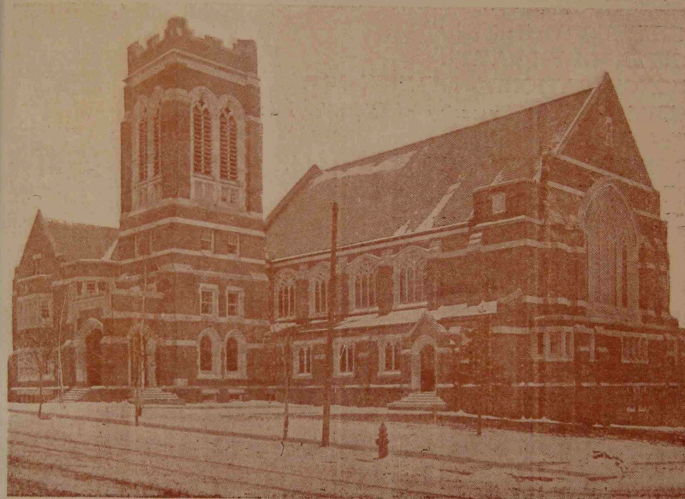

The following is a letter from Cornelius H. Patton, addressed to churches interested in work in Turkey:

Dear Friends:

Already you have received a copy of the News Bulletin reporting the plans of the Relief Expedition to Turkey. Since the Bulletin was printed, however, many things have happened which we want to report to our churches especially interested in Turkey.

Letters have come from Dr. Barton reporting his trip as far as Rome. He and the other members of the Commission spent some time in Paris in important conferences and then proceeded to Constantinople. A cable from Dr. Barton received through the State Department, has reported his safe arrival at Constantinople about February 12th. The members of the Commission had already made a beginning of their important tasks. Dr. Washburn was to start for Beirut overland on February 18th, to investigate conditions and interview Col. Finley, commander of the Red Cross Relief workers in Palestine. President Main of Grinnell College was planning an expedition into the Caucasus, taking large supplies of flour and clothing to relieve the desperate need there. President Moore of the Board, accompanied by Rev. Harry Riggs of Harpoot and Rev. Herbert Irwin, was to lead an expedition into Central Anatolia, to establish hospital and relief centers in Konia, Cesarea and Harpoot. Dr. Barton himself was to make an extensive investigating tour across the entire country and down into Syria.

In the meantime, on February 16th, the Leviathan sailed from New York with the main body of 250 relief workers. A cable has reported their safe arrival at Brest on February 23d, where a special Army Hospital train was provided for their transportation across France to Marseilles. By the time this message reaches you these workers will doubtless be in Turkey ready for their tasks.

It is hard for us to realize the significance of their entrance into Turkey. Some idea of what they expect to do is indicated by the supplies which they have taken. The list is interesting reading: Eight thousand tons of flour, 100 motor trucks, 36 automobiles, 20 motor cycles, 4,500,000 yards of cloth, 100,000 blankets, 50,000 pairs of shoes, 10,000 cans of condensed milk, 16 ambulances, 8 plowing tractors, 1,000 cases of clothing, bed-ditions in Turkey call for all these supplies—and more—is indicated by one sentence in Dr. Barton's cable to the Relief Committee in New York. He says: "One million dollars needed immediately to purchase seed for spring sowing to prevent famine next year as seed grain has been eaten."

The work of the American Board has never been more closely identified with great world problems than it is today in Turkey. And never was there a time so favorable for the stirring attitudiness the compelling call of the world field to the end that we as Congregationalists may adequately carry our share of the enterprise abroad.

Two years ago the Methodists were unable to find a Finnish worker to continue their work in their mission building. We had a worker, Miss Toivonen, but were borrowing the Y. W. C. A. in which to hold services. The two groups wisely decided to combine forces and the Union Finnish Mission was the result. Rev. William Hokkanen, a Congregationalist, was later secured and a splendid work has been done. Mr. and Mrs. Hokkanen were specially helpful at the time of the fire and have greatly endeared themselves to their people. Mr. Hokkanen left March 21, to reenter school at Chicago and perfect his English. A competent Methodist worker succeeds him and the mission is now under Methodist control as the work no longer requires the attention of two denominations. 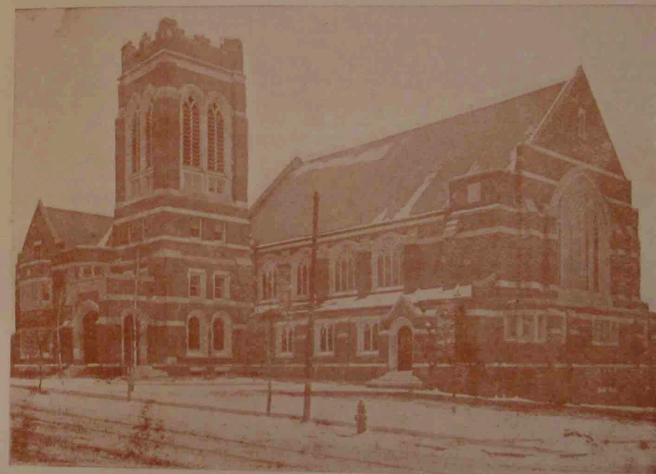

**"The strength of the hills is His also"**

The memorial window, placed in the church during the past week was designed and executed by the Tiffany Studios of New York under the personal supervision of Louis C. Tiffany. It is given in memory of Mr. and Mrs. Cornelius A. Field and Elizabeth Field by surviving members of the family.

The window represents a landscape of sloping hills intermingled with a rich tone of coloring, above which the summer sky is flooded with the golden light of the setting sun. From the hills a brook flows gently into the foreground amidst a mass of bronzed-brown crags and from these stately pines arise to complete the landscape. Greens, browns and blues predominate in the color scheme, and the whole window is illuminated by the after glow of the sun which has just sunk behind the hills. The text chosen for this window is from the fourth verse, ninety-fifth Psalm, "The Strength of the Hills Is His Also."

