the prophecy.—"He shall see of the travail of His soul and shall be satisfied," except the indifference of His followers-your indifference and mine-W. S. W.







#### In Memoriam

The following resolution presented by Mr. W. S. Woodbridge, was adopted unanimously at last mid-week service and was ordered spread upon the minutes of the church.

"We desire to put on record the expression of our sense of the great loss sustained, not only by the church, but by the community at large in the death of our brother beloved, Charles Alden Smith.

As a member of the church for nearly ten years, and a deacon for the past five years, we came to know him, and to know him was to love and honor him. Behind and above every service he rendered to the church, and through his position as principal of the High School, to the whole community, was the man himself, kindly and true, gentle in his firmness and firm in his gentleness, the Christian gentleman, without fear and without reproach.

Words are but feeble symbols to express the value of such a life, or our appreciation of it; powerless to bring comfort to the widow and the fatherless. But feeble and powerless though they are, we offer them as the heartfelt expression of affection on the part of this church for our friend and brother, and of sympathy for his family in this crushing bereavement."

### Charles Alden Smith

Charles Alden Smith was born in Princeton, Illinois, in 1853. The town was founded by New England people. His mother was a native of New Hampwas founded by New England people. His mother was a native of New Hampwas founded by New England of John Alden, reputed the first man to step on Plymouth Rock from the Mayflower, whose courtship of Priscilla Mullens was celebrated by Rock from the Mayflower, whose courtship of Priscilla Mullens was celebrated by Longfellow. With such an inheritance and with the influence of the church, founded by New Englanders and nourished in the lofty traditions of New England life, it is by New Englanders and a devoted adherent of the Pilgrim ecclesiastical order, not strange that he was a devoted adherent of the Pilgrim ecclesiastical order.

He was graduated from Amherst College, Massachusetts, in the class of 1874, and took up the work of teaching. After a brief service in a military academy in Orchard Lake, Michigan, he returned to his native state and wrought at his chosen profession successively in Peoria, Ottawa, Rockford and Lake Forest. At Lake Forest, he was principal of the academy, the preparatory department of Lake Forest University. From there he came to Duluth, in 1899, to the principalship of the Central High School.

The responsibilities of the position are many and arduous. With so many kinds of people to deal with, directly and indirectly, wisdom of the rarest kind is demanded in order to achieve success. It was not long before the whole city knew that a man of high ability and sterling character was at the head of the High School. The wisdom with which he dealt with the difficulties that arose, gained him universal respect, and his never-failing gentle courtesy won the hearts, even of those who for a moment may have differed with him. Tennyson's lines concerning Arthur Hallam describe him perfectly: "And thus he bore without abuse, the grand old name of gentleman."

He identified himself with Pilgrim church immediately on his arrival in the city. His modest, unassuming, helpful spirit soon won the cordial esteem and warm affection of our people. His purchase of a home in Hunter's Park, cut the family off in part from regular attendance upon the church services. Mr. Smith, however continued to serve as deacon to which office he was elected in 1904. He was a valuable member of the Diaconate, his knowledge of men, his experience, his native tact and sincere piety filling nobly the ideal of that office. He was also an honored member of the Board of Directors of the Young Men's Christian Association. His character was an honor to the church and his daily life an exemplification of its teaching.

The universal mourning over his death, is an impressive evidence of the power and attractiveness of a life consecrated to a high Christian ideal.

For several months he bore without complaint the burden of ill health, and when his physicians advised an operation, he submitted cheerfully and bravely, expecting soon to be able to resume his work. The surgeons found what had been hope of a successful issue was impossible. They hoped, however, to prolong his fitteenth, in the presence of his family, with tender messages of farewell to each one and a beautiful expression of his trust in God.

#### An Easter Message

"If then ye were raised together with Christ seek the things that are above, where Christ is." In this profound way Paul makes the resurrection a perennial fountain of noblest life. It is something more than an event that happened at a certain definite time; it is a victory endlessly repeated in the lives of all those who name the name of Christ. There are in Christian experience what may be called the analogues of the crowning events in the work of Christ. He died and rose again; his disciples die unto sin to rise again in the newness and power of a better life. This is what conversion means; it is also the reality of a daily consecration. The evening confession, when sincere and complete, is the death of that day's life; the morning prayer is the sign of the soul's renewal and the dedication of the new day to a fresh incarnation of the spirit of Christ.

"Seek the things that are above, where Christ is." To look at life through Christ's eyes, to see the world in the light of God, that is the power of a truly spiritual life. Augustine confessed that in his wayward days he did not do this. "I had my back to the light, and my face to the things enlightened, whence my face itself was not enlightened." To see the light and to rejoice in it, to lift the face to the Sun eternal, letting it flood heart and soul and daily life with radiance, is the reality suggested by Paul's words. Seeking always the things above, the higher righteousness, the more perfect obedience, the nobler love, the more Christ-like spirit—this is the power of His resurrection. In this way it is an ever present reality, a daily sign of his grace and goodness.—Alexander Milne.





