The Pastor's Installation

The Ecclesiastical Council which convened in the church on Tuesday at 3:00 P. M. was duly organized by the election of Rev. P. P. Wormer as Moderator and Rev. Harry R. Harris as Scribe. The findings of the Council are epitomized in the following statement which was presented at the installation service held in the church Tuesday evening:

The Ecclesiastical Council, meeting at Pilgrim Congregational Church, Duluth, Minnesota, April 29th, to advise as to the propriety of installing Rev. C. N. Thorp, late of Chelsea, Mass., as its Pastor and Teacher, not satisfied alone with the hearty and unanimous vote to proceed to the exercises of public installation, desires to say to all the churches of our order of Minnesota and Northern Wisconsin that it found in Mr. Thorp a man of such sane judgment and poise in theological positions that not a question was asked further along those lines after the candidate's paper was concluded.

The Council also desires to voice the opinion that Pilgrim Church, with its famous succession of pastors, has found in Mr. Thorp one not only worthy to stand in line with the men who have preceded him but capable both in pulpit and parish of making his own ministry rich in the spiritual and numerical growth of the church as becomes a true Minister of Jesus Christ.

The Council was particularly impressed with the pastor's expression of his sense of obligation to the missionary problems of the great north half of the state and felicitates both Church and Pastor on the permanent arrangement sealed by the action of this Council and looks forward to years of spiritual blessing and prosperity for Pilgrim Church, Duluth,

REPORT OF MISSIONARY COMMITTEE


At a recent meeting of your missionary committee, it was voted to make two recommendations to the church as follows:


1. That the church contribute \$10.00 this year from the Missionary funds to the American Bible Society.


2. That the church increase its contribution to the Union Finnish Work of this city from \$10,000 per month to \$30,000 per month for the period commencing January 1, 1919, and ending March 15, 1919, and that on the latter date the church discontinue its connection and support of this work, leaving the First Netholist Church and the worker which the Methodists have secured, in full charge.

Since the meeting of the Missionary Committee, it has been suggested that at the time of making the last payments to the Hokkanens that the church make a parting gift of \$10.00 to them from our Missionary funds. This would be the amount of our contribution toward two weeks additional salary.



Elderkin, of Chicago, now pastor of Park Ridge Congregational Church, be called to the pastorate of this Church, and to that end offers the following resolution:

BE IT RESOLVED by Pilgrim Congregational Church of Duluth, Minnesota, in meeting assembled this 25th day of July, 1920, that Rev. Noble S. Elderkin, of Chicago, Illinois, be, and he hereby is, salled to become pastor of this Church at a salary of \$6,000.00 per annum, with rent of parsonage free, and that the moving expenses of himself, his family and household goods from Chicago to Duluth be paid by this Church.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the date of commencement of such pastorate be October 1st, 1920, or such earlier date as Mr. Elderkin is able to take up the work, and that the relation of church and pastor continue so long as the relationship is mutually agreeable.

In the untimely death of our beloved neighbor, counsellor, fellow member and friend, Pilgrim Congregational Church has lost one of its most useful and faithful members, our community has lost one of its most active and efficient citizens, our State has lost one of its wisest and most practical public servants and each of us individually has lost one of our truest and best friends.

We who have known him for so many years have watched the development of his character, which at all times has been an open book and it has been an inspiration to us all to see the many things that he did so cheerfully and so ungrudgingly for others, his hand and his purse were always ready to help a worthy cause and he had the faculty of interesting others in the many things that commanded his attention. Freely he received of God's bounty and as freely he gave to all good causes.

This church of ours is only one example of his generosity and the inspiration that he gave to our other members resulted in erecting this modern and convenient House of God entirely free

from debt. He served faithfully as Alderman of our City and was one of the first Commissioners of the Water and Light Department of Duluth and as such aided materially in putting this department on a business-like basis.


He was one of the organizers and one of the most faithful members of the Duluth Community Fund and his wise counsel and judgment had much to do with its successful development.