Cornelius A. Field (February 4, 1825—May 21, 1907) and Maria Dewey Field (March 12, 1828—June 5, 1903) were born in Berlin, Vermont, and both traced their ancestry to the early Pilgrim settlers. They were married January 20, 1853, at Montpelier, Vermont, where they spent the early years of their married life, and were active in church work. Mr. Field was one of the promoters and the first President of a local organization known as the Montpelier Young Men's Christian Association established in 1859. The Fields removed to Hanover, N. H., in 1865, where Mr. Field was postmaster for over 20 years. They came to Duluth in the fall of 1886 and Mr. Field entered the real estate and insurance business with his son, E. D. Field. They brought letters from the Congregational Church at Hanover and were both devoted members of Pilgrim Church. Mr. Field served as Deacon in the church from 1890 to 1897, and Mrs. Field's long life of unselfish Christian service endeared her to all who knew her. Both were buried at Hanover.

Elizabeth Field (July 8, 1866—October 31, 1916) was born in Hanover, N. H., and came to Duluth with her parents in 1886, joining Pilgrim Church two years later. She became a successful teacher, a large part of her service being in the Endion School of this city. Entering into the lives and winning the hearts of those under and about her, the influence of her Christian life and character was far reaching. Her body was interred in the family lot in the Hanover, N. H., cemetery.

**News from the Irwins**

The following is a letter from the Irwins recently received by Mrs. Hegardt:

Robert College, Hassar, Feb. 9, 1919.

This week permission has been given for out going post, and so I am making the most of my opportunity. To say that we have often thought of you all in Pilgrim Church, but feebly expresses it. Letters that I wrote to you a couple of years ago were returned, so I don't know when you heard from or of us last. About a year or so ago a note came from Mr. Wingate, saying that he had been in Duluth, so he will have told you of our leaving Cesarea. Mr. Irwin and Mr. Wingate had hoped to remain, but they were practically prisoners, and able to do nothing, so they felt it best to leave, which certainly was better for now Mr. Wingate will be able to return after a good change. On account of our British nationality, of course we were kept here, but in many ways I can not regret it. We have seen things through the very worst I hope, for ever and ever, and have also been able to witness the wonderful change. The day the fleet came in was the most wonderful event I ever witnessed. It was not only the fine sight, seeing those great battleships, but it was what it stood for. Several of us felt almost hysterical, the reaction after the long nervous strain. All of the missionaries here met at Gedik Pasha School and watched the great event. Those great ships coming in in such fine order. Our American and British flags, which had been hidden away for some time, were displayed to full advantage and we waved and cheered and twice sang "Praise God from Whom All Blessings Flow". For the first time in several years we felt that we were safe, and I don't think that any one who hasn't lived in the interior of Turkey for a time, during those years, can really appreciate what that word means. From that day on we have gradually been breathing more freely and it is good.

In many ways I think we have been able to do more here than had we remained in Cesarea, for we have been able to keep in touch with them there and Mr. Irwin has been able to help here in teaching in Robert College and has also been able to help a great deal in the Bible House. He would have returned to Cesarea after the armistice was signed, however, had he been physically equal to it, but after coming here last year he had pleuro pneumonia and later Spanish fever, so it seemed unwise for him to go to the interior in mid winter. He is most anxious

to return there now, to look things over, and prepare a place for the missionary relief party, which is soon to arrive. Since the government stopped using our compound for sick soldiers, they have had it filled with orphans, who, owing to filth, disease and lack of proper care, died off at an alarming rate. I think they will now be quite willing to turn over what is left to us. We know they have opened a good many sealed places and taken a good deal, but just what is left we do not know.

We have had a rather unfortunate time in the way of losing our belongings. This year we have had two robberies. The first time all of the week's washing was taken, and the second time several rugs and many nicknacks and Hugh's clothes which they took from his bedroom, through which they entered. The robberies through the city and the whole country have been simply fearful. When one knows the condition of poverty, and the awful price of food it is not to be wondered at. As one sheet would sell for ten to twelve pounds, you can't wonder that laundry was especially in demand. As it was impossible to replace these things this year, we have simply managed the best we could, and will get what we need again when we go home to America. It has been a great experience in economizing these years. I thought I knew something of it before, but feel myself quite an adept now. It has kept me busy this year trying to have sufficiently nourishing food at the lowest prices, and as for clothes! Well I hope I can get a new suit before seeing any of my friends! However as I have said so many times, "If only our lives are spared after these awful years, we shouldn't complain about losses of material things or if my suit is the same one I came to Turkey in seven years ago. I may be thankful that the material was so good that it has worn so well all this time." . . . If our plans carry we expect to leave here the early part of April, but will write more definitely later. Mr. Irwin joins me in most cordial greetings to all our Pilgrim friends.

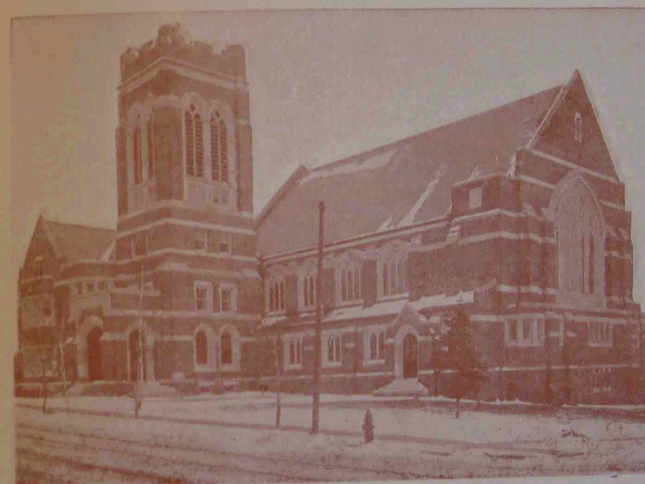

**A Letter from Ray Phillips**

45 Crown St., Jeppes, Johannesburg, So. Africa,  
February 17th, 1919.

Dear Friends:

We're here at last in Johannesburg, in our own home with address as above and have been here three months. We have just harvested the fine large peaches and grapes from our miniature orchard and more miniature vineyard in the backyard.

It seemed best to begin our work slowly and in connection with the church work which is already established.

**Music.**

The music in the Central Church has been poor and we have been trying to improve the congregational singing on the Sabbath. As well, we have gathered one or two singers together as the nucleus of a church choir which may be heard from some day.

**Bible Class.**

Several boys in the Central Church wanted to study the Bible during the week. Accordingly such a class has been begun. These young fellows can speak but little English, and I but little Zulu, but we manage fairly well. I haven't been in any Bible class at home where the questions came so thick and fast, and knotty ones, too.

