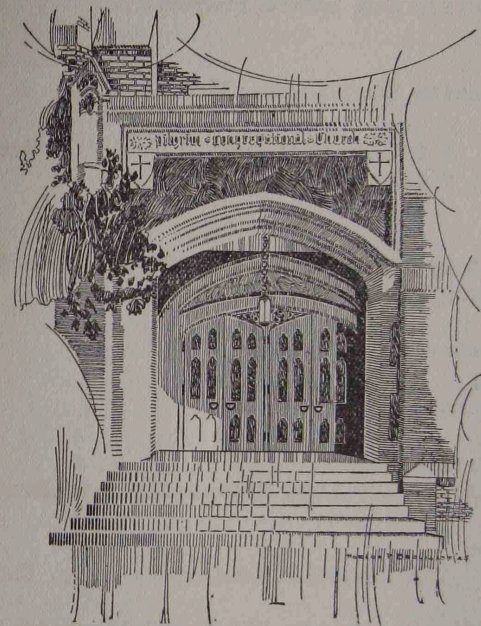
The Rev. and Mrs. McQueen will return to Duluth on February 13 in time for the first of the series of suppers.

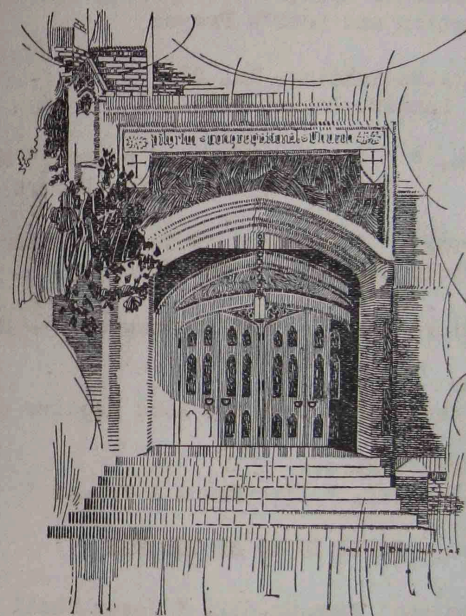
Agnes Johnson Newell

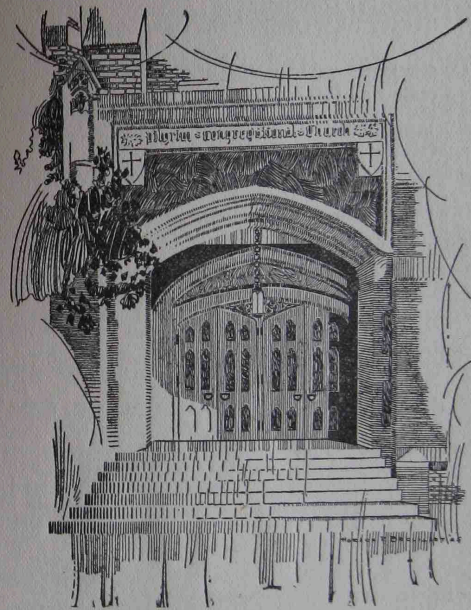
Lester M. Hunt

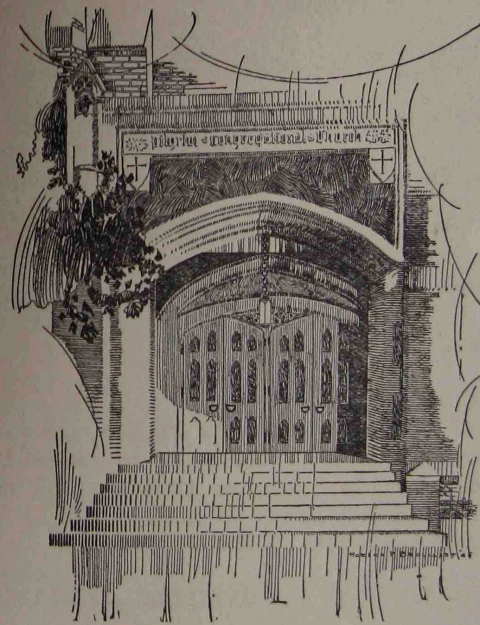
Daniel Arthur Munro was born in Duluth on June 28,

