



Mrs. T. W. Hoopes, for many years a beloved and active member of Pilgrim Church, died of pneumonia Thursday at the Hotel Barstow, San Diego, Cal. Mr. and Mrs. Hoopes left here recently for a trip to California arriving there last Monday. The funeral will be held the early part of next week.

Clara Strong Ames

Mrs. Ames was born in Oswego, New York, September 8th, 1852. She was educated in the public schools of Oswego, graduating from the High School and later attending a ladies' school in the same city. She was married April 4th, 1872, in the First Presbyterian Church of Oswego to Wardwell Ames, who was then engaged in the grain and commission business there. It was not until some time after marriage that they united with the church. It was after a time of great anxiety with Mr. Ames when his wife was critically ill and her life was almost despaired of. It was then the course was determined upon and both united with the Congregational Church of Oswego, in 1875.

They removed to Fargo, N. D., in 1881, where both Mr. and Mrs. Ames became intensely interested in a project to organize a church. They became charter members of the First Congregational Church of that city which later developed into a strong and influential church. Mrs. Ames was an active worker in that church and many of its early meetings were held in the Ames home.

The Ames family removed to Duluth in 1886 and immediately identified themselves with Pilgrim Church. Mrs. Ames, like her husband, was always active and liberal in the support of the church and was a most faithful attendant at its Sunday and midweek services. She was also a lover of good music and it seemed a particularly fitting tribute to the memory of her deceased husband when the beautiful Ames Memorial organ was installed by her with the building of the new church edifice.


Mrs. Ames was a woman of striking personality with strong convictions. She was outspoken and vigorous in denouncing wrong and injustice but helpful and sympathetic to those in need and in every good cause. No one but intimate friends know of the great good she was constantly doing in an unostentatious way. She was devoted to her family and nearest friends and she showed a February 4th, 1908.

Mrs. Ames' religion was reflected in her daily life. She had a firm and simple faith and she lived a devoted Christian life of as to her relatives to whom the sympathy of the Church is extended. She leaves a son, Ward Ames, Jr., and a daughter, Mrs. Rufus H. February 5th at 6 P. M. and the funeral was held from the residence on February 7th.

All the men of this church are especially invited to attend the Men's Bible class which will be addressed by Dr. Davis upon the subject, "The Struggle to Keep God."





Gustan A. Wieland

Aug. 9, 1866-April 13, 1920.

During the year 1854 Albert Wieland and his four brothers, sold their interests in Ohio, including a tannery at Maumee and took preemptions in the virgin pine forests on the Northern shores of Lake Superior, establishing themselves in the lumber business, organized and owned the town of Beaver Bay, where they operated a saw mill, organized the county of Lake, county seat, Beaver Bay. It was there that Gustav A., the oldest son of Albert and Magdalena Wieland, was born.


As a child he was a favorite amongst friends of the family and it was while lifting him by the hands that the bones in his right arm were fractured. Notwithstanding this "Thorn in the flesh" he forced his way up until success crowned his efforts.

He attended the grade schools in the little village school after which he entered the State Normal School at St. Cloud. After this period the Wielands operated a lumber yard at Duluth, where Gustav was employed.

In 1885 they sold the lumber business and he then worked for others in the same line until 1887, when his father purchased the retail shoe business previously established by a brother, E. Wieland, and the subject of this sketch became manager and thus merits the distinction of having served the Duluth public longer than any other in his line.

"The Mayflower, that was so small it could have been set in one of our modern ships, did the most to set loose the greatest set of ideas and ideals, unclouded, simple, sublime." "You have got to get back the old enthusiasm for God and then Christianity will spread like wild-

Rev. Hubert C. Herring also came out of the far East to say to us among other things that the characteristic traits of the Pilgrims were "For himself-nothing, for others everything, cool headedness, warm heartedness. In these Pilgrim ideals the world must be conquered," he said.

If anyone in the conference measured up to Mr. Herring's "characteristic traits" it was Mrs. Woodberry, the A. M. A. Field Secretary, and I imagine our Pilgrim Mothers felt such a going out of their hearts to Mrs. Woodberry that they would have liked to lay aside their Puritan reserve and grasp her hand. What had Mrs. Woodberry to say? Nothing particularly new, but her strong personality that had gathered strength through a wealth of experiences, gave added weight to her message that "The church is the supreme thing and only thing that can solve our problems; and the church is an asset to any community." "It's so intensely American to try to do the thing some one says can't be done. Make democracy fit for the world before you can make the world ht for democracy." "Every man, woman and child must be made ht for democracy. Every man, woman and clints to the made fit is to be enlightened. We must have Christian patriotism.

