#### A Cesarea Club

(From the Congregationalist of March 14th.)

Mr. H. M. Irwin, the missionary supported by Pilgrim Church, Duluth, Minn., writing from Talas, in the Western Turkey Mission, speaks of the success of the club work among the Moslem men and boys in Cesarea. He says: "Besides those who come through the week, we have a regular attendance Sunday evenings of from two hundred to three hundred, and although the majority of these are regular, a certain percentage, probably twenty-five per cent., are constantly changing. It is a source of wonder that audiences keep up as they do. But the habit seems to be formed and many would be completely lost without the club.

"For some weeks a low-down theater company has been performing a few doors from us, but with no appreciable effect except perhaps to increase our attendance. A couple of Sundays ago two strangers dropped in and proposed that we all, missionary included, adjourn to see the dancing girls at the theater. This brought out one champion who said: 'This is good enough for me. Sit down and watch that screen.'

"One of the men went over and examined our vellum scren and said he could not see anything wonderful about it. 'You sit down and wait until he begins to put things on it; they'll be better for you than what you will get at the theater,' piped up the regular attendant. And this was followed by a chorus of, 'Amen.' The Turks are such a reserved people that so much appreciation was very heartening. Suspicion there is and will continue to be, but outspoken opposition to the use of pictures or Bible incidents is now seldom heard. When it does occur, especially with reference to the Bible, a reference to sura so-and-so of the Koran, where something is said of the character under consideration always strikes them dumb."

### The Silver Bay Conference

The Eastern Student Conference of the Young Women's The Eastern Student Conference of the Young Women's Christian Association has just come to a close. The conference is held each year at Silver Bay, Lake George, New York. Everything about Silver Bay is beautiful. Bright skies and call of birds, waving fields and mighty trees, forest dwellers and friendly folk, and everywhere God.

This year seven hundred delegates were present representing 61 colleges and secondary schools. Mt. Holyoke, Wellesley and the University of Syracuse had delegations of 60, while Vassar and Smith, because their Christian associations are not affiland with the National association, are allowed delegations of 50. The delegates are chosen from the Freshman, Sophomore and Junior classes in college. These girls will be back at college another year and will try to bring back the Silver Bay spirit to college, for the "purpose of the conference is to lead students to a fuller knowledge and more faithful service of Jesus Christ, to help them in facing the difficulties and opportunities of college life, and to bring before them their responsibilities for the furtherance of the Kingdom of God at home and abroad." Many a girl at Silver Bay is awakened, many things which may have troubled her are made clear, and she is a stronger, better Christian at the close of the conference than at the beginning. Bible classes and mission study classes are held each morning and each delegate is expected to enroll for one of each. A meeting is also held each morning in the big auditorium, a course of lectures this year, being given there by Dr. Merrill of the Brick Presbyterian Church, New York City. His subjects included "God and Our Relation to Him," "Prayer," "The Divinity of Christ," "The Gospel of Redemption." Dr. Merrill is a fine scholar and a forceful speaker who renewed our confidence and enlarged our vision. Indeed each speaker present represented the choicest product of our churches and Mission Boards.

It is of interest to this congregation to know that one of the most interesting Bible courses was given by Prof. Fred B. Hill of Carleton College, whose subject was "Religious Development in the Old Testament."

The afternoons were given up entirely to recreation: Tennis, basketball, baseball and water sports; colleges and schools competing against one another. Each evening after supper some college gave a "stunt" for us all, after which we gathered in our alloted places under the trees and sang college and Silver Bay songs until time for the evening meeting.

This gathering together of girls from all over the country, from many schools, and especially the foreign girls, was one of the most interesting parts of it all. The Chinese delegation, numbering thirty, were highly educated, refined girls, speaking English that would put to shame our mother tongue as commonly spoken and possessing as well the highest ideals of friendship and Christian service. The ten days at Silver Bay can never be forgotten by any one who was there and their influence must become a vital part of her life.

That it is "active" enough any one acquainted with the work of a large mission station will admit, so much so indeed that it has become the policy of some Mission Boards, among them our own, to send out young business men for this particular service. That it is "misout yours will be admitted when one understands that the one in that position has to keep in touch personally or by letter with all congregations and workers, to advise, console, encourage, resolve quarrels and assist in a thousand ways, and the time it takes! The methods of the East would drive an American business man to distraction. Was it not Lord Cromer who said that "if we want to get the view point of an Oriental we must not hurry him"? A man comes in from a distant village, sits down, you inquire about his health, that of his family, the condition of the congregation, etc. He returns the compliment in the same way and relapses into silence. After some minutes he begins again at the beginning asking after your health, that of your wife, etc., and if he knows them personally, each of the children by name. For a considerable period of time one would think that he made the trip of several days for the sole purpose of making himself acquainted with your condition. But there is always something else at the back of his head to which he finally comes. But after it is sufficiently aired one looks around to find half a day gone. It makes one think of the missionary who wrote home that he could get a great deal of missionary work done if the natives would stay away and leave him alone.