"Boston, Mass., April 19 — A brief cable dispatch, in effect a cry for help from the scene of the massacre at Adana, Asia Minor, where D. M. Rogers and Mr. Maurer perished, has been received by the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions here. The message, tragic in its briefness, is as follows:

"Help, Adana." (Signed) "CHAMBERS." This was from Rev. William Chambers, resident missionary of the board in Adana. Convinced that the help requested must be prompt, Secretary Barton notified the officials of the state department at Washington of the appeal. There are thought to have been upwards of fifteen missionaries connected with the American Board, gathered at Adana last week for the annual conference of the central Turkey mission. The identity of the particular delegates is not known to the American Board officers in this city, but among the entire number of missionaries in Central Turkey of whom some are likely to have been in Adana, are the following: Miss Kate E. Ainslie of Ohio; Miss Alice C. Brewer of Washington, niece of Justice Brewer of the United States supreme court; Miss Isabella M. Blake of Vermont; Miss Ellen M. Blankely of Winchendon, Mass; Dr. Thomas D. Christie of Hantlord Conn., and his wife; William N. Chambers of Canada and his wife, or trattora Count, and its wife, Village F. Goodsell and his wife, Lulu K. S. Cornelia P. Chambers of Philadelphia; Fred F. Goodsell and his wife, Lulu K. S. Goodsell of San Francisco; Dr. Lucius O, Lee of Owasso, Mich.; Frederick W. McCullum and Mrs. McCullum of Toronto, Canada; Mrs. Margaret R. Trowbridge of Brooklyn, and Miss Clara L. Peck of Chicago.







## The Crankston Convention

"We are here in the boosting business," said Mr. W. C. Pearce of Chicago, in one of his inspiring addresses, at the fifty-first annual of Chicago, in one of the Hispaning audiesses, at the hity-first annual convention of the Minnesota Sunday School Association, on May convention of the Militesota Sunday School Association, on May fourth, fifth and sixth at Crookston; and I am sure no one left Crooksfourth, firth and Sixth at Cookston, and and give his own Sunday ton without a strong desire to go home and give his own Sunday School a boost. Our Sunday School is steadily progressing under the leadership of our very able Superintendent, but there is much room for improvement yet and I am glad of it, for the Association sets a standard for every school in the state, and we have something to a standard for W. H. Gold of Redwood Falls, presided over most work toward. Mr. W. H. Gold of Redwood Falls, presided over most of the meetings. The gist of the opening address by Rev. S. M. Dick of Minneapolis, was the conquest of the world in peace, which we as Sunday School teachers are striving for, by teaching the Gospel to those already in our schools, and trying to get every member of every family "from the cradle to the grave" enrolled as members. A little new enthusiasm is what we all need now and then, and this session of meetings, morning, afternoon and evening, for three days, was full of it. The purpose of the convention was as Mr. Pearce said, like the boy's idea of a telescope: "it helps you see the things you can't see." At the meetings we heard of what others do and how they do it, and were aroused to our own possibilities. In order to keep pace with other wide awake Sunday Schools of our state, we must have besides our monthly prayer meeting, a regular teachers' training class, where those of us who are teaching in the school may, by just a little effort, be made so much more efficient. The opportunity is provided for us and we are simply giving ourselves as channels through which Jesus may teach the class, and He will take our smallest talents and bless them to their greatest good. Let's help St Louis county to reach point ten of the standard which requires that ten per cent of the schools in our county shall have teachers' training classes. A strong plea was made for the standard grading of our Sunday Schools. The grading of the junior, intermediate, senior and adult classes is as important as that of the primary department. "And there should be yearly recognition of what has been accomplished especially in the supplemental work," said secretary Locker. Mrs. Frank Caldwell of Minneapolis, gave a talk full of interest and helpful suggestions on "Practical Plans for the Crad e Roll." Great emphasis was laid on the importance of this department, not only because it brings the children very early into connection with the Sunday School but because it is one of the best ways to enlist the interest of the parents. The home department, and the extreme importance of a "Decision Day" in every school, are other subjects which were considered in detail. Rev. Hullett of Detroit, compared a Sunday School without a "Decision Day" to a fisherman who as sunday School without a "Decision Day" to a fisherman who casts in his past and traver pulse it out, and in speaking of the imporcasts in his net and never pulls it out; and in speaking of the importance of teaching the word of God to children, quoted Gypsy Smith as saying: "if you save a man you save a unit, if you save a boy you save a multiplication table." The splendid work done by the general secretary, Mr. A. M. Locker, was recognized by the convention, and since the work in his field has become too great for one man to handle alone, a strong plea was made for funds, to allow the employment of an assistant secretary. Thirteen hundred dollars were raised with little effort, St. Louis county pledging two hundred dollars in addition to its regular apportionment of three hundred dollars. ## Twenty-fourth International Christian Endeavor Convention. St. Paul, July Seventh to Twelfth.

