Excerpts from a Personal Letter from Dr. Laird

12 rue Boissy D'Anglas, Paris, France.
December 12, 1917.

"* * * I am working now in three dispensaries and see a good many patients in the course of a week. I am just beginning the work with the soldiers. Up to this time I have been seeing civilians, but this week Friday I am to work with a French doctor examining soldiers who have been invalided on account of tuberculosis. These men are 'reforme' No. 1 and 2, which simply means they have been discharged from the army. From our dispensary they will be sent to various hospitals and sanitariums. I am particularly interested in such work for it is possible if the war continues we shall have to provide for our own soldiers in some similar way at home next year. All here are rejoiced over the capture of Jerusalem. Next Sunday a 'Te Deum' is to be sung in the Cathedral of Notre Dame. I expect to attend the service.

MAJOR LUCIEN J. BARNES
1839—1890.

Lucien J. Barnes was born at Geneseo, N. Y., September 2, 1839. His father, Rev. Henry H. Barnes, a Presbyterian minister, moved to Albion, Mich., in 1845, which remained his home until his death. The son Lucien was educated in the Albion schools and later graduated from the District of Columbia Law School at Washington. When the Civil War broke out he was ordered to St. Louis as a military telegrapher and later became First Lieutenant in a regiment of Missouri Light Artillery. He was on General Lyon's staff when the latter was killed at Wilson's Creek; later he was attached to the staff of General Schofield. After four years service he was discharged from the army with the rank of major. He engaged in business at Little Rock, Arkansas, and later moved to Washington where he was in charge of a division in the treasury department. In 1883, in the hope of improving his health, he removed with his family to Minnesota as special agent of the General Land Office and came to Duluth in the fall of 1885. In March, 1887, he became a member of Pilgrim Church and was superintendent of the Sunday School in the year 1888-9. He died in this city June 18, 1890. He was married June 12, 1862, to Julia M. Hill of Kalamazoo, Mich. Mrs. Barnes, an active member of Pilgrim Church, survives him, with the following sons and daughters: Julius H. Barnes of Duluth, Mrs. Burton L. St. John of Mont Clair, N. J., Arthur P. Barnes and Mrs. Edwin D. Field of Duluth. The window placed in the church in his memory is entitled "Early Morning".

His hope is that he may have a chance of being exchanged. He is helping some in the Girls' College."

The attention of Pilgrim people is invited to the series of Noon Meetings to be held, as in former years, by the First M. E. Church, at the Lyceum theater, every day this week. Dr. Charles N. Pace, pastor, will be the speaker and the topics will deal with Patriotism and Religion. These meetings are an attempt to reach the passing crowd with the gospel message. If you are down town at the noon hour be sure to attend.

The Duluth Committee for Armenian and Syrian Relief has secured Dean J. R. Allen of the engineering department of the University of Minnesota, for an illustrated lecture Tuesday evening at 8:00 o'clock at the First M. E. Church. Dean Allen is a remarkable speaker and has recently returned from Turkey and Asia Minor. The address will bear upon war conditions in that region, and the appalling condition of the Armenians.

Today ushers in Holy Week, on which thousands of christians throughout the world turn their thoughts toward the Saviour, in commemoration of the closing days of his earthly ministry. We shall omit the Wednesday evening meeting, and shall hold the annual Holy Week Communion service in the auditorium Thurs-

LIZZIE PECK MATTER.

Mrs. Matter was born in Michigan City, Ind., Jan. 2, 1861. She came to Duluth with her father's family in 1883 and was a teacher in the High School for a year or more. The first two years of her college course were spent at Olivet College and from there she entered Oberlin, graduating with high scholarship in the class of '82, being elected a member of the Phi Beta Kappa Society.

She was married Nov. 25, 1885, to Elmer Wales Matter, who was also an Oberlin graduate, both Mr. and Mrs. Matter being all their later years closely identified with and devoted to the life and work of Pilgrim church.

Mrs. Matter passed away at the home of her son, Willard, March 14th last at 8 P. M. after a brief illness.

Our friend was making preparations for a journey; she had set her house in order and everything was ready, when she was called to make her journey to the heavenly home on high. Since her great bereavement of three years ago she has been very lonely. We know that she has attained, in God's good providence, her highest hopes and longings; we grieve for ourselves, but we rejoice for her.

Mrs. Matter was a very remarkable person. Some people have unusual ability, but are not willing to serve. Others are willing but lack ability. Mrs. Matter had rare gifts and she loved to use her talents for the benefit of others. In college days at Oberlin she revealed her splendid intellectual power; and when she came to Duluth she soon began to fill a large place in the life of the city. It would be difficult to enumerate the many activities in which she has been engaged—musical, educational, civic and religious. She was eager that the things of the spirit, which meant so much to her, should be cultivated and developed by all about her. To this keen intellect, and warm interest in others, she added great executive ability; no matter how hard the task might be, if it ought to be carried through, she would find a way; her courage and resourcefulness were phenomenal. How many lives she has touched with blessing.

For thirty-three years she was a member of this church. During this period, her deep religious faith made her felt in all the inner life of the church. For years she has been in charge of

the church music. To this important and often thankless task she gave herself with characteristic faithfulness. The fine musical appreciation of the Pilgrim people is due in no slight degree to her influence. When the responsible and fascinating task was hers of selecting the new organ she made a thorough study of the subject, spent anxious days and sleepless nights over the details, and it was her joy to behold the finished work, and to find in the perfection of the instrument her reward.

