• Through One Great Hour of Sharing, you help to maintain the Family Service Centers in the Occupied West Bank of the Jordan River. The technicians at the Centers have worked out a weaning formula for babies by using local foods. This is preventative medicine. Mothers are taught how to prepare the formula and they can secure it at the Centers. The Family Service Centers also operate a "well-baby" clinic for the necessary immunizations from children's diseases.

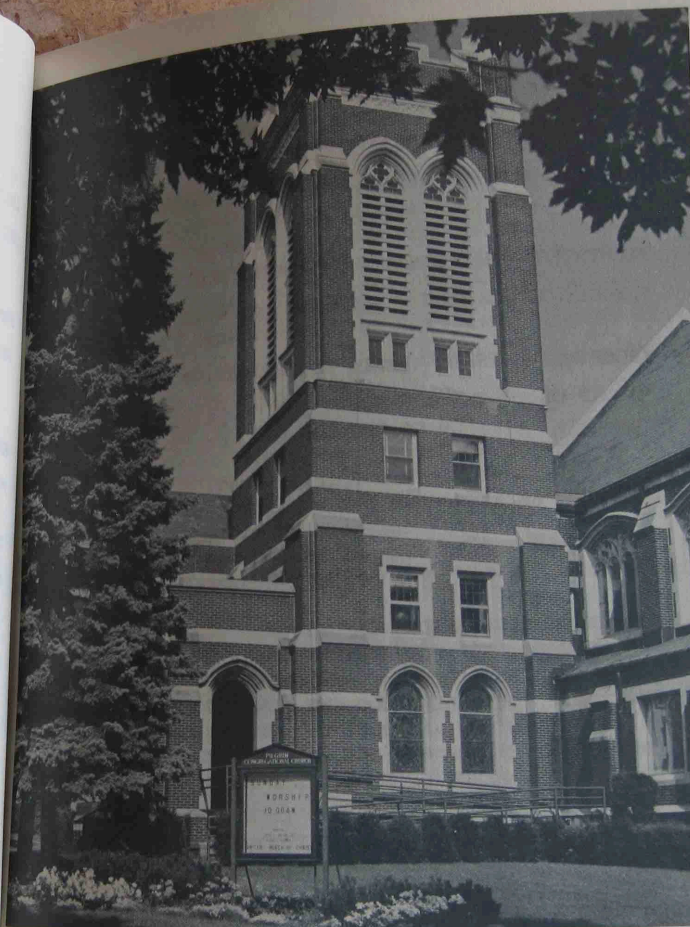

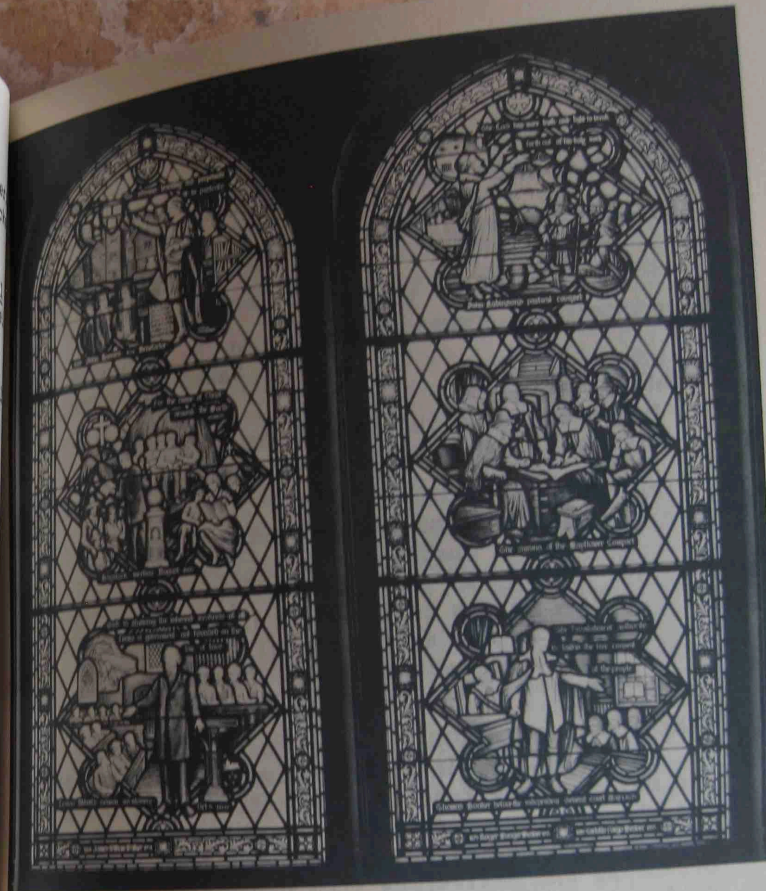


Photograph: Pilgrim Congregational Church, the third meeting house of the congregation, built in 1917.