He was one of the members and afterwards was Chairman of the Minnesota Forest Fires Relief Commission, appointed to this position by Governor Burnquist at the time of the great forest fire in the year 1918. Here again his business ability, coupled with his wise judgment, enabled the Commission to give relief to many thousands of settlers; several millions of dollars of a relief fund were disbursed under his supervision and a substantial balance was returned to the State at the close of the relief work.

He was always in demand when any good cause needed a guiding hand to enable it to be carried forward to a successful conclusion and notwithstanding his busy life, he never failed to

respond generously and cheerfully. He was the life of any company or assemblage and none of us will soon forget the happy hours we spent with him and his good wife in the beautiful grounds surrounding their home in Duluth, and it was in this home that we saw him at his best, surrounded by mother, wife, children and grandchildren, it was a true inspiration to look in upon this remarkable family and see the love and devotion given by each to the other, always a leader in the entertainment of the assembled family and always looking out for their welfare. He has had the satisfaction, during his lifetime of raising a family of which any parent could be justly proud and each of them is taking his or her place in the world in the same useful and efficient manner as did the parents who had set such a splendid example for them.

Sir Charles Wakefield of London, England, who visited Duluth some time ago and with whom Mr. Duncan had transacted very important financial business in London, said of him at a public gathering in Duluth, that London business men had absolute faith in his business judgment and his integrity and that his face was quite as good collateral as his bond. Mr. Noyce was a good camper. He took the Scouts on many hikes and showed them many things. He could play their games and do everything as well as they themselves could, in fact he was considered not merely a leader and someone to obey, but a fellow Scout.

In the camping season of 1927 he spent a week at Scout Camp Lawrie. At the time he was there, a new coliseum or assembling place was being built. Mr. Noyce was a great help in building this project and his memory will always be associated with its construction.

The next fall he was chosen as a member of the Chi Lambda Honor Fraternity of Scout Camp Lawrie because of the work he had done for the Camp and for its work.

In all his work with the troop Mr. Noyce only missed three or four meetings and these were when he was sick or out of town. At the time of his death Mr. Noyce was planning a fine program for the season of 1928-29 and one of his last connections with the troop was to take a number of

boys on an over-night hike.





You can see what it is you are doing when you give your support to the Church if you will read the homily on the back of your collection envelope this morning.

The family of Henry I. Pinneo have generously acceded to the request of the Deacons and have made it possible for the Church to possess a portrait of Mr. Pinneo who served in the Diaconate for over fifteen years. The portrait may be seen in the vestibule this morning.

On June seventh last the Reverend T. W. Howard, known familiarly in this part of the world for many years as the sky pilot of the Rainy River, wandered off into the desert near Tucson, Arizona, where he had made his home lately. Long search for him yielded nothing until last Tuesday, July 22, when the body was discovered by a wandering Mexican. His many friends in Pilgrim Church will be sorry to hear of this sad ending to a singularly useful life. He was seventy-four years of age.

As a footnote to Dr. Elderkin's resignation to be discovered elsewhere in this Calender, it may be stated that on September fifteenth next he will have served as minister of Pilgrim Church for ten years. His pastorate is exceeded in point of years only by the pastorates of the Reverend Alexander Milne and the Reverend Edward M. Noyes. And it may be stated also that this pastorate is his longest, the next longest being his pastorate in Lawrence, Kansas, which extended over a period of six and one-half years.

DR. ELDERKIN ACCEPTS CALL TO AKRON

On July 17, 1930 the following notice was despatched to the members of the Church:

The Board of Trustees of Pilgrim Church do by this call a special meeting of the Church for Sunday noon, July 20, 1930, to receive the resignation of the minister of the Church and to take such action as may appear suitable. Oscar Mitchell,

Chairman of the Board

Pursuant to call the meeting assembled at the stated hour. Mr. Oscar Mitchell was elected to serve as moderator. He called upon the minister of the Church to speak.

The minister of the Church then read the following resigna-

For almost ten years I have served as your minister, I need not say that for me these have been exceedingly happy

years.

And because they have been so happy, it is not easy to take the step that will bring them to a close.

But a call has come to me which I think it is my duty to

The members of the First Church of Akron have asked me to become their minister.