We may think of her, after a brief rest in the home of many mansions, undertaking some yet more responsible tasks in the complex and joyous life of the unseen world. For such a gifted and devoted life is in the highest sense a victory. We sorrow together today at her departure, but we rejoice that she has dwelt in our midst and that she has entered into her well-earned reward.

"So she passed on, the loving and the loved—
We know not where; we cannot see for tears—
But in some realm, from doubt and fear removed,
She wears the beauty of unfading years.
With us, with them, unseen, yet near at hand,
Not loving less for that sweet heavenly birth,
She has but joined the glad immortal band,
Who do the Master's will in heaven or earth.
Who knows what nobler errands of His grace
In ways untried, her eager hands fulfill?
Or if her feet, with swift, untiring pace

The following excerpts are taken from a very interesting letter recently received from Rev. Ray E. Phillips and family, whose temporary address is Box 428, Durban, Natal, South Africa.

* * * * *

If we could tell you about all the fun we have already had as green new missionaries—the cool, delightful trip on board steamer from New Orleans, the thrill when we first set foot on old Dark Africa with its muddy history of slavery and exploitation by the whites, and the warm welcomes we have had from the missionaries here—we are sure every one of you would want to pack up and come along. We are not so sure that we could make the language study in which we are now engaged sufficiently tempting to cause you to hunger and thirst for some of that, but we are trying to make that interesting to ourselves and hope to be able soon to pass for Zulus on a dark night.

* * * * *

The next time we write we shall have something to say of our experiences with the natives about here. We have only visited a few of them on account of the continuous rains. Yesterday, Sunday, we visited a "kraal" in company with some of the teachers, and held a short religious service. We took our brass band instrument, the saxophone, and led the singing. Inside the small thatched hut it made a considerable din, but the scantily-clad audience were very appreciative and not over critical.

Do not forget that you have an interest in a little family on the other side of the earth which is spending a few months in preparing for work under that statesman missionary, Dr. Bridgman, among that seething mass of young men who are drawn to the gold mines at Johannesburg. THINK of us and PRAY for us.

Come in today and boost the class up to the number required in order that we may not be numbered among the slackers in this movement for building up men's classes in the churches.

The Billy Sunday campaign in Duluth has already begun; thousands of workers are organized on the various committees; a large sum is being raised; the tabernacle is completed and ready for dedication this afternoon; well-attended home prayer meetings are rousing religious earnestness thruout the city. In all these preparations Pilgrim church people are taking their appointed part. It will be announced this morning what services will be maintained in our church on the seven campaign Sundays. Let us plunge into the great religious movement with hearty cooperation, and do all in our power to make the effects of Mr. Sunday's presence in our city as widespread, deep and lasting as possible.

The 1917 drive for the Red Cross was the greatest and most patriotic movement ever staged in this country. In it Duluth had a memorable part. We shall throw ourselves even more heartily into the greater Red Cross drive just opening. Larger giving, more aggressive personal effort are required of us all, if this mighty task for humanity is done and well done. Pilgrim Church men and women will find their places and do their part with enthusiasm and loyalty.

Report of the Annual Conference

To act as a storage battery at a conference is pleasant and profitable for a delegate, but much of the power and inspiration of the occasion is lost in the transmission upon one's return, as nothing thrills like personal contact with the live wires at such places.

The 63rd Annual Conference held at Alexandria, Minn., April 7-10, was probably the most remarkable in the history of Minnesota Congregationalism, for the usual peace problems and issues have been multiplied and magnified by our war conditions.

Mr. Leshner, in his forceful, impressive way, pictured the great need of the world for Christianity and for the church at its best, and his closing words are a challenge to Christians to greater service. "From henceforth religion must toil and struggle and sweat; our God is marching on."

This has been a banner year for Minnesota. Slowly but surely she is becoming inoculated with the leaven of Christianity.

With the rest of the world she is growing the habit of giving, so that in spite of the increasing calls, she came nearer her apportionment than ever before.

Mr. George Merrill asked the pertinent question, Why not "go over the top" in church giving as in Red Cross and Y. M. C. A. campaigns? To be sure—why not?

Rev. W. J. Warren, a rural pastor of experience, says of his people: "The farmers who work with God and are God's husbandmen should feel that they are God's men." The same remedy but a variation in treatment is the solution of their problem, namely the Christian church with a resident pastor as "Absent treatments won't work." Mr. Burch, Sunday School superintendent of Minneapolis, defined an expert as "a man away from home" and the necessary equipment, "Christian science, hypnotism, faith, hope, charity and a lot of other accomplishments." Minnesota must have some experts for advancement was the word, with a gain of 1277 in 1917 and a healthy excess of Sunday School children over church members, 3,000 strong. The Duluth delegation had the pleasure of returning with a banner for our school.

Remedies prescribed for scarcity of young men in the ministry, a charge to parents to stop putting hindrances in the way of their sons becoming ministers, and to Congregational churches to speed up and get abreast of the times in making conditions more favorable for a well earned peace and plenty during years of retirement for the minister and his family. Substantial support of the "Pilgrim Memorial Fund" is the response to the charge they most heartily urge a fitting monument to Pilgrim ideals and John Robinson, their embodiment.