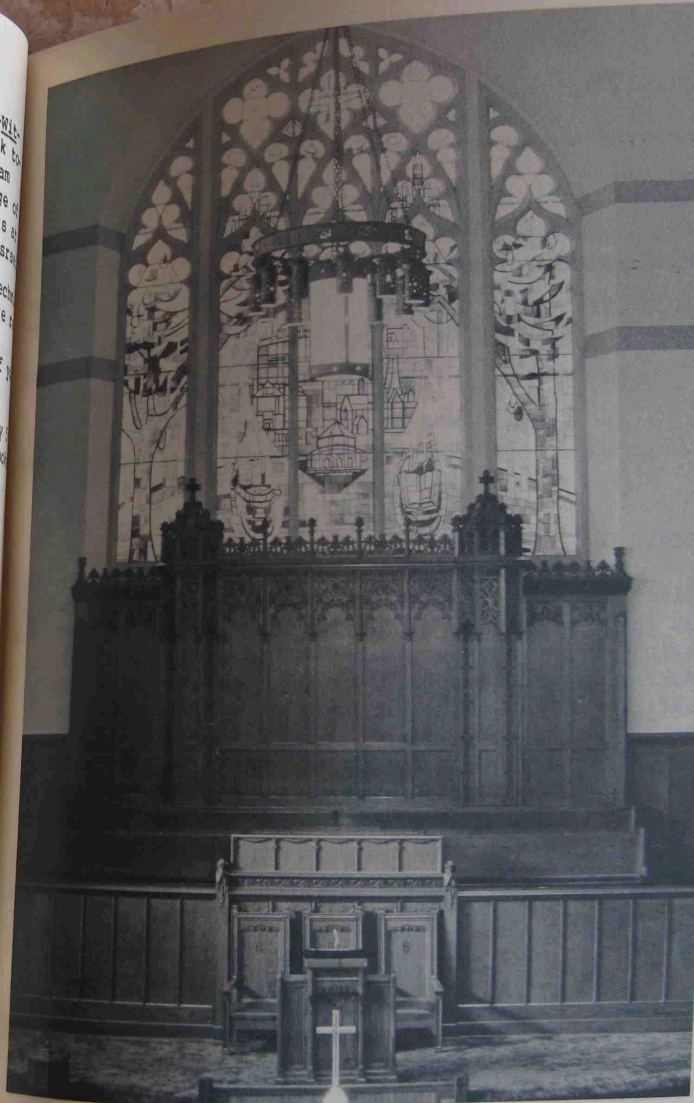

YOUTH CAMPS

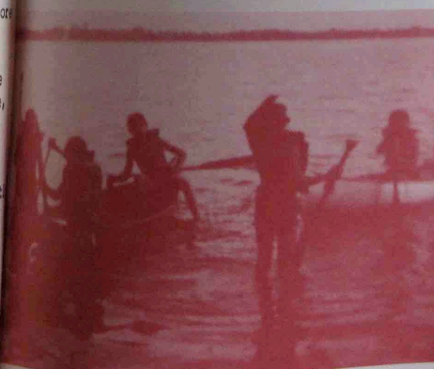

MINNESOTA SHARES IN CHURCH DEVELOPMENT

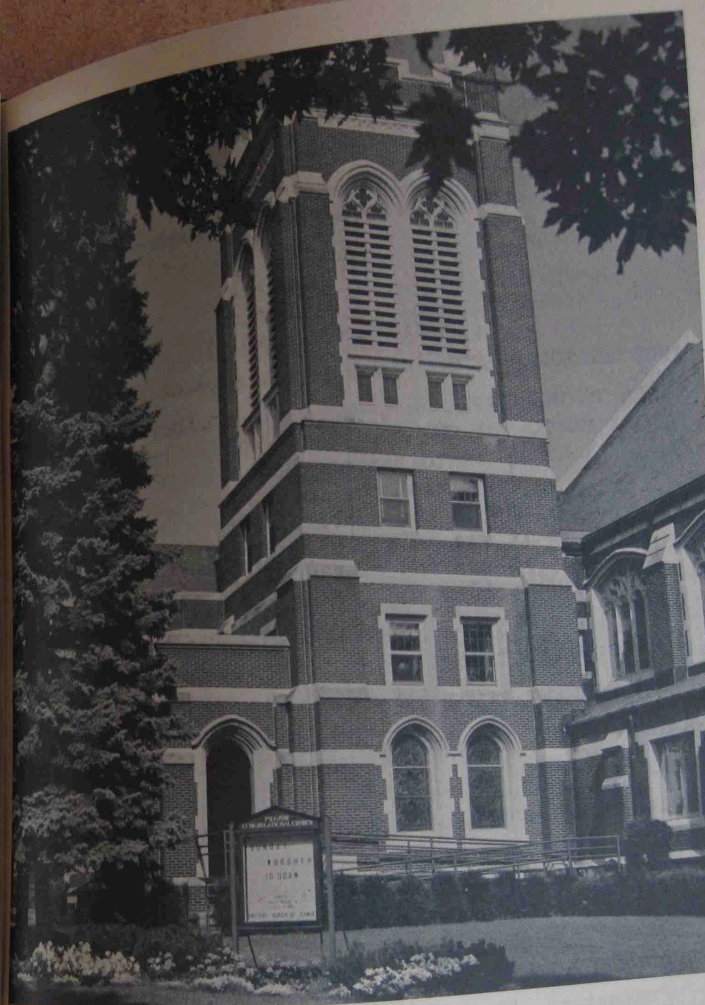

THE ORDER FOR CONFIRMATION

(Before confirmation the elders or diaconate shall be satisfied that the confirmands have been properly instructed in the Christian faith and desire to receive the rite. Confirmation shall be administered in the presence of the worshipping congregation, except in cases of extremity when it may be administered privately in the presence of elders or diaconate.)

After the sermon has been preached an elected representative of the church shall announce the names of the confirmands and invite them to stand before the congregation, saying:)

Dear friends in Christ: The church bestows on those who have been received into the fellowship of Christ through baptism the rite of confirmation. These persons have studied the word of God and have been instructed in the practice of the Christian faith. They are here to profess their faith and to be confirmed by God for service in his world.

(The minister shall say to the confirmands:)

You have come that God may claim you publicly for his service, confirm you in his covenant, and invoke upon you the Holy Spirit by whose help alone you are able to fulfill your vows.

Hear the Great Commandments:

"You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the great and first commandment. And a second is like it, You shall love your neighbor as yourself. On these two commandments depend all the law and the prophets."

