For nearly twenty-three years he was a member of this Church, to which he gave the most faithful and loving service. unsparing alike of his time and of his means, and in the general religious and philanthropic work of the city he was a leader upon whom his fellow workers had learned to rely for counsel and encouragement.

As a citizen and man of affairs he commanded universal respect and honor. He was "Diligent in business, fervent in spirit, serving the Lord," and in him the highest ideals of Christian citizenship found abundant expression.

His favorite salutation of "Neighbor," may truly furnish the key to those qualities of mind and heart which endeared him to an unusually wide circle of friends, many of whom have personally felt his helpfulness.

As a Church we would express to his stricken family our affectionate sympathy, and commend them to the tender care of Him Who "doeth all things well."

#### Wardwell Ames

Wardwell Ames, or "Ward" as he was familiarly called and always wrote his name, was born in Oswego, New York, on December 6th, 1846.

His grandmother Ames had been a most devout Christian and member of the Methodist Episcopal Church. His father and mother had been connected with the same church in their early life, but on account of the very strict rules of the church concerning amusements, forbidding checkers and such games, they allowed their membership to lapse.

Ward was the third of five children. They came to maturity without any definite church connection. The oldest sister identified herself with the Protestant Episcopal Church. For a while Ward accompanied her to the services and was generally considered an Episcopalian, but he never joined that com-

Not until some time after he was married did he become a church member. It was at a time of great anxiety when his wife was critically ill and her life despaired of, that Mr. Ames determined to become a member of the church. He and Mrs. Ames united with the Congregational Church of Oswego in 1875.

Although he was very young he was soon prominent. He was made church treasurer. He accepted on one condition, that the minister's salary should be paid on the first of every month, in advance. His resignation was ready when that could not be done. The times were hard after the financial collapse of 1873 and the church was in debt, but under his leadership the church expenses were met promptly and the debt paid.


the opening session was held on Tuesday afternoon, and the congress adjourned Friday night. Meetings were held in the Auditorium, for men only, every forenoon and evening, and there were twenty-four formal addresses at that place by men whose denominational affiliations were unknown to the great majority of those who listened to them. Wednesday afternoon was given up to sectional conferences, held at various halls. churches, hotels, etc., in the vicinity. Conferences of physicians and surgeons, ministers, lawyers, Sunday school and Bible class workers, business men, brotherhoods, church officers and editors. respectively, were thus held. For each of these meetings splendid programs had been arranged, and laymen who were recognized leaders in their respective professions or vocations addressed the meetings.

On Thursday afternoon there was held a conference of all the delegates to the congress in Orchestra Hall. This was, so to speak, a meeting of the committee of the whole, at which was discussed the vital, practical question of the congress, viz.: How to conserve and extend the influence of the national missionary campaign. The resolutions there read and recommended to the congress for adoption, are too lengthy to be given in full at this time. In substance, they recognized as one of the most beneficial results of the campaign the spirit of unity and cooperation that had been displayed, and declared that the chief place in all future plans be given to "follow-up" work in keeping the movement a living, vital power in the church.

On Friday afternoon, conferences by churches were held at various places. Here were discussed ways and means by which the different denominations could proceed with the work most advantageously and effectively. Representatives of the Congregational Church met and listened to addresses by Dr. C. H. Patten, our former pastor, and others. The apportionment plan of giving, as adopted by this church a few years ago, was discussed at length; and it appears that this plan is in operation very generally in our Congregational Churches in all of the states, except in Ohio. When the delegates were asked to express briefly their experiences with the werking of this plan in their respective churches, the responses were enthusiastic, and the declaration of what the churches were undertaking for the current year under the inspiration of the campaign just closing was undoubtedly most cheering to the secretaries of the various societies of the church,

The congress adjourned on Friday night, after adopting as a body, the substance of the resolutions recommended by the delegates at their informal meeting on Thursday afternoon.







Moody's question, "Are you the woman of great faith?" "No; I am the woman of little faith in a great God."

The addresses by the Rev. Walter H. North on New Wine in New Bottles and that by Dr. Barbour on God's Challenge to the Churches were illuminating, able and inspiring. The addresses were of a high order and were greatly appreciated by those who heard them. Unfortunately the people of Brainerd, like the people of most churches and communities where such meetings are held, seemed to have the idea that the services and addresses were only for the delegates. The chief benefit of such gatherings is for those with whom the meeting is held.