Would you think of turning to the Orient to find the great center of the democratic spirit? And yet Dr. Strong says there is where we shall find it, for the Chinese are fundamentally the most democratic people in the world. While Japan is "seething" with the impulse of democracy and India is a close third. Dr. Strong fears they may acquire democracy before they have learned that service and sacrifice are the prices of the liberties they seek. Lessons established democracies have not yet absorbed.

Of course we could not get thru a conference without much about the issue uppermost in all minds, the world war, the present world problems, with greater ones looming in the future to which we as churches and Christian people must measure up. Splendid things were said about our soldiers at home and abroad by those who had authority to speak, of which we were proud. But if we would continue to rejoice in this splendid record we must liberally support the agencies that establish the "power houses," the prayer tents, so called by the officer ambitious for every member of his regiment a Christian. The impossibilities of the delegate loom large for material and space are so out of proportion. In closing I will add some of the most forceful gleanings from the Conference. C. C. Decker, our moderator, said, "Salvation is the biggest word in the English language. Intelligent preparation for Christian service, a skillful working with God in saving souls, and a practical every day possession of God power is what we need." Cannot you see and hear Mr. Leshner's earnestness in the following words: "Considering the awful price we are paying, to what sublime destiny are we moving?" "The democratizing, fraternizing Christianity is our only hope of making a permanent country and a new, lasting race."

Fanny Jane Mars. 1838-1918

Death came to Mrs. Fanny B. Mars on Friday, July 19, as the quiet close to a long and useful life. Always an earnest and sincere Christian, Mrs. Mars, in the active years of her life, was energetic in church and relief work. When frail health limited her activities her home became the center of her influence. To strangers and outsiders, perhaps, she had a certain, though gentle, reserve. To the circle of her intimate friends, her children and grandchildren, she showed unfailing warmth and loyalty. Her uncompromising standards became their ideals of life and the warmth of the love she gave them meant a broader, clearer vision for their eyes. It is those qualities which abide and remain, a benign and constant influence in the lives of all who knew her well.

Fannie Jane Mars was the second daughter of Thomas Blenkinsop and Nancy Sudren, born at Lancashire, England, August 11, 1838. She came to Cambridge, Mass., with her parents at the age of eight years. Her girlhood was passed at Manchester, N. H. At the beginning of the Civil War her family moved to Boston, where she was married to Robert W. Mars, December 12, 1865. Shortly after their marriage, Mr. and Mrs. Mars moved to Chicago where they built their first home, and where in 1870 they became members of the First Congregational church and were earnest and consistent workers in that denomination to the close of their lives. Business necessitated their moving to Marinette, Wis., in 1885, and to Duluth in 1891. It was during these years that Mrs. Mars was keenly interested in the religious, social and relief work of her church and city.

The old hymn, one of her favorites, "We shall sleep, but not forever," sung at the service of her burial, tells as well as anything could what her faith meant to her; and when death came it left with her loved ones the memory of a life of loving-kindness and serene belief and the conviction that to her death was, in all truth, only "a little folding of the hands to sleep."

A recent ruling by the Judge Advocate of the War Department concerns the use of the Service Flag. The service flag while only semi-official is recognized and encouraged by the government. A blue star shall represent those in the military or naval service of the United States, a silver star those wounded or invalidated home from overseas, with a gold star superimposed for those who die as the result of such wounds or disease, and a gold star alone for those killed in action. The service flag should not include members of the various war boards and others in civilian patriotic service. "The essence of military service is that persons who wear the uniform subject themselves to be ordered anywhere without the right to refuse to go."

 1864-1918.

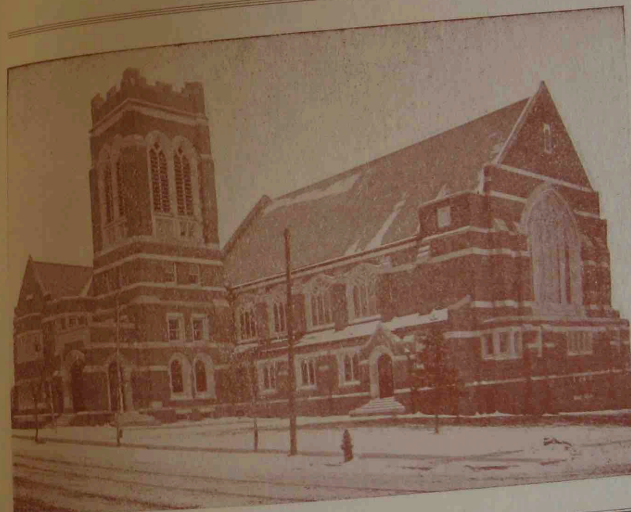
After a lingering illness of several months, Mrs. Ella Staughton Wade passed to the heavenly home on Wednesday morning, August 28. She was born in Milwaukee, May 3, 1864, of a line notable in religious, educational and artistic activities. Her grandfather, Rev. William Staughton, one of the most famous pioneer Baptist ministers in this country, was first president of George Washington University. Another early relative was the artist, Rembrandt Peale, who painted the finest likeness of Washington. Her father, Neville Staughton, was an energetic railway contractor, who built the first road through Ashland, and other roads in southern Minnesota. The family removed to Winona where she was six years old, and her youth was spent in that city. She was a leader in church work at Winona, pianist and teacher in the Sunday School, and county secretary of the Y. P. S. C. E. In 1890 she was married to B. C. Wade, and has since shared most helpfully his problems and successes in the leadership of Young Men's Christian Association work in Port Huron, Mich., in the summer of 1912 and, with their family, have been actively associated with the life and work of Pilgrim Church. Mrs. Wade was a quiet, unassuming personality, devoted to her home, meeting the cares of her large household with unfailing cheerfulness and self-forgetfulness. She was a remarkable mother, and has left the fine impress of her christian character upon her children. Always faithful in her church-life, her unswerving trust in her Saviour was never more manifest than in her quiet courage and good cheer during her illness. The sunny influence of her life abides with us all, as a treasure that cannot be taken away. Our sympathy goes out to her family who are meeting this great trial with a christian heroism, worthy of her strong, beautiful christian life, now transferred to the high privileges and joys of the heavenly home.