The club work for boys and young men is a child of our own begetting and although it is natural for one to look with favor upon his own offspring yet it is encouraging to have the station, the mission and the Prudential Committee look with favor upon this, as a promising youngster. It is now ten years since we began the club in Talas. Every year we have met with the opposition of the authorities of the Gregorian church and every year we have worn it down. This year has been no exception. When we began last autumn we had a fine attendance but we wakened one day to find this cut to a mere handful. We soon learned that the boys had been severely punished for attending. However, before many weeks we had them all back and more, with the permission of the church authorities. The daily average attendance has been about 40, at Sunday School 66, and at Sunday evening service 50. These are all Christian boys belonging, for the most part, to the old Gregorian church. Good work has been done. Besides active work in the gym. and reading room, part of every evening was given to the reading and discussion of some good book or a

### Fifty-ninth Annual Meeting of the Congregational Conference of Minnesota

At 3 o'clock Tuesday afternoon a line of churchly appearing people, carrying grips and umbrellas was filing along the level streets of the town of Wadena in search of the Congregational church. Arrived, they found a truly beautiful new church, large enough to comfortably seat 250 persons and already pretty well filled with an audience who were listening to an inspiring address of the Moderator, Hon. Lowell E. Jepson of Minneapolis. From that time until Thursday noon, when the train left for Duluth, the three delegates from Pilgrim Church, Rev. Mr. Thorp, Mr. W. W. Sanford and Mrs. W. S. Woodbridge, were in faithful attendance from 8:30 A. M. to 9:30 P. M. To accommodate the 140 delegates, the church had apparently secured the co-operation of the whole town, as we found when we went to the places assigned to us for the night. The pastor went to the prosperous home of a lumber dealer, a son of Mr. Sampson Dower, in the 70's a resident of Duluth and whom old residents remember as the father of 14 children. Mr. Sanford was sent to the home of a man who bottled beer and Mrs. Woodbridge and her roommate, Mrs. Tupper, a sister of Miss Hartwell of Foochow, China, were sent to the home of a Roman Catholic. It was a most generous and even courageous undertaking on the part of the Wadena church to assume the entertainment of such a gathering. Our breakfasts we foraged for, with varying success, but the other meals were supplied by the ladies in the pleasant and convenient dining room of the church and were most palatable and abundant. This was the time for pleasant greetings, for committee meetings in corners, and for unexpected recognitions. Among the valuable addresses, uplifting and instructive, I will only mention the annual sermon by our pastor on "Wider Religious Freedom," the five devotional addresses by Rev. Theodore Shipherd of Milwaukee on the general subject "The Message and the senger," the paper by Supt. Lesher on "The Growing Task" and the paper by Supt. 



Upon the religious life of the community, her influence has been most potent. There are many to bear witness to the quality of her work as chairman, for many years, of the religious committee of the Young Women's Christian Association, many to testify to the devotional spirit which she inspired as president of our church missionary society, and during the last two years her consecrated leadership of the Philathea Class has been a leaven whose far reaching effects no one can estimate.

Wherein lay the secret power of attraction which was felt by all with whom she worked? In the faculty ever to discern the best in another's character. ## The American Board Meeting

The 105th annual meeting of the American Board was held The 105th annual meeting of the interior Board was held at Detroit, Michigan, from October 13th to 16th, inclusive. Unable to attend all of the nine sessions, the writer consoled himself with the conviction that he could no more have digested all of the good things of the intellectual feast that was spread than he could hope to digest all of the good things of a nine course

I think that, on the whole, the address of most universal interest was that on Wednesday morning by Secretary Barton upon "Outstanding Features of our Missionary Year." As he recounted the various matters of great interest to all who listened. I am sure that everybody felt that there was one feature that stood out far ahead of all others, and that was the wide-reaching effect upon our missions of the European war. I can briefly mention but a few of the problems dwelt upon by Mr. Barton.