Matthew 22:37-39

(The minister shall ask the questions and the confirmands shall answer:)

Do you confess your faith in God and pledge yourselves to live as disciples of our Lord Jesus Christ?

I confess my faith.

Do you promise, according to the grace given you, always to remain a faithful member of the church of our Lord Jesus Christ, to come to the Lord's table, to love and serve God in the world, bearing witness to the risen Lord?

I promise.

THE OWNING OF THE COVENANT

(The confirmands shall join the congregation in affirming the church covenant:)

We are united in striving to know the will of God as taught in the Holy Scriptures, and in our purpose to walk in the ways of the Lord made known or to be made known to us. We therefore join and covenant with each other to worship, work and serve together as loyal disciples of Jesus, to live within the human community a life of righteousness and neighborly love, and to do all within our power to promote the reign of God's will in all human relations.

(The confirmands shall kneel and the minister, laying a hand on the head of each one by one, shall say:)
Strengthen, O Lord, this your servant with your heavenly grace, that (he-she) may continue yours forever; and daily increase in (him-her) your Holy Spirit, until (he-she) comes into your everlasting kingdom. Amen.

Let us pray.

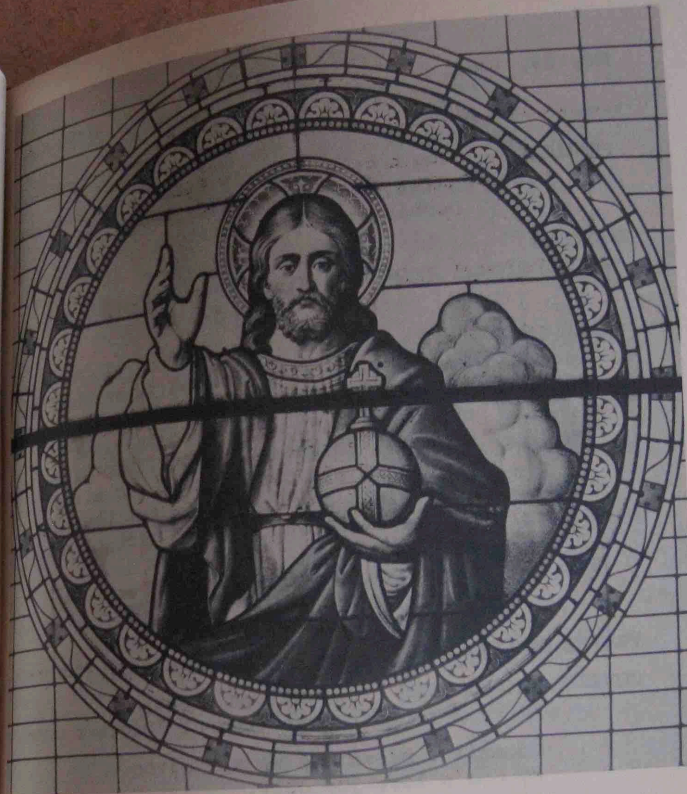


Photograph: Pilgrim Congregational Church, the third meeting house of congregation, built in 1917.