The Jubilee Fund

Of the \$250,000 which the Woman's Board of Missions of the Interior has been creating for the purpose of erecting new buildings, \$133,000 has been given and work has already begun on seventeen of the buildings. Minnesota's share of this is \$15,000 and \$12,800 has been secured. Duluth has not given her just apportionment. Instead of the \$600 which the state chairman has asked of us our committee has now on hand and in pledges \$125.72. The Jubilee barrels may supply another \$100. The rest must come in the form of individual gifts.

The War and Missions

A recent editorial in the London Times reads as follows:

"Why should the war delay our mission work? There is a sense of humiliation, it is true, in the Church; there is a subdued tone in its voice, but there is no shame in the thought of the faith itself. The war is not the breakdown of Christianity. Though the thought of it must awake penitence in all the churches throughout Europe, the war can never be laid to the charge of the faith. Christianity has not been tried and found wanting; it has been found difficult, and not tried."

"The Church, believing as it must do that in its gospel there is a sure spiritual foundation for mankind, cannot limit its vision or its service. Nor can it do its work piecemeal; it cannot finish its task in Europe and afterwards begin in Asia. Throughout Asia there is in process a complete transformation of social institutions, habits, standards, and beliefs. The movement is unceasing; it will as little wait on our convenience as the tides of the sea. The Church, indeed, so far from thinking that the missionary enterprise can be delayed, is stricken by remorse to know that it is so late with the offer of a faith to which all the spiritual strivings of the East have moved."

The Committee of Reference and Counsel, in a message to the churches, gives two reasons for increased giving to foreign mission work:

"1. The work of more than 2,000 Teuton missionaries has become disrupted and is in danger of dissolution. This throws an immediate and enormous responsibility upon the Christians of England and North America. England is heroically assuming a large share of the burden; we of America must not hold back.

"2. The Asiatic and African races are undergoing sweeping transformations in their thinking, their relations to the nations of the West, and in their religious conceptions. They have been fighting the white man's war shoulder to shoulder with Europeans, and upon a plane of equality. Dependent peoples who are now sharing in the conflict cannot return to former positions of contented subjection.

"It is clear that foreign missionaries are true soldiers of the better order which is to bind the world together after the war. They are quite as important to America as her army or her navy."

