Concerning the Bulletin

The former editor of the Bulletin, Mr. E. W. Matter, who had charge of the printing of the address-list last May, mentioned to the pastor his intention of using book paper and black ink on the next volume of the Bulletin. As the old cut could not be used on rough paper, Mr. Matter arranged for the pen-drawing of the church, from which the engraving used today was made. Mr. Matter mentioned the plan repeatedly to the pastor, and was looking forward to making what he believed to be an improvement in the form of the Bulletin. Reorganizing Our National Societies

The preliminary report of the Commission on Missions appointed at the Kansas City Council is published in the current number of the "Congregationalist" and should be read by all members of the denomination. This commission of twenty-two is composed of some of our strongest leaders, with President King of Oberlin as chairman. President Cowling of Carleton and Mr. David P. Jones of Minneapolis are our Minnesota representatives, and the name of the Reverend Edward M. Noyes also appears on the list. The duty of this commission has been to devise a plan whereby all organizations "doing common work shall be under a common administration," and its task has been extremely arduous, requiring both patience and tact.

"The American Bible Society is about to extend its work by the establishment of a new station for Bible distribution on the Panama Canal. Every sailor who passes through the canal will be presented with a Bible. Bibles in 127 languages are available for this work."—The Congregationalist.

PILGRIM CHURCH ANNUAL MEETING, ELECTION, HELD

Salary of Rev. C. N. Thorp, Pastor, Increased—Financial Report Optimistic.

Pilgrim Congregational church held its annual meeting and election of officers and committee chairman in the parish house last night. The salary of Rev. C. N. Thorp, pastor, was increased \$600 annually by vote of the congregation.

Preceding the meeting, 275 members were guests at the annual chicken supper given by the Ladies' union. The affair was in charge of Mrs. W. A. McGonagle, Mrs. W. G. Hegardt and Mrs. Bertha Webster. The young people of the church served.

Rev. Mr. Thorp presided at the annual meeting. Rev. E. C. Chevis of Biwabik read a message from the state conference. R. H. Pinneo, Sunday school superintendent, reported an increase in membership. It was voted to change the name of the department from Pilgrim Sunday school to Pilgrim Church school.

Societies Make Reports.

Glenn Schroeder, president of the Christian Endeavor society; Miss Austin of the Philathea class; C. M. Duncan of the Men's class; W. C. Allen of the Boy Scouts; Miss Florence Wade of the Girl Scouts; Mrs. Albert Baldwin of the Women's Missionary society; Miss Effie White of the Friends-in-Council; S. E. Matter of the missions committee; E. W. Matter of the organ committee; S. E. Matter for the building committee; Oscar Mitchell, chairman of the board of trustees and others made reports.

H. W. Nichols, church treasurer, reported that the operating expenses of the church during 1917 were \$9,558. Mrs. L. E. Paddock of the church furnishings committee, reported gifts of furnishings valued at \$3,000. W. G. Hegardt, treasurer of the building fund committee, reported that the new building complete cost \$156,703 and that this amount was covered either by cash or by subscriptions.

Election Held.

Brewer Mattocks jr., said 476 members were enrolled and that 34 of these are absent from the city. W. S. Fort, treasurer of the missions and benevolence committee, said \$2,746 was raised in the year. Mrs. C. A. Duncan reported that the Ladies' union obtained \$2,169 in 1917.

Ballots bearing the tickets of the nominating committees were distributed and later taken up. The results of the election will be announced in the church bulletin Sunday morning. W. W. Sanford, C. E. Carlson and R. H. Pinneo are the tellers.

A Message to Pilgrim Church Fathers and Mothers

Our Sunday School boys and girls are taking home pledge-cards today, which we wish them to fill out, with your kind assistance, and bring to school next Sunday. Each pupil will exchange the pledge-card for a package of little red envelopes. The package bears a number, corresponding to that pupil's name on the book of the school treasurer. Each envelope is dated, beginning with March 7th, when the use of the envelopes will begin. The envelopes have two pockets, one for expenses and the other for missions. The object of the new plan is to train the young people in systematic giving. May we ask you to advise the pupils how to fill out the card. Last year the school raised about \$400 for expenses and \$100 for missions. This should be remembered in dividing the total pledged between these two causes. A pupil giving two cents a week should give one cent to expenses and one to missions. A total gift of five cents should be divided four cents for expenses and one for missions. A ten cent gift should be divided eight cents for expenses and two for missions. Let the pledge be generous, but let the younger children make some pledge, however small. The package of envelopes may be tacked up on the wall where it will not be lost or forgotten. We should be glad to have you remind the young people of their envelopes the first few Sundays till the habit is formed. Many of the older scholars are already giving through the church envelopes. They can use both sets of envelopes if they wish. A better plan would be to use the church envelopes through February and notify the church treasurers by a note in the offering that they are changing to the red envelopes March first. They can make out a Sunday School pledge large enough to cover what they have been in the habit of giving through both church and Sunday School. In this new plan, as in all the work of our school, we need the constant assistance of the fathers and mothers. It is our wish to teach the young people that regular giving for the home expenses and missionary work of the church is an essential part of real christian living. If further information regarding this matter is desired, please consult the superintendent, Roger M. Weaver, the treasurer, Herbert U. Moore, or the pastor, and they will be glad to make the plan clear.

Little Sermon for Passion Week

"He trusted in God, let him deliver him now if he will have him."

What a taunt! For ages Israel had been taught that there is protection for the righteous, that God would specially keep those who keep his law. Prophet and priest had made this the very center of their teaching. And Jesus had lived the perfect life. He had kept the law, he was the sinless one. Nevertheless, here he was upon the cross, hanging between two thieves, rejected of men and seemingly deserted of God, helplessly and hopelessly in the hands of the hated Romans. Where, then, were his claims that he had come heaven-sent? that God was with him? Was not his fate sufficient proof that God was not with him? If his Father in Heaven cared for him, surely he would deliver him. Moreover, he had claimed to be king of Israel, but "if he be king, let him come down from the cross and we will believe him." And where was his power? "He saved others, himself he cannot save." All the great things which he had claimed for himself, all that he had said or done now seemed to be turning back upon him and increasing the reproach and scorn of his enemies. Every minute that he hung upon the cross in the agony of its cruel torture inflamed the contagion of derision which had spread through the mocking crowd.

It was an awful hour, an hour which seemed to undo all the other hours of faith in divine protection, or undo Jesus Christ himself. And it was an awful situation, sinless and yet dying like a sinner.

What is the answer to the questions which it raised in the throng around the cross? It is the answer given by the apostles when he arose from the dead. It is the answer which runs like a stream of life through the rest of the New Testament, the answer which has possessed the minds of believers through the centuries since. Jesus Christ could not come down from the cross because he was the "Lamb slain from the foundation of the world." He could not save himself because he was there to save others. The sinless one was dying for sinners. We cannot understand all the mystery of the great transaction, but it has a salvation to which the heart of the little child responds and the faith of the dying saint cleaves.

A Letter from Mr. Irwin

(This letter shows evidences of having been censored.)

Talas, Turkey, February 19, 1915.