CELEBRATING TWENTY-FIVE YEARS

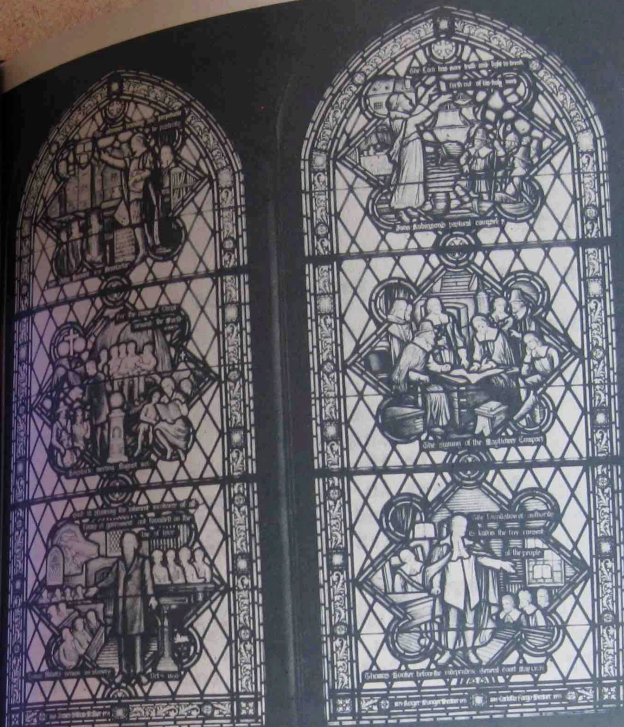

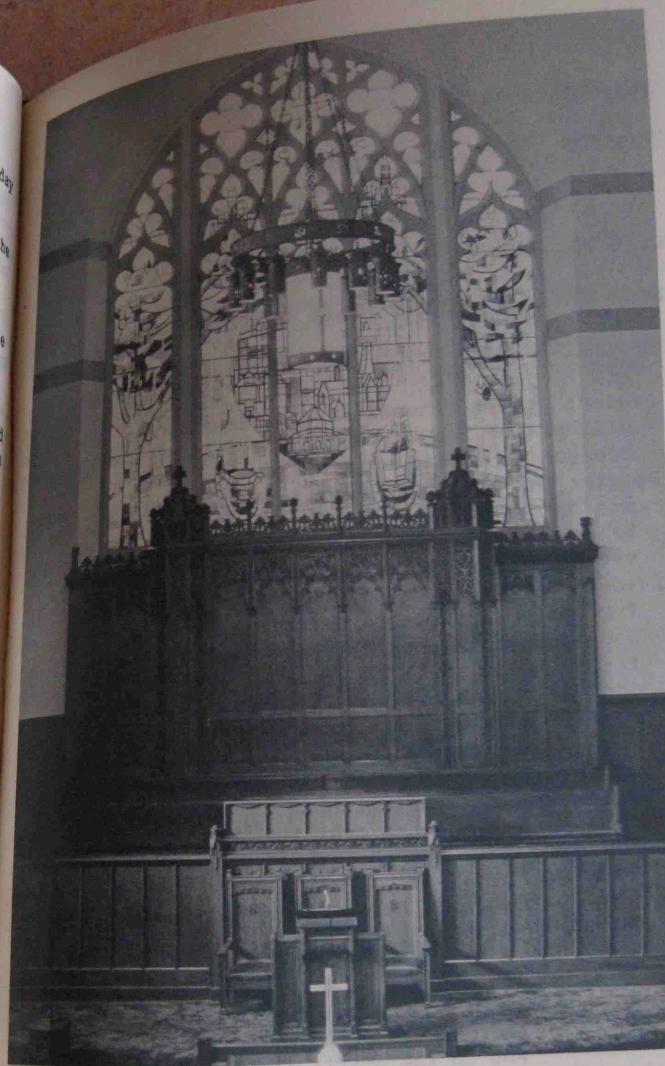


Photograph: The Roberts Window, dedicated in 1979, celebrates the contribution of Congregational churches to higher education.