**Boy Scouts.**

Work of this kind is badly needed, and we have organized a Scout troop, but calling it by another name, the "Pathfinders". We have a differently shaped button, and slightly different organization. Already there are a dozen members who have passed the



entrance tests. We have a secret knock, a secret initiation, etc., and the little native boys like this as well as their white brothers. It's all "hot stuff" and delights their souls. We hope this movement will eventually spread, possibly with the help of the British Boy Scout Movement. They are sympathetic, but have against them an almost overpowering popular prejudice, making active work for the native boys difficult for them.

#### Good Times in the Mine Compounds.

Clean social good times are lacking in the compounds where the thousands of mine workmen live. One group of mines, the Crown Mines, have fifteen thousand men employed. In order to make an opening into this one group of men we have been meeting with the Christian boys every Saturday evening in their chapel. Here we have some clean, wholesome good times with lots of fun. The fellows like it immensely and enter heartily into every game with great zest. A little later outdoor athletics will be tried, it being our ultimate aim to get the thousands of men in the great compounds all interested in these sports.

#### Work for the Girls.

In addition to working in the Sunday School on the Sabbath and helping in my work, my wife has a club for girls which meets weekly. The varying ages of the girls will make a division necessary soon. These girls are from 12 to 18 years of age and eager and glad to learn the ways of the white ladies.

#### Playground for Children.

This is not a "going concern" yet, but we have great prospects. A mining company has promised us the use of a good-sized plot of ground right in the heart of the city, accessible to hundreds of native children in the worst of the alum area where some place to play is sorely needed. It is going to be very expensive fencing and equipping a playground and we lack funds, but we are going to do what we can and pray that money will be forthcoming from somewhere. This playground will be located near a mine compound, and as well near a municipal compound where city employees stay, and it is our hope to make it a gathering place for the native young men from these places as well as for the children, having them meet, of course, at different times. If you could see the condition of these compounds, and the homes of the children with their filth and squalor, and if you could see the flash of the playing cards and the greedy eyes with which the little fellows (almost babies) gamble for shillings and half-crowns after the manner of the white men whom they copy, I believe every one of you would want a real share in a well-equipped playground for the unfortunate native kiddies of this city.

Now that the war is ended we are going to confidently expect that you will all drop in on us for a visit soon. Don't all come at once, for we have only one spare room. But MY we would like to see every one of you! Aeroplanes from London to Cape Town are being talked now, and some of you may prefer to wait a few months and come direct "by air" instead of by water. We have had letters from many of you and you can be sure they were enjoyed. A letter or hastily jotted card just to let us know you are not forgetting us will be greeted with cheers. Love to you, our home folks.

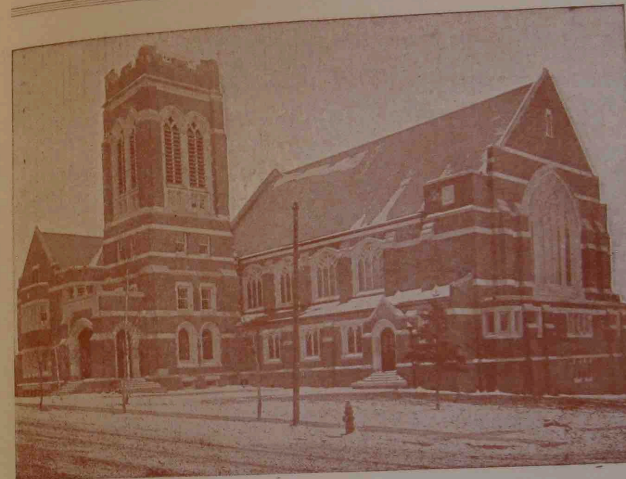

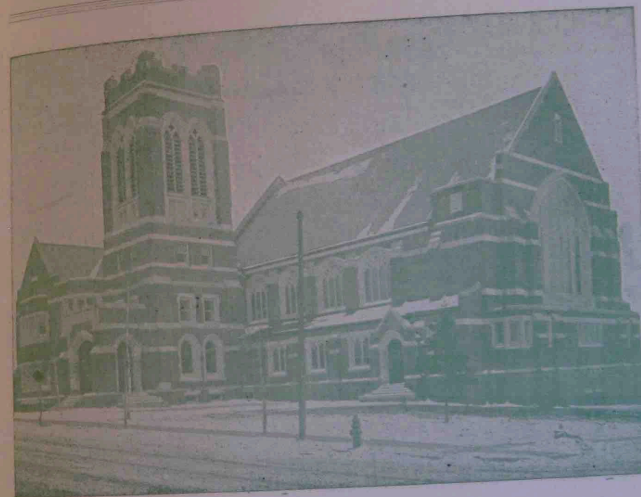

baptism of children. Parents wishing to have their children bap-  
tized are asked to notify the Pastor by Wednesday.

The Preparatory Service will be held Thursday evening at  
8:00 in the chapel. Members are urged to attend. This will be  
the last Thursday evening meeting until September.

An interesting letter from Mrs. Irwin to the Pastor is printed  
in part below:

Robert College, Constantinople, May 11, 1919.

My dear Mr. Thorp:

We surely did think that we would be at home before this,  
but one thing after another has prevented. In the first place,  
when we heard that the Commission and Relief Workers were  
coming, we felt that we ought to stay, as Mr. Irwin wanted to see  
the Board people any way with regard to the situation. After  
talking with them and helping for several weeks with the unload-  
ing of the first relief supplies, he left for Cesarea. He had to stay  
for some time in Konia as our part of the country is not "occu-  
pied" and it was very difficult to get permission to go on there.  
Finally it came, under the condition that he would go in on his  
own responsibility. This of course he was glad to do, and went  
on immediately, taking with him a Mr. Beach and Dr. Whitney.  
He has been working almost night and day ever since trying to  
get our buildings into usable condition for the relief work head-  
quarters. He has gangs of men and women at work repairing,  
plastering and whitewashing—and so much happiness it has  
brought to the poor people, having work. Am sure they feel as  
though there were hope in life with something which looks like  
re-construction and help for their beginning again.

Of course a great many of our places (sealed) had been  
opened and things taken. We lost practically everything which  
had been stored in our attic and cellar but our heavy furniture was  
left, and a few other things so that there will be something for our  
relief workers to begin with again.

