Annual Meetings of the W. G. M. I. and W. B. M. J.

The Fortieth annual meeting of the Minnesota Woman's Home Missionary Union and the Thirty-fifth annual meeting of the Minnesota Branch of the Woman's Board of Missions of the Interior were held at the Olivet Congregational church in Merriam Park, St. Paul, April 16th to 19th. There were 150 delegates present, representing the different churches throughout the state. The interest and enthusiasm during the sessions were greatly enhanced by the personal inspiration of three of our missionaries, Miss Olive Gibson of New Mexico, Miss Emily Hartwell of Foochow, China, and Mrs. Mary Williams Hemingway of Taikuhsien, China,

The reports from the various societies showed a remarkable growth in missionary work during the past year, which is most encouraging. The work of missions has ceased to be the efforts of a very few consecrated women, who have always been the leaven in ages past and is being carried on by all the different branches of our churches. Why should not our young people, our Sunday School pupils, our men, as well as our women, help in this great field of missions? Thus we are truly conserving our strength, time and opportunity.

The box department, which sends boxes of clothing and food to new settlers, missionary camps and needy individual families was most strongly emphasized as an efficient way to serve in mission work. Personal work of this nature was forcibly advocated.

The budget recommended by the board at Chicago as Minnesota's share for the support of our missionaries, etc., aggregates \$8,500.

In order to meet this in a business-like way, the churches of our denomination have adopted the apportionment plan. Individual churches are raising the apportionment assigned them by using various methods. The apportionment committee recommends the payment of these apportionments quarterly; if this were done, societies would find they could much more easily collect their money and often materially increase their present contributions.

The taking of more missionary literature, more Bible study, self-sacrifice and daily prayer were urged as weapons with which to carry on this important service of the Master.

Annual Meeting of the Buluth Conference

The fifteenth annual meeting of the Duluth Conference of Congregational Churches was held with the First Congregational Church at Biwabik, May 28 and 29.

Pilgrim Church was represented by Rev. J. Kimball. Mr. T. H. Hawkes, Mrs. W. A. McGonagle, Mrs. W. S. Horr and Mrs. C. E. Wallace. The annual sermon was preached by Rev. Geo. P. Sheridan of Brainerd from Gen. 4:9, "Am I My Brother's Keeper?" It was an able scholarly address and brought out the truth, that in the present day creeds and dogmas do not count for much, but the essential thing is the brotherhood of man, and how can we best lend the helping hand to those about us. At the business session Wednesday morning, reports were given from most of the churches in the Conference, and these in the main were encouraging. Both the churches at Brainerd have now regular pastors, as well as the one at Grand Marais. The church at Biwabik is planning for a new church building, as the present one is old and too small to accommodate their Sunday School, which sometimes has an attendance of 165, a remarkable showing, as the church membership is only 50. It was voted in accordance with the recommendation of the State Association, to change the name from Duluth Conference to Duluth Association, and also for each church to raise its apportionment for this year. The Woman's Missionary hour on Wednesday afternoon was conducted by Mrs. Horr, following which the delegates were taken on a trip to the iron mines, while the ladies were entertained at the homes of the Biwabik ladies. Probably the most inspiring, helpful, and yet practical of all the meetings was the concluding one on Wednesday evening, addressed by Dr. Geo. R. Merrill on the "Minister and His Church," followed by Rev. W. L. Sutherland of Detroit on "The Church and Its Minister." The meetings emphasized the need of assistance from the Home Missionary Society, which some of these struggling churches should have, and yet which is withheld from them at the present time on account of lack of funds. These churches look to Pilgrim Congregational Church as their natural leader, and if Congregationalism is to grow and expand in Northern Minnesota, we should do all in our power to help by our sympathy, our advice, and, if need be, by our gifts.

