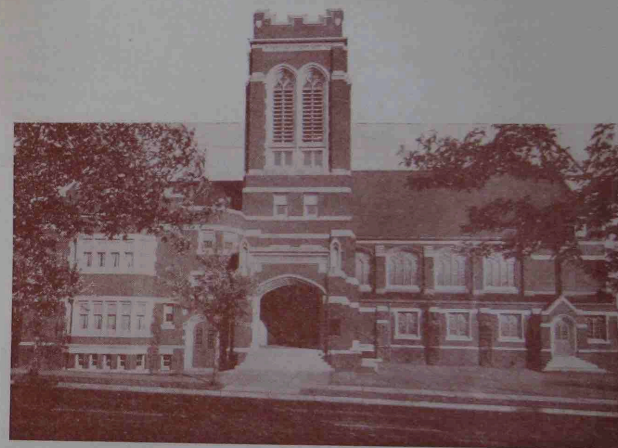

"We seem to give him back to Thee, dear God, who gavest him to us. Yet, as Thou didst not lose him in giving, so we have not lost him by his return.

"Not as the world giveth givest Thou, O Lover of Souls! What Thou givest, Thou takest not away. For what is Thine is ours always, if we are Thine.

"And life is eternal; and love is immortal; and death is only a horizon; and a horizon is nothing save the limit of our sight.

"Lift us up, strong Son of God, that we may see farther; cleanse our eyes that we may see more clearly; draw us closer to Thyself that we may know ourselves nearer to our beloved who are with Thee.

"And while Thou dost prepare a place for us, prepare us for that happy place, that where they are and Thou art, we too may be. Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen."

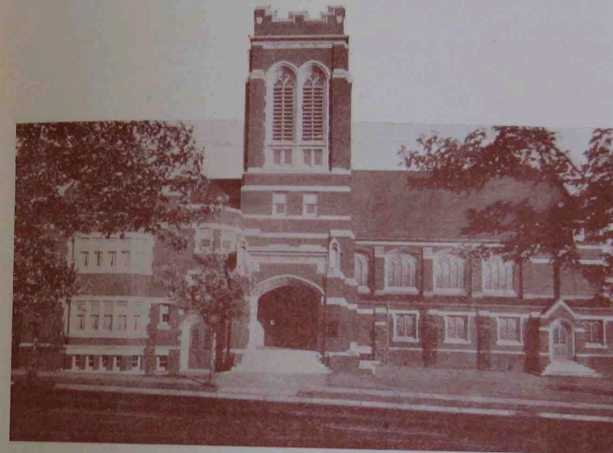

FATHER AND SON BANQUET

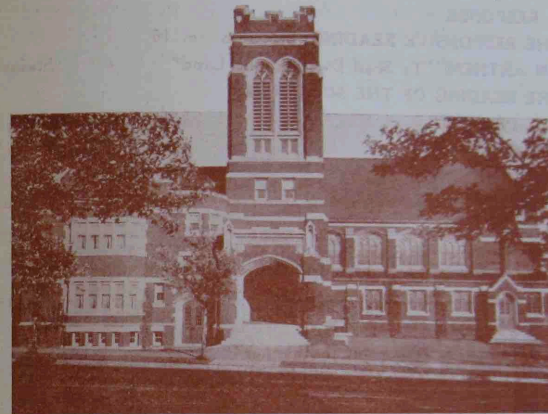

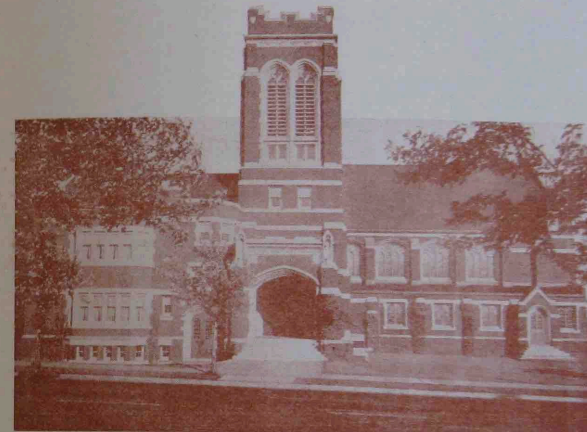

II. THE PROBLEM OF PROVIDENCE."

Genesis 45:8. "It was not you that sent me hither, but God."

The good Congregationalists of New Haven informed the American Board that they had a foreign missionary problem on American soil all ready for the Board to tackle. But the Board contended that it did its work in foreign lands. And insisted that new provisions would have to be made. So new provisions were made. This was in 1846. Out of the organization then effected grew the present American Missionary Association. Its work now is among the so-called undeveloped races under our flag, the Negro, the Indian, the American Highlander, the Chinese, the Japanese, the Hawaiians, the Porto Ricans and the Spanish speaking peoples. Every Congregationalist may well be proud of these seventy-nine years.

Our boys, in recreation as well as in religious instruction, have profited by your appreciation of boy-life and by your devotion to their welfare.