This year we have been especially blessed in the matter of health. The weather has been exceptional, nothing that could be called winter as yet, and it is not likely that we shall have much after this date. Perhaps it was because of the steady bright mild weather, certainly we have been enjoying good health up to a week or so ago. It has been a great boon especially in view of the fact that practically everything in the shape of a medical man has been swept into the army. What the future may have in store for us in this respect is doubtful, for whereas * * * * some places, we have only had a touch of it here. The mild weather has been a blessing to the poor in that it saved them from the expenditure for fuel and left them with so much more for bread. Flour, meat and other native products have been cheaper than for some years, but * * * * as regards price and often in reality.

Our work is going along steadily although our hospital is closed through the absence of Dr. Hoover on furlough. Miss Phelps finds considerable to do in the medical line. Of course in medical cases a good nurse is about as valuable as a doctor and in certain respects better. But even in the case of minor surgery and broken heads and legs, she shows considerable ability. Our schools continue their work with slightly reduced attendance but with efficiency. The club work which is specially under my charge is on the whole doing well. In Caesarea on account of our having donated our horses to the army, it is not possible to do what we wish, but here it is exceptionally good, and on the whole the work averages up well.

So we manage to keep busy—good thing too, for on account of a strict censorship we are not allowed to hear or say what we would. Ignorance is not bliss.

Annual Meetings of the W. B. M. I. and W. B. M. II.

The forty-third annual meeting of the Minnesota Home Missionary Union, and the thirty-eighth annual meeting of the Minnesota Branch Woman's Board of Missions of Interior were held April 13-15 in Plymouth Congregational Church, St. Paul. There was a large attendance of registered delegates, while local women turned out splendidly, realizing the privilege of listening to the number of excellent speakers on the program.

Messages from many countries in foreign fields held our attention, the most inspiring being given by missionaries directly from the work. Miss Ruth Bushnell, from Erzroom, Turkey, was unanimously "adopted" by the society to occupy the place made vacant at that station so recently by the death of Miss Eunice Atkins. Miss Bushnell will resume her work as soon as she receives word that it is safe for her at Erzroom. This city of from fifty to sixty thousand inhabitants is right near the border line between eastern Turkey and Russia, and directly in the war area. A terrible scourge of typhus fever is now raging, because of the horrible insanitary conditions, and as many as 300 deaths occur in one day.

Miss Caroline Fullerton, from Shanghai, China, pictured graphically the needs of little children and young girls in China, pointing out so clearly the opportunity just now for women in this country to help. Dr. and Mrs. Percy Watson, graduates from Carleton College, Minn., gave interesting accounts of their work in the Shansi Mission, Fen Chow, China, showing costumes and jewelry worn by women and children.

A strong appeal was made for better buildings for schools for natives and homes for missionaries where, in many instances, a wide spreading tree is the only church, and insanitary huts the only homes. Enthusiasm was aroused to help reach the goal set for this purpose, of \$250,000 in 1918, the year of the Golden Jubilee Anniversary of the W. B. M. I.

One of the strongest speakers on the program was Miss Benton, the new dean for younger women at Carleton College, who for many years has held a most responsible position on the faculty of Smith College. Her topics were "Power of Intercessory Prayer," and "Our Young Women—the Dynamic of the Twentieth Century." She says this terrible thing that is sweeping Europe is not to be called the "War Peril" but the "Peril of Peace," and all our women should join in sending word across to the fighting world, to let them know we are not sitting idle, but are strong in our zeal for peace.

Dr. Ozora Davis, President of the Theological Seminary of Chicago, Ill., Miss Margaret Slattery of New York City, and Mrs. M. W. Mills, Principal of the Schaeffer School of Cleveland, Ohio, were three of the great events of the meeting, stirring the audience by their earnest appeals. One of the great truths ever to be remembered and passed on is that "The only way to bring Christianity to humanity is to bring Christ to individual souls." Our slogan to be, "The whole world for Christ."

To be counted as one among so large a body of earnest Christian women, whose one great aim is to help others in Christ's name, is an inspiration that having once been experienced is a revelation that stirs one's very soul. The strong plea all through the meetings is for more earnest prayers. Stronger than the call to give, is the great grand call for prayers.

Duluth Association and Superior Convention

Lay Delegates who attended the Duluth-Superior Convention last week were thoroughly awakened to their own peculiar responsibility to the church and to the social body both at home and abroad. The subject, Tuesday afternoon, was "The Expected Church—Its Ministry, Its Members, and Its Sunday School." The first topic was ably presented by the Rev. Sheridan of Brainerd and the third by the Rev. Sutherland of Detroit, who said that the expected church would have no Sunday School—it will be a Sunday School. The expected membership was discussed by the Rev. Smith of Washburn and was an arousing appeal for the practical application of Christianity, the faith which is shown by works and the interpretation of doctrine based on actual experience. In this last connection he pointed out the absolute impossibility of understanding the atonement until sacrifice has become a personal reality.

The first address, Tuesday evening, was given by Mr. Thorp who made a plea for more workers among the members. The address rather surprised those who have not sat under Mr. Thorp's preaching and Duluth delegates were afterwards asked if any one dared be idle under such leadership. President Brownell of Ashland followed with a stirring appeal for Northland College, which should result in some practical help on the part of our Minnesota churches for this unique institution. The speaker pointed out that this is the only academy or college in which boys and girls with no possessions but grit and ambition, from the wildernesses of northern Minnesota, northern Wisconsin and northern Michigan may obtain an education. The state inspector of education says that he knows of no institution where the students work as they do there and no school in which the atmosphere of Christian spirit is so marked. President Brownell told of concrete cases illustrating what the institution is doing for the wilderness settlements. One graduate went back to his home, a station in the forest where there were four saloons, one store and a group of settlers' homes. In a short time the saloons were gone, the young student had organized a Sunday School, arranged for some church services, formed clubs among the young people and thoroughly changed the ideals of the community. This is certainly work worth while. Recently the main college building, containing everything of the community. This is certainly worth while. Faculty and students have accepted this as a test and are sacrificing in every way to rebuild. Here is surely a challenge which we cannot allow to leave unanswered if we are to claim for ourselves membership in the "Expected Church."

Wednesday afternoon the woman's missionary meeting was held. Fourteen of our members were present. Foreign work was presented by seven brief talks by Duluth women under the very able direction of Mrs. Thorp. Mrs. Wentzel of Superior gave an earnest talk on Home Mission work. The annual sermon was preached Wednesday evening by the Rev. Hammond of Aitkin. Again the membership conscience was aroused, this time in regard to our attitude as Christians to those members of society classed as outcasts. Only as we show the spirit of Christ in His dealings with the Magdalen are we worthy of our discipleship.

The next meeting will be held in Brainerd, Mr. Christian Bruhn will be moderator. The Rev. Harris of Biwabik was re-elected registrar.

Dear Friends:

Our little journey into the world has included three delightful days on the lakes, a glimpse of Cleveland, five crowded and fascinating days in Greater New York, two days among old friends in Chelsea, two days in Boston, part of a week at Amherst College commencement, and a few days of quiet rest here among the Green Mountains.

The lake trip was beautiful beyond words, with smooth seas, superb accommodations and choicest fellowship. We landed at Lorain, sped through Ohio vineyards to Cleveland and spent an afternoon going through Euclid avenue and the superb park system. On the New York train we were delighted to meet Mrs. C. E. Holt, one of the Pilgrims.