Church of Duluth:

"Your Committee on Pulpit Supply report that since their election they have met regularly and have considered and discussed with much care the qualifications of a considerable number of men who have been suggested for our vacant pastorate. In this work we have kept in mind so far as possible the requirements of this particular church, and the character of man in our judgment most suited to its needs. We despair of finding anyone who will please all equally well, or be equally strong along all lines, and we realize in some measure at least the many view points from which a pastor of this church must be judged, and the many demands which will be made upon his time and powers. As a people we should not be unduly critical. Any man, and especially any strong and worthy man, will have peculiarities of his own. He has a right thereto, so long as they do not give substantial ground of offense among his fellow men. If we are steadfast in our desire to make Pilgrim Church still more a strong central body for the doing of good works, and a force and influence for the beautifying and ennobling of individual character in both young and old, and for the accomplishment of civic righteousness and the betterment of the community roundabout, and a force also in the higher reaches of religious faith, we should be able to work with any good man of fair ability or better, whose heart is in such work. What is called for on the part of us all is not the display of fastidious criticism, but the exercise of sound judgment of the warm and generous kind, but such also as shall correctly determine what, under all the circumstances, is best for this church. There should be keen appreciation of the great needs of the time, and there should be a willingness to enlist and serve, not until something goes slightly awry, but for life. Wm. E. Cadmus, late pastor of the First Congregational Church at Peoria, III. He is every. where regarded as a strong and zealous man. To procure the services of Mr. Cadmus will require an annual budget of \$1,610 in excess of the amount which heretofore we have been obliged to raise and pay. Of this amount about \$900 will be necessary to maintain a trained helper in connection with the pastor's work. Whatever be your disposition of this report, we concur in the advisability of securing and maintaining such a helper as soon as possible. The total additional expense here proposed is considerable, and, with the other questions presented, is for the consideration and determination of the church. We feel warranted, however, in recommending that this burden be assumed.

"Mr. Cadmus is a man with a zeal for definite, progressive work, and it is partly as the result of our conference with him, that reference to work of that character is made in the resolution which is presented herewith.

We therefore present for your consideration and recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

"Be it resolved by Pilgrim Congregational Church of Duluth that we desire as Pastor a man, who, in addition to making the church still more a beneficent influence with individual lives, will plan and lead in thoroughgoing constructive work, in the increase of church membership and attendance, in the growth of all the in the growth of all the organizations of the church, in its increased influence for right living and right action throughout the community of which we are a part, and that we individually engage by our own personal efforts to further such

near future as shall be mutually agreeable, and that we near that we engage to pay him as compensation the sum of \$5,000 per annum, the same to be paid in equal monthly instalments, with the understanding that out of said sum Mr. Cadmus shall pay not less than \$900 per annum in equal monthly instalments for the services of a trained helper who shall be procured and maintained as a part of the regular working force of this church, and with the further understanding that Mr. Cadmus shall occupy the parsonage belonging to the church, and shall pay in equal monthly instalments at the rate of \$750 per annum as rent therefor.

"Be it further resolved that a copy of this resolution be transmitted to Mr. Cadmus by the Committee on Pulpit Supply, and that if accepted by him, the same, with such acceptance, shall constitute a contract between the parties so long as the same shall remain mutually agreeable, and that negotiations on the part of this church respecting the further details, if any, of such contract shall be carried on by the Board of Trustees."

Following the reading of the report Judge Cant moved its adoption. This motion was seconded and after considerable discussion the meeting proceeded to an informal ballot. The votes having been counted the chairman, Mr. Oscar Mitchell announced that eighty-two votes had been cast in favor of the motion and twenty-two against it, and the report of the committee was declared adopted.

A motion was thereupon made and seconded that the informal ballot be made formal, which motion was carried by a viva voce vote. The chairman then asked all to rise who were willing in the event that Dr. Cadmus accepts the call thus tendered, to pledge him their hearty support and this pledge was duly given by a unanimous rising vote. The meeting then adjourned.



If nothing more comes out of our negotiations with one another, it has been worth all the trouble, many times over, to have concentered your forces on a policy of forward movement, and also to have shown faith in your own ability by standing ready to assume a large additional financial responsibility.

It now seems that, beyond most delightful personal acquaintanceships and friendships, this must be the net result of our negotiations. For I do not feel, much as these circumstances of your call please me, that I am warranted in accepting it. The large negative vote cast on your informal ballot indicates an absence of spontaneous enthusiasm which I fear would too seriously cripple our work at the very beeinning. There is no way of knowing how much of it is personal against me, how much was due to lack of opportunity to reflect upon the new responsibilities involved, or how much may have been caused by a desire on the part of some to hear and to judge other candidates.

