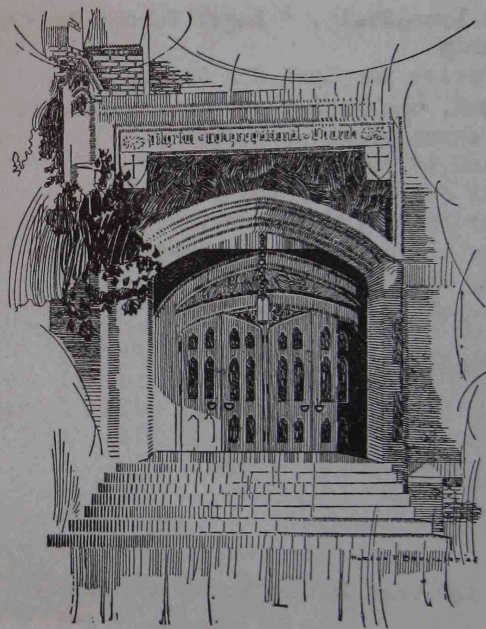

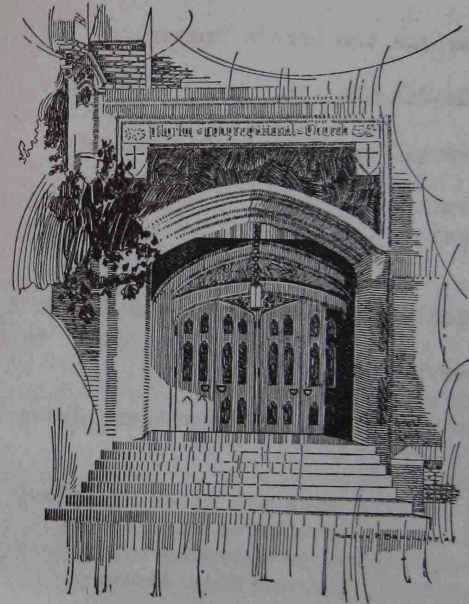

Frank E. Blodgett  
1879 - 1943

Frank E. Blodgett was born at Wauwatosa, Wisconsin, on October 19, 1879. He came to Duluth in 1890 and united with Pilgrim Church in 1895. In 1939 he was elected to the Board of Deacons and served continuously until his death, which occurred on January 8, 1943. No person ever was more faithful and loyal to his church than Mr Blodgett. He is survived by his sister, Miss Clara Blodgett.