On the first Sunday we worshiped in the new and beautiful colonial meeting house of Flatbush Congregational Church. The stately red brick structure with great granite columns in front occupies a large lot graced with shrubbery and flowering plants. It made me more eager than ever for the new Pilgrim Church that is to be. We were surprised and delighted when Dr. Guild, your preacher for July, and his family occupied the pew directly in front of us. Next day we had a wonderful eighty mile ride with Dr. and Mrs. Guild in their auto, going as far as Sleepy Hollow and the hills of Westchester county.

At Friday evening meeting a large number of our former parishioners came to greet us at an informal reception after service. You know how many times I have written about our school. I cannot forget my school life for ever. I have learned many useful and helpful lessons in the school. It has left many impressions upon me. I have seen the good actions of my teachers. They try to show the truth and righteousness in our school lives, so this school has left a good influence upon me and to the other girls. In all these things I am grateful to you for your help, that I could have this opportunity to study in such a school. Now I have reached the end of my school life. In our school we have a Christian Endeavor society and I was chosen to be president of this society. And there is a Y. W. C. A. which is divided into several clubs. Ours is the Violet club. Our leader is an American lady. This year we are helping by sewing underwear for the soldiers.

Last Friday evening we had our "hair up" party. Every year seniors take their hair up, first day they are invited to have a merry time with American ladies. For this is called "hair up." So we spent a happy evening in playing different games.

Yet I have not decided what to do next year, but my wish is to be a teacher. Every day I pray for you, and wish you to pray for me and for our country.

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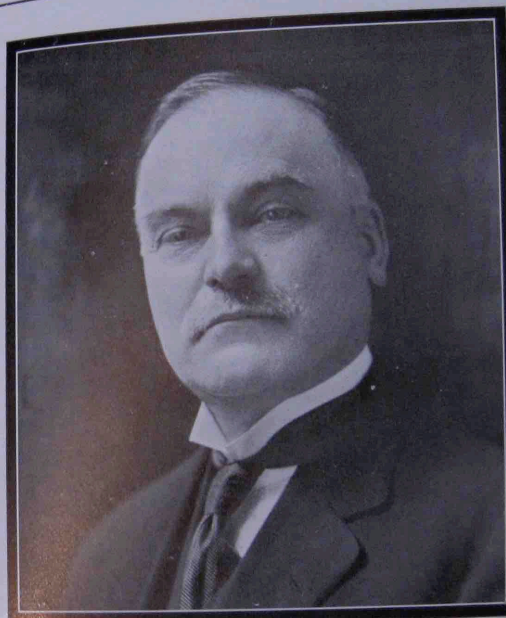

Memorial

Allen Daniel Goodman was born at Melmore, Ohio, January 1, 1859, and died in Duluth, Minnesota, July 28, 1915. His boyhood was spent in Waseca and Winona, Minnesota, where he received his early education, later attending the University of Minnesota. In 1885 he married Miss Blanche Swain, of Madison, Wisconsin, who, with their son, A. Laird Goodman, survives him. After engaging in the lumber business in Waseca for a number of years he came to Duluth in 1900, and joined Pilgrim Church in November of that year. He served this church on important committees and in other capacities, always with loyalty and devotion. He entered into the activities of life with zeal and enthusiasm, and as a man of affairs was a recognized factor in the business and social life of this city. He believed in the practical gospel of humanity, and his giving was unostentatious but extensive and generous. He did not wait to be solicited, but sought opportunities to render assistance to those in need. Such sentences as the following, from his many letters in the files of a charitable organization of Duluth, are eloquent of his thoughtful generosity: "Dont' you think it is about time that the list of poor families for Thanksgiving was sent to me? Please send it along as quickly as possible, and the larger the list the better it will suit me"; "As long as I have plenty of flour at the mill I do not want a deserving poor family in Duluth to suffer from hunger"; "I can assure you that I shall be pleased to send flour to all the needy families whose names you have given me. * * * When the families are really in need you cannot send the lists along too frequently to suit me"; "Do not hesitate to call upon me whenever you find a poor family in need." Other institutions of the city testify to this same generosity. Thus in his life he exemplified the principles of true christianity. In his death this community loses an esteemed citizen; this church an honored and respected member; and the poor and the unfortunate of this city a kind, sympathetic and generous friend.

The Finance Committee was authorized to increase its number and to enter at once upon a campaign to solicit pledges for the amount necessary to be raised. At a subsequent meeting of the trustees and building committee held at the Manse last Friday evening it was decided to employ F. G. German, architect.

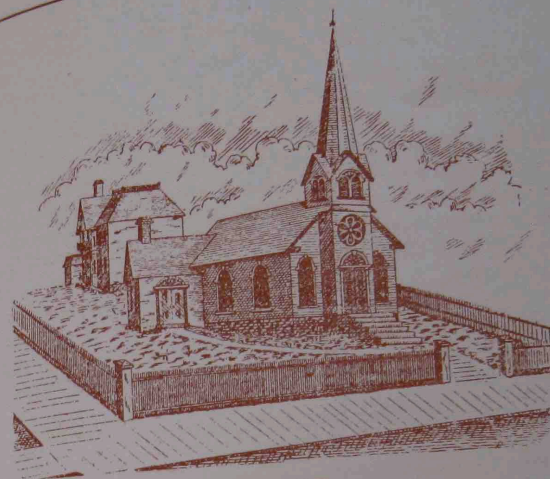

Historical Sketch of Pilgrim Church

The first meeting for the purpose of organizing a Congregational church in Duluth was held November 27, 1870. The minutes of this meeting as they appear on the church records read as follows: "The Congregational friends of the city of Duluth assembled at the rooms of the Y. M. C. A. the 27th day of November, 1870, to consider the question of organizing a Congregational church. The meeting was called to order by L. H. Tenney and formally organized by the election of William S. Woodbridge as chairman and George Spencer as secretary. A motion was made by Mr. Tenney and seconded by Mr. Thomas Dowse, that the meeting proceed to organize at once a Congregational church. This motion was passed by a unanimous vote." A committee of which William S. Woodbridge, Jeremiah Kimball and R. S. Munger were members, was appointed to draft a church constitution. "Mr. Tenney was instructed to write to Rev. Charles C. Salter of Brookfield, Mo., that it was the voice of this preliminary meeting to extend to him a call as soon as the church became permanently organized."

The name "The Pilgrim Congregational Church of Duluth, Minn.," was adopted when the church was formally organized by Council January 18, 1871. The Council consisted of Rev. J. L. White, pastor of Plymouth church, St. Paul; Rev. H. A. Stinson,

pastor, and D. B. Barber, delegate, of Plymouth church, Minneapolis; C. S. Bardwell and W. H. Hatch, delegates from Vine Street church, Minneapolis, and Rev. Richard Hall of St. Paul, State Superintendent of Home Missions.

The meetings of the church for the first six months after its organization were held in what was known as the Pendleton Block on the southwest corner of Superior Street and First Avenue West.

There were sixteen charter members of the church: Thomas C. Cain, Miss Catherine Cochran (now Mrs. J. P. Johnson), Thomas Dowse, Mr. and Mrs. Jeremiah Kimball, Mrs. Roger S. Munger, Mr. and Mrs. O. K. Patterson, Rev. and Mrs. Charles C. Salter, Mr. and Mrs. Ezra L. Smith, George Spencer, Mr. and Mrs. William S. Woodbridge, all by letter, and J. P. Johnson on confession of faith.