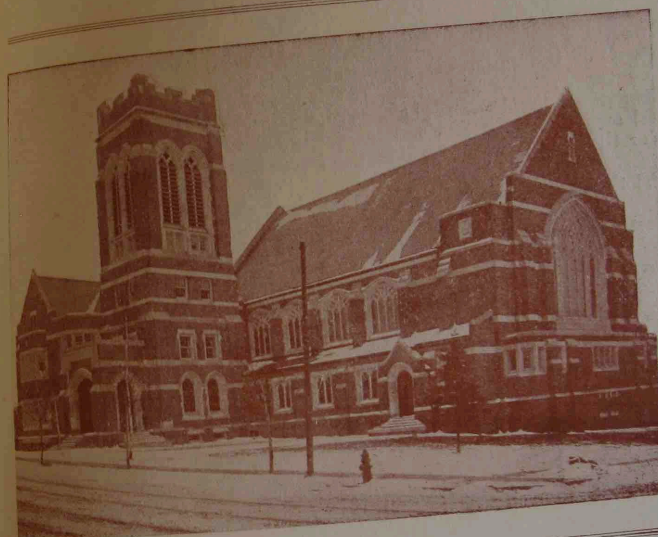

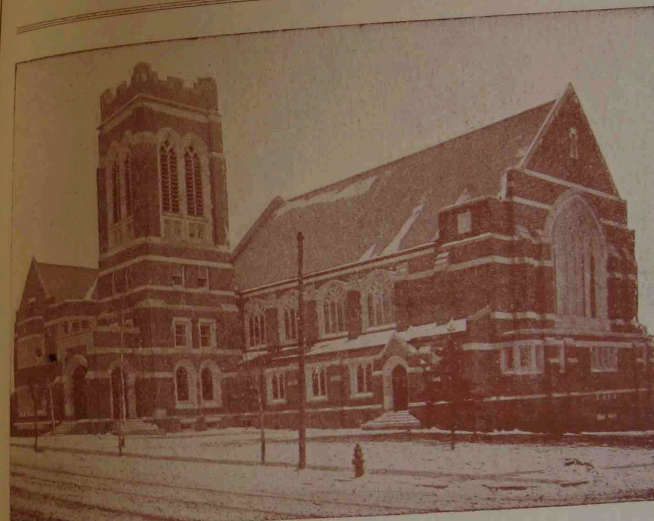

Extracts from a Recent Letter from Rev. Ray Phillips

Dear Friends: * * *

We were met at the depot in Johannesburg by Dr. Bridgman. He had us on the front porch of his home introducing us to Mrs. Bridgman and son Brainerd before we could breathe more than a few deep breaths of the bracing Johannesburg air. There was no doubt in our minds after meeting them that these were the folks about whom we had heard so many fine things. We were made perfectly at home.

Dr. Bridgman took us out for a bird's-eye view of the city. We sped along the road on his Indian motorcycle, my wife in the side-car and I on the pillion behind Dr. Bridgman. We went to the top of two hills from which were pointed out the residential suburbs which have grown up in the last few years, and which are still growing at a tremendous rate. From these high points could be seen also the mountains of tailings, or waste rock, which mark the locations of the mines. Looking either east or west, as far as we could see, there were smoke-stacks belching smoke. We had already become a little accustomed to the roar like the sound of distant thunder which is heard everywhere and never stops: the sound of the stamp-mills crushing the rock at the mines. We had our eyes opened to the fact that we are to live in a city as modern and bustling as Minneapolis or Chicago, and which is growing far more rapidly than either of these. Sporting events evidently and also in a variety of other things. Johannesburg is great in size and occupies first place. Theater ads take as much space in the daily papers as in New York city; racing and betting, even in these war times, run full blast—on one day's horse-racing last week over \$375,000 changed owners. And the city is decidedly not

dry, and we are not aware that it will soon be so in the future.
 * * * The Devil must be rushed to death at Johannesburg finding something for these young men to do in their leisure time.
 * * * Occasionally they have a big dance when beer and meat and furnished by the mine authorities. But gambling, beer-drinking and worse, are their main recreations.

On the next Sunday my wife and I went with Dr. Bridgman to a group of mines in which he has a fine work. He has the sympathy of the mine authorities to such an extent that they have furnished a place for use as a church. Here we were held spell-bound by the singing of the men. The room was packed to the doors with husky young fellows, and when they rose to sing it made the little and big thrills go hustling up and down your back.

Since returning from Johannesburg we have dug into the Zulu language with renewed energy, for we know now what sort of a proposition Dr. Bridgman has for us. We have been sent here, you understand, in response to a call from Dr. Bridgman for someone to start social work among these thousands. Christ said that He came to "give life and give it abundantly." Dr. Cabot of Boston believes that this "abundant life" is four-fold, and includes Work, Play, Love and Worship. He believes that Christianity should give a rounded experience of all these four essentials. Here in Johannesburg are gathered men representing native tribes over the whole of South Africa.

Of one thing we are certain; that soon after we arrive at Johannesburg we shall need some means of covering ground quickly. The Reef is sixty miles long and is served by slow tram cars and trains, but if a person doesn't wish to spend half of his life inside a tram or train the only alternative is some sort of motor vehicle. And there is where the difficulty comes. Ford automobiles here are palace cars, for they cost \$1,000. Motorcycles with side cars are correspondingly high, costing about \$725. Gasoline is \$1 per gallon. Our missionary salary will be dealt a blow from which recovery will be slow and painful if we negotiate the purchase of either motorcycle or automobile soon after we arrive. We shall probably do as other missionaries here have done—walk until we drop, then buy a bicycle and run that until our legs give out, then send an appeal in desperation to America which shall start Dr. Patton or Dr. Barton out in search of someone who will be kind to a wind-broken missionary.

Our family is well and happy here at Inanda. We get sufficient relaxation from study in the tennis court. Little John is a general favorite here among students and teachers alike. He has already been given a Zulu name by the people. It is "Tanda-bantu" and means "Lover of the People." He smiles at them all, no matter how loudly they talk, or how wrinkled and ugly are their faces. He walks now and is beginning to say a few words.

Our best wishes and greetings go out to you, our home friends.

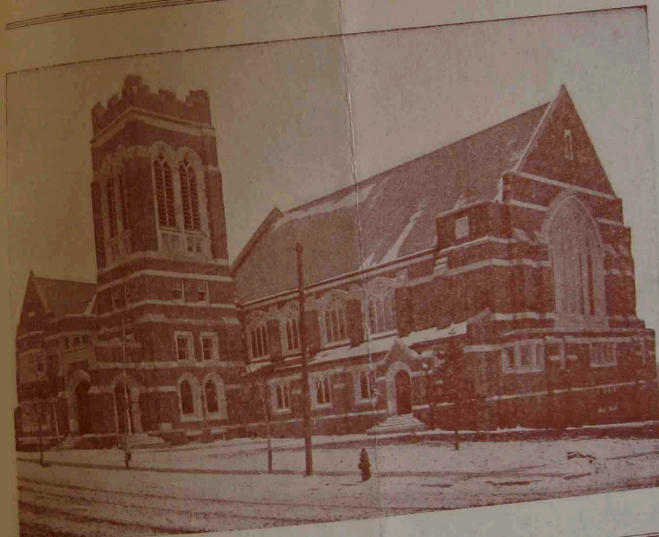

Faith Helen Rogers

Early in November, with high hopes of rendering a beautiful service to our men in France, Miss Rogers sailed from New York commissioned for recreational Y. M. C. A. work. She was taken ill on board ship and passed away, the burial being at Bordeaux. She was one greatly gifted and greatly beloved. Her years of brilliant and enthusiastic service at Pilgrim organ have endeared her to us all. Later we shall issue a more adequate appreciation of her character, and devote a Vesper Service to a fitting Memorial of her life.