Many missionaries had already started to the field when war was declared and a part were detained in this country just as they were ready to depart. The board has had to provide for such so far as possible. Of those who were en route, some stopped in European countries and will study until the conditions enable them to go on. Others, detained before starting, are pursuing further preparatory studies in this country.

With the outbreak of the war Turkey, in which country onethird of the Board's missionaries are located, declared the abrogation of those treaties by which foreigners had been exempt from the jurisdiction of the Turkish court. This act has aroused the Powers to the necessity of seeing that steps are taken to protect foreigners and the American Board with characteristic promptness and foresight has notified the missionaries to urge the Turkish officials to visit the schools, colleges and hospitals and satisfy themselves that everything is there conducted in a spirit of fair-

What had the appearance of causing serious trouble with the missionaries and the mission stations was the inability to transmit money through the banks. This was met by the Standard Oil Company's notifying the Board that the Board might pay the funds into the New York office of the company and it would see

In commenting upon this situation, Secretary Barton read two or three extracts from a verbatim report that was made from an address by a Mohammedan in the celebrated Mosque of St. Sophia in Constantinople. The substance of it was: "I bring you glad tidings. The hordes of unbelievers in so-called Christian lands are butchering each other by the thousands. May the good work go on! And the congregation said 'Amen.' " In an editorial in a Pekin paper the Christians were held up to scorn because of the inconsistency of their national life with their teachings, as demonstrated by the

These problems the Board and its missionaries must meet as best they can. As the Secretary presented them, there was no spirit of pessimism but a clear ring of optimism that rose above the storm of war and permeated the whole gathering, so that one somehow felt that the problems and difficulties that were arising and which were being met so skillfully and so courageously, were indeed blessings in disguise.

Can you imagine the impression that was given by the sight, upon the the platform together, of five veterans in the Turkish field, the aggregate of whose years of service exceeded two hunderd and fifty? Dr. Greene of Constantinople, who has been on the field fifty-six years and who is apparently over eighty years of age, delivered a ringing address upon the subject, "The Call to the Home Churches." He read from manuscript. He read without glasses. His voice reached every corner of the large auditorium. One could not listen to these veterans, so enthusiastic, so optimistic, so clear in their understanding not only of the needs and opportunities and political questions existing in their fields of work, but of the problems of the home land, without being persuaded that the missionaries of the American Board become statesmen and diplomats as well as teachers and preachers. After all was over, the lasting impression was that the

American Board is a wise, economic, judicious and statesmandike body, doing with the funds placed in its hands a mighty work which increases with the years and which no amount of war, even among Christians, can efface.

For two years he gave up the chairmanship, but was re-elected in 1910, and since has continued to occupy that important position. He has traveled around the world on a deputation of the American Board, and has been wel. comed everywhere, both by missionaries and scholars.

He was a delegate to the International Council in Edinburgh, and took with him his address on Missions. But during the days of the Council, as his theme grew big in his soul, he cast aside his manuscript and re-wrote his address, which is remembered as one of the truly great addresses of the Council.

He brings a new type of man to the presidency of the Board. Hopkins brought to it the impression of a commanding personality. Storrs was the foremost orator of his time, needing a great theme for his genius, and never so commanding in his mighty eloquence as when he spoke of the conquest of the world for Christ. Lamson, the gentle, the sweet-spirited, came as a pacifier after a period of storm and stress. Capen was the business man in the organized work of the Lord. Moore is the scholar-statesman—the Woodrow Wilson of the Board, the methodical man of judgment and vision. He is a man with a trained mind and a clear grasp of the missionary problem, a man with wide experience and notable prestige at home and abroad.



### Extracts from Mrs. Irwin's Cetter

(Received by Mrs. W. G. Hegardt and read at the meeting of the Women's Missionary Society last Wednesday.)

My Dear Mrs. Hegardt and Friends of Pilgrim Church:

I hardly know where to begin to tell you all the happenings in Turkey today. As soon as war broke out in Europe soldiers were mobilized here. Part of the forces have left for Constantinople and part may go today. Several months ago Emin Pasha, minister of war, made a flying visit here to inspect the regular thoops (Caesarea is a military center now) and tried to inspire the soldiers with thoughts of revenge and regaining glory lost in

When the war broke out and England took the two battleships upon which Turkey had set her heart, bitterness against England became intense and the feeling was inflamed by the Turkish press in Constantinople. We received a letter yesterday from a doctor in England who had planned to come to Turkey, saying that if the trouble became serious the British government intended removing their subjects from the interior. Mr. Irwin, being a Canadian, would come under the head of Britishers and it would be strongly against our personal feelings to leave when the country was in trouble and we would certainly not do it unless there came a direct command.

