

THE PASTOR'S ROLE IN THE MINISTRY OF THE CHURCH

Recently, members of a committee studying theological education discussed three propositions: In general, a community is not better than its churches. In general, a church is not better than its minister. In general a minister is not better than his training.

Whatever truth these statements contain, the committee decided the pasto has a responsibility for decisive leadership. As one church leader commented, "The pastor must be a multiplier, never a dead-ender." He must manifest the contagion of the gospel so that it spreads through him to him people, and through them to the near-world and the farthest parts of the earth. He by no means has a monopoly upon this role. But when the pasto succeeds in multiplying the effects of the gospel, the church surges with new life.

This commonplace truth underscores the necessity for effective and continuing theological education for pastors. The role of the pastor in the ministry of the church is so crucial that only the best possible preparation for his task has a chance of being good enough. Only education that neve ends will equip him to relate the Good News to a world that is ever new





DIALOGUE IN KANSAI

Residents of a suburb of Kyoto, Japan's ancient capital, have been accustomed to the stream of people who come through the town to Nippon Christian Academy's Kansai Seminar House. Built just beneath brow of a low tree-covered hill, the Seminar House hosts a wide variety groups. Young leaders of Japan's new religions meet to talk about the new religions meet to talk about the new religions. life-style of today's youth. Labor union leaders discuss the problems foreign capital investment in Japan. Architects and artists share their sights with religious leaders. Medical doctors meet to discuss the problem of medical education and training and of professional ethics. Member department store staffs come to talk about their personal/professional velopment and their relationship to local industry. High-school teachers university professors discuss present-day educational problems. Christ staff of the center (or Christian experts—lay or clerical) are present provide Christian insight, input, and questions for the "dialogue." Over past several years, nearly a thousand people each month have come to Kansai Seminar House for such meetings, taking advantage of the chur sponsored facilities for overnight "retreats" which so easily occas serious reflection and dialogue.

As early as 1958, local pastors in the Kansai region began talking w university professors about what might happen if such dialogue could encouraged between Christians and largely non-Christian economic political, and religious groups. With the help of secular community group and of church groups from as far away as Germany and America (our Unit Church Board for World Ministries helped), their dream came to reality. Seminar House itself reflects the Japanese church's concern to becothe vital center from which a spirit of Christian concern, reconciliation, love can flow into the world.

AGREEMENT AT ADDIS ABABA

A bright chapter was written this past year when the Agreement of Addis A bright chapter was an end seventeen years of bitter conflict in the Sudan area Ababa brought to an end seventeen years of bitter conflict in the Sudan area Ababa brought to all characters and African Southerners. And the church was there.

A year before, Kodwo Ankrah, the World Council of Churches' Secretary for African Relief, became convinced that President Nimeiry's regime in Khartoum wanted a genuine settlement with the South Sudan Liberation Movement, if the leaders could be found and brought together. Christian Aid—a division of the World Council of Churches—helped the Southern leaders to meet and formulate a common position. Director Leopoldo I Niilus also worked step-by-step on the arrangements and negotiations in Addis, and Canon Burgess Carr of the All-Africa Conference of Churches served as moderator. The generous provisions of the Addis Agreement make it a far-sighted settlement of reconciliation, a model for other regions.

When the Agreement was signed, Emperor Haile Selassie, who lent his good offices, expressed gratitude by saying to the ecumenical team, "You were instrumental in reaching the happy result we witness today . . . You were able to bring two brothers together again. What joy is there more than this?"

CHRISTMAS: THE GOOD NEWS AND THE BAD

First the good news: The Kingdom of God is at hand! God comes again to claim his world for his own purposes. It is an act of love with power to change things in important ways. And change them he does! He frees people from all the little boxes we live in, boxes of fear and hate. He invites excluded lepers back in, to be a part of the community. He breathes on the dead and they live. He comes among widows and orphans, all those dedead and they live. The comes and long again. He enters the holy city which had become the city of greed and exploitation, and he claims it for his own

No wonder people rejoice. His kingdom abolishes all pretenders to authority.

Now for the bad news: Repent! That is a word nobody wants to hear bewould be. To repent is to take another look and see things differently. Take another look at our little power arrangements and give them up, because they do not bring life. Take another look at our best loved and deepest loyalties and abandon them, because they are less than healing. Take another look at our grossest fears and forget them, because they don't merit much attention. No wonder people resist. Because it's so radical.

Christmas is all of that, bittersweet-good news and bad. And we must come to terms with it. Christmas is for receiving and for abandoning, for turning loose and for starting again.





TIED TOGETHER BY CABLE

In San Francisco, the Northern California Conference of the United Church of Christ and the United Church Board for Homeland Ministries have joined in support of an unusual special project, a research project on cable television designed to study its potential as a resource to serve community

The project, under the direction of an experienced veteran of the mass media, will have three emphases. It will aid churches in raising questions about local community access to cable television when franchises for the service are being considered by municipal and county boards. It will help community groups to discover how specific needs, such as those of senior citizens or of young parents, can be served by cable television's ability to provide local programming. And it will help churches to develop new concepts of evangelism matched to the potential of cable television for reaching large masses of the population.

The Community Media Project, which is its name, will also be concerned with promoting fair employment of minority groups in television and other media. The main thrust of the total effort will be in the direction of tying the community together rather than allowing cable television, by default, to bring benefit to only one part of the community.