At the first meeting for the election of officers held January 26, 1871, Jeremiah Kimball was elected deacon. George Spencer, clerk, and O. K. Patterson, treasurer. William S. Woodbridge was elected deacon at a later meeting held on February 2nd of the same year. The first board of trustees consisted of L. H. Tenney, Roger S. Munger, O. K. Patterson, Josiah D. Ensign and Ezra L. Smith. A Sunday School was organized after the first Sunday morning service with thirty-two members.

At a meeting of the church held February 21, 1871, it was voted to purchase two lots on the northeast corner of Second Street and First Avenue East as a site for a new church building and on April 1, 1871, plans for a new building were chosen and a building committee, of which Roger S. Munger was chairman, was appointed. The new church, costing \$2,800, a cut of which appears in this Bulletin, was dedicated July 16, 1871, and for nearly eighteen years was the church home for Congregationalists in this city.

Among the contributions by friends living outside the city was a bell weighing 1200 pounds, costing \$365, given by Dr. Charles L. Ives of New Haven, Conn., brother-in-law of Rev. C. C. Salter. This bell rang for the first time September 25, 1872, and when the present building was erected, in 1889, was given to Plymouth Congregational church in West Duluth.

Owing to financial conditions following the panic of 1873 the population of Duluth diminished during a few years from 5000 to 2500. Some churches discontinued services and boarded up their church buildings. For nearly three years Pilgrim church united with the Congregational church in Brainerd, one pastor

serving both churches. At a meeting held April 10, 1876, to discuss the advisability of discontinuing church services a vote was taken and it was decided that "This church shall continue." During this period the church was obliged to accept aid from the Home Missionary Society and there were several changes in the pastorate. In 1881, however, the church again became self supporting and since that time there has been steady growth and advancement.

It is evident that a strong faith in Congregationalism and its place in the future of this community upheld this little band of workers during these trying years. This faith and its fruit, self sacrifice, must ever be counted by their successors as a priceless heritage.

In 1885 the Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor was organized, one of the first in the state.

At the annual meeting of the church held January 11, 1887, it was voted to "erect a church building, beginning within a year, to cost not more than the amount subscribed." On February 3, a building committee was appointed, consisting of J. W. Norton, J. F. Patten, Roger S. Munger, Charles H. Clague and William S. Woodbridge and on March 17 the sale of the old church and site was authorized. The new site, on the corner of Lake Avenue and Second street, had already been chosen. The building on this site was begun in May, 1887, and the exterior was finished in November of that year. On Sunday, November 27, the building was burned. Aside from the financial loss, this caused a delay of nearly a year in the completion of the building. The total cost of the site, building and furnishings was \$55,828.33.

The associations connected with this church building are valued by all, but we look forward to the new era before us with confidence and happy anticipation.

Church Notes

The Men's Bible Class will meet today to discuss plans for the future.

The Sunday School will resume its regular sessions today. It is hoped that officers, teachers and students will be present with promptness and enthusiasm to take up another season of Bible-study together.

Last Sunday at the close of the morning service the Pastor called to order the business meeting, which had been regularly and legally called. In the absence of the clerk Walter S. Horr was elected temporary clerk.

It was unanimously voted to authorize the trustees to convey the property on which the present church building is located, to the Y. M. C. A. for the sum of \$35,000 cash, reserving such rights and property in the church building as they may think best.

By unanimous vote the trustees were authorized to acquire title to the lots purchased last summer by a group of Pilgrim Church men, and held in trust by W. G. Hegardt, according to the terms of said deed of trust. These lots are at the southeast corner of Twenty-third Avenue East and Fourth Street (150 by 140 feet).

An organ committee was unanimously elected to arrange in cooperation with the building committee for the disposal of the present organ and the securing of an appropriate organ for the new church building. This committee, with power to add to their number, consists of Mrs. E. W. Matter, chairman, W. G. Hegardt and Mrs. H. B. Paull.

The building committee, as at present constituted to include the trustees, was unanimously confirmed and authorized to proceed to employ an architect, make plans and contracts for the erection and equipment of the new Church and Parish House. The building committee was empowered to appoint such other committees in connection with their task as may be needed from time to time and to assign the duties of such committees.

On Thursday evening the Church took action upon recommendation of the Pastor and deacons, relative to temporary arrangements for services and meetings while the church is without a home of its own.

It was voted to accept the generous invitation of the Masonic Fraternity, and to hold the Sunday School in the basement rooms of the Temple, Sunday mornings at 9:45, using the entrance on Lake Avenue. The adult classes may determine for themselves whether they will meet before or after the church service. It was voted to hold the morning service in the Temple Auditorium at 10:45, using the entrance on Second Street.

It was voted to authorize the trustees, in view of the offer of the Unitarian Church, to arrange for the use of their building, at Eighteenth Avenue East and First Street, for all the other services and meetings of the Church and its organizations.

The Church also voted to maintain a second service on Sundays, and to secure a referendum of the entire membership, by postal ballot, as to whether such second service should be a Vesper or an evening service.

Report of State Conference at Masera

The conference opened on Tuesday, October 5, at 2 P. M. with devotional service led by Rev. A. E. Gregory of Austin, which was followed by an address delivered by Rev. Edward B. Dean of Northfield, in which he said: "The democratic form of government is the distinguishing mark of Congregationalism. There is something in the spirit of our freedom which demands that and self reliance. This develops strong character and mighty leaders. The new constitution interferes with no church in its local work but provides the conference shall be the instrument of the Congregational churches of the state for all cooperative work they wish to do. If not the best, it is an improvement on the old." The new constitution was adopted.

At 4 P. M. Rev. John P. Miller preached a sermon on "Christ, the Center of the Bible." He said the old testament was the dawn and the new testament the full orb'd day. The heart of Christianity is the atonement. Take Christ out of the Bible and you have an empty shell. In history, poetry and parable the writers were inspired by but one idea; that Christ was the Alpha and Omega. Christ and Him crucified should be the center of all church work. Emphasize the cross in Christian hope." On Wednesday morning there was a report of the committee which visited Carlton College. They were impressed with the pleasant relations between the people of Northfield and the College. The Pastor does good work among the students. Every student has kindly supervision. Carlton employs two men who give their entire time to the Bible, history of religion and missions. Professor Ward spoke for the Chicago Theological Seminary, speaking of the great leaders who were chosen for the work of the church who had attended the school. He said "the work of our churches is growing larger and more difficult as the years go by. We must continue to furnish leaders."

Rev. Harry Deiman of Minneapolis spoke on the university student problem. A pastor is to be employed to conserve the Congregational students at the university for Congregationalism. On Thursday afternoon Mr. Leshner gave his report. He said, "We reap that we did not sow and sow that we do not reap." He spoke of Dr. Herrick's grand services of 27 years and how Minnesota had been blessed in its leaders and that if we win the state for Christ consecrated wealth must do the work.

Rev. Henry Holmes gave an address on "Christian Citizenship." He said "There is no higher function than teaching ship." He said "Christ was the great law maker. The preacher, the people, the schools and the homes are all law makers and the men who will crystallize the ideals of the people into laws are the ones to send to the legislatures."

