FIFTY-FIVE YEARS AGO TOMORROW

On January 18, 1871, Pilgrim Church was formally organized by a Council composed of the Reverend J. L. White of Plymouth Church, St. Paul; the Reverend H. A. Stimson and Mr. D. B. Barber of Plymouth Church, Minneapolis; Messrs. C. S. Bardwell and W. H. Hatch of the Vine Street Church, Minneapolis, and the Reverend Richard Hall, then State Superintendent of Missions. The service was held in the old Pendleton Block, where the new Church continued to hold its meetings until July 16th, 1871. The first officers were Messrs. Jeremiah Kimball and William S. Woodbridge, deacons; Mr. George Spencer, clerk; Mr. O.K. Patterson, treasurer. The first board of Trustees consisted of Messrs. O. K. Tenney, Roger S. Munger, O. K. Patterson, Josiah D. Ensign and Ezra L. Smith. A Sunday School was organized at the close of the first Sunday morning service with thirty-two members. The first pastor of the Church was the Reverend Charles C. Salter who served from 1871 until 1876.

At a meeting of the new Church held February 21, 1871, it was voted to purchase two lots on the northeast corner of Second Street and First Avenue East as a site for a Church building.

On April 1, 1871, the building committee, with Mr. R. S. Munger as chairman, was ordered to proceed. The building was ready for dedication on Sunday, July 16, 1871. Building and grounds had cost \$5,500. For nearly eighteen years this building was the Church home of the Congregationalists of the city.

This building, now used for other purposes, stands at the southwest corner of First Street and Eighth Avenue East.

The Lake Avenue building was begun in May 1887, but was burned on November 27, 1887, so that the first services in the stone building were not held until 1889. The total cost of site, building and furnishings was \$55,828.33.

The present property was purchased in March 1915. The present building was begun July 10, 1916, and was dedicated December 23, 1917.

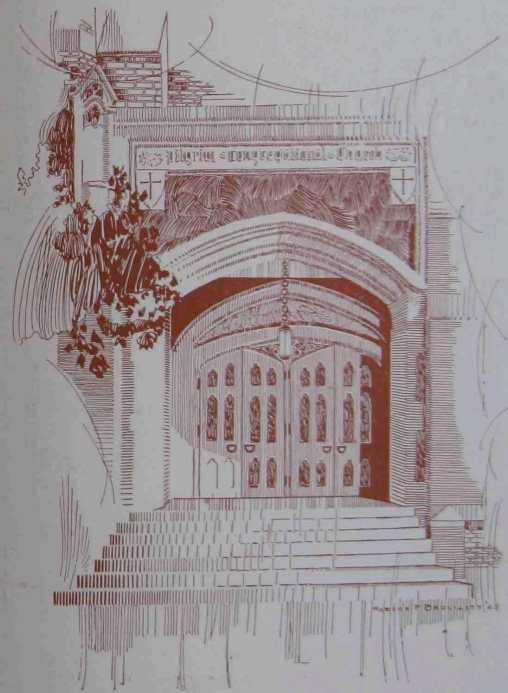

GOOD NEWS

Pilgrim Church Cradle Roll carries 79 names.

The membership of Pilgrim Church at the close of 1925 was 827.

A girls' choir is assisting in the ritual service of the Junior Department.

There are 63 enrolled in our Boy Scout troop, a gain of 6 over last year.

Girls ten years of age are now eligible to membership in our Girl Scout troop.

There is room for 20 more boys of pre-scout age in our Boy Ranger organization.

During the year eighty-eight new members were received. The net gain was sixty-two.

The Primary Department had an average attendance of 88% during the 1925 Church School year.

The Junior Auxiliary, the youngest organization in the church, raised \$1,496.23 during the year.

Seven of our Senior Department young people are serving successfully as teachers in our Church School.

The Junior Christian Endeavor Society won the attendance banner at the district Junior convention in the fall.

Fifty-six children under six years of age are enrolled in the Beginners' Department. The average attendance is 33.

An increasing number of the younger women of the church are attending the meetings of the Woman's Missionary Society. The Duluth Council of Churches is the local expression of the realization by the Christian Church of their common task.

The Friends in Council, the smallest organization in the church, raised \$245.25 for various missionary causes during the year.

THE REVEREND JEREMIAH KIMBALL

1841—1926

Jeremiah Kimball was born August the seventeenth, 1841, in Kittery, Maine, and was the son of a congregational minister. When he was about nine years of age the family moved to Andover, New Hampshire, and later to Wilmot. He attended the academy at Franklin, New Hampshire, and later the academy at Frysburg, Maine. On September the first, 1864, he enlisted in Company E First Volunteer regiment of New Hampshire, heavy artillery, at Concord and was honorably discharged June fifteenth, 1865.

On May the first, 1868, he was married to Nancy W. Hazen in Sutton, New Hampshire. He came to Duluth in 1869. Mr. and Mrs. Kimball were two of the charter members of Pilgrim church which was organized January the eighteenth, 1871. He was elected deacon on that date which office he held 1871-1874, 1875-1882, 1922-1925 and was elected honorary deacon for life in January, 1925. In 1880 he moved to Huron, South Dakota, as missionary of the American Sunday School Union organizing Sunday Schools for a period of ten years. He was ordained a congregational minister in Huron in 1891. Later he undertook work under the Congregational Home Missionary Society and organized the church at Weesington Springs, South Dakota, supplanting at three other stations for two years and later serving the church at Aurora, South Dakota. In 1894 he was called to the pulpit of Hope church, West Superior. Later he served churches in Tamarack, Aitkin and West Duluth.

He died Saturday night, June the nineteenth. The funeral service was held from Pilgrim church last Tuesday. Members of Gorman-Culver G. A. R. Post, of which Mr. Kimball was chaplain, attended and conducted a part of the service. His wife, a daughter Anna N. Kimball and a son Edward L. Kimball survive.

At a special meeting held Monday, June the twenty-first, the deacons of Pilgrim church expressed their appreciation of Mr. Kimball's devotion to this church and his interest in its welfare. The minutes read:

"The death of Jeremiah Kimball is a personal loss to every member of Pilgrim church and the influence of his devoted christian life is a heritage to be cherished. He was one of the organizers of this church. Interested in the better things in life he contributed, in large measure, to the spirit and the purpose that controls and guides Pilgrim church. He was zealous of its welfare, devoted to its service, prophetic of its widening field. His was a life of service, fulfilling the injunction 'Do justly, love mercy, and walk humbly with thy God.'"

WILLIAM G. HEGARDT

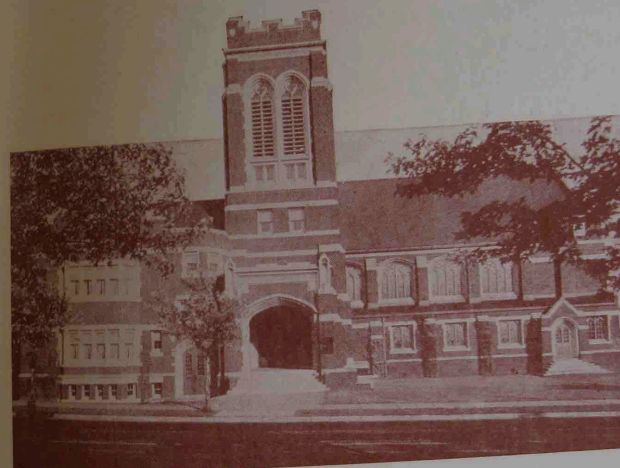
