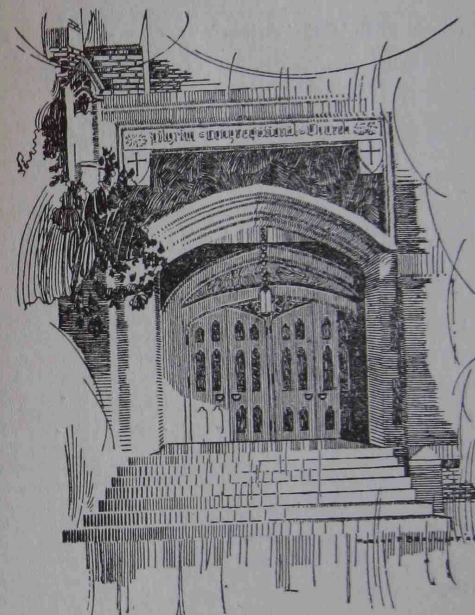

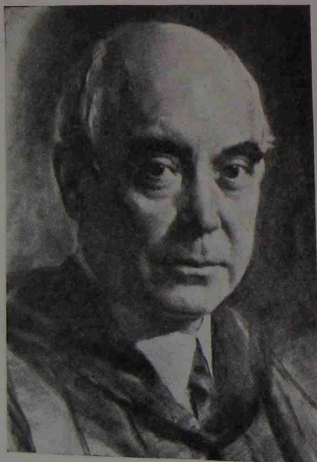

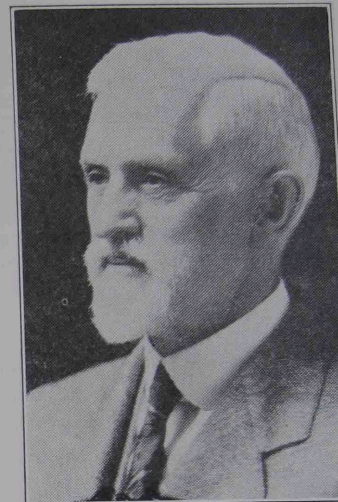

OSCAR MITCHELL

1863—1937

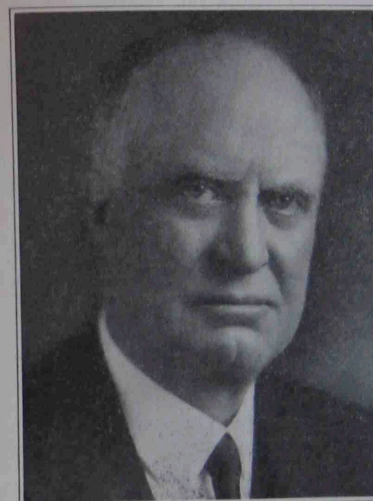
Oscar Mitchell was born August 10, 1863, on a farm in Greene county, Illinois. He was educated in the public schools and at the University of Michigan. Before beginning his law profession he taught school for several years. In 1891 he was admitted to the practice of law in Minnesota and established law offices in Duluth. On July 7, 1892, he and Miss Mary Wildey were married and came to make their home in Duluth. Through the years Mr. Mitchell gave unsparingly of his time and interest to civic affairs.

In 1895 he united with Pilgrim Church and from that time on the welfare of the Church was constantly in his thoughts. For more than 32 years Mr. Mitchell served as chairman of the Board of Trustees and it was largely due to his wise and thoughtful judgment that the Church came through many crises and without debt. His devotion and love to his Church and the principals for which the Church stands was unflinching. The Church has suffered a deep loss in Mr. Mitchell's death.

Services for Mr. Mitchell were held at the Church on Saturday, February 20, and interment made at Forest Hill. Mr. Mitchell is survived by his wife, two sons and two daughters.

OSCAR MITCHELL

1863—1937

The Board of Trustees and the Board of Deacons of Pilgrim Congregational Church of Duluth, Minnesota, in joint meeting assembled, on Wednesday, February 24, 1937, are vividly mindful as they gather of the loss they and the Church have sustained in the death on February 17, 1937, of their esteemed and beloved colleague, Mr. Oscar Mitchell. His long association with the Church includes forty-two years as a member, thirty-seven years as a Trustee and more than thirty-two years as its wise and active chairman.