At the recent meeting of the National Council held at New Haven, Conn., the Rev. Charles N. Thorp served the Council as a member of the business committee of nine men of which the Rev. Carl S. Patton of Columbus, Ohio, was chairman. The National Council, representing our more than 6,000 Congregational churches, is composed of 600 delegates chosen by state conferences and local associations. Minnesota is represented by 25 men. The Council meets biennially and every delegate is a voting director at the meetings of our seven missionary societies, held in conjunction with the Council meetings. The Council controls over \$14,000,000 in trust funds and \$4,000,000 in real estate.

News Bulletin from the American Board

A news-bulletin from the American Board has been received which states that "The Armenians from all of the stations in the Eastern Turkey Mission and from Trebizond, Marsovan, Sivas and Bardizag in the Western Mission have been in large part removed. Many of the men have been killed and the women and children deported towards Arabia. Talas and Cesarea were spared longer than some of the places further east. Word comes under date of September 5, that deportations from there were beginning. Dr. Hoover had been to Talas from Constantinople to perform an operation upon Mrs. Irwin which was wholly successful. He has returned to Constantinople."

Congregational Women and Foreign Missions

The three Woman's Boards have passed into the treasury of the American Board this last year \$308,251, nearly a quarter of its total receipts, and are responsible for the support of 220 missionaries.

The American Board Meeting

I arrived in New Haven on Monday of the week of the meetings of the National Council and the Allied Societies. Mr. Thorp, who had preceded me four days, rather staggered me on my arrival with the greeting, "I'm full." With the passing events of the next two days I came to realize the true meaning of that fulness and I can assure you that it was entirely legitimate. I should like to tell you of many interesting features of the meetings, but my objective was the meetings of the American Board held upon Tuesday and Wednesday and I will refer briefly only to them. Rev. Thomas B. Woodside crowded into an impassioned address of twenty minutes, what he could of twenty-seven years labor in West Africa. Four natives of India, dressed in native costume, missionaries from the Marshall and Gilbert Islands, from China, from Turkey and from other lands, each spoke until called down by the inevitable buzz of the "time-keeper." This year, as last, the deepest interest centered in war-ridden Turkey. I wish I could tell you the thrilling tales told by Rev. Mr. Partridge, one of the latest to leave Turkey. Let me mention in particular the address of Rev. James P. McNaughton, who has been in the Turkish field for twenty-eight years. With the entry of Turkey into the war, he was interned for several weeks and banished from the Empire as a British subject, having been born in Canada. He is a tall, soldierly appearing man whom you would mark as strikingly distinguished in any surroundings. He said that a triple tragedy is being enacted in Turkey. A mighty empire (the Turkish) is trembling in the balance and is liable soon to perish; the first nation that adopted Christianity (the Armenians) are in imminent danger of annihilation; and if the Armenians shall be destroyed, the labors of many years of the American Board in Turkey will be jeopardized. After he had told of the heart-rending condition of the native Christians in Turkey, he turned to a brighter aspect of the situation and told of the self-sacrificing labors of the people which are an earnest of better times to come. I shall never forget how that great audience was electrified when he straightened his commanding form to its full height and said, in substance: "Do you think you know how to give? Let me tell you something about giving. Over there the average wage is twenty-five cents a day, and out of their poverty those native Christians in one year gave just a little less than two hundred thousand dollars for the spread of the gospel. I tell you, you don't know what giving is." By Wednesday night I, too, was full; full of an appreciation as never before, of the scope of the Board's activities and of the pressing demands for more workers in the field; full of admiration for the scholarly, statesmanlike, consecrated men and women who are devoting their lives and their splendid talents to this work; full of profound respect for the efficiency of the American Board in its management, not only of the difficult problems upon the fields, but also of the limited resources which enable it to accomplish what it does; and full of a sense of the awful responsibility that rests upon the Congregational Churches of Christian America, upon our own Pilgrim Church, and upon each member of the Church to see to it that the American Board shall not be compelled to narrow the bounds of its labors by lack of funds.

Our Missionaries in Turkey

In a letter from the rooms of the American Board this week there are reassuring tidings regarding the Irwins.

"We have had no letters from the Irwins or from the other missionaries at Talas for many weeks. It is evident that the mails are greatly interrupted, or, if they are writing, the censors are holding up the letters. Our last word about Mrs. Irwin was that she had passed through her operation successfully. You doubtless know that Talas has suffered in the general deportation of the Armenians. We have heard however that some of the Roman Catholics and Protestants have been exempted. The latter part of September the missionaries had opened a school of about 175 pupils. Probably some of them were refugees from the villages who were received into the school for protection. The missionaries are giving much time and attention to relief work for the suffering people. Letters from Constantinople inform us that they hear quite regularly from different interior points and that all the missionaries are in comparative safety."

By the thoughtfulness of Secretary Wade we are hearing today from the lips of Secretary Wilbur, whose field includes the entire land of China, the inspiring story of recent Christian movements in that country.

Mrs. Frances A. Woodbridge, one of the charter members of Pilgrim Church, died at her home in this city on Sunday, November 28, at the age of seventy-four years. The funeral was held from the residence of her daughter, Mrs. N. J. Upham, on Thursday, December 2, the Pastor conducting the service.

Owing to the unusual conditions affecting both our home and foreign mission work, the Missionary Committee of the church is desirous of sending our present quarter's apportionment before the end of the quarter. An extra effort at this time will show our appreciation of the untiring devotion of our representatives on the mission fields during this time of confusion and stress.

In Memoriam

Mrs. W. S. Woodbridge, the woman of whom Duluth has most reason to be proud, died Sunday morning, Nov. 28th. The end came suddenly and unexpectedly after a short illness. Mrs. Woodbridge was 74 years old on Thanksgiving day, Nov. 25th. She was born in 1841 in Portland, Maine, the family moving to Boston when she was one year old. Her maiden name was Frances A. Pool. She was educated in the Boston high school and the Boston normal school. After finishing in these schools she taught there until, because of a slight weakness of the lungs she went south to Mississippi and taught in Holly Springs Seminary. While there she recovered her health, and was still there when the war broke out. A Northerner, and alone, she had many inter-

esting experiences. She went alone through the Southern hospitals searching for her brother, but he was never found. She afterward returned to Boston and married William S. Woodbridge, coming to Duluth as a bride. Mr. Woodbridge later established the Lake Superior News, and so the history of this northwestern country became easily accessible to her whose mind was so fittingly formed to receive it and make it interesting. She never failed when speaking of the days long gone by, to invest them with a charm of which one never tired. Those days and scenes lived and moved before you as things still throbbing and palpitating with life.

In 1871, just one year after coming to Duluth as a bride, Pilgrim Congregational Church was established. From that time until this, she has been active in its work, presiding over, directing and assisting at all its undertakings. In the early days her quick wit which smoothed its way through all the little tangles and dilemmas of a country church, was largely responsible for its success and growth. Later the Ladies' Union owed much to her judgment and supervision. She was always ready to take her share of the burden and has been president of nearly every society in the church. Her spiritual life showed most beautifully in her talks at prayer meeting and missionary society. All who heard her speak at the Thank Offering meeting a year ago, when out of her own sorrows she told how to be thankful in spirit, took away a lasting impression of her courage and faith. Her sympathies were always with the pioneer churches of the state, with all the struggling races of the home mission field, while she showed her interest in foreign missions by her gift to the Hartwell house in Foochow, China, of a stairway and hall in memory of her husband. Among the first organizations for the public benefit in which Mrs. Woodbridge took one of the leading parts, was the formation of the Ladies' Library, which was organized about the year 1885 and was located in the Phoenix block. Years later this was turned over to the city and was the real beginning of our public library. She was also one of the organizers of the Ladies' Literature Class and has been since its beginning one of its most important leaders. She was one of the most valued members of Liberty Chapter, D. A. R. She had served it as regent, and as delegate to national and state conventions had met many of the leading women of our country some of whom had become her personal friends.