Nearly all the places in the country are now occupied by  
relief workers, i. e., of course I mean the centers. Cesarea, Sivas  
and Harpoot have had to wait till the last on account of the polit-  
ical situation, but we hope that soon some of our own Board  
officers will be there to control the situation, so that it will seem  
safe. There is a place on the Marmora about four hours from here  
which is the center for the relief supplies. The great warehouses



down there are full of good things for relief work and as each "unit" is prepared the train on the side track there is filled with the necessary things for each station, and when ready supplies and workers go on together. The Cesarea-Sivas unit is now ready and they will probably leave tomorrow. I will be thankful for Mr. Irwin has been so anxious to have them there to get to work as quickly as possible.

Since writing the above have had a letter from a Greek friend in Cesarea speaking of Mr. Irwin's arrival. She says (I give you her wording exactly): "It was our great pleasure at last to meet Mr. Irwin on Tuesday afternoon, the 15th of April. It was on Sunday that we got the telegram of Mr. Irwin that he may be in the late evening at home, so we went down to prepare bath water and tea when they come. We had to wait over night, and the next day we asked from Injison by telegram if they reached there. They had not. So we kept asking again and again. On Tuesday noon we got the answer, 'an hour before two automobiles have passed and other 9 are to come,' so immediately we went down to the city and met them just in the middle of Kangla bazars. Everybody was so excited, all the Christians were so glad. The next day I met many Talas women who said they could not sleep from their joy. So kind of America to send people and help to us! Mr. Irwin is overworking now trying to get settled, with the Government business, and with visitors of all kinds. Since Mr. Irwin and the autos came here, the price of flour is getting less and less. Everybody is afraid soon they'll bring loads of flour and sell cheap so they are hurrying to sell their own cheap. It was good for the poor people on that line too. This week I'll be busy cutting underclothes for the orphans and the poor people will be glad to sew them."

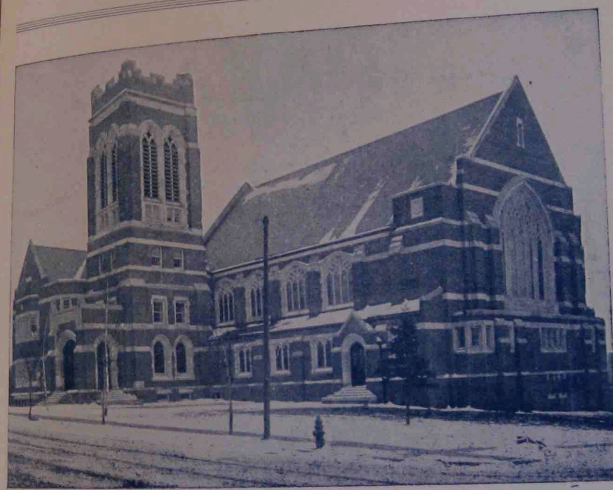
This Greek friend, Kiria Calliope, is one of whom we will tell you more when we see you. She has been like a mother to our people who were left there, and has kept a large number of orphans. We have sent her money regularly for the work. When Mr. Irwin went he took a lot of material for clothing, for we knew that what they had was finished. That is what Kiria Calliope meant when she said that she would be cutting out underclothing for the orphans that week.

Last night at the College Dr. Geo. Washburn of Boston, who has charge of the medical work of the Relief Commission, told us of that trip into Cesarea. He was of the party with Mr. Irwin, and Mr. Partridge of Sivas was with them too. Although the road is a military one, the rain began soon after they left the railway, and the mud was so bad that the journey took them 3 1/2 days instead of one day as they had expected. One of the supply trucks getting out of order, accounted for most of the delay. However, they finally reached there. One thing we have been so happy about is that the trees in our compound have been spared. We do not know how soon we can be starting homeward. We Other things might be replaced, but they couldn't in our life times. We have been looking for Mr. Wingate but he hasn't arrived yet and Mr. Irwin may feel that he shouldn't leave till he does. We work is simply thrilling here now, but we both need a thorough rest and change before settling down to it again. I must close this letter now. Will try and write soon again. Give my love to all the dear Pilgrim Church friends. I hope we may be able to see you all before long. Very sincerely yours, GENEVIEVE IRWIN.

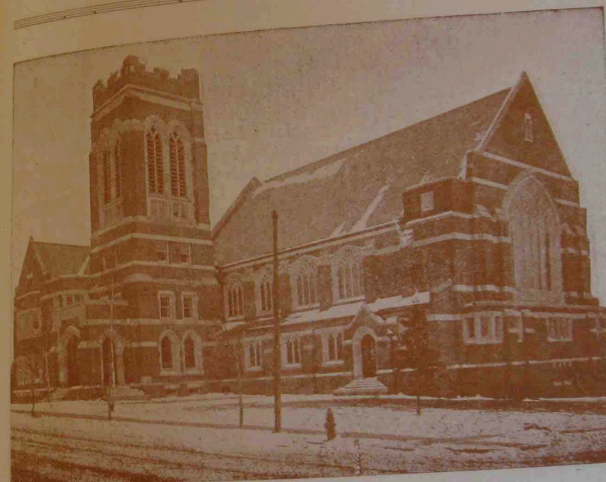

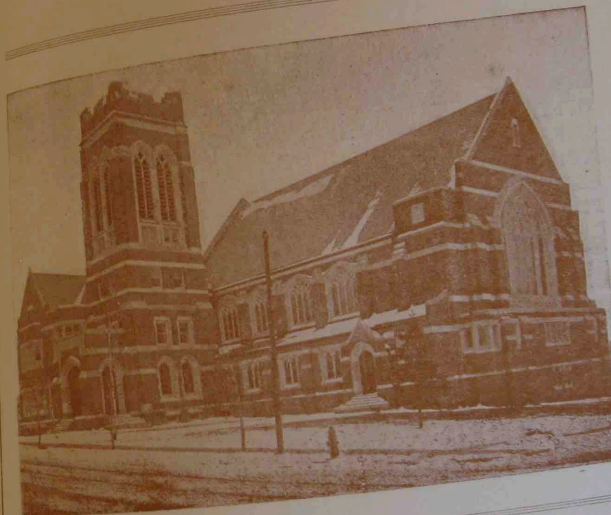

## A Letter from Our Pastor

Dear Pilgrims:

We are spending a few days in Chelsea, meeting many of the old friends. I had the pleasure on the 17th of preaching in the church of which I was for nearly seven years pastor, before coming to Duluth. A church is so much like a family circle that it was a memorable experience to greet the people again. They were all amazed at what seven years have done for Willard and Margaret.