That there are some who would like to hear other men I have been advised. While under normal circumstances this is not considered good church policy, it may be that in this case it will satisfy any members who have such a feeling and lead

to ultimate unanimity. At a special meeting of the congregation held in the lecture At a specific room Monday evening, September 23d, the following was presented by Hon. William A. Cant and unanimously adopted:

Reverend Alexander Miine died at Columbus, Ohio, on the 22nd day of September, 1912. For nearly thirteen years immediately prior to the first day of January last he was the pastor of this church and the beloved friend of us all.

Mr. Milne was a profound scholar of great intellectual and moral power. He was in the forefront as a preacher of the Word. His field was of the mind and of the spirit and he was pre-eminent therein. As instructed by vote of the church at the annual meeting the pastor has appointed a committee to carry out his recommendations relative to a new location for Pilgrim Church. The committee is as follows: C. A. Duncan, Chairman; E. D. Field, T. H. Hawkes, Oscar Mitchell, J. W. Norton.

At an informal meeting of the men of the church after vespers last Sunday the pastor presented some interesting and significant facts relative to the eastward movement of the "center of population" of our church constituency which has gradually taken place during the past few years and for the first time in public raised the question whether the time has not come for the church to consider the advisability of procuring a new home. It is quite within the range of possibility that subsequent events will give historic significance to this meeting.

The Annual Meeting

Over 200 members partook of the excellent supper provided by the ladies at the forty-second annual meeting of the church by the ladies at the torigonal to the church Tuesday evening. A large proportion of these remained to hear the annual reports and to participate in the election of officers for the ensuing year.

The business meeting was called to order at 8 o'clock by the Pastor, Rev. Chas. N. Thorp, and after singing "Blest Bo the Tie that Binds," and a few words of prayer, the minutes for the past year were read by the Clerk, Mr. Brewer Mattocks, Jr. This was followed by reports from the various societies and committees. Taken as a whole these were most satisfactory, indicating a condition of activity, faith and loyalty

in a year full of difficulties and discouragements.

The report for the newly organized Young People's Society meeting of the society was held at the Manse in November, being attended by 75 young people. This was followed by a formal meeting on December 8th, when arrangements for a permanent organization were effected. Much interest and enthusiasm is manifested and the meetings are now being held regularly with an attendance of from 50 to 75. A thriving young people's society is one of the bright outlooks for the coming

Mrs. W. W. McMillan, president of the Women's Missionary Society, reported a profitable year of study and much work accomplished. The financial year has been made to conform with the fiscal year of the church and their treasurer's report showed that the year's apportionment had been met, leaving a balance

The Friends in Council reported through Miss Alice Drew, the president. The suppers have been well attended and from these suppers the society has managed to create a surplus inspite of the high cost of living. Their recent study has been

Isaac Headland's "China's New Day."

The Sunday School report was read by Mr. Andrew Nelson, superintendent. All the departments including cradle roll, teacher training class and adult Bible classes are organized and at work and the teachers are becoming familiar with the new graded lessons. The school has again demonstrated that it is not only self supporting but has a balance of \$85 in the treasury and has contributed over \$100 for mis-

Hon. W. A. Cant, the new president, spoke for the Brotherhood which had five meetings the past year with an average attendance of 38. There is a growing interest in this society and the speaker extended a cordial invitation to all men of the church to join the ranks of this exclusively men's organization.

Mrs. W. A. McGonagle's report indicated that the Ladies' Union had enjoyed a year of successful activity. Eleven hundred dollars having been paid on the Mause mortgage during

The church treasurer, Mr. H., W. Nichols, showed that all bills had been promptly met and a small balance on hand.

The Annual Meeting-Continued

Mr. W. G. Hegardt, chairman of finance committee, gave a brief verbal report.