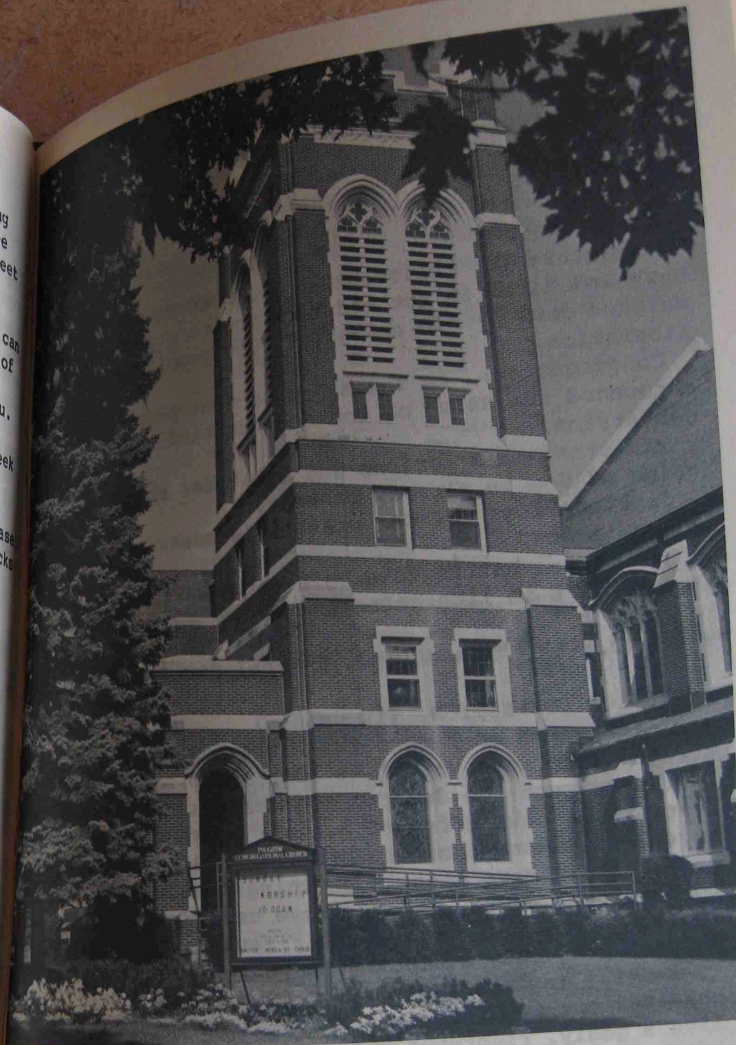

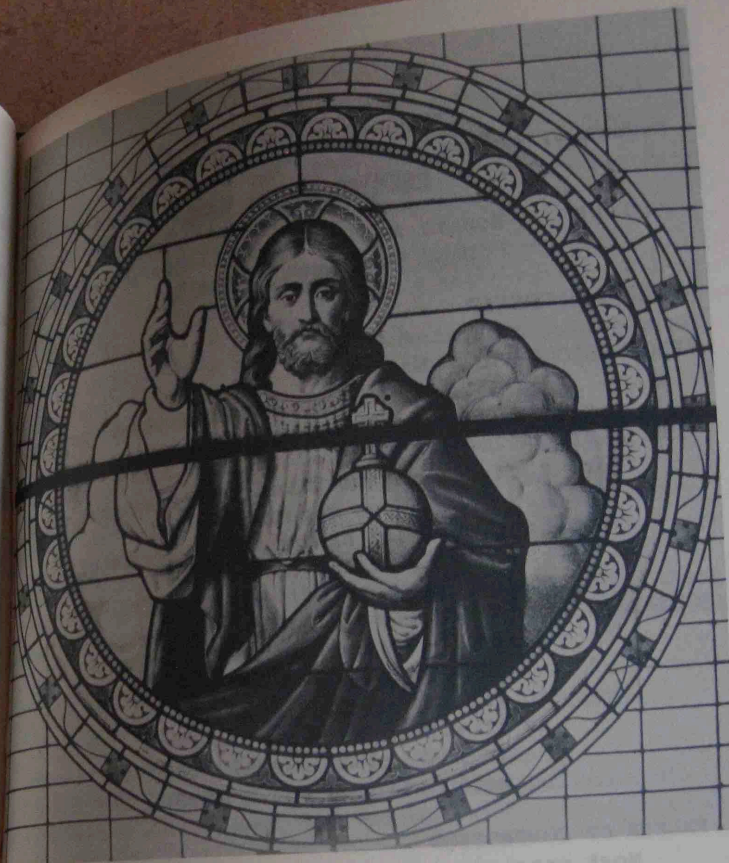

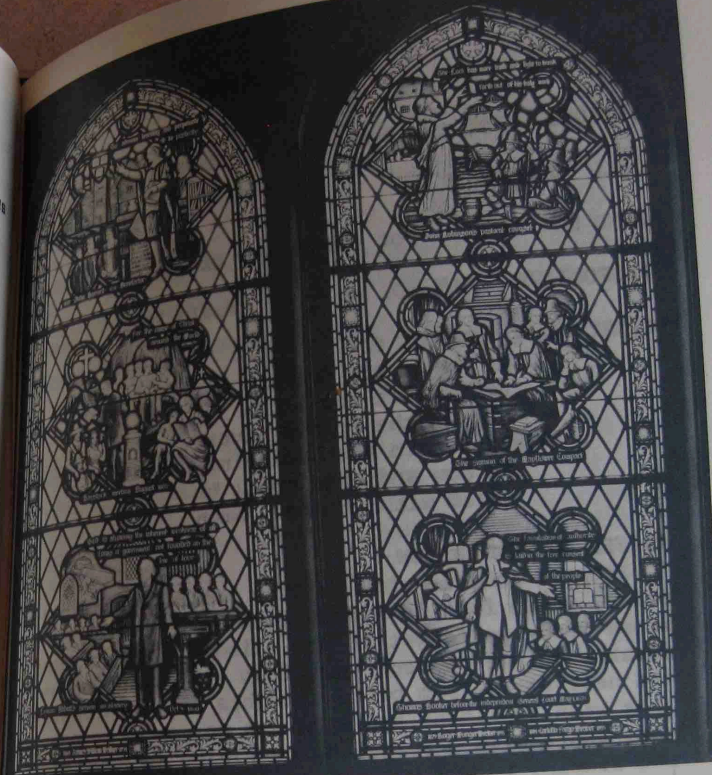


Photograph: The Munger Memorial Window in Chapel skylight, originally in Avenue Church 1888-1916.

Written by Rev. Bentz, a UCC minister, this book brings to light the transitions and needs of immigrant families in the U.S.

One of the persons who told her story to Rev. Bentz was Mirella Diaz, a woman who left Cuba with her husband and son to join relatives in Miami. This is her impression of her new home:

"In Cuba, I'd been a slave. I feel more at home on this strange soil. Americans opened their hearts. Everybody clasped our hands like real brothers and sisters. If the young people would only know how hard it is in other places to be free, filled, clothed, to have everything in hand. How precious freedom is! . . . I still can't believe it."

Through your gifts to the Neighbors in Need offerings in past years, the UCC Council for American Indian Ministry was able to determine the need for and help to start the first urban UCC American Indian church. All Nations Indian Church came into being during the fall of 1981 to meet the needs of American Indians in Minneapolis and St. Paul.

The gathering pastor, Rev. Harry Stroessner, has this to say about his new ministry:

"Because one-third of the Neighbors in Need offering goes to support Indian ministry, the Council for American Indian Ministry was able to start its first urban Indian congregation in the Twin Cities of Minneapolis/St. Paul.

"All Nations Indian Church is cooperating with the Native American Theological Association (N.A.T.A.) and United Theological Seminary in providing a field work experience for Native American Seminary students who are being trained for urban ministry.

" . . . it is the challenge for all of us in the Christian community to be involved in this first urban Indian congregation of the United Church of Christ."

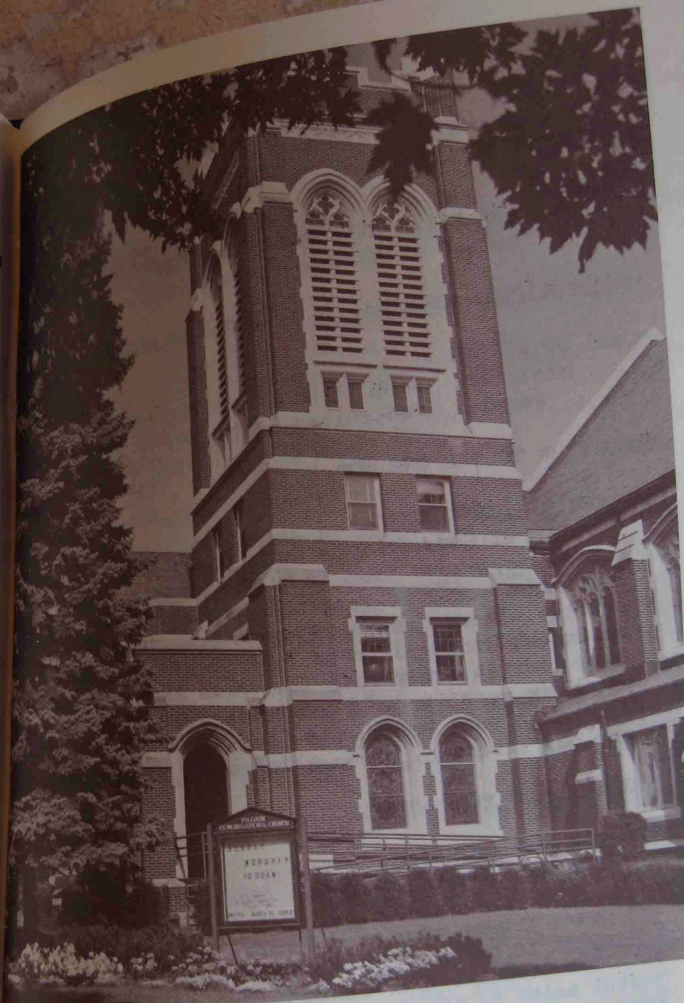


Photograph: The Roberts Window, dedicated in 1979, celebrates the contributions of Congregational churches to higher education.