We desire to express and record our gratitude for the privilege of working at his side through many years; our appreciation of his sustained and faithful service and his many gifts of time and means, and of his wisdom and judgment applied in utmost conscience and devotion, to the affairs of the Church.

The city of Duluth and the various institutions which Mr. Mitchell served with greatly miss his counsel and his generous and sincere devotion to the projects to which he gave his support.

In all these activities in which his initiative and judgment were vital he carried himself as the Christian gentleman and democratic citizen. We record our conviction that his faith and his practice of the Christian virtues were both exemplary and admirable, governing and stimulating his life; and that it was his love for his God and his fellow-man throughout his entire life which impelled him to render such rare and effective service to the Church.

It shall be our aim to maintain the spirit of Christian service and the sound practice in the business affairs of Pilgrim Church for which Mr. Mitchell was so stalwart a champion—and to keep before us the example of his manly, vigorous yet humble and reverent life.

To his family we extend our deepest sympathy, and commend them to the care of the loving God and Father: and we assure them of the sympathy and the gratitude of the members of Pilgrim Church, whose prayers and kind thoughts are going out in their behalf.

OSCAR MITCHELL 1863-1937

42 years a member (since 1895)
37 years a trustee (since 1900)
32 years chairman of trustees (since 1905)

These dates mean that the Mitchell family's association with Pilgrim began the year before the church celebrated its 25th anniversary. We were then in the Lake Avenue church. Mr. Mitchell's service as Chairman of the Trustees included the important and critical years of planning, financing, and building the present church and the growth which followed those years.

See Bulletin for October 29, 1916, for address by M r. Mitchell at laying of cornerstone.

Mr. Mitchell accepts keys of new church at dedication service 12/23/17.

Mr. Mitchell on pulpit committee to seek new minister after resignation of Rev. Charles Thorp, October, 1919. Elderkin called.

Mr. Mitchell on committee to finish rear of pulpit and choir area in 1921.

Mr. Mitchell was one of the spokesmen for Pilgrim when Dr. Ryan, rector of St. Paul's, died 1922.

The Mitchells contributed to the social life of the church. In 1908, the Church Conference met in Duluth and the delegates were guests of Mr. and Mrs. Mitchell at a launch ride and dinner at the Boat Club. In 1921, Mr. Mitchell made a trip to Europe on the Aquitania. He was welcomed home by churchmen at a dinner and was the speaker at a Harvest Dinner in September.

MARY WILDEY MITCHELL (1868-1962)

Also a member since 1895.

In 1917 Mrs. Mitchell was one of the sponsors for a church class in nursing and dietetics.

In 1919 she was the pianist for the Thursday evening church services for January.

See Bulletin for 11/14/20 for the eulogy for the wife of the late Rev. Alexander Milne, former Pilgrim pastor. Written by Mrs. Mitchell, possibly since they had been friends and neighbors when the Milnes lived in the manse at 1311 E. First St. and the Mitchells lived at 1102 E. 1st St.

MARGARET MITCHELL joined the church on May 16, 1976.

In June, 1922, according to the bulletin, she sailed for a summer in Europe. In December of that year she was a student at Smith College. (Oscar, Jr. was at Blake.) After that time I am fairly sure that she was noted as returning from schools in Europe and others in this country, but I did not take time to check that out.

OSCAR MITCHELL, JR. joined the church in 1946.

There is another daughter listed in the obit, but I have no information on her except that she once entertained her Sunday School class with Julia Marshall.

Pilgrim Church will observe its custom of placing memorial lilies on Easter Sunday. Those who wish to have such memorials are asked to call the Church Office.

