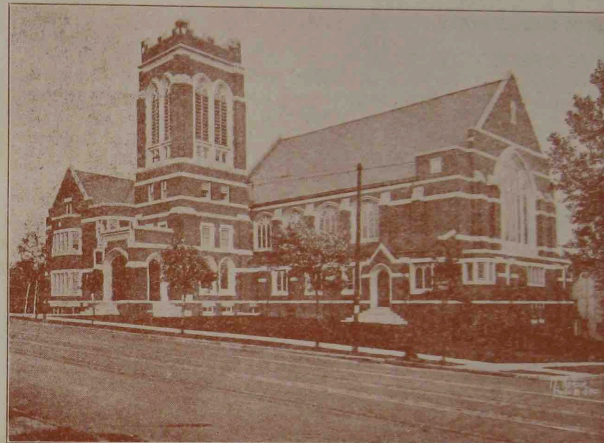

### THE ANNUAL MEETING

The fifty-second annual meeting of Pilgrim Church was held in the Parish House last Tuesday evening. Supper, in charge of Mrs. R. E. Johnson, was served to about 240, and this was followed by the business meeting. Dr. Elderkin was elected moderator. After the reading of the minutes of the last annual meeting the various reports were given and the election of officers held.

The report for the Christian Endeavor Society, made by John Harlow, president, showed a membership of thirty. The society has held regular meetings through the year except during July and August, with an average attendance of twenty-five. One delegate went to attend the Northfield Conference last summer. A biweekly fellowship luncheon just preceding the Sunday evening meeting is a new and successful feature of the work this

winter. The cabinet includes besides the regular officers committee chairmen to look after various special departments.

Reports by Miss Mary Elwell, captain of the Girl Scouts, and A. O. Rabideau, Boy Scoutmaster, showed the two troops of the church active and in good condition.

Report by R. C. Hawkers, treasurer of the Church School, reported a total expenditure of \$867.38.

Judge R. M. Funck reported for the Religious Education Committee. This committee being new since the last annual meeting the chairman took occasion to define its function as to serve as the cabinet of the Religious Education Department. The Women's Assembly having guaranteed the expenses of the Department for the year, their president, Mrs. T. J. Davis, was invited to meet with the committee, as was the pastor. This committee held frequent meetings during the year with Mr. Hall to discuss and decide upon the policy of the Department. The chairman spoke of the budget asked for for the year 1923 as "not very much when the wide field for its expenditure is considered". The aim of the department is service to the children of the entire community.

The report of the Religious Education Department, Rev. W. M. Hall, Director, gave a brief account of the following activities among our children and young people: Vacation Church School, Boy and Girl Scouts, Christian Endeavor, Booster and Pijugi Clubs, Basbet ball for High School boys, Pilgrim News, Young People's Conferences, and the Church School. The Booster and Pijugi Clubs are lively organizations of boys and girls in the Junior Department, with service and recreation as their aims. High School Boys have played basket ball one evening a week. The ten issues of Pilgrim News that have appeared during the year have been very popular with the children and young people. Our young people have been well represented at several conferences in different parts of the State during the year and the delegates have come home with many new and valuable points of view. The Vacation Church School had an average attendance of 101 with 12 denominations represented, making it in a real sense a community enterprise. Mr. Hall reported the Church School as being in good condition, with 44 adult workers and an average attendance during the last three months of 1922 of 239.

Miss Effie White, president, reported for the Friends in Council. Several social meetings were held during the year, besides the annual Thank Offering meeting. With a membership of only ten, this society has paid \$100.00 towards the church apportionment, besides \$35.00 for other benevolent purposes.

The report of the Woman's Missionary Society, Mrs. C. L. Haney, president, was read by the vice president, Mrs. C. H. Dunning. Eight meetings have been held during the year with an average attendance of 40. The ladies prepared and sent a box of surgical dressings to the Congregational Hospital in Porto Rico, and shipped two fine barrels, one to the Moorhead School, and one to Remer. Two delegates represented the society at the State meeting of the W. B. M. I. The Thank Offering amounted to \$183.70.

Mrs. T. J. Davis, president, reported for the Women's Assem-



bly. Among the achievements for the year are the purchase of new hymnals, putting in the reredos, starting the Duluth Occupational Therapy work, financing the Religious Education Department, serving the State Conference, the District Christian Endeavor Union, and our own church people with 5,084 meals, giving the Goldthwaite organ recital at cost, and providing equipment and decorations in various parts of the building. Their disbursements amounted to \$8,426.61.

Brewer Mattocks, Jr., church clerk, reports a membership of 685 at the beginning of the year, 54 new members received, 14 letters of dismissal granted, and 2 deaths, making our present membership 723.