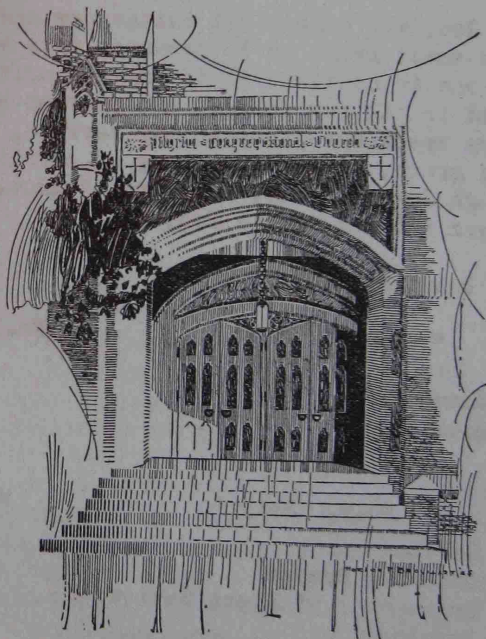

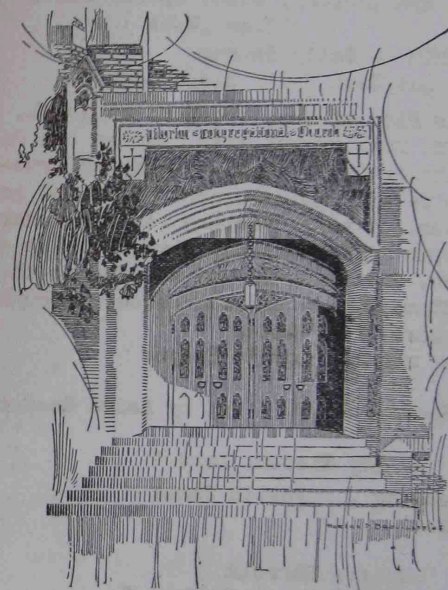

7:30 p.m. - Recreation

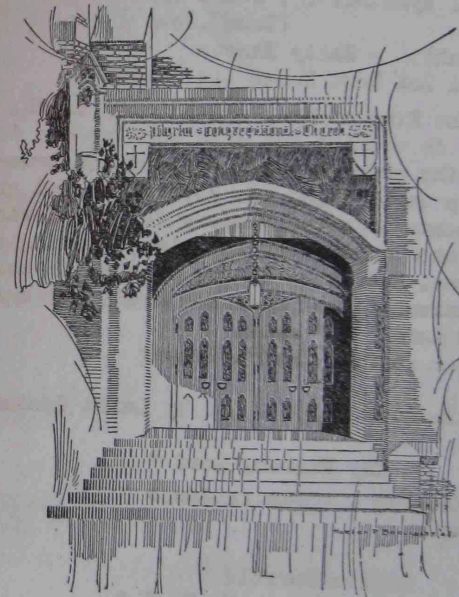

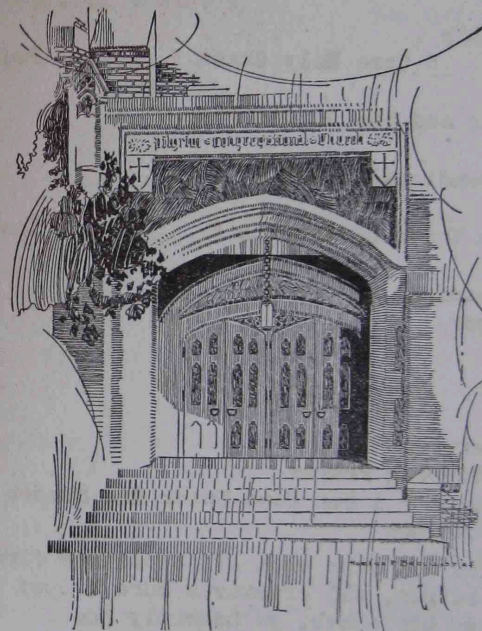

Mr Anderson passed away on January 29 and services were held on February 1, with interment at Forest Hill.

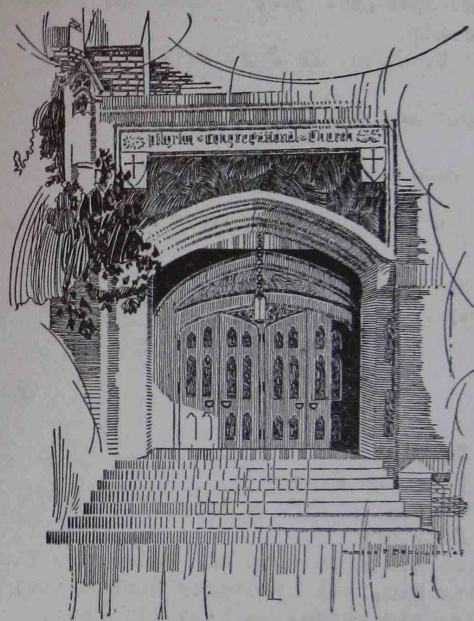

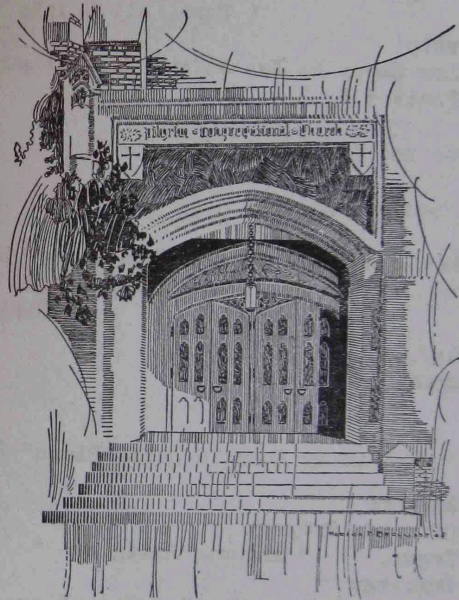

9. Temper your own group-drive with a civilized regard for the rights and liberties of other groups.

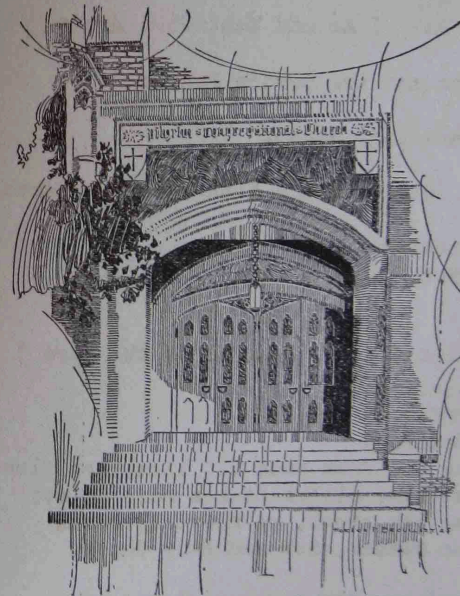

Reed R. Brunner was born in Duluth on August 13, 1910. He received his early education here and was graduated from Purdue University with a degree in Electrical Engineering. We Believe that no nation or combination of nations should interfere with the internal religious or governmental structure of another nation.