About fifty Duluth Christian Endeavorers left in a large special coach of the Northern Pacific, at one fifty-five Wednesday, P. M. This coach was decorated with banners bearing the inscription "C. E., Duluth." The ride down to St. Paul was very warm and dusty, but no one seemed to mind it much, for all were thinking of the good time they were going to have at the Convention. We were met at the depot by the St Paul Reception Committee and conducted to the Minnesota Headquarters Building, on the corner of Fourth and Jackson Streets. Here we each paid a dollar to register and were given the Convention Badge, a copy of the Official Program and a song book, "Jubilant Praise," which was used throughout the Convention. Those who wished rooms were shown to their places by the Entertainment Committee, others hastened over to the Auditorium where the first general meeting was already in progress. The Auditorium is a large, beautiful building, with a seating capacity of over fifteen thousand. It was a grand sight, decorated as it was with the Christian Endeavor colors, red and white, and a beautiful arrangement of electric lights. The musical directors of the Convention were Prof. E. O. Excell of Chicago, Mr. Percy S. Foster, Washington, D. C., and Prof. F. H. Jacobs of New York. trained a chorus choir in his own city. These choirs came to St. Paul and made up the Convention Choirs, and helped greatly to make the singing of the Convention a very pleasant part of the program. 



It seemed that there would be more interest on the part of our church, if we had a parficular field to work for, and so it ought to be. It is well just now to call attention to the work at Grand Marais and vicinity, which has been under the care of Rev. W. J. Horner for over a year. A Duluth man visiting that section recently, brought back very favorable reports of Mr. Horner's work, which seems to cover about all the settlements in Cook County, and recently, Mr. Horner has written a brief letter about his field. He holds two services on Sunday at Crond Me. day at Grand Marais, hiring the village hall, as the little church has no building, and in the afternoon looks after a Sunday School seven miles away, which he reaches by means of a hired or a borrowed horse, when he is fortunate enough to secure one; otherwise on foot. There would not seem to be much rest for Mr. Horner during the week, for he holds services with such regularity as is possible at Lutsen. Totte, Cross River, Chicago Bay and Flute Reed Valley, the furthest of these points being distant twenty miles, and the roads rough, to use a very mild term. ### The Minneapolis Meetings


The fifty-fourth annual meeting of the Congregationalists of Minnesota, opening on Monday morning last, was necessarily short and sharp, and all the more interesting on that account. It was overshadowed to some degree by the larger meetings which were to follow from Wednesday to Saturday, that of the American Board, and that of the National Country of the Nation of the National Congregational Brotherhood, and yet, the lesser meeting was of real value. Less than half of the two hundred and twentyfive Congregational churches were represented in the attendance, but the property of the second churches were represented in the attendance. but the reports showed a year of growth, and a promising outlook.

The wiping out of the great debt of the Home Missionary Society,
removed a standard of the great debt of the Home Missionary Society. removed a standing cause of depression, and made the talk of advance in our Home Missionary work a reasonable proposition. One quarter of our churches, tifty-six, were aided last year by the Home Missionary work are as the company to the company ary Society, but this money, as for the previous two years, has come almost entirely from within the state, the grant from the National Treasury being now only one hundred dollars per year. Against this, offset some twelve thousand, five hundred dollars raised in the state for Home, Missionary, work not to mention the amounts raised by offset some twelve thousand, five hundred dollars raised in the state for Home Missionary work, not to mention the amounts raised by the stronger churches for struggling sister organizations, and we see that Minnesota is, Congregationally considered, no longer a dependent state. To give any adequate report of the One Hundredth Annual Meeting of the American Board in time for this week's church calendar is clearly an impossibility. As I write, half past five o'clock Thursday afternoon, only one half of the series of meetings has been held, but already enough has been told of Geography, History, Politics and Religion, to almost make one imagine he had been studying all these subjects for long weeks. And this is no second-hand information that is being brought out with telling effect. Men who witnessed the strange scenes in Constantinople and Smyrna when the new Turkish Constitution was promulated in the stitution was promulgated in July, 1908; who knew personally the twenty-two missionaries, preachers and teachers of Cilicia who were cut to pieces in the Adana massacre last spring; who have watched the movements of Godle Spirit in Last spring; who have watched the movements of God's Spirit in Japan for ten, twenty, thirty years; who passed through the Boxer Rebellion in China, and have watched the awakening of that giant patients. the awakening of that giant nation in the last decade; who have been trembling at the uncast of India. trembling at the unrest of India, and rejoiced while they trembled; who could being news of the Dack Could be while they trembled; who could bring news of the Dark Continent, and of the light breaking upon it; when such men spake of whether the light breaking upon it. who could bring news of the Dark Continent, and of the light breaking upon it; when such men spoke of what they had seen and heard, their words were like a trumpet call from high heaven. ### Annual Meeting of Pilgrim Church.