W. N. Hart, chairman of the Building and Grounds committee, reported all church property, including the parsonage, in good condition. He spoke again of the need of janitor's quarters in the building.

The report of the Board of Trustees, Oscar Mitchell chairman, showed that all church property is free from indebtedness and that all bills and current expenses are paid. The church property is insured for \$150,000. Formerly the premiums were paid once in three years. A plan has been worked out by the trustees by which the premiums will henceforth be paid annually, \$668.34 in 1923, and \$500 a year thereafter. The apportionment for 1923 is \$6,292.00. A large number of the members of the church are still not represented directly or indirectly by a pledge for the church budget.

The report of the treasurer, H. W. Nichols, (W. S. Horr assistant treasurer), showed the total receipts for the year to be \$28,697.05, disbursements \$28,653.62, balance on hand \$43.43.

The chairman of the finance committee, W. G. Hegardt, reported an estimated budget for 1923 of \$26,928.00, and the necessity of getting \$1,751.00 more in pledges if we adopt this budget.

The minister of the church in his message cautiously referred to the matter of attendance both at the morning and at the vesper services. And expressed his fondest hopes. He stressed the achievements of the Assembly and wished like fury that the men had an organization comparable to it. He explained how invaluable the church office had been. Told about the work of the Lookout Committee and explained why it would be best to continue generous contributions to the Deacons' Fund. Urged the church to stand behind the Duluth Council of Churches as it had been doing. He ventured to recall the splendid work of the whole church in entertaining the State Conference during the merry month of May while the ice was still in the Lake. And he closed by suggesting the appointment of a committee to take the entire apportionment problem under advisement.

Before the meeting adjourned to meet at the call of the trustees it was voted to thank the News Tribune and the Herald for their many fine courtesies, to send the greetings of the church to Mrs. C. C. Salter a charter member who is ill at her home, to thank Mrs. Johnson and the J-O group for their part in

making the evening a success. The new members of the church who were received at the December Communion and were guests of honor at the dinner were called upon to rise. The phantom tellers of the election were Messrs. Barnes, Finlayson, Hunt, Orr and Dr. Laird who would have done very well if there had been any need of doing well.

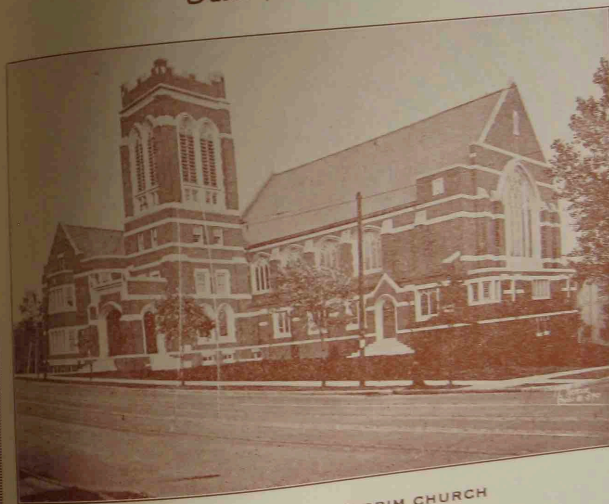
### DR. JOHNSON PRESCRIBES FOR HIMSELF

The meeting of 1925 will be held in the First Church of Washington, D. C., of which President Coolidge is a member. Mrs. W. A. McGonagle and the minister of Pilgrim Church were delegates of the Duluth Association. Out of a possible 685, there were 557 voting delegates in attendance. The total number of Congregationalists presaged from all parts of the country is conservatively estimated at 4,000.

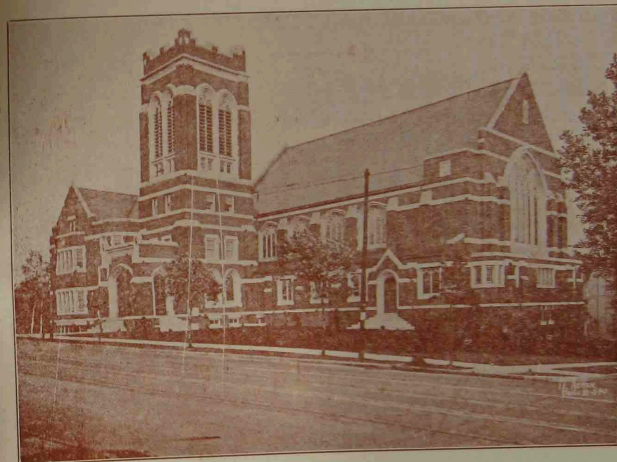