In international co-operation many questions will arise involving limitation of sovereignty, and the status of colonies.

We Believe that all such questions can and should be met by the application of the ideals which we have mentioned.

We Believe that, in order to afford equitable access to, and fair distribution of the raw materials of the world, and in order to provide air bases and the use of canals, rivers and harbors and other commercial facilities, each and every nation should be

ready and willing to surrender certain aspects of sovereignty upon fair and just terms, in the furtherance of international commerce and universal social and economic welfare, but that such surrender should probably be achieved through properly established international boards.

We Believe that the delicate and complicated problem of colonies should be approached by our nation from a realistic point of view and in a spirit of good will, mindful of the fact that the problem of the Philippines was once ours, and that we would not have tolerated interference by another nation or combinations of nations in our solution of that problem.

We Believe that the same ideals should govern the United Nations in their approach to this problem as we have declared should govern our nation in its relations with other nations, and that where colonies are satisfied with their present autonomy, partial self government or other form of alliance, that relationship should not be interfered with by outsiders because of possible minority groups, or otherwise. Colonies which are not satisfied with present relationships, should be left as they are for the present, unless the mother country, shall voluntarily choose to surrender total or partial sovereignty under stipulated conditions of mandates or protectorates looking to ultimate independence.

We Believe, however, that any such surrender of sovereignty should be voluntary, and not a "must" declaration of the United Nations, or any part thereof. The Golden Rule would sanction no other course.

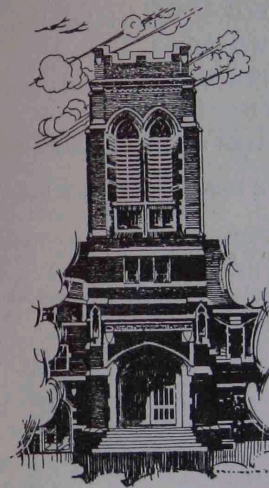

On June 22, 1893, at Kasson, Minnesota, she and Mr W.G. Hegardt were married and they came to live in Duluth.

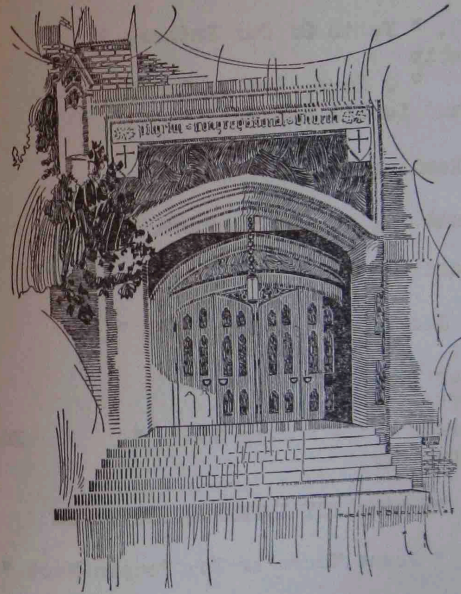

### HOW CHRISTMAS GOT ITS NAME

*Christmas gets its name from the mass celebrated in the early days of the Christian Church in honor of the birth of Christ, its first solemnization having been ordered by Pope Telesphorus. This was about the year 138, for in that year Pope Telesphorus died. At first Christmas was what is known as a movable feast, just as Easter is now, and, owing to misunderstandings, was celebrated as late as April or May. In the fourth century an ecclesiastical investigation was ordered, and, upon the authority of the tables of the censors in the Roman archives, December 25 was agreed upon as the date of the Saviour's nativity. Tradition fixed the hour of birth at about midnight, and this led to the celebration of a midnight mass in all the churches, a second at dawn, and a third in the later morning.*

*Among St. Augustine's writings there are thirteen sermons for Christmas Day, in one of which he remarks: "As the Church hath handed down, John the Baptist was born on the 8th before the Kalends of July (June 24). But the Lord was born on the 8th before the Kalends of January (December 25)."*

*St. Chrysostom, the "golden mouthed," preached a Christmas sermon in the city of Antioch on the 25th of December, A. D. 386, more than fifteen hundred years ago, and thus addressed his hearers: "You may expect a worthy reward for this your zeal from Christ; who to-day was born in the flesh."*