Our hearts are aching for the people here. In almost every house there is sorrow over the going of sons or husbands. Some of the rich have bought themselves off for 43 pounds, but the mass of the people can't pay it, as it would be more than a year's

The Assistant Superintendent emphasized the importance of establishing such a class at once.

### The Annual Meeting

The forty-fourth annual meeting of the church was held in The forty-fourth annual meeting of the church was held in the parlors last Tuesday evening. The Pastor acted as moderator. The minutes of the last annual meeting were read and approved. Reports were made by the heads of all the departments of church work. The report of the Clerk showed we have received during the year, 51 new members with losses by death and dismissal 17. a net gain for the year of 34, making the present membership 506, the largest in the history of the church. The report of the Ladies Union disclosed that a payment of \$1,000.00 had been made by them on the Manse mortgage, thus reducing that indebtedness to \$400.00. The various financial reports showed the past year to have been most satisfactory from the standpoint of church finances. All financial obligations of the church for current expenses are paid. The Treasurer of Benevolences reported the church apportionment paid in full; and in addition a sum of \$210.00 remitted to Mr. Lesher for special State Work.

The Board of Trustees through its Chairman, Oscar Mitchell, recommended that the finances of the Sunday School be placed under the control of the Board of Trustees, so that all contributions made by members of the Sunday School shall be made to the church and its various activities. This recommendation was adopted and all collections in the Sunday School will hereafter be paid through the Sunday School Treasurer to the Church Treasurer and all expense of the Sunday School will be paid out of the general fund.

The committee on Church Site, through its chairman, Mr. C. A. Duncan, reported that nine members of the church have purchased the property at the southeast corner of Twenty-third avenue East and Fourth street (100x140 feet). Privilege is given to the church to secure this

to the church to secure this property at any time within five years. The Pastor's report showed a year of substantial gains in all the departments of the church, and sketched a program for 1915 which, if all members join in furthering, will bring us to our next annual meeting with a membership of 600, an attendance of and a financial condition which will show our regular income a little in excess of our expenditures. He also recommended that in view of the report of the committee on Church Site, a building committee be appointed to investigate all preliminary problems connected with the construction of a new church building. The closing paragraph of the Pastor's report is as follows:

I cannot find words to express my gratitude for the many ways in which you have encouraged your Pastor in our work. I doubt if ever a minister wrought under happier conditions. You and made us feel more than ever at home among you. May God in His Name, filled with His Spirit, dependent

in His Name, filled with His Spirit, dependent upon His power."

As recommended by the nominating committee the number of deacons was increased to eight, an Assistant Treasurer of Benevolent Funds and a Visiting Committee were elected.

The report of the tellers appointed by the moderator to count the ballots shows that all candidates selected for the various offices by the nominating committee were elected. The report of the tellers will be found elsewhere in this bulletin.

#### A Tefter from Mr. Irwin

Talas, Turkey, Dec. 8, 1914.

Dear Mr. Thorp and All Pilgrims:

We have recently been told at the post-office that English is taboo and we must write in "American." A British consul here has been reading "Shorty McCabe" for pastime and remarked that one must become proficient in the language of Shorty in order to fulfil the requirements. This letter goes to you open, and I can say nothing regarding the war. Our district seems to be the center of the war-cyclone; we are in a state of peace and quiet. Our schools are going forward far better than we had feared, both as to attendance and support. The hospital is closed, as Dr. Hoover is on furlough and the native assistant physician in charge has been drafted into the army. Our club work is going better here than in Cesarea. For the work here I have a young man who has had twelve years of Y. M. C. A. experience in the United States. With his knowledge and push the work here was never so flourishing and influential. The government liked the appearance of our horses and annexed them for war purposes, so that it is hard for me to look after the club in Cesarea, especially after dark. It is generally considered here that only men of ill repute are abroad after sundown. However the reading room and gymnasium are kept open there. Business is more and more deranged. Some staples are difficult or impossible to obtain: sugar, kerosene, matches, etc. Flour and meat are cheap and plentiful. We may have to take our coffee without sugar and go to bed with the hens but we bid fair to get enough to eat. We are well and in security. We should like to know more of what are well and in second, but some day after the censorship is is going on in the world. Winkle awaken to what has been going on unknown to us. Mrs. Irwin joins me in best wishes for the new year.