Mr. Oscar Mitchell, chairman of trustees, reported the church as having no outstanding obligation except the mortgage on the Manse now reduced to \$1,900; \$600 of the amount due next September having been paid in advance by the Ladies' Union to which grateful acknowledgement and praise was given.

It was recommended that every family in the church be represented by pledges for regular contributions towards the expenses of the church.

Mr. R. A. Webster for the Building and Grounds Committee stated that the church property is in good condition, extensive repairs having been made on the parsonage during the year.

Next Mr. W. W. McMillan, treasurer of the Benevolent Fund reported that the apportionment had been met and a small balance on hand.

The remarks of Mr. H. B. Paull, chairman of the Missionary Committee, were cordially received and he hopes to be greeted as heartily when contributions to the missionary fund are solicited. He recommended regular monthly or quarterly contributions so that funds may be promptly forwarded, also that

The clerk of church presented a most complete and interesting report. The church roll now shows a membership of 430. Four members have been removed by death during the year; Mrs. Chloe Phillips, Miss Reva Isham, Mr. Wm. A. Holgate and Rev. Alexander Milne. The clerk recommended, in closing, that a vote of thanks be given to the Pastoral Committee for its most efficient and satisfactory work. This was done by a unanimous rising vote.

McMillan; clerk, Mr. Brewer Mattocks, Jr.; Music Committee, Mrs. E. W. Matter, Mr. E. G. Chapman, Mrs. C. H. Dunning; Missionary Committee, Mr. H. B. Paull, chairman, C. A. Duncan, Albert Baldwin, S. E. Matter, W. G. Hegardt, Geo. A. Gray, T. H. Hawkes, W. I. Prince. The Pastor and the treasurer of the benevolent fund are ex-officio members of this committee. A committee consisting of Mr. Baldwin, Mr. Frick and Mr. Sanford was named to appoint ushers for the morning and evening services. This committee to act in consultation with the pastor.

The Annual Meeting-Continued

Mr. Pineo fittingly expressed the thanks of the church to Mr. Andrew Nelson for his five years of continuous service and upon his resignation Mr. Albert Baldwin was elected superintendent of the Sunday School. Mr. Harbison, secretary, and Mr. Arden Shepherdson, treasurer.

The recommendation of Mr. H. B. Paull for the apportionment plan as a definite goal for missionary giving was adopted.

Mr. T. H. Hawkes, chairman of committee for revision of membership roll, reported progress and stated further work will be taken up soon.

It was voted that a committee of five be appointed by the chair to act with reference to a building site and to ascertain the probable cost of a new church edifice, as recommended by the paster.

Mr. M. W. Bates moved that the church officers, deacons and standing committee be a committee for nomination of officers to be elected at the next annual meeting. The general sentiment seemed to favor a committee on nominations for all officers and committees, and on motion of Mr. E. W. Matter it was voted to postpone action until some later date prior to the next annual meeting. After the singing of a hymn the meeting adjourned.

A Word of Appreciation

The report of the committee appointed to nominate officers of the Sunday School has the following concerning the retirement of Superintendent Andrew Nelson:

"Mr. Nelson came into the Sunday School work with us over five years ago, when he was a comparative stranger in the city. Upon the very urgent request of pastor and teachers he accepted the office of superintendent. Through the subsequent years beset with unusual difficulties he has been full of courage and good cheer. Always kindly and courteous he has worked in harmony with officers and teachers and he leaves the school well organized, and with the best Christian spirit prevailing. He has commanded the admiration and won the love and esteem work. Although he gives his office over to another, we hope by his counsel."

The Pastor's Annual Report

After a brief review of the Pastor's work since he came to us in October the report continues as follows:

It is my duty as a faithful watchman on the walls of our Zion, to present to you certain aspects of the situation in which we find ourselves today, together with sundry recommendations looking toward what I am constrained to believe is to be the greatest chapter in the history of Pilgrim Church. Our present edifice was erected in the year 1887. At that time your beloved and optimistic pastor, Mr. Noyes, predicted that eventually the Church would remove to the east end, maintaining the work at Lake avenue, if needed, as a mission. Not long after the First Presbyterian Church to the east of us, and the First M. E Church to the west erected commodious buildings, and have since attained large membership. They are doing thorough about a half mile apart, guarding the present approaches to the steadily becoming a section of business houses and public buildings. As Duluth grows, the business section is bound to push uphill and crowd out the homes of the people. Our church