Our three weeks in the White Mountains were most refreshing. At Waterville, which is the only settlement in an entire town, we found a nice little hotel, with nearly twenty cottages. The hotel is the center for meals and social good times. There is a nine-hole golf course, and the place is surrounded by the forests and hemmed in by the mountains. We found most delightful people, many of whom have summered for years in the Waterville valley. Our own Dr. Patton owns one of the cottages and his daughter Catherine was there this summer. We had many splendid rides and climbs among the mountains. The altitude of 1553 feet gave us crisp mornings and nights, not unlike Duluth.

It was a joy to receive Mr. Irwin's letter telling of his safe return to our shores. We shall hope soon to welcome him in Duluth.

Mrs. Thorp has entirely recovered her strength and we shall soon be facing westward, eager to see you all again, and to take up the work of another year. May God bless you all most richly and guide us together into deepening fellowship with Him, and earnest service in His name.

## A Letter from Mr. Irwin

Bay of Fundy, August 8, 1919.

Dear Mr. Thorpe:

We left Constantinople July 11 for St. John, N. B., in a tramp steamer and are nearing the end of our journey. We spent 36 hours in Gibraltar, coaling, so consider we have made a remarkably good journey, considering the class of boat we are on. It is extremely difficult to get home from Constantinople in anything like a direct way, so were delighted to find this steamer through the recommendation of the British Embassy. It is a great big tramp that carried coal to Constantinople and is proceeding light to St. John to load lumber for England for the Imperial Government. The captain and all the officers have been kindness itself. The captain gave up his spacious cabin with double brass bed. Opposite is a private bath room, at the side of the latter another stateroom for two people, and then the saloon. All told the best accommodations I have ever had on a boat.

Yesterday we lay off Cape Sable on account of fog, but came on this morning in an even denser one. About an hour back we picked up the Lurcher shoal buoy and are on our last leg for St. John. As it will be late tonight when we reach there we shall probably have to anchor outside somewhere for it will be impossible to make the harbor in this fog and wind.

As Mrs. Irwin has already written, I did not feel satisfied to come home after the armistice without making a trip to Cesarea to try and straighten out matters there and help all I could until Mr. Wright could arrive and take the direction of affairs. I am thankful to have been able to get our work somewhat reorganized and our big relief work under way during the time I was there. But more of that sometime when I see you.

After spending a few days in Ontario we hope to go on to Winnipeg, which will be our headquarters as far as I know at present. I hope to write you from there later on. Our address will be 59 Donald Street, Winnipeg.

Please extend to all our Duluth friends our best wishes.

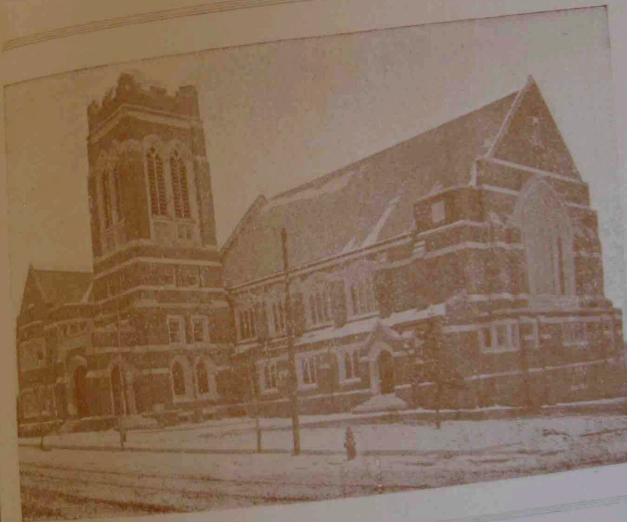

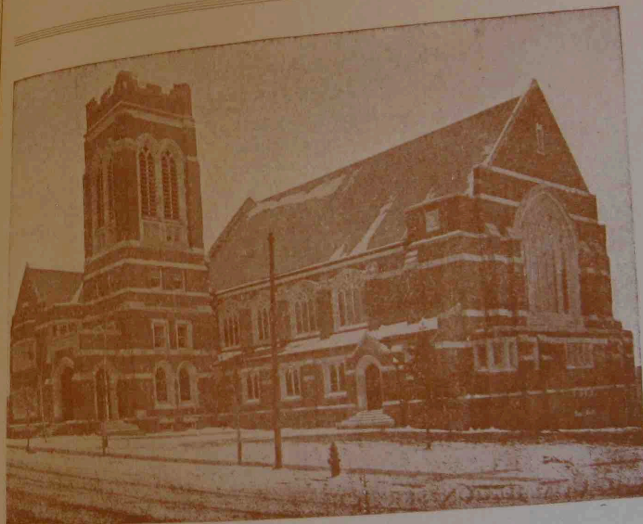

To the Members of Pilgrim Congregational Church,  
Duluth,

My Dear Friends:

We have spent seven happy and laborious years together as  
pastor and people, and it is with very deep personal regret that  
I offer to you my letter of resignation. But these are restless  
days and seven years constitutes a long pastorate. Our years here



have witnessed the forming of many enduring friendships. Together we have seen the transfer of Pilgrim Church to its present splendid building. Many new families have entered our fellowship and the church has entered upon a period of remarkable prosperity. You are equipped for an era of larger ministry to the neighborhood and city. A new leader, with different gifts and fresh enthusiasm will serve to develop the church along wider lines and a new voice will present the gospel with a different emphasis. There are times when a pastor welcomes a new task and a fresh set of parish problems.

These things have been in my mind in recent months. And, on the last Sunday of the vacation I visited the First Congregational Church in Holyoke, Mass. My classmate in Yale, Harry Hannum, formerly pastor in Superior, left the Holyoke church a year ago, after a pastorate of eleven years. They urged me to consider a call, during my visit, and the opportunity made a strong appeal. The church is much like our Pilgrim Church. It has a fine edifice, located in the best residential section of a busy New England city. There are large opportunities for growth. The income is somewhat larger, which in these days is an item. There is a large body of young people, including a boy choir of sixty voices. Congregationalism is strong in Holyoke, as throughout New England. And the thought of living within a few miles of Amherst and Mount Holyoke colleges is very alluring to both Mrs. Thorp and myself. Moreover the church has wisely engaged a salaried pastor's assistant to look after the church office and attend to the thousand-and-one business details such as have taken so much of my time and energy while in Duluth. I hope that Pilgrim Church will release my successor from this petty yet necessary detail work by engaging a similar assistant. I would also urge the early engagement of a salaried director of religious education. Our church school and young people's activities have grown until they demand the entire time of such a trained specialist, if they are to be handled in a large and effective way.