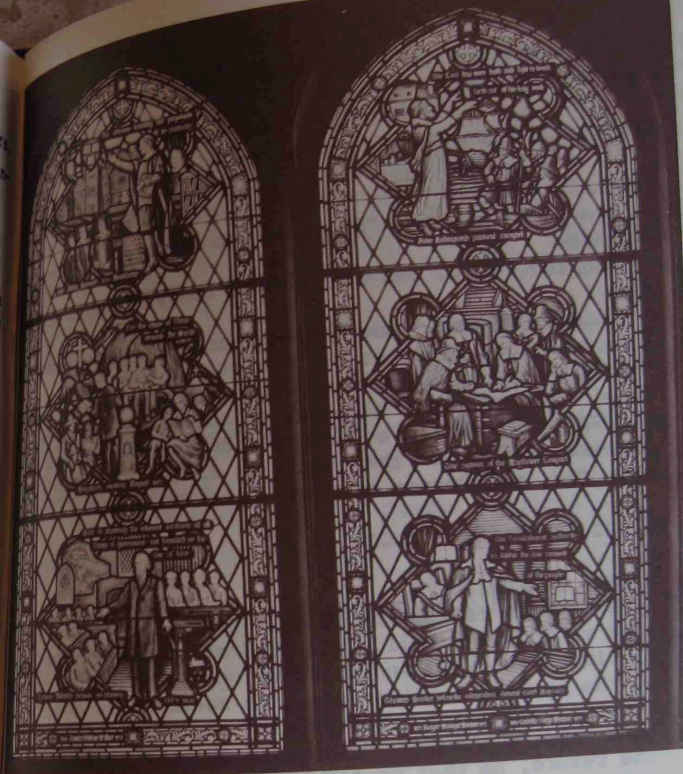


photograph: Pilgrim Congregational Church, the third meeting house of our congregation built in 1917.