The conference is the custodian of the records and standing of the ministers. It also grants licenses to preach. A young man of Swedish-Finnish birth and training, Mr. Oscar A. Granholm, graduate of the Swedish department of Chicago Theological seminary, was licensed for two years. He is doing a very hopeful work among his own people, centering at Biwabik, holding the services in our church there.

The condition of the churches as reported is now in the main very hopeful-Aitkin is about to rebuild the church. They have been without a pastor for two years, but they are now almost ready to make a fresh and most promising start. Brainerd First has a pastor of whom every one speaks most appreciatively, and the church is planning to build a parsonage. Biwabik has a similar enterprise in hand. All told the condition of the churches is more promising than for several years.

"While no votes were taken, certain ideas became so outstanding as practically to constitute the policy of the conference. Among those ideas may be mentioned the exaltation of the native church as the chief agent in world evanelization. The democratic ideal of a self-governing, self-supporting, and self-propagating native church, which has been a cardinal principle of the American Board from early days, has been voiced by this conference as the bedrock principle of missions, and is likely to be the greatest contribution of the conference to missionary efficiency. Another outstanding fact was the enthusiasm of the conference for Christian education, especially higher education for the raising up of native leaders. In most of the debates the missionaries took the leading part, with the representatives of the native churches a close second.

"The highest object of the conference was achieved at the session of June 21, when the subject of co-operation and unity was considered. The Eusiness Committee brought in a resolution, formulated by Commission Eight, looking to an International Committee of information, comity, and co-operation. The plan called for a temporary Continuation Committee until such time as the boards composing the conference should approve of a permanent committee. The discussion upon this resolution occupied nearly an entire day, and was of extraordinary interest. The underlying problems of unity between all Protestant bodies were laid bare, and were discussed with rare frankness and

"But without question the best speech was made by Mr. Cheng, a Manchu, whose simple statement, Denominational good humor. distinctions do not interest the Chinese, stated the whole situation in a nutshell. The vote was unanimous in favor of the resolutions, the audience breaking out in the Doxology.

The significance of this action can hardly be overstated. It makes international the large measure of comity which has existed for years among the American societies, and is big with promise for a general movement looking to the reunion

"It is too early to estimate the meaning and value of this great conference for world evangelization. But in the judgment of sober-minded men it is bound to mark a new era in Christian co-operation and efficiency on the foreign field, and quite possibly also at home.

The lessons are all given in story form, as stories appeal able critics and educators. most forcibly to little children. After each lesson, folders are given the children containing the story of the day and suggestions to parents for impressing the lessons. Very valuable help may be given the child at home in following these suggestions.

During the first two years of the junior course when the historic sense begins to develop, the instruction is given through stories chronologically arranged but from different periods.

The geography of the Bible lands is introduced and many psalms and passages of scripture are prescribed for memorizing. Through the correlated lessons children learn facts about the Bible, manners and customs of the people and other things which

help to make the Bible a living book. We learn by doing and for this reason this part of our work should be a very important factor in fixing the stories in the

If we had the necessary room, tables, material, we could minds of the children. plan for this work at the Sunday school, but so long as we haven't, we ask the assistance of the parents in preparing the Work Books at home. It may seem that the books for the first year leave no room for originality. This is true in a sense and the work has been purposely prepared in this way, for before the pupils can do original work they must learn the lesson of following instructions accurately, and they learn not only to do this but get the greatest benefit from the lessons themselves.

These books, with some additional tests, will be the basis for promotion from year to year and we wish to send the best books to the State Association for exhibition.

The success of the work depends upon the thoroughness with which it is done and one short hour a week is not enough for

all we wish the children to get of Bible knowledge. Children have not as a rule, been trained to give much of any time outside to the Sunday school lessons, but if we all appreciate the importance of the work and realizing how inefficient our own training has been along these lines we will be glad to have the children studying under improved methods. Your interest and co-operation will be greatly appreciated by the teachers and officers of your Sunday school.

### Annual Meeting of Pilgrim Church

There was an unusually large attendance at the fortieth annual supper and business meeting of the church on Thursday evening, January 19th. The reports which were presented by the heads of the various departments of our church work were listened to with interest and indicated progress in many ways, during the past year. Lack of space prevents a detailed notice of all these reports.