Two questions of a general nature confront us. First, are we needed downtown? I have rarely seen a similar area in the heart of a city with so many church buildings. The Romanist cathedral, the multitude of Scandinavian churches, the Jewish synagogue, the M. E., Presbyterian, and a host of other churches, with our own, are offering religious opportunity to this downtown section. The Bethel, with its various activities, and rescue work, the Y. M. C. A. and the Y. W. C. A., present institutional features to those in need.

May it not be that Pilgrim Church is more needed in some other section of our city?

The other general question involves a survey of Duluth to see if a church like ours is needed in any particular section. Within a few years the Normal School neighborhood has been opened up; it is destined to become a center of large population in the next ten years. The grades out there are easier; sections far up the slope are available for building. From Tenth avenue as you go eastward, you find the unfinished Christian church on Twelfth avenue, the unfinished St. Paul's at Seventeenth avenue and Superior, the little Unitarian church at Eighteenth and First, the Endion Methodist (once our own property) at Nineteenth avenue and First street and the Procathedral just below it. If I were a young business man, with little children in my home, having just built a house at Twenty-fourth avenue East, I should quietly call a meeting of some of my neighbors and promote the organization of a Congregational Church not far from the Normal School, as a section that needs a church of the Presbyterian or Congregational type, and needs it now. The Normal School is steadily growing; the church that is located within easy reach of that school is bound to make its impress upon the coming teachers in all this northern section

The Pastor's Annual Report—Continued

of the state. Furthermore such a church can command the support and minister to the religious needs of a steadily growing number of settled households.

It is sound church-experience, that a church building to be effective must be located within easy distance of its people. Some of the most influential and powerful churches in America today were started in what is now the business section of a city. Later, as population moved outward, the church followed its people to the section where they congregated. Our own Plymouth Church in Minneapolis recently disposed of its down town property and built a \$250,000 edifice within reach of its people in a suburb. Situated there, the church is taking on new life; a large Sunday School is being built up from the homes of their own people and their neighbors; had that church persisted in maintaining itself several miles from its people it. would be waning. Such a move is by no means a retreat; it is a genuine advance. The easy thing would be to stay down town and hold the fort, until the ammunition is all exhausted. The heroic thing is to occupy higher ground, and win in the

I have been making a map of our parish, plotting streets and locating every family in which we have one or more church members. The church directory for 1905 makes possible a comparison. In 1905 Pilgrim Church had west of Lake avenue 40 families. We now have ten families. Between Lake avenue and Tenth avenue east we had seven years ago 75 families. We now have 35. East of Tenth avenue we had 75. We now have 115. Totals, in 1905, 190 families; in 1912, 160 families.

At present, west of Tenth avenue east, we have but 45 families. East of Twentieth avenue east we have 62 families. In 1905, if our building had been set in the center of the church population, so that as many families were east of it as were west of it, it would have stood at Eighth avenue east. Today the center lies at Sixteenth avenue east. It has been moving eastward these seven years at the rate of over a block a year, and the end is not yet.

In the light of these facts, we may well ask two questions. What is the probable future of our Church if we remain on the old site? Our region is less residential and we have a very slight personal hold on the neighborhood. If we hire church visitors and build a modern parish house, we shall simply bring our work to the standard of efficiency of our two neighbors. They have the inestimable advantage of many families in this locality. We may scour the hotels, and get hold of some transients. Meanwhile our own people are largely located from one to three miles away. I know there are some who will cleave to this church as long as the church lives. But some have left us within the past ten years. We are winning few new families hoys and girls to other Sunday Schools. That means that we are unable to care for our own children. Just now there is

ample money for current expenses; how will it be fifteen years maintenance gradually dwindle, eventually Pilgrim Church must

What may be the future of this Church if within a reasonable time we sell the Lake avenue property, and erect a new church home somewhere east of Sixteenth avenue east?