Such are mere snatches from the full program of the 65th Annual Congregational Conference, a memorable occasion, but I have tried to set before you just some of the many most impressive utterances of those four days. I have not mentioned our Mr. Patton for his message was of the same appealing nature as that he gave us the Saturday evening before, and time and space prevent the mention of many others who helped to make the occasion memorable. I fall to wondering what would be the report of our Pilgrim delegates. Through our church Educational Society such workers are being trained. Mrs. A. M. She thanked all the Women's Societies for the splendid boxes and barrels. We were urged to send more boxes, especially Christmas boxes, to our missionary stations. Mrs. E. A. Tupper of Minneapolis told of the "Greater Schauffler." Minnesota is making fine progress toward our goal for Schauffler School and we were asked to see that our individual churches were raising their pledges for the Schauffler building fund.

The annual meeting of the Woman's Board of Missions of the Interior was held May 27th in Plymouth Church, Minneapolis. Mrs. Lowell E. Jepson presided. The devotional service was led by Mrs. Margaret Evans Huntington, Honorary President of Minnesota Branch. Three minute reports were given by the Association directors. Messages from Turkey were given by Miss Olive Vaugh and Miss Hadjopian, Minnesota's missionaries in Turkey. who are home on furlough. "If you are good enough to feed us," said Miss Vaugh, "we can look to you only for protection from the sword of the Turk. We do not care if you call it a mandate, but it seems strange to us Armenians that the Christian nations of Europe and America cannot somehow cooperate to prevent the slaughter of our helpless people." Miss Hadiopian is a native of Turkey and her training was made possible by our American Board. She said, "You have given us your language, now you must listen to us. You have shown us the Christ, you must see that we become Christians." One felt anew the great need of protection for these foreign peoples and we should sacrifice more and more for such noble work in foreign fields. Miss Bement of China has returned to this country after 21 years service as a missionary. She spoke of her work especially among the childern and young people of China. Too much stress cannot be laid upon the urgent need for more trained workers, more liberal gifts and more self-sacrifice from each individual church all over this land of plenty.

By a vote at the close of this session, the Woman's Boards will not meet in connection with our State Conference next year. The reason given is that we must give more time to our woman's special missionary work.

Each church was instructed to see to it that missionary talks are given at different times during the year before all the church organizations, especially the Church School. We were urged to have various exercises, either pageants or other suitable forms of entertainment in commemoration of this our tercentenary year of the Landing of the Pilgrims.

To Our Fellow Citizens of the British Empire.

It has become clear today, both through the arbitrament of It has become clear today, both carough the arbitrament of war and through the tests of rebuilding a life of peace, that neither war and through the tests of resulting the peace, that neither education, science, diplomacy, nor commercial prosperity when allied with a belief in material force as the ultimate power are allied with a benef in inacerial force as the unimate power, are real foundations for the ordered development of the world's life. These things are in themselves simply the tools of the spirit that

Even the hope that lies before the world of a life of peace protected and developed by a league of nations, is itself dependent upon something deeper and more fundamental, still.

The co-operation which any league of nations may hope to foster will become operative in so far as the consenting peoples have the spirit of good will. And the spirit of good will among men rests on spiritual forces; the hope of a brotherhood of humanity reposes on the deeper spiritual fact of the Fatherhood of God. In the recognition of the fact of that Fatherhood, and of the divine purpose for the world which are central to the message of Christianity, we shall discover the ultimate foundation for the reconstruction of an ordered and harmonious life for all men.

That recognition cannot be imposed by government. It can only come as an act of free consent on the part of individual men

Responsible as we are in our separate spheres for a share in the guidance of the British Empire as it faces the problems of the future, we believe that in the acceptance of these spiritual principles limits.

We would therefore commend to our fellow citizens the we would therefore commend to our fellow citizens the necessity that men of good will who are everywhere reviewing civilization, should consider the relation to the reconstruction of the reconstruct civilization, should consider also the eternal validity and truth of these spiritual forces which are in fact the one hope for a permanent foundation for west!

FIFTY YEARS AGO IN PILGRIM CHURCH.

November 28, 1870.

The Congregational friends of the city of Duluth assembled at the rooms of the Young Men's Christian Association on the 28th day of November in the year 1870 to consider the question of organizing a Congregational Church.

The meeting was called to order by Mr. L. H. Tenney and formally organized by the election of Mr. W. S. Woodbridge as chairman and Mr. George Spencer as secretary.

The object of the meeting was then stated by Mr. L. H. Tenney and each person present was requested to express his

All were favorable to the formation of a church.

A motion was then made by Mr. L. H. Tenney, seconded by Mr. Thomas Dowse, that the meeting proceed at once to organize a Congregational Church, which was agreed to by unanimous vote.