The report of the trustees again emphasized the need for an increase in the amount of our weekly pledges in order to escape the necessity of having to make up a deficit by a special assessment upon a few at the end of the year. The amount so raised this year to cover such deficit was \$1,875.75, being larger than usual on account of expenditures occasioned by the recent fire in the church. According to the report of the finance committee there are but 116 regular weekly pledges in force, which suggests the possibility of increasing the total amount of our weekly contributions by increasing the number of pledges.

The clerk of the church reported a total membership at the present time of 423, the following having been removed by death during the past year: Mr. Wardwell Ames. Mrs. W. C Johnson, Mrs. I. W. Foglesong, Mrs. Mary E. Townsend and Mr.

John Christie, Jr.

The report of the superintendent of the Sunday School was very gratifying in that it showed that during the year such changes in classifying and grading have been introduced as to bring the Sunday School up to the rank of first grade as defined by the State and National Sunday School Associations. The superintendent's report carried the recommendation that hereafter the church undertake the financing of the Sunday School, all school collections excepting missionary funds to be turned over to the general fund. In a discussion of this recommendation it developed that there is considerable opposition to its adoption at the present time and the matter was laid on the

The report of the deacons called attention to the fact that attendance at the mid-week service has become so small as to table. raise the question whether this service could with propriety be discontinued for the present. A very spirited discussion was precipitated by the introduction of a motion to discontinue the mid-wek service, which motion was amended to read that the service be discontinued only until such time as the pastor shall be able to again lead the meetings. #### Forty Years Retrospect

On January 18th, 1871, Pilgrim Congregational Church was organized with 16 members, six of whom are still members of this church, and residents of Duluth: Rev. and Mrs. J. Kimball, Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Johnson and Mr. and Mrs. Wm. S. Woodbridge. Five of the original 16 are dead, among these being Rev. C. C. Salter and Mrs. R. S. Munger; three live outside of Duluth, while the remaining, Mrs. C. C. Salter and Mr. George Spencer are residing in the city, but have joined other churches.

Our church, humanly speaking, owes its origin to two Oberlin graduates, Mr. and Mrs. L. H. Tenney, who had a deep love for the Congregational way, and foresaw large possibilities for Duluth. The final result has justified their wisdom and foresight.

The first two deacons of the church were J. Kimball and Wm. S. Woodbridge, while of the five trustees, R. S. Munger is still with us, an honored member of this church, and Hon. J. D. Ensign, a leading member of the community, but attending another church.

Our first Sunday School was organized with eight scholars, and some older people as a sort of "filling"; if our present trustee and chairman of the finance committee, Mr. W. G. Hegardt, was not a charter member of the Sunday School, he became a member within a very short time after the opening of the school.

The forty years of our church life are mainly of interest as connected with our four prominent pastors, Reverends C. C. Salter, Edward M. Noyes, Cornelius H. Patton and Alexander Milne, our present pastor, whose pastorate in length exceeds that of any of the others. We had other faithful pastors, Rev. C. A. Conant, two years; Rev. E. C. Ingalls, one year; Rev. J. W. Hargrave, one year, while Rev. M. M. Tracy, now dead, was with us fifteen months; but their pastorates were so short, and Duluth's general business depression so great that these years were full of labor and trial, and saw little if any growth, except in our Sunday School.

Mr. Salter's work was full of enthusiasm and hopefulness; though like the coneys we were "a feeble folk", yet under Mr. Salter's stirring leadership the church bought two lots at the corner of Second Street and First Avenue East, and put up a frame building, the whole costing between \$4,000 and \$6,000, \$500 of which, let us not forget, was given us by the Church Building Society. Previous to this we had worshipped in what was then known as the Pendleton block, a frame building located at the corner of Superior Street and First Avenue West, where the store of S. H. Knox & Co. now stands. one of our leading business men, "There was at times hardly enough money in town to buy a breakfast." All our banks but one closed their doors, and the deposits of that one dropped, on one critical day, to \$300.00. Mr. Salter's health, never very robust, failed and in April, 1876, he left us, "Cast down but not destroyed," and in much the same strain could we tell of the experiences of the next six or seven years. But slowly, almost imperceptibly at first, Duluth was getting upon her feet. It was about this time that we began to welcome new comers to our church, the Peck family, a tower of strength, Mr. and Mrs. J. W Norton, young men like E. W. Matter, T. H. Hawkes, W. W. Me-Millan, W. A. McGonagle and others, and in June, 1883, Mr. Munger discovered for us in New Haven, Conn., just the man we needed, as he assured us. He proved a true prophet, for from the time that Rev. Edward M. Noyes, just graduated from Yale Divinity School at the age of twenty-four, came to us in September, 1883, until he left us in September, 1894, we had a pastor, leader, organizer, for whom any church might well be thankful. He found us with 50 resident and 45 non-resident members; the report of our clerk on January 17th, 1893, showed a total membership, after a careful revision of our rolls, of 364. it may be of interest to note that at the meeting it was voted to undertake the raising of \$5,000 to purchase a site and build a new Congregational Church in Endion Division. The site was purchased and later the church was built, but it is now, Congregationally speaking, only a memory.