The proposal of the Holyoke church has resulted in a meeting of the church and society last Friday evening at which a hearty and unanimous call was extended. The opportunity is unusual and I believe that it will be best for me to embrace it. Therefore, in order that we may be settled there before cold weather, I am asking you to release me from the pastorate October 20th, 1919, and to join with me in calling a council of churches to review our action and to formally dissolve the pastoral relation.

In making this request I recall with deep affection and appreciation your many kindnesses and your unfailing patience and loyalty. Your friendship we shall always cherish and we shall hope to see many of you in the east in these days of easy travel. May the Heavenly Father direct and unite you in the choice of the new leader, who shall guide Pilgrim Church into yet larger things for the Kingdom. Wishing you grace, mercy and peace in the Lord, I am,

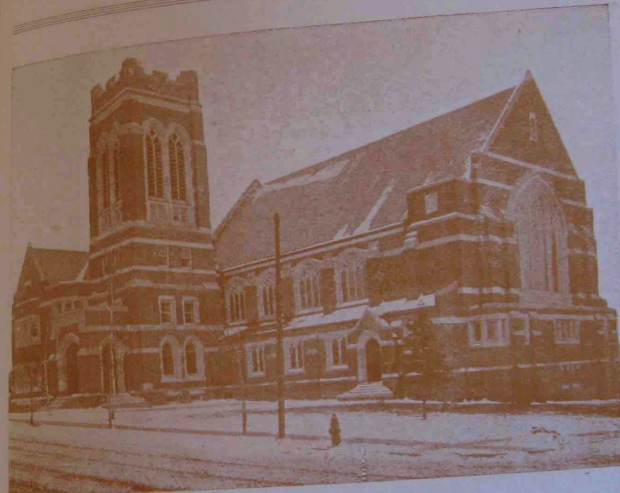

It is urgently requested that every member of the church be present at the midweek meeting to be held Thursday evening, Oct. 9th, at which time action will be taken providing for a pastoral committee to provide for temporary pulpit supply and to recommend a new pastor.

The twenty-second annual meeting of the Duluth Association of Congregational Churches will be held at the First Congregational Church, Backus, Minn., Oct. 14 and 15.

Resolutions Accepting the Resignation of Rev. Charles N. Thorp as Pastor of Pilgrim Congregational Church, unanimously adopted at a meeting of the Church held Thursday evening, September 25, 1919:

"Have faith in God. That is the message that I would give to Pilgrim Church." With these words a former beloved pastor began a letter which he sent to this Church when we were seeking a new pastor in the interim between the present pastorate and the one preceding. Continuing, in a letter full of affectionate solicitude, Dr. Patton said, "Pilgrim Church is a divine institution. God has shown you his favor. He has declared his leadership in the past. But a far more glorious future awaits you—if you are willing in the day of his power. In seeking a new pastor, seek a man of strong faith, a man who has experience with God. Beware of mere brilliancy, oratorical show, personal ambition. You want a man of God, and God will lead you to him and him to you, if you seek in the right way for the right ends."

As the result of the labors of a painstaking and conscientious committee and under divine guidance, as we believe, Mr. Thorp was called to the pastorate of this Church in October, 1912. He came to us with a fine enthusiasm and a broad optimism that has been a dominant characteristic of his seven years ministry among us.

For several years before his coming there had been a somewhat dormant sentiment in the Church that for its most effective work Pilgrim Church must seek a new home in the Eastern part of the city. This sentiment did not begin to crystalize into action until Mr. Thorp, with characteristic zeal, made a careful canvass of the situation. Within a few weeks after beginning his pastorate he made a map of the parish showing the location of the family and thus demonstrated that the center of the Church's population was sixteen blocks east of the then location of the Church building. He then brought the subject before the Church at its annual meeting in January, 1913, setting forth in detail the results of his investigations and concluding his report as pastor with a recommendation and a prophecy; a recommendation that the costs of a new building be investigated and a purchaser sought for the old site, and a prophecy that by 1915, Pilgrim Church would be conducting its services from a center between Sixteenth and Twenty-fourth Avenues East. From that day his effort to fill what he was convinced was the supreme need of Pilgrim Church was not slackened until on Christmas day, 1917, there was dedicated free of debt this Church and parish house, a plant unsur-



passed in strategic location, in architectural beauty and in working equipment by any church of the Northwest.

Notwithstanding the fact that for so many months of Mr. Thorp's ministry the services of the Church were conducted in quarters ill fitted for effective organization, nevertheless the organizations of the Church were during such time kept together, and during the seven years of his pastorate more than three hundred and fifty new members were taken into the Church.

As a pastor, the welfare of his parish was ever upon his heart. He has visited and comforted the sick, baptized our children, married our young people and tenderly performed the last rites as dear ones have passed to their final resting places.

In all his labors he has been assisted by Mrs. Thorp, whose wisdom, tact and loving zeal have left their impress upon the life of the Church at every angle. Much that she has done is ordinarily under the charge of a paid assistant, in a parish as large as ours, but with her it has been a labor of love, and her compensation has been the satisfaction of seeing the abundant fruitage of her labors and the deep love that the whole parish has for her.

As we believe that God led him to us seven years ago, so now we believe that as he is about to enter into the life of a new parish and take up the solution of its problems, God's hand is leading him.

**THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, That, with assurances of the deepest love and affection; with sincere hope that his future pastorate may be one of mutual joy and benefit to pastor and congregation; with fervent prayer that for many years yet to come he and his wife may labor together for the upbuilding of the Kingdom, this Church accepts the resignation that has been tendered, and commends Mr. Thorp and his family to the tender care of Him "Who doeth all things well."

**RESOLVED FURTHER**, that the Chairman of the Board of Trustees be, and he hereby is appointed to act with the pastor in selecting a committee to call an ecclesiastical council to terminate the pastoral relation.