1855 - 1940

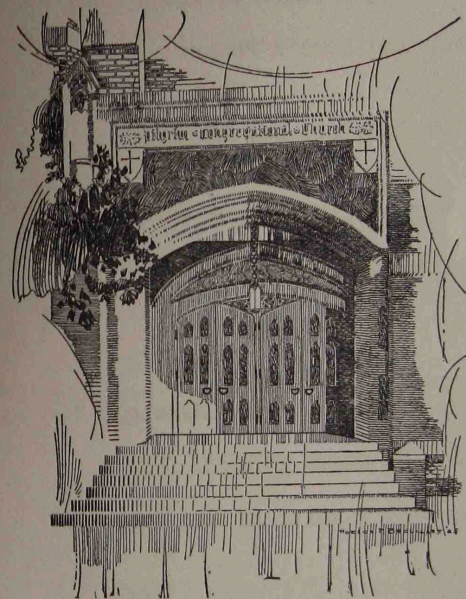

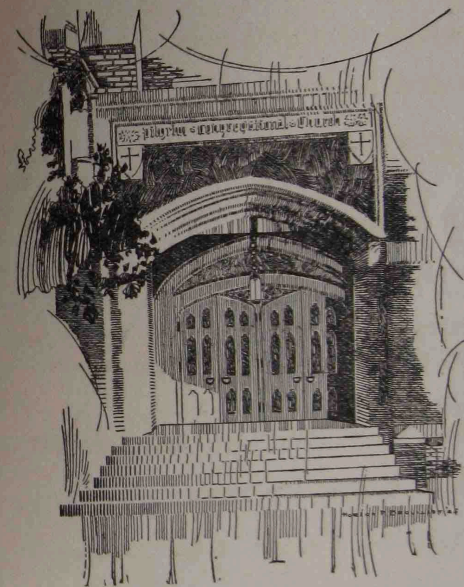
Robert Bliss McDonald

1874 - 1940

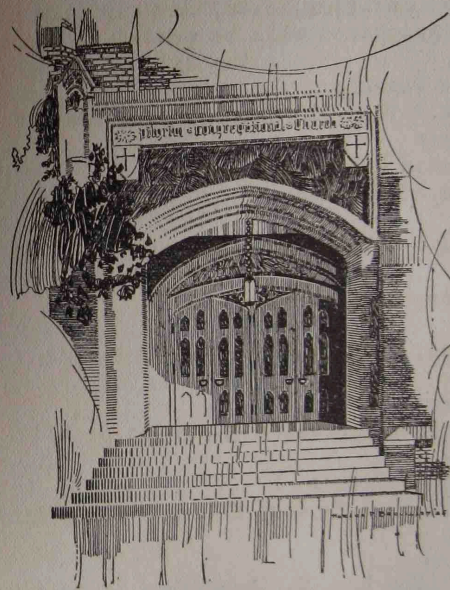

1852 - 1940

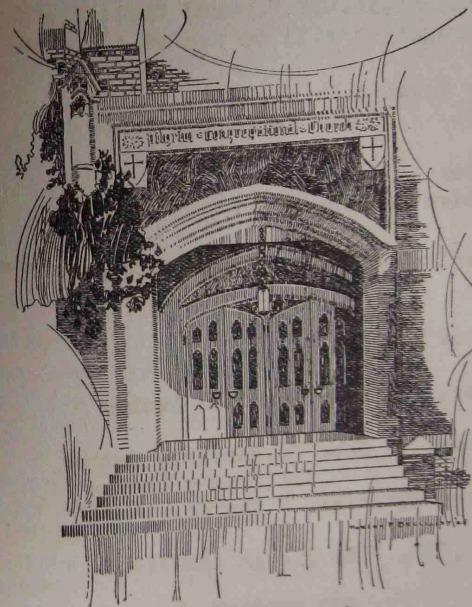