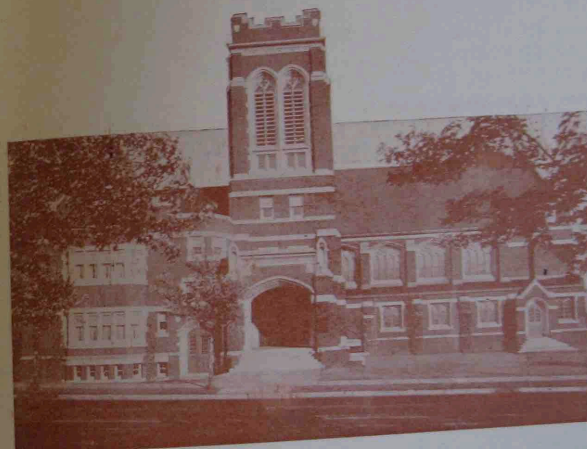

Not in pride, arrogance, and disdain of other races and people, but in sympathy, love, and understanding.

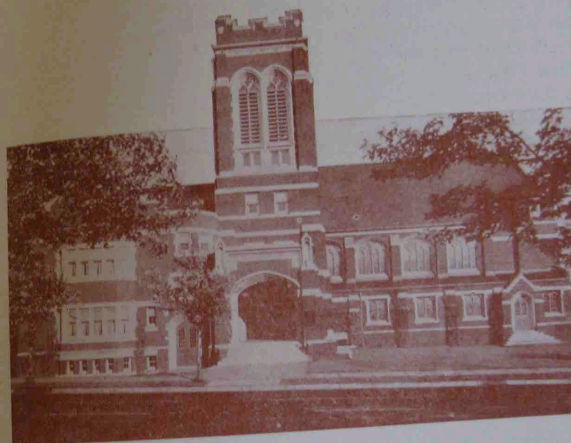

Some months ago Pilgrim people gathered a fund whereby Mr. and Mrs. Irwin could secure organs for some of their Armenian refugee congregations in Greece. The following letter is one of four bearing the news of the arrival of the organs and expressing the joy and the gratitude of the ministers and congregations of those churches.

Athens, Greece,
Aug. 8, 1925.

To the ladies of Pilgrim Congregational Church,
Duluth, Minnesota.

Dear friends,

With a great joy, I come to acknowledge receipt of an organ dispatched by you for our church through Rev. and Mrs. Irwin. I feel specially happy for the fact that there are very generous friends across the Atlantic who are keenly interested in the well-being of our refugee people who have been altogether robbed of their possessions.

Please permit me, on this splendid occasion, to express to you the sincere feelings of our gratitude and appreciation for your sympathy and intimate friendship. Dear sisters, be sure that our church, of which I am the pastor, will immensely enjoy this beautiful organ in worshipping God.

Our church, which is three years old, has been located on a hill and commands a very lovely view on the shore of the Aegean sea. The number of our congregation amounts to about 350 people all of whom have come here as refugees since the calamity of Smyrna. Likewise we have our Christian Endeavor Societies of both sexes; lady members are sixty in number and young men are about thirty-five. We have also a Sunday School which is attended by 60 to 70 children. All of these organizations will profit a great deal by your gift of organ.

We have organized a choir of young men and young women who inspire us very much in our worship. Our choir is preparing a concert to be held before long, the income of which will be devoted to the repair of the church building. On behalf of my congregation, I thank you once more, and wishing you God's blessings, I remain, with cordial salutations,

