HEARD AT THE ANNUAL MEETING

Mrs. A. L. Gerry, president, reported for the Department of World Fellowship of the Women's Assembly, formerly the Woman's Missionary Society. Ten meetings were held during the year with an average attendance of 46 and with two outside speakers, Miss Priscilla Holton and Mrs. H. M. Irwin. Four delegates were sent to the State conference in May. The society entertained the church at the fall reunion with a missionary play, "Mrs. Lively's Operation". Four barrels of clothing valued at \$428.50 were sent during the year to Talladega College and to Mr. Muhonen for distribution in his parish. The Thank Offering amounted to \$125.78, and was sent through the church treasurer for division between Dr. Watson's hospital in China and special young people's work in Minnesota. In December the society adopted the proposed new constitution and voted to become the Department of World Fellowship of the Assembly. "Come to one of our meetings and you will come again."

Mrs. E. L. Armstrong, president, reported for the Junior Auxiliary. Meetings were held monthly from January to May and weekly during the fall months. An evening group of members who were unable to attend the day meetings also met every week during the fall months. A picnic in June afforded an opportunity for the day and evening groups to meet together. Sewing for St. Luke's Hospital in the spring, taking charge of the Teachers College banquet in May, furnishing the baby booth at the Sale and decorating for the Christmas luncheon were among the activities of the Auxiliary. Five hundred dollars was paid into the Assembly treasury, and a balance of \$405.50 is on hand. "It would not be so easy to estimate the friendliness and good fellowship which the members derived from working together, which after all is the purpose of all the Assembly groups."

Mrs. W. B. Matter, president, reported for the Women's Assembly. Five meetings and luncheons were held during the year with an average attendance of 75. Outstanding events of the year were the All-Assembly valentine party in February; a musical tea for members and their friends in May; a garden party at the S. E. Matter home in July; the Christmas sale and luncheon and the carnival in December. Among the receipts were: Easter eons, etc., \$495.45; musical tea, \$115.00; pledges, \$447.50; lunch-\$500.00; Christmas sale, \$562.07. HEARD AT THE ANNUAL MEETING

C. D. Stillman, chairman of the committee on religious education, reported for the seven departments of the Church School. The total enrollment was 378 and the average attendance 266, an increase of 13 over the preceding year. Plans for 1929 in the Beginners department include a closer relationship between the parents and the Sunday School through the story lists, copies of simple prayers and graces to be sent out to be used by the parents. This department also hopes to have some new furnishings in the near future. Thirty Primary graduates this year received Bibles as gifts from the Church upon their promotion to the Junior department. Teachers in the Junior department express themselves as well pleased with the new Pilgrim Press curriculum adopted this year. This department as usual shows the highest percentage of attendance to enrollment. During the year the Senior department was divided, the classification corresponding to that of the Junior-Senior high schools. Mr. Noyce had charge of the younger group known as the Intermediates. The worship service of this department was planned and carried out by the officers assisted by the superintendent. Sunday night suppers with group discussions were a feature of the Senior department. The plan of having the two older classes elect their courses instead of being assigned to classes was tried and found satisfactory. Among the activities of the missionary department were the sending of friendship bags to Mexican school children, entertaining the Japanese dolls, and carrying out the usual Thanksgiving and Christmas projects. In closing his report Mr. Stillman paid high tribute to the work of Mr. Noyce as director of religious education in this church. "How ably and well he filled that position for over two years is known to us all. The influence of his personality and character upon our young people can never be forgotten."

THE CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS OF THE DEPARTMENT OF WORLD FELLOWSHIP OF THE WOMEN'S ASSEMBLY

Adopted December 12, 1928.

Article I. Name.

The name of this department of the Women's Assembly of Pilgrim Church shall be "The Department of World Fellowship."

Article II. Object.

The object of this organization shall be the study of Christian living and the promotion of Christian work, especially of those enterprises for which Pilgrim Church is responsible.

Article III. Membership.

Every woman in the Assembly shall be considered a member of this society.

Article IV. Officers.

The officers of this society shall be a president, a vice-president, a recording secretary, a corresponding secretary, a treasurer and an auditor.

Article V. Executive Board.

The executive board shall consist of the officers, the representative of the society on the State board, and the chairmen of the program, membership and box committees.

Article VI. Amendments.

These articles may be amended at any regular meeting by two-thirds of the votes cast by the members present, notice of the proposed change having been given at a previous meeting.

BY-LAWS

Article I. Meetings.

1. The meetings of this society shall ordinarily be held on the third Wednesday of each month except July and August. Special meetings may be called by the president.
2. The annual meeting shall be held in December.
3. The executive board shall meet at the call of the president.

Article II. Finances.

1. Major appeals for money or boxes shall be referred to the advisory board of the Assembly. Minor appeals are to be cared for through the regular silver collection.
2. No money-raising enterprise shall be undertaken without the approval of the advisory board of the Assembly.

Article III. Elections.

1. Election of officers shall ordinarily be held at the annual meeting. The president, vice-president, recording secretary, treasurer and auditor shall be elected annually. The corresponding secretary and the representative on the State board shall be elected for a period of five years beginning with 1928.
2. Acceptance of the report of the nominating committee shall constitute an election.

Article IV. Duties of Officers.

1. The president shall preside at all meetings of the society and of the executive board and shall have general oversight of the work. She shall appoint committees as hereinafter designated and shall be a member ex officio of all standing committees. She shall make an annual report.
2. The vice-president shall assist the president and shall perform the duties of the president in her absence.
3. The recording secretary shall keep the minutes of each meeting of the society and of the executive board, preserve the records, and write into the constitution and by-laws in their proper place in the record book any amendments to them hereafter made. She shall make an annual report.
4. The corresponding secretary shall conduct the correspondence of the society.
5. The treasurer shall keep account of all money received and disburse the same on order of the society or of the executive board. She shall make a report at each meeting and an annual report.
6. The auditor shall audit the books annually and shall be prepared to report to the society on all matters relating to the church apportionment.

Article V. The State Representative.

The State representative shall keep in touch with the State work and report regularly to the executive board and, when called upon, to the society.

Article VI. The Executive Board.

The executive board shall constitute the president's advisory board. It shall have power to make recommendations to the society and may transact minor matters of business.

Article VII. Quorum.

A quorum shall consist of ten members assembled at a regularly called meeting.

Article VIII. Committees.

There shall be three standing committees: a membership committee of three members, a program committee of five members, and a box committee of three members. The president shall appoint the membership committee and the chairman of the box committee at the January meeting, and the program committee and a nominating committee at the June meeting. The members of the box committee shall be named by the chairman of that committee.