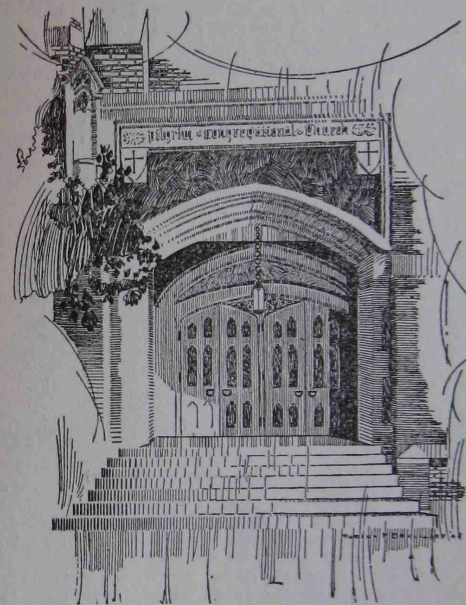

Thomas Craig McQueen was born at Milton, North Dakota, in 1903. His family moved to Pembina, North Dakota, and it was there that he received his early education. After his graduation from the High School at Pembina, he went to Winnipeg and enrolled in the University of Manitoba. In 1924 he graduated with the degree of Bachelor of Arts. In 1925 he entered Manitoba Theological College and was graduated from there in 1928.

While a student at the Theological College he was pastor at Warroad, Minnesota, and during his summer vacations traveled with the Dominion Chautauqua.

Mr. McQueen and his family are at home in the manse at 2426 East Fourth Street.

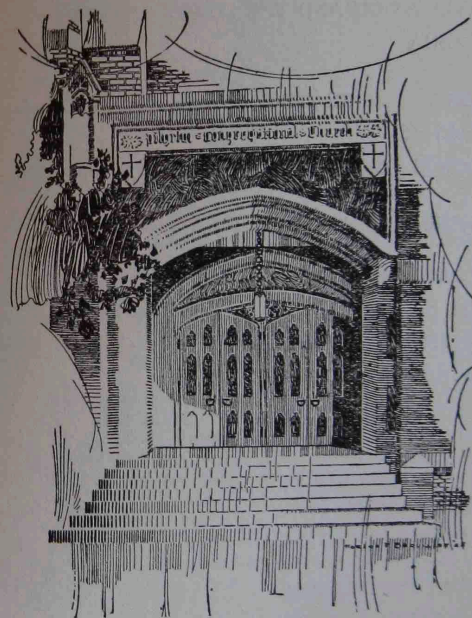
Pilgrim Church maintains a Church-time kindergarten to which parents may bring their children to be cared for while the parents attend the morning service.

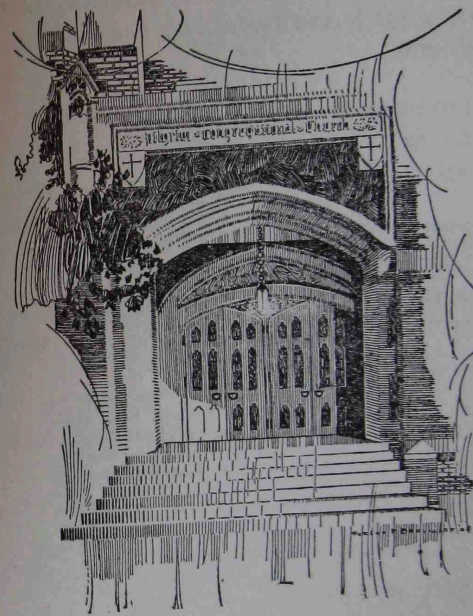

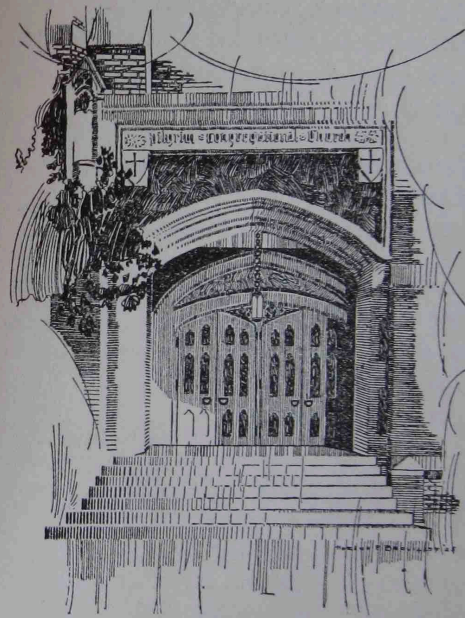
ANNA AARON LERCH

Minister:

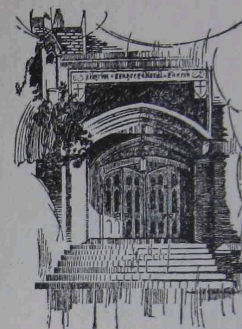