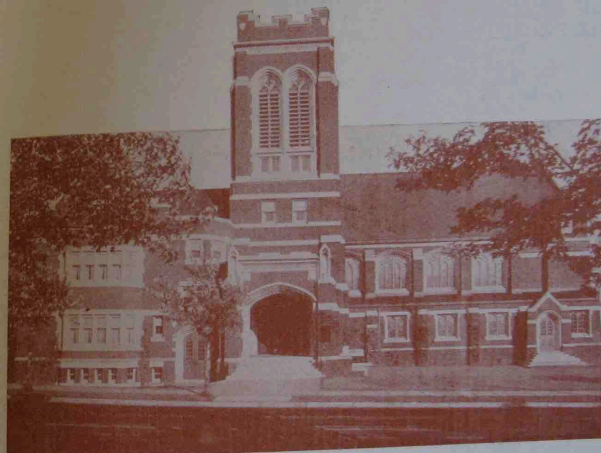

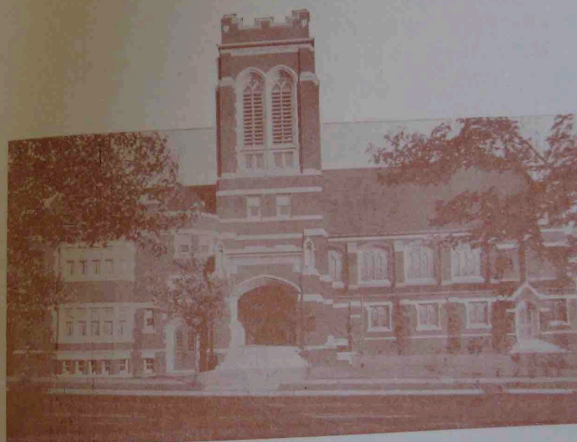

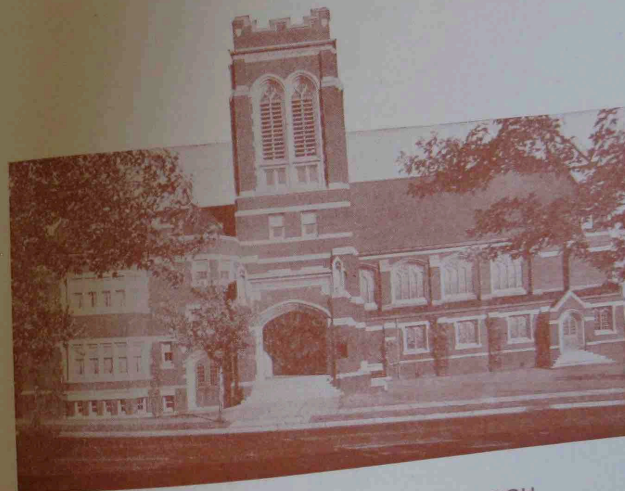

TRANSPLANTING ANATOLIA COLLEGE

"Anatolia College in Marsovan was crushed to earth; it is rising again at Salonica (the Thessalonica of Paul) in Macedonia, under the government of Greece.

The refugee peoples of the Near East deserve all the sympathy they receive from American friends. This tragic 'movement of populations' is the greatest of its kind in all history. There are 160,000 refugees in Salonica, 800,000 in the province of Macedonia, and 1,500,000 in the whole of Greece.

Almost before these pilgrims satisfy their hunger, or find shelter, clothing, or employment, they plead for the education of their boys. Lads who live as street arabs today will become highwaymen tomorrow. If they get a good schooling today—and they take all their teachers give them—they will be capable men and useful citizens tomorrow.

In response to such conditions Anatolia College was opened on a three year plan in 1924, in Salonica, a pilgrim school among pilgrim people; a school without a building, a book, a bench, a bed, or a bell.

Salonica is building mightily at the present time; it is the point where the Greek seaman from the south meets the Slav ploughman from the north; Moslem, Jew and Christian have felt at home here for many generations; Salonica is moving forward under a Christian government re-established in 1912 after alien domination since 1430.

The Greek government has revised its laws for the express purpose of welcoming American education. Anatolia College has been promised exemption from tariff on building materials and given a grant of a college site outside the city.

Nothing is ending throughout the Near East; everything is just beginning. Mr. Venizelos expressed the common view when he invited us to relocate in Macedonia, saying that an American college might do much to remove the spirit of suspicion, fear and hate among the people of the Near East and establish a spirit of confidence, courage and good will across racial and religious lines."—George E. White.

CAROLINE FLETCHER AMES 1844-1925

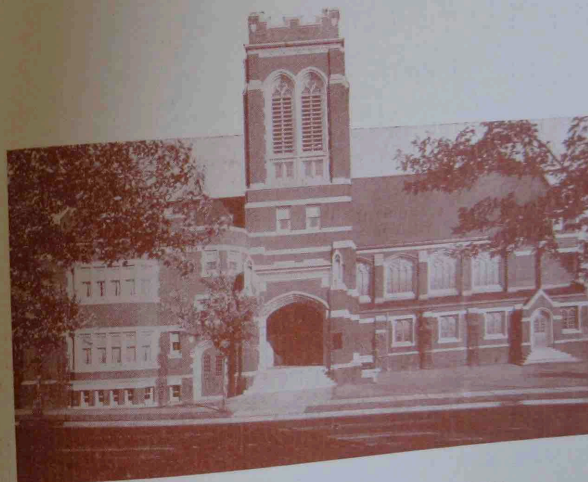

wars shall be no more.

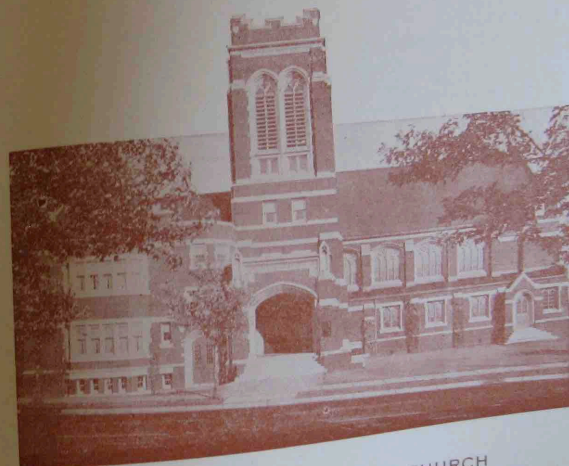
Some day some nation must take that path—
