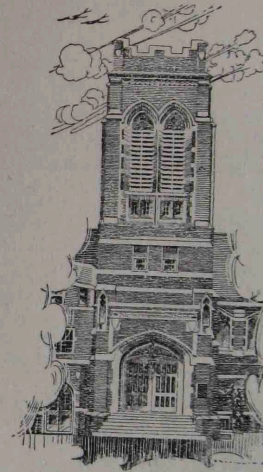
**Alternative to Futility** by Elton Trueblood.