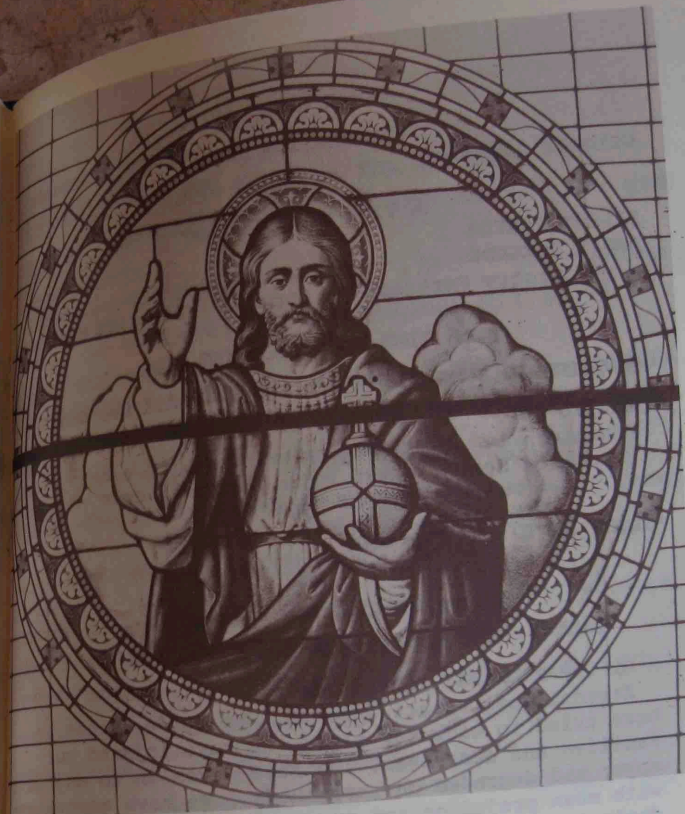

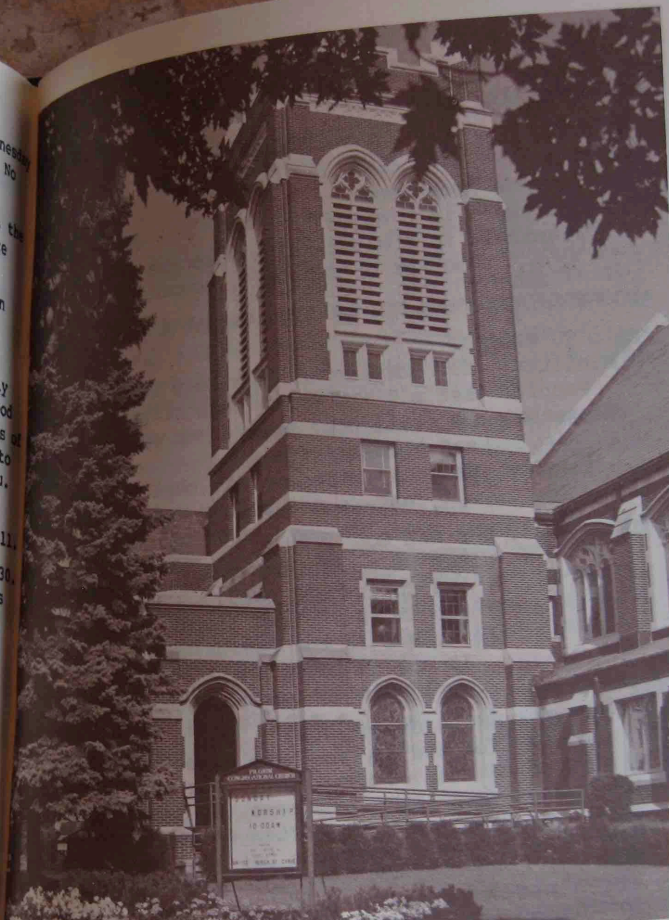

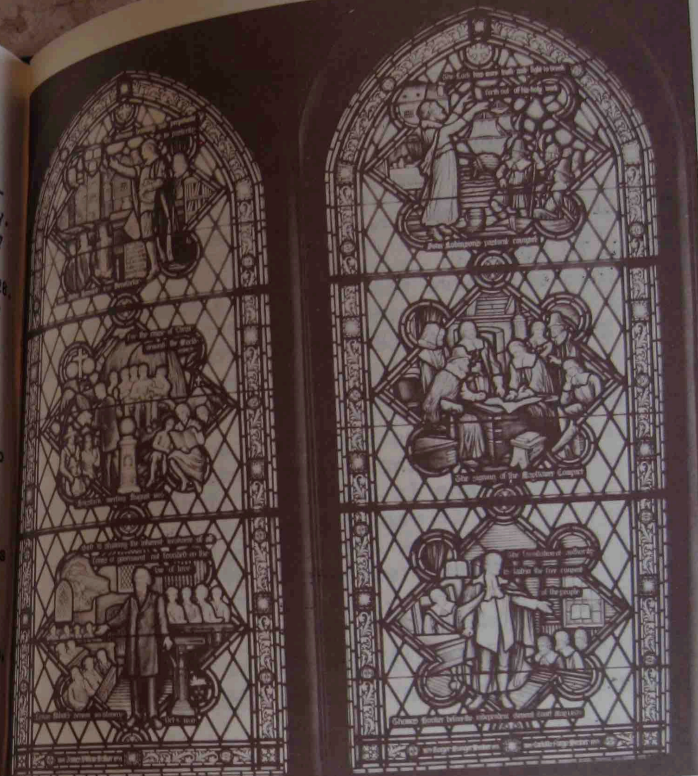


Photograph: Pilgrim Congregational Church, the third meeting house of our congregation built in 1917.



This overture to celebrate the arriving of Jesus among mortals is based on the famous Latin hymn associated with the first Sunday in the church year, *Veni redemptor genitum*. Martin Luther's German translation is depicted in this first section of the typical slow/fast/slow arrangement of a French Overture. The Messiah's arrival is a royal occasion, but is announced and fulfilled in a gentle way (by strings, and not by trumpets and drums). His descent to mortals is depicted by the movement downward of the choir sections: Soprano down to Bass. Together, the sections join in the second phrase of the hymn.

Welt The whole world marvels

This faster, fugal section expresses the wonder and amazement of the receivers of the gift of the Christ-child from heaven. Here is illustrated the reaction which we exhibit as we experience God's gift: praise and joy and worship; and it is "catching" - the sopranos begin it, the altos catch the spirit, the tenors join in, and then the basses also sing of this inexpressible feeling.

The majesty of this text is reflected, once again, in the slow section which is the same melody as the first phrase which also has, as its subject, God and his actions among mortals.

The rhetorical questions of the recitative move into the flowing of the arioso section - the flowing of blessings down to us, as illustrated again in the final downward sweeping scale passage of cello and bass.

The flowing melody line is played in unison by the four top strings. The most important blessings that could be offered and received by the Church are expressed in the continual joyful, relaxed structure of this aria.

IV. Recitative (bass)

The text, from Revelations 3:20, is pictured by the pizzicato strings - knocking on the door of our heart and, also, the pendulum-like passing of time in anticipation of the Apocalypse for which we wait, but which we also have begun to experience when Jesus communes with us. As is typical of Bach, he gives the words of Jesus to the bass soloist as he interprets this somewhat sinister feeling anticipating the Last Judgement.

V. Aria (soprano)

The sinister feeling portrayed in the bass solo gives way to the purest radiance and child-like devotion as the Soul (normally given as a solo to the soprano by Bach) welcomes exuberantly the entrance of Jesus to this world and to our heart.

Behold! Behold, I stand
at the door and knock.
If anyone will hear my

VI. Chorale

Bach reverts to a chorale verse to finish off the work. However, this portion of a chorale is from a hymn most normally associated with the Epiphany season which comes after the Christmas season. (See last half of hymn 145.) The sopranos carry the melody in longer notes to the end, holding the word "Verlangen" for a very long time, while the strings climb to a pitch height near the end which Bach saves for only very special word painting situations. Here he perceives the Soul as winging its way, in joyful anticipation, to union and communion forever with the long-awaited Messiah.