A committee consisting of Messrs. Tenney, Patterson, Kimball, Woodbridge and Munger was appointed to draw up a Church Constitution and Confession of Faith and Covenant.

A committee consisting of Messrs. Dowse, E. L. Smith, Spencer, Mitchell and Patterson was appointed to arrange for calling a council and to take other necessary steps to perfect the

By a unanimous vote Mr. Tenney was instructed to write Mr. Charles Cotton Salter of Brookfield, Missouri, that it was the voice of this preliminary meeting to extend to him a call as soon as the church became permanently organized.







ANNUAL MEETING

The annual meeting of Pilgrim Church, held in the parish house on the evening of January 18th, was of especial interest, It was the fiftieth anniversary of the organization of the church. There were about 250 in attendance. Three of the sixteen charter members were present—Mr. and Mrs. Jeremiah Kimball and Mr. J. P. Johnson.

The minister of the church, Dr. Noble S. Elderkin, presided.

The minutes of the last annual meeting were read by the church clerk, Brewer Mattocks, Jr., and approved as read.

The report of the clerk, his eleventh report, showed a membership of 558 at the close of 1920. The 79 new members received into the church on Sunday, January 16, 1921, the largest single accession in the history of the church, are not included in these figures.

Before giving his report Mr. Mattocks, in the character of Massasoit, cleverly portrayed as the vision of the aged Indian the growth of Pilgrim Church made possible by the faith and spirit of sixteen men and women of 1871.

A summary of the financial reports of the treasurers of the various organizations will be found elsewhere in the Bulletin.

The report of the Christian Endeavor Society, made by the president, Maurice Hart, shows an active membership of thirty. Forty-two meetings were held during the year, two at the county poor farm and one at Nopeming sanitarium. The society contributed \$10 to the Hoover fund for starving European children and \$5 to the State Christian Endeavor Union.

The report of the superintendent of the Church School showed an enrollment of 282 members and an average attendance of 230 since September, when the present superintendent, Mr. Paul Favor, took the office. The nominating committee of the Church School through its chairman, Mrs. W. K. Daugherty, recommended the employment of a trained and paid superintendent and by such action of the church Mr. Favor, whose term of office had expired, was asked to continue as superintendent until such an arrangement had been made.

The report of the Woman's Missionary Society showed that besides the regular contributions to the church missionary budget the society had expended \$475, \$137 of which was a thanks offering; \$220 was spent in outfitting a family in northern Minnesota and for clothing sent to a school for negroes in the south. The report of the Friends in Council, made by Miss Gertrude Longstreet, showed that they had raised \$197.29 during the year and \$18 to the Serbián relief and \$10 each to the Schauffler School, the Berry School, the Bethel Home, Ministerial Relief and Women and Children of the Orient.

Mrs. C. F. Colman, president of the Ladies' Union, made a verbal report.

The report of Boy Scouts, Troop No. 8, showed an active membership of 17. Several of the members have taken prizes in athletic contests, first aid, life saving and knot tying.

The report of the Cirl Scouts was made by Gertrude Hegardt, lieutenant. The Girl Scouts troop of Pilgrim Church was the first organized in Duluth. It has 19 active members. The troop orphan and assisted in the financial drive in November for the national Girl Scouts organization.

The report of the Board of Trustees showed that all church property, including the parsonage, is free from indebtedness and that all bills and current expenses are paid. Insurance on church buildings and contents is carried in the sum of \$150,000.

The church treasurer, H. W. Nichols, reported total receipts for 1920 for general fund \$15,524.38; the disbursements \$15,511.05; cash balance, \$13.33.

The Benevolent treasurer, W. S. Horr, reported receipts \$3,497.55; disbursements \$3,497.55.

The minister's message consisted of certain recommendations:

- That a year book be published annually in January, the names of members to be kept in type for use at any time.
- 2. That a children's church be established under a paid leader.
- That an investigation be made as to the need of a second service.
- 4. That some organization be maintained among the men of the church which shall provide for frequent gatherings.
- 5. That the New Members committee be made a permanent committee.
- 6. That Mr. C. E. Carlson be asked to form a committee to block the parish.
- 7. That an invitation be extended to the State Conference to meet here in 1922.
- 8. That Pilgrim Church take a greater interest in nearby Congregational churches.
- That Church Night be made a time when the various groups of the church report as to their activities.
- 10. That the appointment by the advisory committee of Mrs. Sanford as publicity chairman for one year be confirmed by the church. (Adopted.)
- 11. That the membership list be kept alive by an annual roll call.
- 12. That a trained religious work director be employed as superintendent of the Church School and other activities of the young people. (Referred to Ladies' Union.)
