

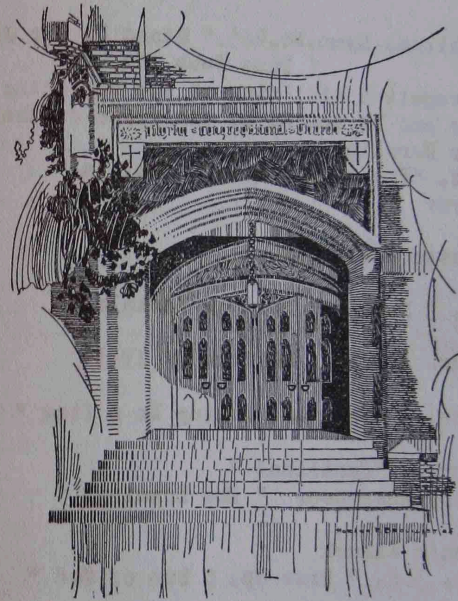

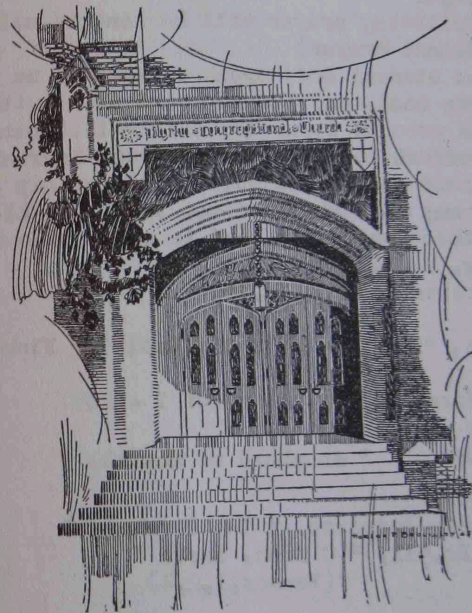

James Love Crawford
1863 - 1941

James Love Crawford was born on June 23, 1863, in Omagh County, Ireland. At the age of 18 he came to America. He visited Duluth but went to Knife Falls (Cloquet) to establish a drug store and while there he met and married Miss Lucy Ward. In 1889 they came to Duluth to establish their business and make their home. Mr Crawford united with Pilgrim Church in 1918 and remained one the most loyal and faithful members all through the years. After a brief illness Mr Crawford passed away on January 2. Services were held on January 4 and interment was made at Forest Hill.

Surviving members of Mr Crawford's immediate family are his wife, his son, W.W. Crawford and his two grandsons, W.W. Jr. and James.

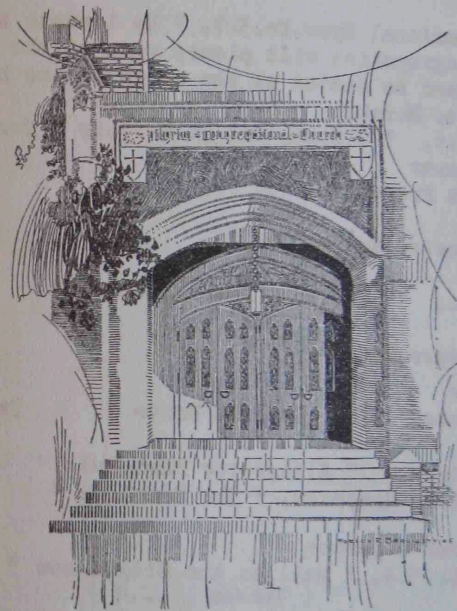

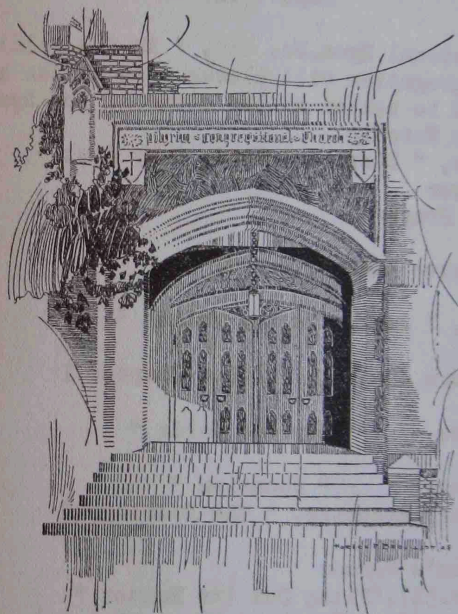

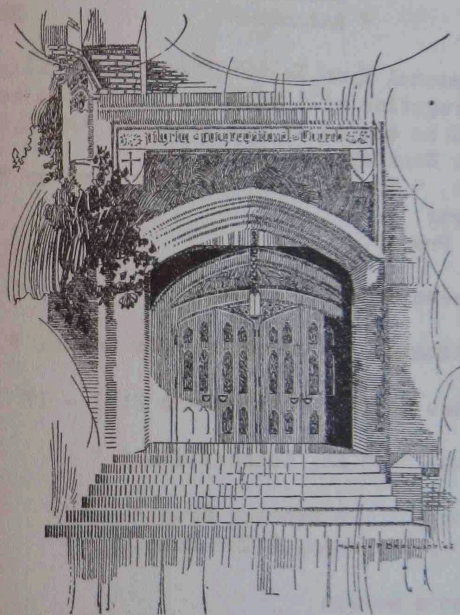

1861 - 1941

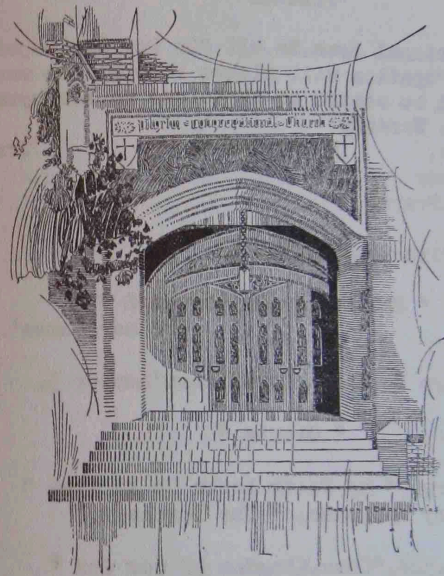

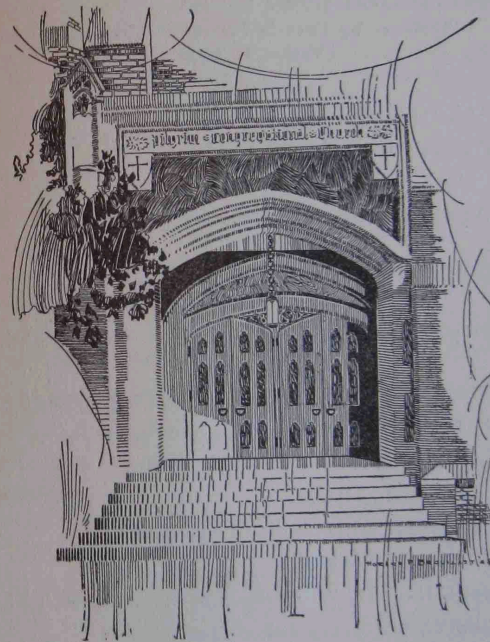
Eva Erickson Davern