#### **Richard Alexander Webster, 1825-1919**

Pilgrim Church has sustained a severe loss in the death of Richard A. Webster. Mr. Webster has been ill for months and fell asleep in the early morning of Sept. 25, to wake in the heavenly home. A man of sterling character, he was greatly beloved in the church and throughout the city. Since 1891 he has been a faithful member of our church, serving for many years as chairman of the committee on building and grounds. With unflinching cheerfulness he met the large demands made upon this committee in connection with the new church building.

Mr. Webster was born June 4, 1852, at Florence, Ontario, the son of James T. and Alice Butler Webster. He came to Duluth in January, 1889, joining Pilgrim Church with Mrs. Webster a few months later. During all his years in Duluth he has been associated with the Clyde Iron Works, holding different positions of trust with the company. He was a leading Mason, of the Ionic lodge and Scottish rite, in which he had attained the thirty-second degree and held the office of almoner. The funeral services will be held Monday afternoon at 2:30, at the Masonic Temple. To his wife and family our hearts go out in tenderest sympathy in their great bereavement. We think of our friend, released from weakness and suffering, and face to face with friends and loved ones who had gone on before him into the Home of Many Mansions.

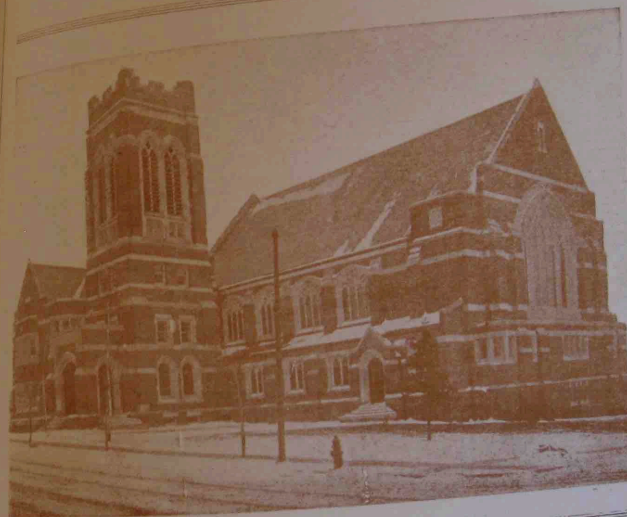

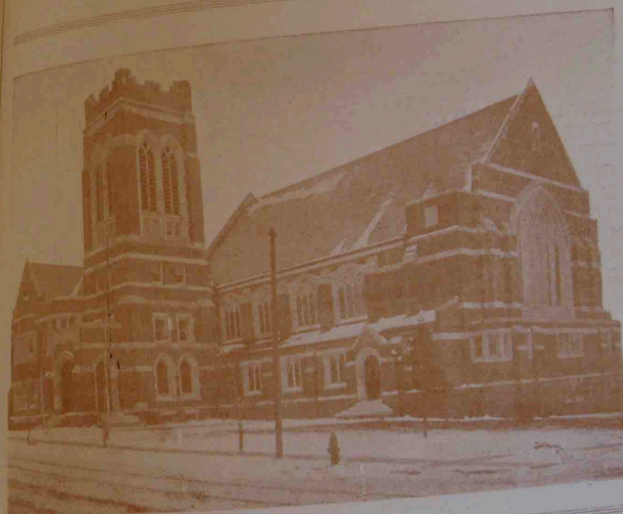

## REPORT OF ECCLESIASTICAL COUNCIL.

Pursuant to letters missive, an Ecclesiastical Council assembled in Pilgrim Congregational Church in Duluth, Minnesota, on October 16th, 1919, at eight o'clock P. M. upon request of this church and society, for the purpose of reviewing the action of the Pastor and Church in regard to his resignation and its acceptance thereof, and, if deemed advisable, to declare the relationship dissolved.

The Council was composed of ministerial and lay delegates of the following churches, to-wit:

United Protestant Church of Morgan Park, Duluth, Minnesota, Rev. John W. Kuyper, Pastor, and Mrs. C. C. Sampson, delegate; Pilgrim Congregational Church, Superior, Wis., Rev. Reed Taft Bayne, Pastor, and Harrie Rogers, delegate; Hope Congregational Church, Superior, Wis., Rev. W. P. Powell, Pastor, and W. A. Roycraft, delegate.

As, under the call, a quorum was not necessary, organization was effected by the choice of Rev. Mr. Bayne as Moderator and Rev. Mr. Powell as Scribe.

The resignation of the Pastor and the action of the Church accepting the same were both read by the clerk of the Church found to be regular and satisfactory.

The Council voted to retire and be by themselves for further consideration. After full deliberation, Harrie Rogers and Rev. J. W. Kuyper were appointed to draw up and present to the Council for its consideration a report of its findings. The Council then returned to the Church Assembly and listened to the report of the committee, which was as follows:

Your committee, appointed to recommend what action be taken in relation to dissolving the pastoral relation existing between Pilgrim Church and its pastor, Rev. Chas. N. Thorp, does hereby advise that the council approve the action taken by the church, and declare that the pastoral relation be and the same is hereby dissolved.

Although Mr. Thorp has done an unusual work and has been more than ordinarily successful in this parish; and, though the relation existing between pastor and people has been and still is a most affectionate one; still, the greater field offered by this new call seems to be ample reason for this separation. We hope and firmly believe that his work in his new field will show results which will fully justify such action by this council and we hereby extend to him our tender sympathies and earnest prayers for his future success in the work of the Master, wherever Providence may lead him to labor.

This Church has our sincere sympathy in its present loss and we can only commend it to Him who is the Great Head of the Church, for guidance in the selection of a new leader.

All of which is respectfully submitted for your consideration.

Upon motion, properly seconded, the report was unanimously adopted by the Council.