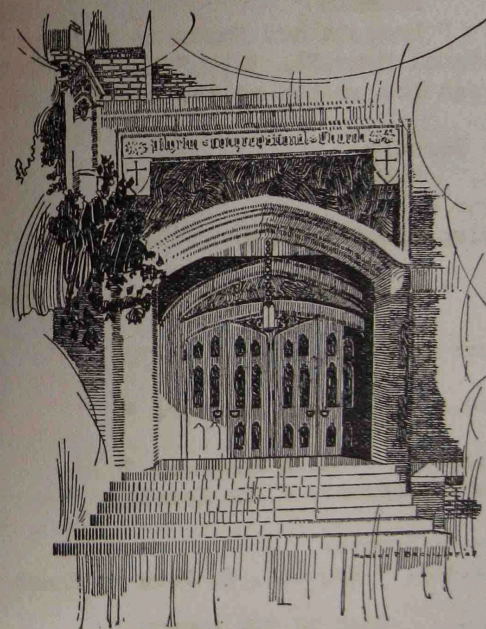

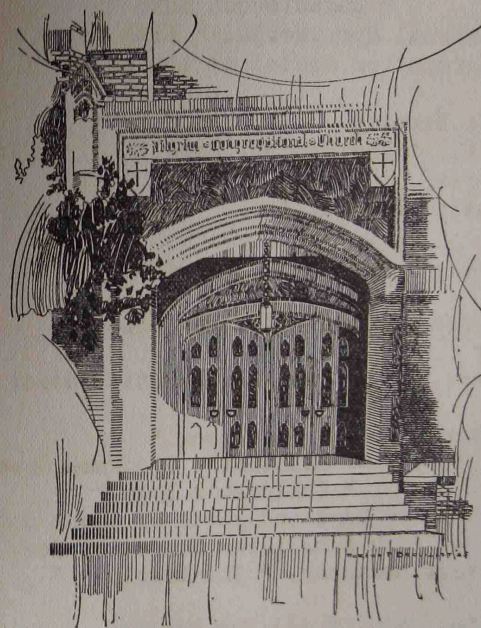
Nora B. Armstrong

1885 - 1940

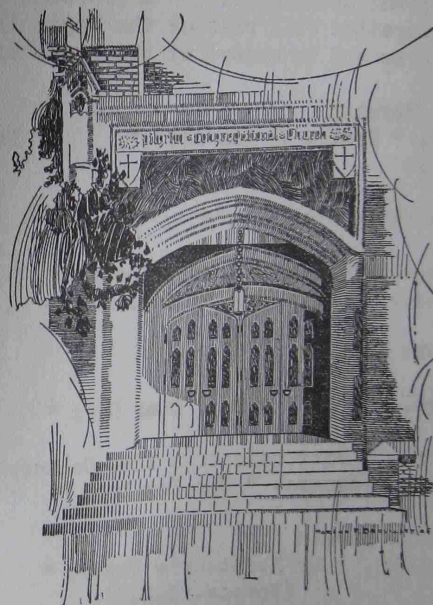

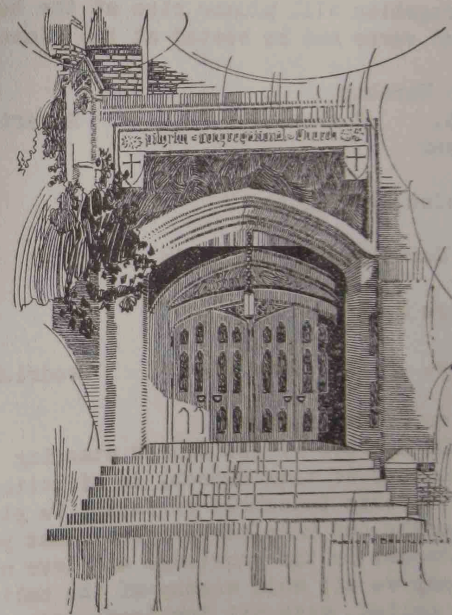