Church Notes

We welcome today at our service our friends of the First Baptist Church, whose edifice was generously devoted to the city as an emergency hospital.

Miss Myra Germond is taking the place as secretary of the Church School made vacant by the resignation of Miss Bessie C. Mars, who will be away most of the winter. Miss Mars has for several years filled this important position with faithfulness and efficiency.

Rev. O. G. Mason, for eight years pastor of the Congregational church at Remer, died at Walker Sept. 21, at the age of 52. Mr. Mason was one of the most prominent and useful citizens in Cass county, holding the office of County Commissioner, chairman of the Remer School Board and other offices. He was the county leader in war activities and his overwork in the recent drives hastened his death. He was a great power in all the higher life of that section and had recently accepted in addition to his other tasks, the Congregational pastorate at Walker.

Mrs. Idobel L. Thoires, after a lingering illness, passed to her reward Nov. 16. She was a christian of rare simplicity and beauty of character. Much of her life was spent at Wabasha. The Pastor conducted the service in her memory on the evening of Nov. 18, and the burial was at Wabasha. Her daughters have the deep sympathy of the Pilgrim people.

On Friday, October 11, the City Commissioners issued an order forbidding all public gatherings, on account of the severe epidemic of influenza. The order included churches and schools. On the following night occurred the disastrous fire with its awful destruction of lives and property. For seven Sundays all church services in the city have been suspended, many of these Sundays having been devoted to relief work.

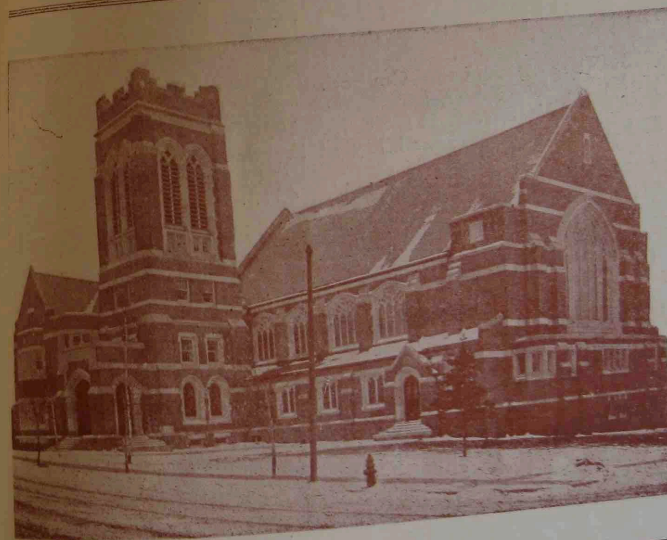
After the disastrous fire of Oct. 12, sewing for fire relief was done at our church for twenty-one days and 1,141 new garments were made. The workers used 26 bolts of outing and Scotch flannel and 60 yards of gingham and dress goods. Eighteen bolts were given by individuals, two were furnished by the Ladies' Union and the rest came from the work-room at the armory. Funds received for the daily luncheons, \$62.00, were spent for buttons, thread, tape and other sewing materials. Mrs. Thorp and Miss Marie Hegardt alternated in charge of the work-room. Mrs. L. E. Paddack supervised the sewing-machine department. Mrs. Collins, Mrs. W. G. Hegardt and Mrs. L. E. Paddack were the relief committee for investigation and distribution of the clothing. Four hundred and sixty-one garments were sent to the armory including 76 night-gowns, 125 petticoats, 42 bloomers, 7 dresses, and 60 baby slips. Mrs. Collins and her committee gave out personally 5 house dresses, 40 girls' dresses, 13 dressing sacques, 11 aprons, 154 night clothes, 19 boys' blouses, 2 shirtwaists, 1 wrapper, 68 underwaists, 14 kimono's, 28 pairs bootees, 2 layettes, 4 jumpers, 28 bloomers, 28 petticoats, 4 baby slips, 6 boys' dutch suits, 19 rompers, 17 baby bonnets, 6 quilts. In addition Mrs. Collins has distributed some fine boxes from out-of-town friends, also used clothing, cribs, bedding, baby-carriages, sewing-machines and other furniture. The committee plans to keep in touch with these families, assisting them further if necessary. It would be impossible to list the men and women of the church who rendered valuable assistance to the refugees at the armory and elsewhere.

The Pilgrim Messenger, printed by the church, bearing Christmas greetings to our men in the service, was mailed yesterday to the 59 men on our honor roll. It contains items of interest regarding each man, extracts from some of their letters and a message from the pastor. Copies can be had in the foyer after service today.