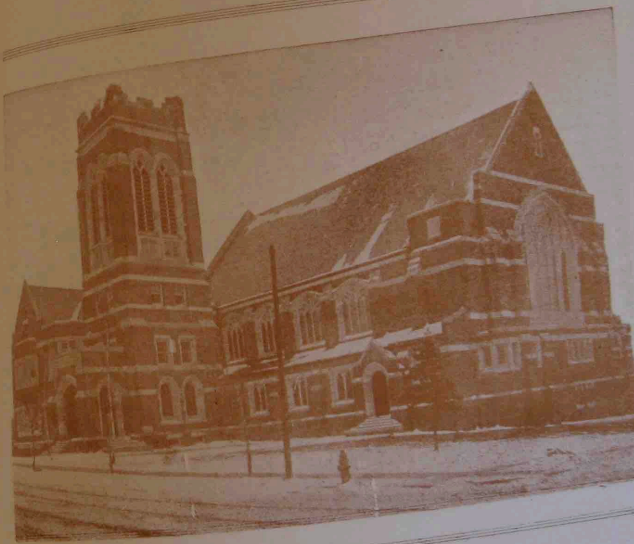

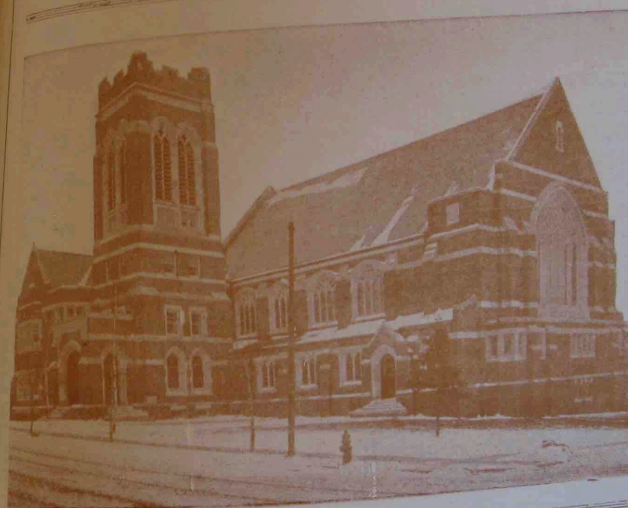

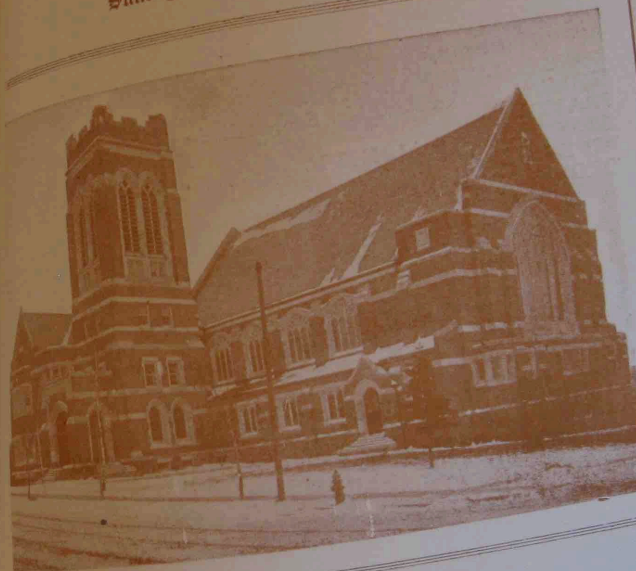

Nov. 7, 1838, at Cold Brook, New Hampshire. Mr. Parsons was graduated from Cold Brook Academy in 1855, and spent the seven years following at Oberlin College, two years of which was devoted to theology. He was also graduated from the law school at the University of Michigan.

He was married in 1876, at Saginaw, Mich., to Luella Ellinwood, and in 1888 they came to Duluth, where Mrs. Parsons died in 1900.

The surviving members of the family are the son, Mr. C. A., and the daughter, Miss Ollie Parsons, both of Duluth. For his life work Mr. Parsons chose that of teaching the principles and methods of business; and well he laid the foundation for the success of many a young man and woman.

Mr. Parsons was truly a scholar and a gentleman. His gentle, firm and kindly ways, reminded one of the Master whom he served.

One cannot mourn the passing of such a grand old man. His life was full and complete. His going was radiant and beautiful, like the radiance and beauty of the setting of the sun; and the afterglow gratefully reflects the rich simplicity of his well spent life.

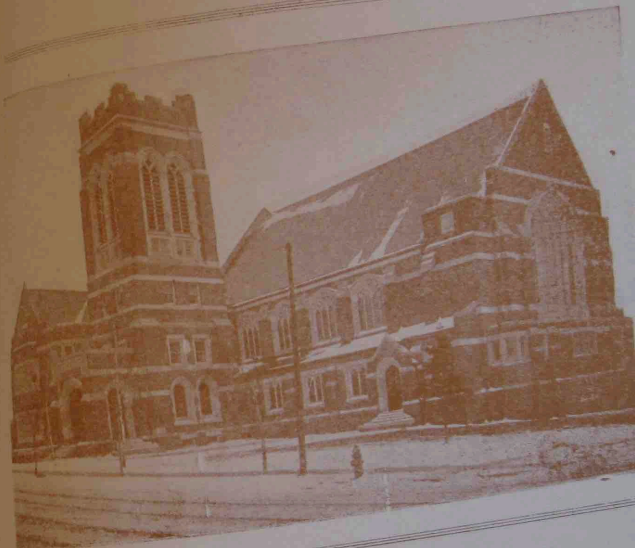

## Report of Annual Meeting

The forty-ninth annual meeting of Pilgrim Church was held in the Parish House last Tuesday evening, January 20. Supper was served by the Ladies' Union and the business session followed, Mr. Albert Baldwin acting as moderator.

The report of the church clerk, Mr. Brewer Mattocks, Jr., showed we have received during the past year 69 new members and have lost by death and dismissal to other churches 28, leaving a net gain of 41, or a total membership of 556.

Mr. C. G. Scott, superintendent of the Church School, reported the total enrollment of the school to be 258, with an average attendance of 180.

Maurice W. Hart, president of the Young People's Society, reported that the membership had been doubled during the past year while the treasury had made up a deficit of \$10 and had on hand a balance of \$22.

Mrs. E. L. Kimball, president of the Woman's Missionary Society, outlined the subjects studied during the year and reported an average attendance at the meetings of 32.

Miss Anna M. Kimball, president of the Friends in Council, gave an account of the meetings held and topics presented during the year and reported that a larger amount of money than ever before had been given for benevolences.

The Missionary Committee, through Mr. E. L. Kimball, chairman, reported that we have raised our full apportionment of \$2,000 and paid Mr. Irwin's salary in full but recommended an increase in the missionary budget.