The Women's Council, which she founded in 1904, has perhaps been the organization dearest to her heart, for there, she said, "We can do things worth while." People and their welfare were of great interest to her. Nothing that tended to better their condition seemed too small or too great to her to undertake. She was the first president of the Women's Council and has been president the last two years, just passing out of office.

Mrs. Woodbridge was the former head of the Women's Auxiliary to the Y. M. C. A., which was the predecessor of the Y. W. C. A. She was also an active member of the Twentieth Century Club. In fact nothing of importance in the way of civic improvement or uplift has been attempted in Duluth without Mrs. Woodbridge. Long will the inspiration of her presence remain with us, her gracious and gentle dignity, her atmosphere of composure and inward peace, testifying to the power and stability of the soul within. Whenever she spoke she commanded instant attention. Even her voice, always gentle and musical, seemed to penetrate to an inner consciousness which at once gladly yielded itself to the charm of her speech. Her outlook upon life was so large that she seemed to find no place for self seeking, and her mind thus freed from the petty ambitions common to most of us, offered no resistance to the greater spiritual forces which entered unhindered and found their expression in practical ways looking toward the establishment of human life upon a higher spiritual basis. We cannot measure the result of the influence of such a life in the world. It is a part of the heaven which works toward the creation of a spiritual Divine Order in the world life.

As a friend she was most genial and interesting, with a sense of humor which was delightful. She entered into one's hopes and interests as if they were like her own. She was indeed a royal friend, never to be forgotten, her memory ever woven "about the beautiful things of life."

In the "more stately mansion" to which she has gone, we shall think of her as not only receiving the joys and blessings of that greater life, but as still scattering with her gentle hands, love and beauty and blessings, for only so could she be her own true self.

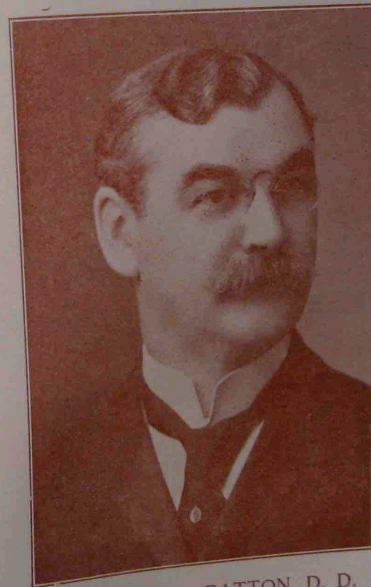

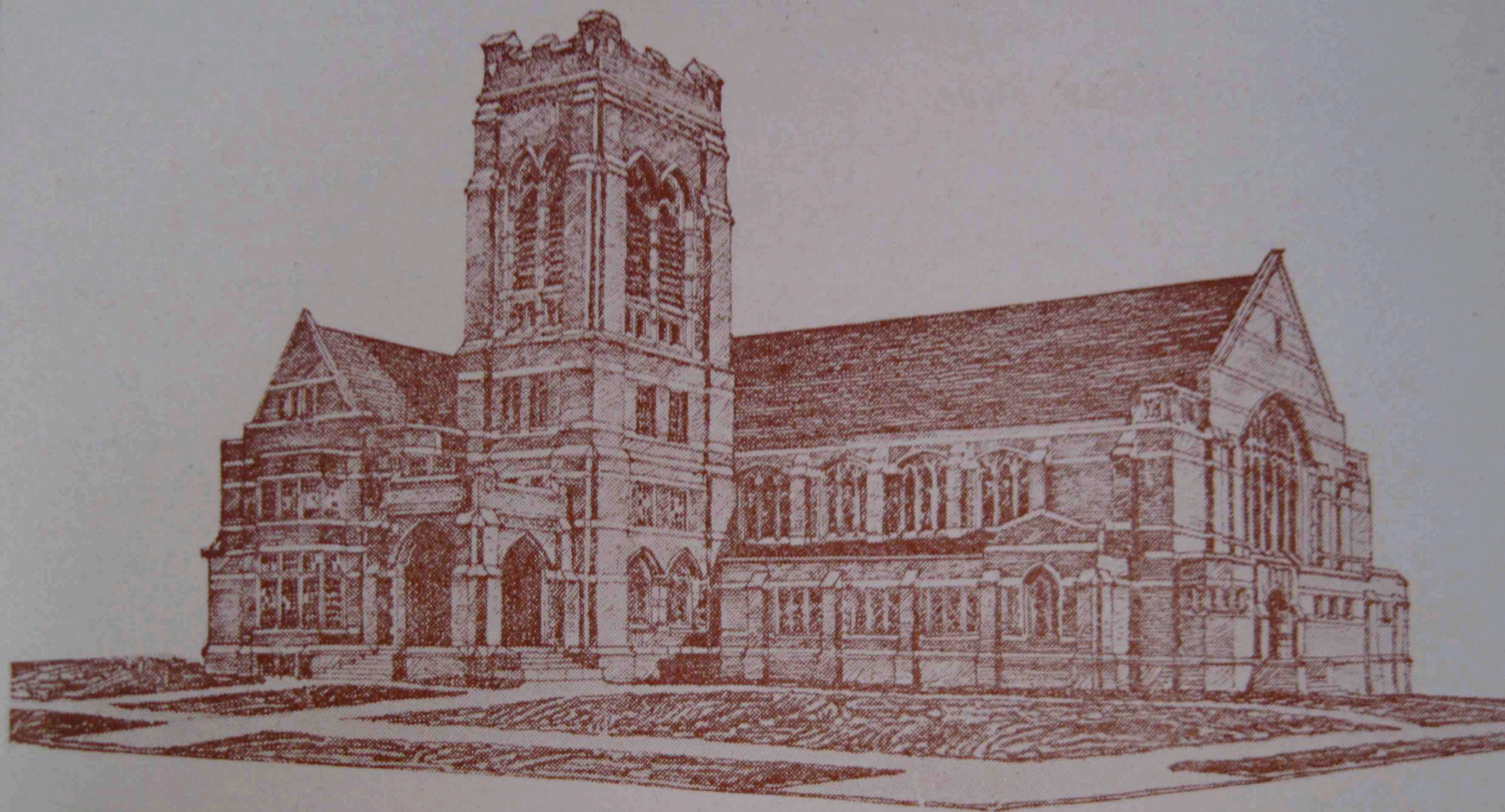

An expression of appreciation for courtesies extended was tendered the First Presbyterian Church by the chairman of the Board of Trustees in his annual report.