Extracts from Mr. Irwin's Letter

Following are a few excerpts from a very guarded letter written by Rev. H. M. Irwin, dated Constantinople Aug. 9, 1918, and forwarded by way of Switzerland to the American Board at Boston:

"I hear regularly from Callipoli and others at our old homes. They report everything in much the same condition as when we left. There was some talk of removing the hospitals but this idea seems to be dropped and the head physician who had been removed, was recalled."

"I had hoped to have seen you before this but my application stuck at the top. However, there is every likelihood of getting away on the exchange. A recent letter from John Macfarlane states that he is awaiting orders to go. He had small pox in the winter."

"Last winter we had quite a siege of sickness. The baby was laid up with diphtheria and in March I was taken down with pleuro-pneumonia. We are all well now, although I am still troubled with adhesions in my left lung."

"I have been helping Luther for some time now. Last winter I taught at Arnaet Keoy. This year I expect to put in three days a week at Robert College and three days with Luther. Since spring we have been living in Scipio's house and have been more comfortable and in better health."

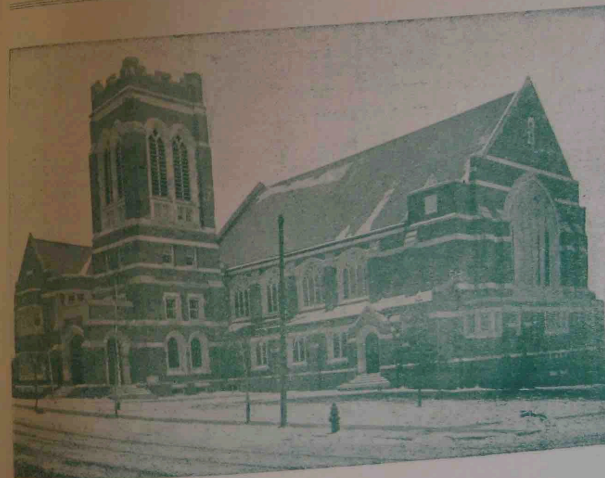

Pilgrim Memorial Fund

A feature of the celebration of the 300th anniversary of the landing of the Pilgrims in 1920 will be the completion of the Pilgrim Memorial Fund of Five Million Dollars, to be raised by the Congregationalists of this country. This will be a pension fund for retired or disabled ministers. The plan contemplates the setting aside annually by each pastor of a small per cent of his salary, the local church to do the same. These sums, drawing interest and augmented by an appropriation from the national fund will give the pastor a substantial income after his retirement. Minnesota has already pledged about \$100,000 of her quota of \$175,000, several gifts of \$25,000 and \$10,000 having been given in Minneapolis and other places. Pledges are generally made payable in five annual installments. Albert Baldwin, C. A. Duncan and the pastor are on the state commission for raising the fund. Dr. Francis L. Hayes of Chicago, the western representative of the campaign, will be here over next Sunday, occupying the pulpit and addressing the Brotherhood on Friday evening at the get-together supper.

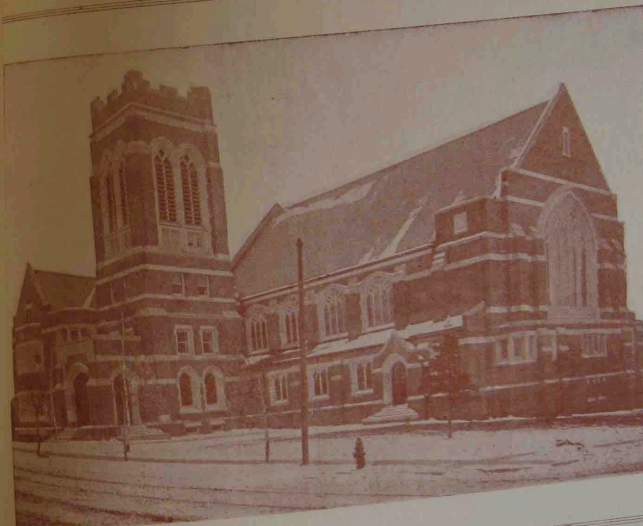

D., of Chicago, western secretary of the Fund, is with us today, opening the Duluth campaign for our share of this great Congregational movement. Congregationalists throughout the land are raising Five Million Dollars, to be used, in addition to an annual percentage of each minister's salary, to be furnished jointly by the church and the minister, for a pension for Congregational ministers after they have reached retiring age. Our state is raising \$175,000 for this fund, of which the Twin Cities have already given about \$100,000. Plymouth Church, Minneapolis, alone giving \$25,000. Gifts are payable in five annual installments. It is believed that the Pilgrim Church people will respond generously to this great need, which other great denominations have already recognized by raising similar funds. Large gifts and small, according to the ability of the giver, are gladly received.

A Proclamation by the President

For more than three years American philanthropy has been a large factor in keeping alive Armenian, Syrian, Greek and other exiles and refugees of Western Asia.

On two former occasions I have appealed to the American people in behalf of these homeless sufferers, whom the vicissitudes of war and massacre had brought to the extremest need.

The response has been most generous, but now the period of rehabilitation is at hand. Vastly larger sums will be required to restore these once prosperous, but now impoverished, refugees to their former homes than were required merely to sustain life in their desert exile.