The enthusiastic loyalty of our people to Pilgrim Church was never more heartily attested than on Tuesday evening, January eighteenth, when nearly two hundred gathered in the parlors at the thirty-ninth annual supper and business meeting of the church.

The ladies made no mistake when they entrusted the preparation of the supper to Mrs. M. F. Bates and Mrs. B. Webster to whom are due the thanks of all who were present for the bountiful repast, which was so generously provided and expeditiously served.

The business session was called to order at a quarter before eight o'clock and opened with the singing of a hymn and with Scripture reading and prayer by the pastor, who acted as moderator. In absence of the clerk Mr. E. W. Matter was elected clerk pro tem.

The first order of business was the presentation of reports from the heads of the various departments of our church work,

The Christian Endeavor Society, through its President, Mr. E. B. Neff, reported a membership of thirty-four, being a slight increase over last year. The report of Mr. Eugene H. Harbison, Secretary of the Sunday School, showed a membership of two hundred twenty-three, being an increase for the year of about fifteen per cent. Mr. Andrew Nelson, Superintendent of the Sunday School, in his report, emphasized the present pressing need of the school for more teachers. The report of Miss Mary E. Murdoch, who has charge of the Cradle Roll, showed that this new department is now well established. Miss Murdoch asked for a fuller co-operation on the part of parents in reporting the names and dates of birth of the children who should be enrolled. Mrs. Robert Smith, Superintendent of the primary department of the Sunday School enumerated in her report several things needed, among them being more chairs, blackboards, a screen, and a door cut through a partition in order to make an independent entrance to the class rooms of her department.

An unusually interesting report was presented by Mrs. W. W. Sanford, President of the Women's Missionary Society. It is perhaps not fully realized and appreciated to how great an extent this society has been "an inspiration to the Church in a great deal else besides missionary work."

In the absence of Mrs. S. W. Clark, President, the report of the Ladies' Union was presented by Mrs. H. W. Nichols. This report evinced the usual activity of the ladies who have already paid the five hundred dollars pledged by them for this year toward the mortgage on the Manse.

Mr. George A. Gray, President of the Brotherhood, reported a satisfactory condition of that organization as indicated by a large attendance at the monthly meetings and by the fact that half of the five hundred dollars pledged for the year toward the mortgage on the Manse has already been raised

Mr. Oscar Mitchell, President of the Board of Trustees, reported that the extraordinary expense made necessary by repairs on the church, the proposed purchase of a motor for the organ

and to make up a deficiency in the general fund has been promptly met by a generous subscription, the total amount so raised being eighteen hundred fifty-five dollars. Too much emphasis can scarcely be laid on the recommendation in Mr. Mitchell's report that every member of the church and congregation he directly represented in the financial support of the church by a definite weekly pledge.

Mr. Milne's report made grateful acknowledgement "for the provided," and reported that the past year had been one of normal pastoral activity. #### Annual Meeting Continued.

#### CAN WE UNIFY OUR WEEK-DAY SERVICES?

(An extract from the pastor's annual report.)

Could we not look forward to a unification of our services during the week? I have observed that there cannot be held between Sundays more than one large successful service. These are busy times and our people, men and women, have many cares and responsibilities. In former days there was usually but one service during the week, the mid-week prayer meeting. It is a fact, I believe, that in most churches that service has fallen off greatly in number and influence. This does not mean that people are less devoted. It means, in part, that their time is taken up in other ways, some of them very good ways. Think of our church last week. On Monday evening forty men were present at the Brotherhood supper and meeting. On Wednesday afternoon twenty-five women met at Mrs. Walker's house as the Women's Missionary Society. On Friday evening a large number came together in a social way to a reception in the Manse. Is it passing strange that on Thursday evening we did not have to put up the sign, Standing room only? Think of this week. Here is this large representative gathering of the church. It is altogether likely that the Thursday evening service will show some falling off from even the usually small attendance.

Would it not be possible to improve our arrangements in the way of unifying these excellent but to some extent competing services? For instance, why could not our annual meeting be held on Thursday evening? It is always preceded by a brief devotional service. Take Thursday evening (or any other if more convenient) as the church night and as far as possible center everything on it. Instead of the ladies meeting on Wednesday afternoon, why could they not meet on Thursday? They frequently have refreshments, just enough to spoil the appetite for supper. Why not have just a little more a little later neithe for supper. Why come in. The whole could be followed by a glorious devotional and spiritual service that would be helpful to everybody. It is at least worth thinking about, and I