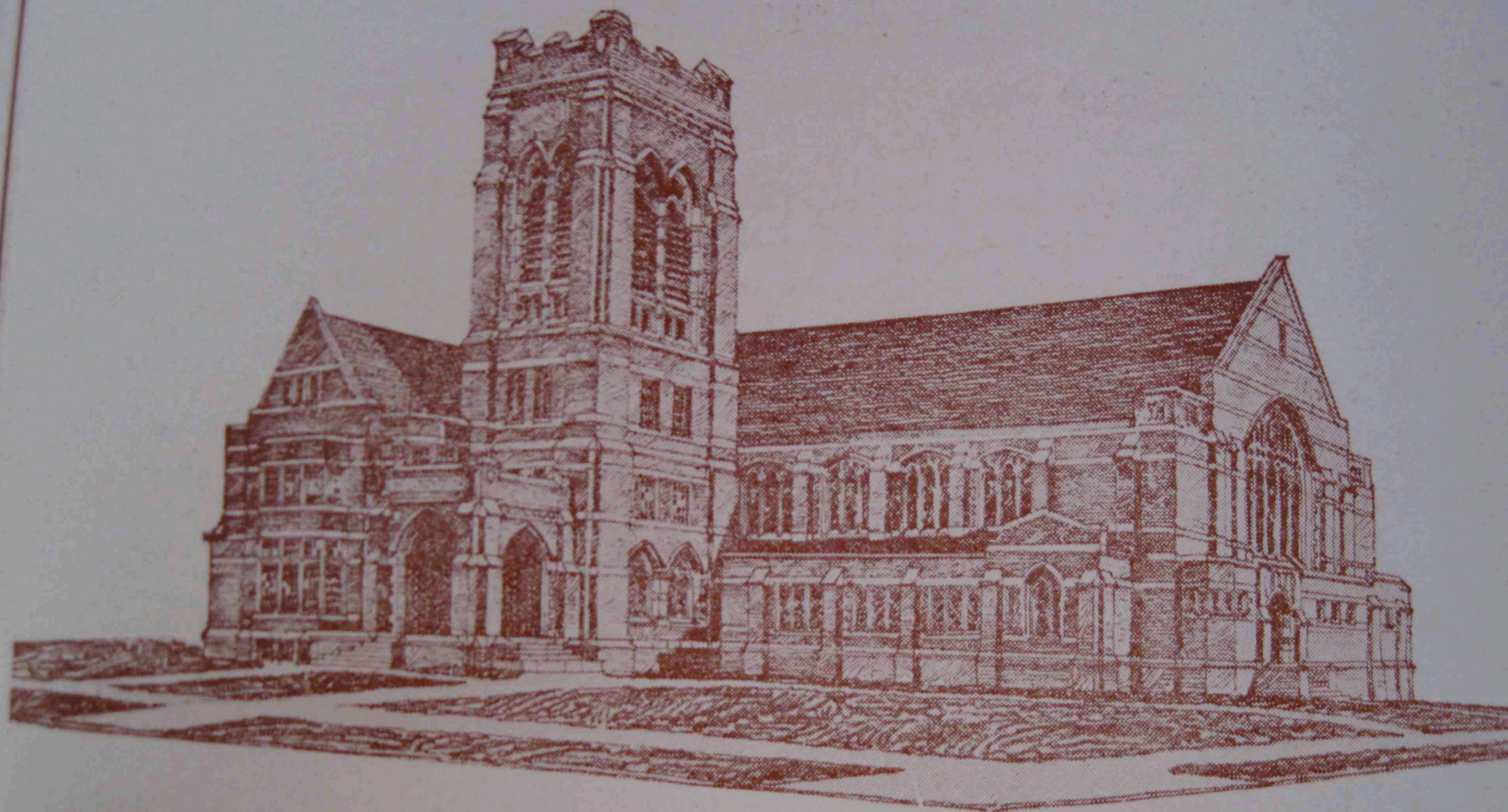

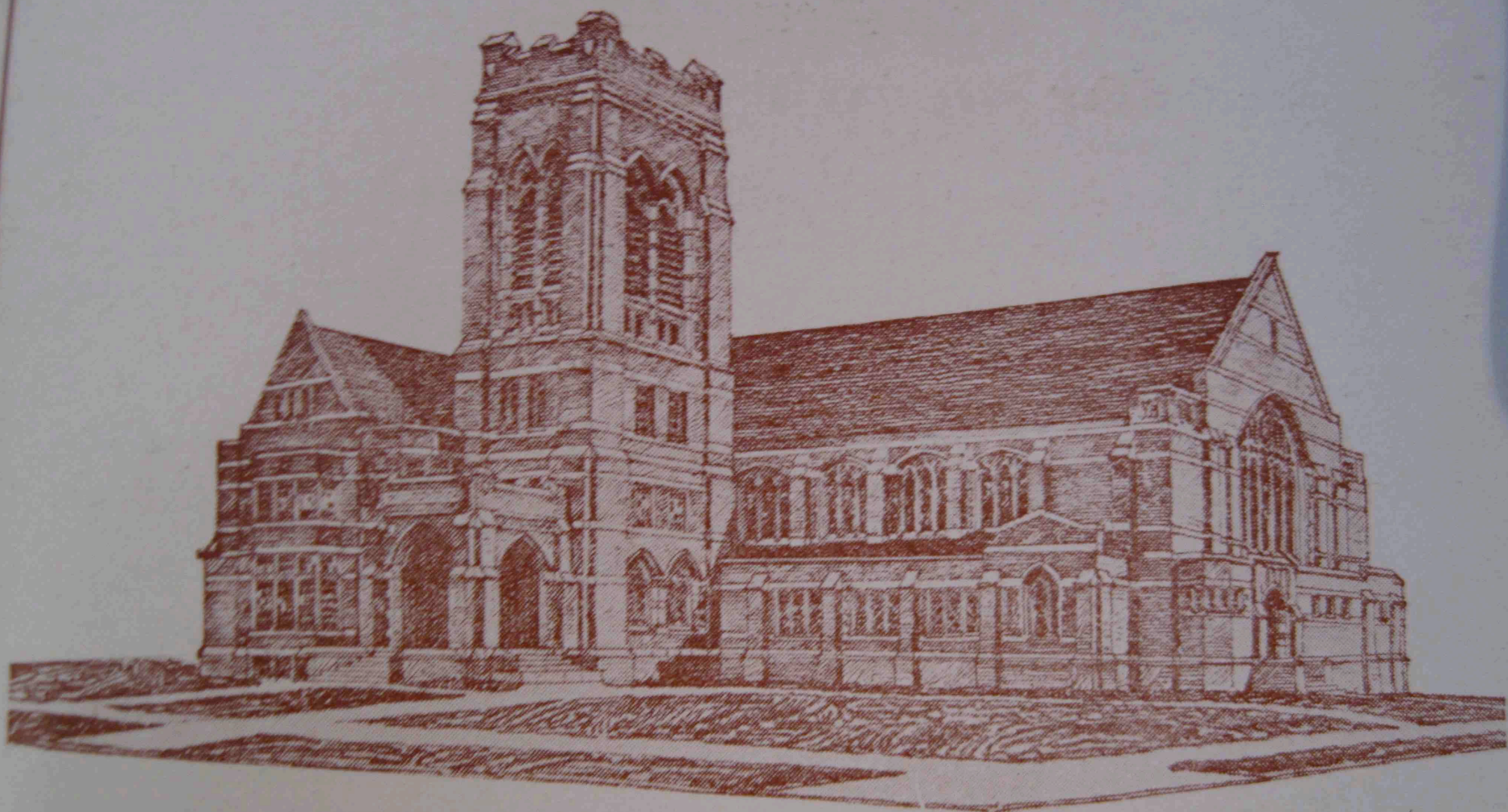

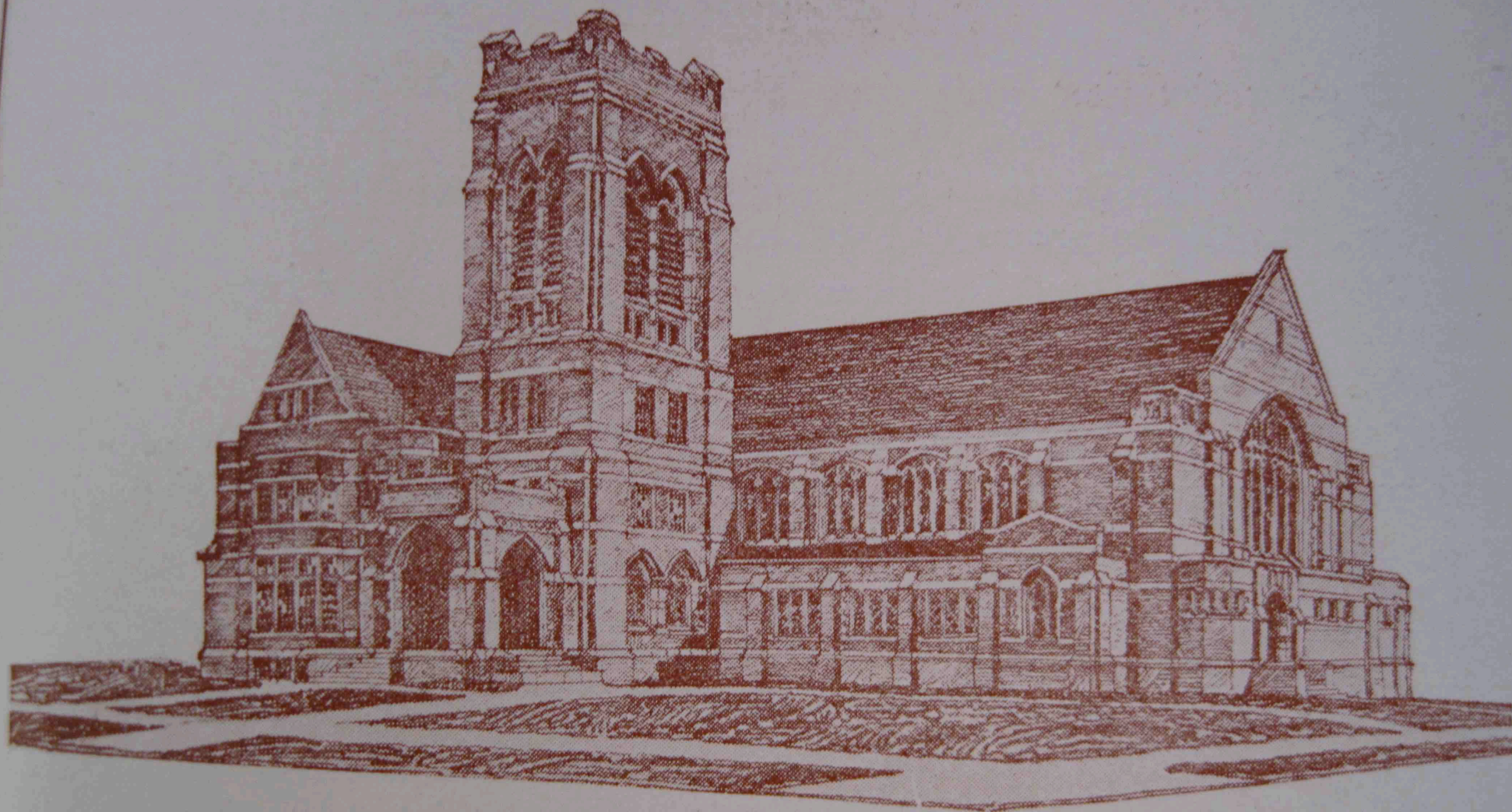


THE NEW CHURCH BUILDING

Laymen's Missionary Conference

(The following resolutions were adopted at the Congregational Laymen's Conference last Friday evening):

The Congregational laymen of Duluth and vicinity, gathered with their pastors at the Convention of the Laymen's Missionary Movement, are profoundly grateful for the atmosphere created by these great gatherings. We pledge ourselves and our churches to renewed activity for larger missionary information, enthusiasm and achievement. We desire to enter heartily into the proposed program of union effort for the conservation of the work of this convention. We purpose to push the every member canvass without delay in all our churches. We shall endeavor to give a larger place to missionary education, in our Church and Sunday School life. We heartily approve of a religious survey in March, 1916. It is our aim that every man in these churches shall enter into his full privilege, giving heartily, systematically, and to the very limit of his means for the extension of christianity throughout the world.

Report of Annual Meeting

The forty-fifth annual meeting of Pilgrim Church was held in the parlors of the First Presbyterian Church last Tuesday evening. There were over two hundred persons present. Supper was served by the ladies of Circle Number Three and was followed by the business session. The Pastor acted as moderator. The minutes of the last annual meeting were read by the clerk, Brewer Mattocks, Jr., and approved. This was followed by reports from the various officers, organizations and committees. All reports showed the past year to have been one of activity and loyalty under difficulties and trying conditions. The report of the clerk showed we have received during the year 27 new members with losses by death and dismissal to other churches 14, a net gain for the year of 13, making the present membership 519.

A summary of the financial reports of the various organizations will be found elsewhere in the Bulletin. The report of the Building Committee, given by Mr. W. N. Hart, was received with great interest. Stereopticon views of the elevation and interior plans of the proposed new building were thrown on a screen and as the congregation viewed for the first time its future church home a burst of applause showed approval and enthusiasm.