And I have intimated to them that when you released me I should be glad to accept their call.

That I may be free to do so, I ask that the relationship existing between us as pastor and people be terminated Tuesday, September 30, 1930.

The motion to accept the resignation was put and carried. The motion to accept the resignation was put and carried.

The moderator complying with the instructions contained in
the preceding motion appointed a committee consisting of Mr.
O. J. Larson, Mrs. C. E. Adams and Mr. H. W. Nichols to prepare
a minute which should express the sense of the meeting.

The committee presented the following minute:

WHEREAS, Our pastor, the Rev. Noble S. Elderkin, has made it known to the congregation at this meeting held today (July 29, 1930) that he has received a call to the pastorate of the First Congregational Church of Akron, Ohio, and in order that he may be free to accept the call, he tenders his resignation from the ministry of Pilgrim Church to take effect September 30, 1930.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED. That said resignation be and the same is hereby accepted to take effect as requested; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That while this is perhaps not the proper occasion for the enumeration and appraisement of the many achievements of Dr. Elderkin's ministry of ten years in Pilgrim Church, we cannot refrain from saying briefly that it is the sense of the congregation that we contemplate with deep and genuine sorrow the ending of a ministry which has been so fruitful in every activity of the Church.

Through his exceptional executive ability and his unfailing tact, he has organized our congregation into a harmonious and effective working body.

During the decade of Dr. Elderkin's ministry, many have come into the Kingdom of God through the door of Pligrim Church, and the power and influence of the Church in the community since Dr. Elderkin was called to this pastorate have increasingly developed.

Humanly speaking, these achievements are due primarily to the intellectual and spiritual power and leadership of our beloved

Individually, and as a congregation, we feel under a deep sense of obligation to Dr. Elderkin not only for the beneficence of his ministry but also for his notable contribution to the civic life of

We felicitate the congregation of the First Congregational Church of Akron upon their wisdom in calling Dr. Elderkin to the ministry of their church. They have chosen a man of inspiring personality, a profound scholar, a devoted pastor, and a great preacher, now in the prime of his intellectual power and ripe in genuine Christian, experience. in genuine Christian experience.

This work was found to be necessary and has been done under plans prepared by and under the supervision of Charles E. Foster, heating engineer. The contract price for doing all of the work was \$12,500. To this is to be added the engineer's fees of 5% of the contract price, making a total cost to the Church of \$13,125.00.

The question of financing this cost has been carefully considered by the Trustees. There will be a very substantial saving in the cost of coal during each year. Taking into consideration financial conditions, it was thought unwise to attempt to raise funds to make payment at this time, and that left as the only other method to borrow the necessary money. Arrangements have been made for a loan of \$13,000 with interest at five per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, the loan to be secured by real estate mortgage upon the property of the Church, including the parsonage. All of said notes to bear interest at the rate of 5% per annum, payable semi-annually, and the principal of each thersof to be payable on any interest payment date on thirty days' written notice to mortgages of intention to pay.

Said mortgage shall be in form approved by the Chairman of the Board by his execution thereof."

Under the provisions of this resolution the Church will be required to pay on the principal debt at least one \$500 note in each year and will have the privilege, by giving the necessary notice, to pay as many additional notes as it may desire.

No exact estimate as to the saving on the cost of coal to be made by reason of this work is possible, but it is hoped that the saving will at least take care of the one \$500 note together with all interest necessary to be paid in each year, and that within the next few years conditions will be such that a special drive can be made and all the balance of the notes paid.

All of us dislike the thought of a mortgage upon the Church property, but the condition of the heating plant had become such that the remodeling was, in the judgment of the engineer and of the Trustees, imperatively necessary. The work has now been done and it must be paid for either in cash or by arranging a loan, as has been done. When the indebtedness was incurred it became a charge against the property of the Church and it is only by borrowing the money and giving security that arrangements can be made to avoid the necessity of paying all of the indebtedness at this time.

The Trustees submit a form of resolution authorizing the execution and delivery of the notes and mortgages, and request its passage as follows:




