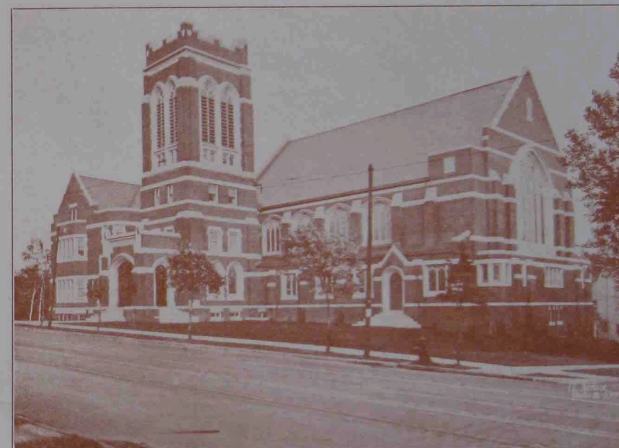

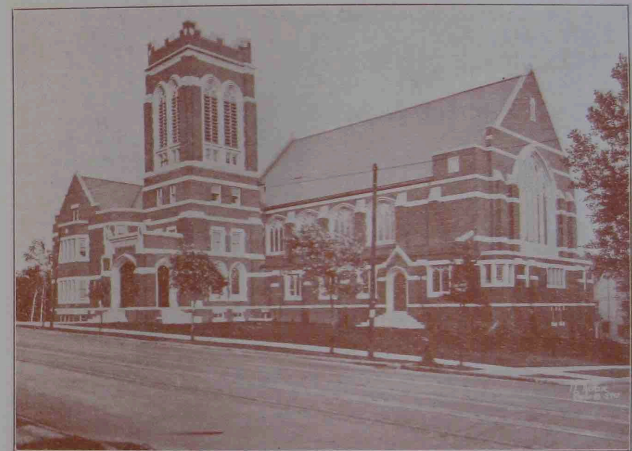

 Only a meagre handful braved the glorious weather last Sunday afternoon to hear what Mr. Wallar had to say about the campaign to drive the drys from Congress. The Minnesota Anti-Saloon League cannot make the fight it is sure the churches want to have made unless funds are provided. Pilgrim Church ought to share in these funds. To what extent?

It was a cheering story of achievement that Dr. F. N. White brought us last Sunday morning. The work of the American Missionary Association during its 75 years of service is something to rejoice in. Dr. White did not ask for money. That does not mean he does not know places where money could be used. He might well have asked us to help him rebuild the dormitory at the Girls' Industrial School in Moorhead, Mississippi, which was destroyed by a cyclone in 1918. For this is one of the things that needs to be done. Shall we gather a thousand dollars as a witness of our care and concern?

THE STATE CONFERENCE

May 16-18, 1922.

This was the sixty-seventh annual meeting of the Minnesota Conference. It was the third time the conference had come to Duluth. The weather was atrocious. For two of the three days it rained and fogged and misted and misbehaved pretty scandalously. Tuesday was fair and fine and we natives were trapped into some unseemly boasting. By Thursday evening we had run out of excuses and were ready to say that it most always did this sort of thing when Duluth entertained Conferences.

However, it was only the weather that was out of kilter. Pilgrim homes fairly shouted their welcome. Those who elected to be entertained at Duluth hotels discovered an ample provision.

Just exactly two hundred accepted our hospitality. And of these one hundred and sixty were cared for in Pilgrim homes. The registrar's records showed one hundred and seventy-eight voting delegates.

It is safe to say that about two hundred and twenty-five came to Duluth for the Conference.

Supper Tuesday evening and luncheon Wednesday and Thursday noons were served free of any charge to all who cared to stay. More than 230 were willing to stay Wednesday noon. The stormy weather made this fine foresight of the ladies of the church doubly welcome.

The attendance at the banquet Wednesday evening was above three hundred. It does not need to be said that every detail in connection with every meal was perfectly attended to. Those who peeled potatoes and those who cut grape fruit and those who prepared the million or two sandwiches did their chore as faultlessly as those who waited upon the tables. It was great service greatly rendered.

The Soo special from the Twin Cities came in an hour ahead of time and slightly disarranged plans for greeting the delegates at the station. But the special street cars were at the station even if the messengers and scouts were not.

Every imaginable convenience was provided in the Parish House lounging and rest rooms, stationery, typewriter service, newspapers, telephones, a post office, an information bureau, check rooms, and a fruit and candy stand operated in turn by the Girl Scouts, the Boy Scouts and the Christian Endeavorers.

The excursion committee had no end of cars on hand for the promised trip around the boulevard. The pre-arranged schedule was maintained but the weather was at its worst just at this hour. Printed directions for seeing the right things were handed each of the 200 excursionists. And if Wisconsin and Michigan were not seen in the offing it was the fault of the weather man and not the committee. It ought to be said to show how generous was the response of Pilgrimites to the call for cars sixteen cars above what were needed joined the line outside the church that Wednesday afternoon.

The reception committee was on hand at the beginning and remained on hand until the last rain drop was rained Thursday evening seeing that delegates were received and directed.

No religious conference ever had better publicity. The Duluth papers were exceedingly generous. The committee was exceedingly alert.

A Conference News Sheet appeared four times. The Decorating Committee forgot nothing.

Pilgrim Choir helped at the three evening sessions. Pilgrim organist was present at every session—morning, afternoon and evening.

The Scouts and the young folks did many a good turn. Concerning the meetings themselves much could be said. But only this shall be said: Among those that brought good news was Dr. Cornelius H. Patton, sometime minister of Pilgrim Church and a brother beloved.

The occasion was altogether a notable one. It was not a handful but a host that made it so. To each belongs a sense of satisfaction in a good piece of work well done.

Certain firms and individuals outside the Pilgrim circle contributed in various ways to the success of the conference. Among these were the Kelly Furniture Company, Rickard and Borski, A. W. Anderson, E. M. Stone, John Neipp of Kelly-Duluth Company, Gowan, Lenning and Brown, Gassers, Duluth Marine supply, The Duluth Chamber of Commerce, the Herald and the News Tribune. It is needless to say that what they each did was appreciated and will not be soon forgotten.

And it should be said here at the close that Mrs. Clapp who is in her 100th year and Mrs. Drew who is in her 90th year honored the Conference by attending its sessions.