It was during this pastorate, at the annual meeting on January 11th, 1887, that the church voted to erect a new building. Work was commenced in May of that year, the building committee being J. W. Norton, Chairman, J. F. Patten, R. S. Munger and Wm. S. Woodbridge. On November 26th, as we were nearly ready to occupy the new building, came the fire which gutted the building and delayed our occupancy for a year or more. It was not until early in February, 1889, that we commenced to use the new auditorium, though using the basement some weeks ance was \$3.500.00; the total cost of site, building and furnishings was \$55,838.53. This building, which was again damaged by fire during the past year is atil.

Our first church building, erected in the summer of 1871, finally came into the possession of the Unitarian church, and was moved to its present location at the corner of Eighth Avenue East and First Street.

Of the death of Mr. Noyes' youngest daughter, and then of his wife, both resulting from typhoid fever, we have space only to say that the final result was a threatened nervous breakdown which necessitated a change. Our loss was the gain of the First Church, Newton, Mass., and of the Prudential Committee of the American Board, of which Mr. Noyes has been a valuable we had some little share in shaping the future of a man so rich in good influences and high resources.

It was no easy task that fell to Rev. C. H. Patton, now Dr. Patton, when in February, 1895, he took up the work that Mr. Noyes had laid down. But he took it up with a brave heart, and wide vision; his interest in the Sunday School, in the train-

ing of the young people in the Christian Endeavor Society, and in Missions, Home and Foreign, in our other Congregational Churches in Duluth was unceasing, and our cnurch feels the effect of these still. It was with sincere regret that we recognized that his call in August. 1898, to the First Church of St. Louis, Mo., was a call to go higher, which he ought not to refuse. And how proud we have been, rightly proud, of his work for the past seven years as Home Secretary of the American Board, and we are now following with interest, as pest we may, his missionary tour in Turkey, India and Africa, glad to remember that he was our pastor.

We come now to the present pastorate, that of Rev. Alexander Milne, which because it comes within the memory of most of us who are now members of the church, will require but little space compared with the review of the 28 years preceding.

Mr. Milne commenced his work with us on the second Sunday in February, 1899, having thus completed nearly 12 years of service. He found us with a debt of \$15,000, the annual interest on which, \$900, was a harrassing burden. By wise plans on the part of the Trustees, and hearty co-operation of the church as a whole, the entire debt has been wiped out, some two years ago seeing its final extinction. Another important forward movement has been in the increase of our Missionary pledge and the assuming of the support of a Foreign Missionary, Early in 1907 we arranged with the American Board to assume the support of Rev. Herbert M. Irwin and his two children, the total sum required being \$528.00 and we have contributed some little in excess of that sum to the Board, besides the contributions of our Woman's Missionary Society to the W. B. M. I. which this past year amounted to \$185.00. We have also made a material increase in our Home Missionary-Offerings, though we were not able this year to reach the apportionment of \$1,750,00 for the seven Societies as made by the State Apportionment Committee. Our church membership now stands at 423 which includes many non-resident members; our Sunday School enrollment is 175. The difficulty in holding our membership through the movement of the population away from the center which we began to feel 20 years ago, has not diminished with the years, nor it is likely to grow less. It calls for increased watchfulness on our part to maintain the sense of personal interest and personal responsibility throughout the church as a whole.

Looking back over the forty years we see many mistakes and failures, we see losses by fire and flood, but we see also the good hand of our God upon us, and let us have faith to believe that His goodness will not fail us, but that He who hath led us, will lead us unto the end.