It is estimated that about 4,000,000 Armenian, Syrian, Greek and other war sufferers in the Near East will require outside help to sustain them through the winter. Many of them are now hundreds of miles from their home land. The vast majority of them are helpless women and children, including 400,000 orphans.

The American Committee for Relief in the Near East is appealing for a minimum of \$30,000,000 to be subscribed January 12, 1919, with which to meet the most urgent needs of these people.

I, therefore, again call upon the people of the United States to make even more generous contributions than they have made heretofore to sustain through the winter months those, who, through no fault of their own, have been left in a starving, shelterless condition, and to help re-establish these ancient and sorely oppressed people in their former homes on a self-supporting basis.

Annual Meeting

Two hundred and sixty sat down to enjoy the chicken pie dinner served by the Ladies' Union of the Church Tuesday evening. Boy and Girl Scouts assisted in serving and hostesses presided at each table. Music was furnished by the Church School Orchestra, directed by Mrs. O. J. Larson.

After dinner the 48th annual meeting of the church was held in the chapel, Rev. C. N. Thorp, the pastor, presiding.

After singing "Faith of Our Fathers" and a prayer by the pastor the church clerk, Brewer Mattocks, Jr., read the minutes of the previous annual meeting. The report of the superintendent of the Church School, C. G. Scott, was read by B. C. Wade. There is a total enrollment of 269 and there is a determination on the part of both teachers and officers that better work shall be done this year and the attendance largely increased.

Beatrice Webster reported a year of activity for the Philathea Class, which was in the lead among 52 city Philathea Classes in Red Cross work.

The Y. P. S. C. E. had a slight falling off in membership owing to the absence of those engaged in war service. A membership campaign is now being carried on. Bruce Scott, the president, made this report.

Mrs. S. E. Matter, vice president of the Woman's Missionary Society, reported a year of interesting study of missionary work at home and abroad. "As the civilized nations face the tremendous problems of the immediate future none will work more faithfully and more effectually than our missionaries." A larger attendance upon the monthly meetings was earnestly asked for.

The Friends in Council, with a membership of 15, have been proved loyal and generous. Miss Effie M. White, the president, stated that the amount given for benevolences was increased from \$115 to \$150 during the past year.

W. W. McMillan, chairman of the Missionary Fund, reported pledges all paid and obligations fully met. The treasurer of this fund, W. S. Horr, gave the total disbursements as \$2,286.20.

The past year has been one of unusual interest and great activity for the members of the Ladies' Union, according to Mrs. L. E. Paddock, its president. Red Cross and fire relief work, with a total of 7,715 articles manufactured, constituted a part of the year's work in addition to the general work carried on in circles. "The ladies have been splendidly loyal and have found great joy in rendering much needed service." Three French orphans were adopted by the Ladies' Union and the total disbursements for the year were \$2,815.94.

H. W. Nichols, church treasurer, reported total disbursements of \$10,662.12, and a balance on hand of \$151.56.

"The church owns free of encumbrance its church property and parsonage and comes to the annual meeting with all bills paid." So stated Oscar Mitchell, chairman of the Board of Trus-

tees, in his annual report. R. A. Webster spoke briefly for the Building and Grounds Committee.

Brewer Mattocks, Jr., the clerk, gave an interesting and encouraging report. He gave the present membership as 515, 4 having been lost by death and 4 by dismissal. The total number of members received during the calendar year including those received at the first communion in the new church a year ago was 77. This is the largest number ever taken into our church in a single year.

The pastor, Rev. C. N. Thorp, gave a comprehensive review of the year's work, which has been broken into to such an extent that the church has been necessarily closed for one-fourth of the Sundays of the year so far as regular services are concerned. Billy Sunday meetings, influenza, and the great forest fire being contributing causes of the suspension of services.

"Yet never in its history has Pilgrim Church done so much for others as in the year now closing."

"Four of our members have passed to their reward—all were women, two aged and two in the full tide of christian activity."

Regular giving to the Missionary Fund was urged so that we may forward our dues quarterly and not fall behind the amount pledged.

Of the \$20,000 asked for, \$18,984.50 has already been pledged for the Pilgrim Memorial Fund. "There have been 63 pledges thus far and this subscription is one of the biggest things this church has ever done in a financial way for the strengthening of the christian forces."

It is hoped that a new Church Directory will be printed and ready for distribution by the middle of February.

Thursday evening meetings have been neglected and Mr. Thorp expressed the belief that "at least every other Thursday every Pilgrim who is not literally tied at home should come no matter at what personal inconvenience, to the place of prayer and fellowship. It will strengthen you in your own faith, it will strengthen this church and it will deepen your own spiritual life."

"May the Spirit of the Living Christ empower us all for larger service and guide us forth into the uncharted paths of the new year."

All of the reports were accepted, to be made a part of the church records.

It was voted to hold morning service after February 1st at 10:30 and Church School at 12:00 noon.

The clerk read the names of nominees for various offices and committees proposed by the nominating committee, which were upon motion balloted for. C. E. Wallace, Dr. D. T. Pennie and J. S. Prisk were named as tellers to count same and render a report as to the result.

After singing of a verse of "Blest Be the Tie That Binds" meeting upon motion adjourned.