- (1) We shall hold our own people. The people in the west-woodland, or in the Twentieth ayenue section; they will take the car and go towards the morning sun at the hour of worship. girls we shall stop the steady loss of our own young people and their families.
- (2) We shall stand as a strong church, with a new and handsome building, in a section where hundreds of young people are now living and more are scon to build homes. With our remarkable constituency of leading men and women, we are destined to attract and win many families, and to furnish them the inspirations of the religious life.
- (3) The resources of Pilgrim Church, personal and financial, will increase, and not diminish; and we shall be able to do larger things for the downtown section through the Y. M. C. A., the Y. W. C. A., the Bethel, or in union mission work, as the opportunity may arise.
- (4) Pilgrim Church has always been known as a church which trains and furnishes leaders for the higher life of Duluth. In the new location we could even more abundantly fulfil that peculiarly important function in years to come.
- (5) In the whole process of building a new church we shall find a wonderful harmony and joy. The old sinking at the heart, which you have all at times felt as you have contemplated the gradual waning of the power of this old church will give way to a feeling of hope and exultation, as together we sacrifice, as the fathers of 1887 sacrificed, that this Church may have a beautiful and substantial home, in the right location for the best service.
- (6) The influence of such a church upon the students of the Normal School is not to be forgotten; to set this church over against those hundreds of young people, each a future leader in our state, will be fraught with untold blessing to multitudes.

The Pastor felt it his duty to lay this matter informally before a group of our church men last Sunday evening, about 40 being present. This representative gathering was of one heart and one mind in the conviction that Pilgrim Church, so far as its people are concerned, has already gone into the east end, and that, as soon as the necessary business arrangements can properly be made, the building ought to follow the church. We were told by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees that

certain financial investigations should first be made. These investigations concern three matters. First, the selection of a suitable lot, and the securing of an option thereon; second, the canvassing of the market fer a possible sale of our present property, and third, the estimate of the cost of a new edifice and the ability of the people to meet the outlay.

There are plenty of available lots in the section in question. We cannot expect to realize full value for our present property, but prospects for a favorable sale are bright.

As to the cost of a new edifice, opinions will widely differ. The wise church today extends the process of erecting and financing a new building over a term of years. There are two ways of doing this. One is to build in two sections, erecting first a commedious parish house, or chapel, and later, adding the main church. The other is to erect a complete building, securing immediate subscriptions, large and small, payable in two or three annual installments, as the givers prefer. It is rarely the case that a church building is dedicated free from encumbrance; which simply means that Christian people often prefer by extending their giving through a mortgage over a term of years, to build a House of God that will be a joy to all beholders, and a delight to their children's children. My impression is that when Filgrim Church builds, she will build something as much in advance of the present churches of Duluth as this old building was in advance of its neighbors, when it was erected.

It is my firm conviction that by 1915 Pilgrim Church should be doing its business from a center between Sixteenth and Twenty-fourth avenues east. I would therefore close this report with the following recommendation:

"Resolved, that a committee be chosen to make immediate investigation as to an available lot in the east end for a new church edifice, and to secure an option thereon if deemed advisable; to look into the matter of securing a purchaser for the present Lake avenue property; to obtain the necessary facts as to the cost of a new edifice, and to report their findings to the Church."

Proposed Benevolences for 1913

On recommendation of the Missionary Committee, the church at the annual meeting voted to adopt "The Apportionment Plan," in accordance with which the sum of \$1,445 should be raised by Pilgrim Church for benevolences during the current year, thirty-eight per cent to be for foreign missions and sixty-two per cent for the home work, the money to be divided among the following nine societies in the proportions indicated:

It will be noted that in accordance with the above schedule 23% of the whole amount or \$332.35 will go to the American Board. The church has, however, undertaken for several years past to pay to the American Board \$525 toward the support of Rev. Herbert M. Irwin, our Missionary Pastor. For this reason the missionary committee made the further recommendation that the additional sum of \$192.65 be raised to complete the amount pledged for Mr. Irwin. This recommendation was adopted, making a total of \$1,637.65 which it is proposed to raise for missionary purposes during the year 1913, as against \$1.503.80 contributed in 1912.