The Board of Trustees reported through its chairman, Oscar Mitchell. The report in part was as follows:

"We desire to congratulate the Church upon the splendid showing it is now making under most adverse conditions. It often happens that there is a reserve strength not known to or appreciated by the possessor. We feel that this is true to a large extent of Pilgrim Church. The ability it has shown to maintain its services and keep up the attendance and interest in Church services and in the Sunday School under the adverse conditions existing has revealed a strength that we think many of us did not fully appreciate existed.

"The experience through which the Church is now passing should and, we think, will prove to be a source of strength for the future. The response of the membership of the Church and congregation and co-operation in maintaining the organization and interest in the various activities of the Church is very encouraging.

"The opportunity is rarely given to any organization to do a finer thing than has been done by the Masonic bodies in providing this Church with a meeting place as has been done. We have been furnished something that money could not have bought and it is one of the greatest compliments and one of the finest expressions of confidence and good fellowship that could by any possible way have been extended from one organization to another. They would not have extended these courtesies with the hope or expectation of receiving pay for them but by this act Pilgrim Church is made a debtor to the community and is placed under obligations to show by its services to the community in the future that the confidence of the Masons was deserved and their courtesies appreciated. The whole community is brought closer together and the city is made richer by this act of generous and courteous appreciation on the part of the Masonic bodies."

This sum is raised through the weekly offerings of many subscribers, paid through the duplex envelopes. A few givers prefer to send checks quarterly to the treasurer of the benevolent funds.