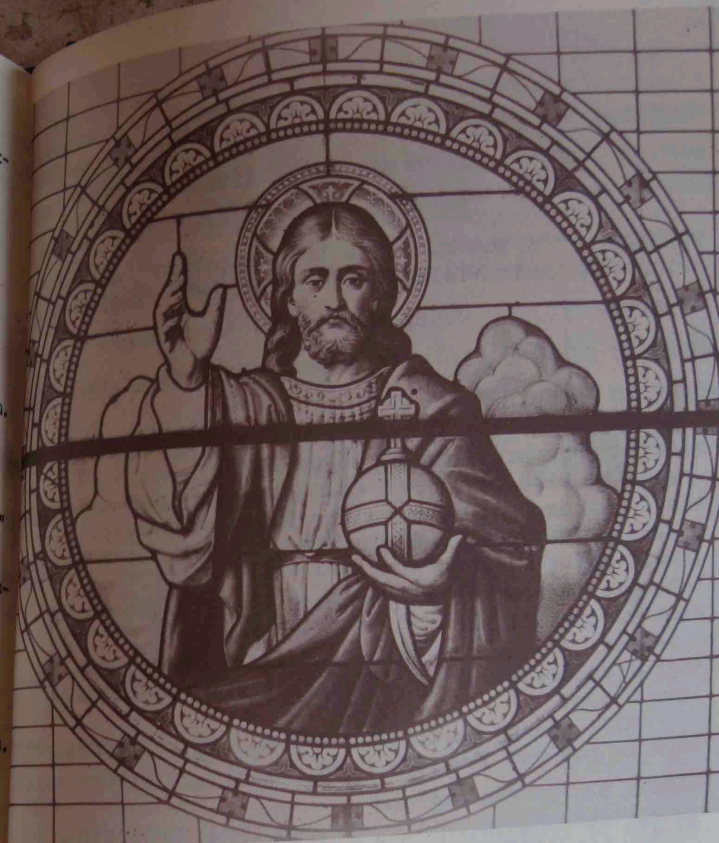


Photograph: The Roberts Window, dedicated in 1979, celebrates the contributions of Congregational churches to higher education.

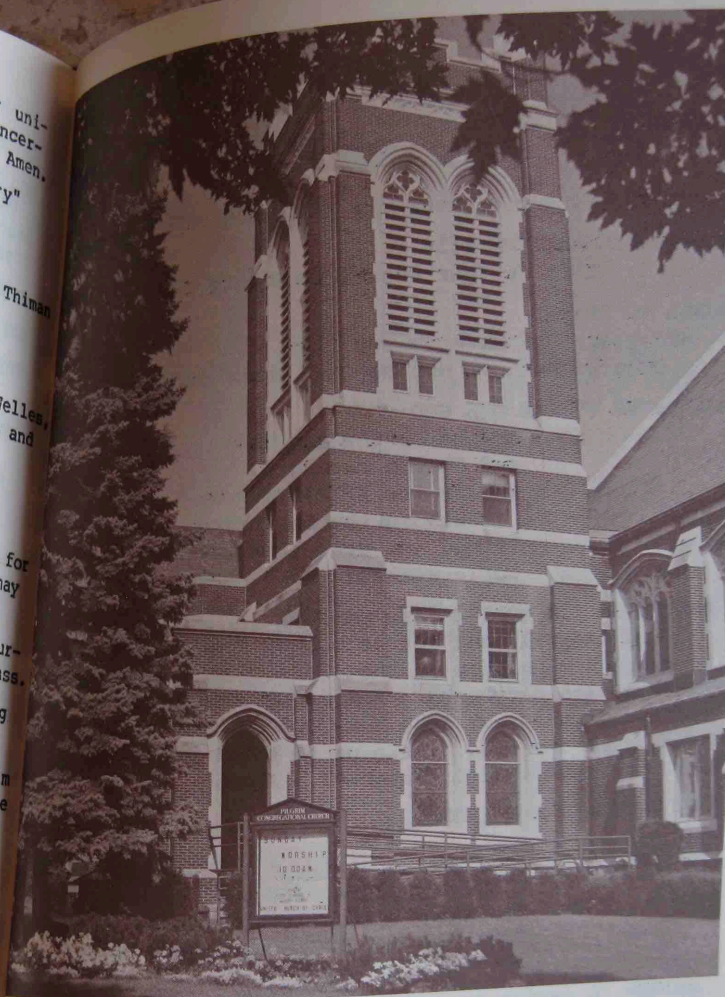

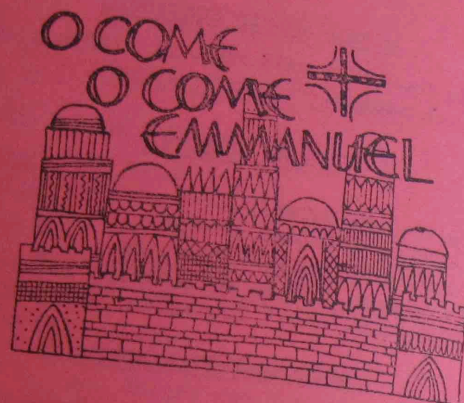

NOTES ON THE MUSIC

The Medieval Carol represents an interesting and oftentimes fascinating look into our musical and theological past. You have heard two English Carols and a Spanish Villancico, which is carol-like in format.

The texts deal with the mystery that a person senses when faced with concepts not readily explained. Our modern bent for reason tends to be absent and is replaced by a beautiful sense of drama and joy in the gifts we are presented. This sense of drama is common to both the liturgical drama and the carol. The term "Macaronic" is used to describe the texts because of the mixed Latin-English usage.

Musically, the form tends to be burden (refrain), verse, burden, etc. The music materials remain but it is the text which changes in the verse. In these performances I have coupled textually related verses to shorten their length.

The instruments used are reproductions of early instruments. The instrumentation is speculative at best, for the concept of the composition including an exact orchestration, had not yet taken hold.

The offertory composition is from the final movements of a solo cantata composed by Telemann during the late (high) Baroque period. It was composed for the fourth Sunday in Advent. The scoring is Telemann's. The text of the cantata is from Philippians 4: 4-7.

The point of all of this is that a series of events occurred that baffle science. A beauty became a shared experience, a mystery was revealed. The ministry of this music will, I hope, help one regain that sense. To God's glory we offer our humble gifts.

Bath is close to Stonehenge, Wells and Exeter Cathedrals and to Bristol and South Wales. London is a ninety minute train ride and Oxford and Stratford are not far away.

The invitation extended to us is for the Easter season in April. However, the church there can arrange for a summer visit if that proves convenient for more people.
