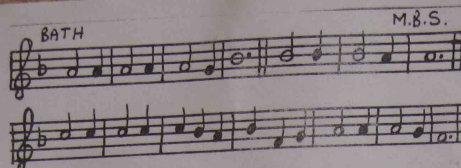

Dear Pearl,

I am coordinating a small group making the arrangements for the visit to Bath from Duluth and George Fletcher has passed your letter on to me so that I can give you details as fixed so far.

I must first explain that Mary and I shall not actually be in Bath to welcome you. This is very sad for us and will seem discourteous unless I explain that it also has a happy side to it. Our son, Peter, is to marry a charming young lady from Indonesia, though she now works in Australia. The wedding is to be in Jakarta and that is where we shall be at the end of July! With Peter based in England but often working abroad (up-country Pakistan for some weeks at present) the arrangements are complicated, especially when the Catholic church in Indonesia asks for signed documents at short notice. They are both mature people - around 30 - and Cornelia has excellent English (a degree in Australia) so we do not have fears of cultural problems to alloy our joy.

Now to the visit. As the stay is only 9 nights we felt it best to have only one host family each and not disrupt the short time with a move. I give a list below. We plan to meet you at Gatwick and bring you by road to Bath in a coach, a journey of about 3 hours. We hope that we can have the same arrangement as when we were met at Minneapolis, namely that you will pay the coach cost. A small party will mean larger shares but we are getting the smallest reasonable coach for people and luggage and estimate about £20 each, which is cheaper than the train journey from Gatwick to Bath.

You arrive in England early in the morning so we agree you will want a restful first day. You will be entirely with hosts and free to do or not to do. You can go to bed as early as you like - the combined evening meal for all guests and hosts is postponed to the following day.

Two full day outings are planned for the Thursday and the following Tuesday. These are coach trips but not to a great distance and we hope you will alljoin in because a coach trip enables a lot of church people not directly involved as hosts to come too and meet you all. The trips are 1. south of Bath to Sherborne (an interesting small town) and Montacute House (a splendid large Elizabethan house and garden now owned by the National Trust) 2. north of Bath to Slimbridge, a wildlife reserve particularly known for water birds, and to Berkeley Castle - no ruin and everybody's idea of a "real" castle.

Other plans are taking shape but you will not be dragooned into a full schedule. Through hosts and other volunteers we shall do our best to arrange for any special wishes you have individually of places to see. We plan, as usual, to let you have evening meals in various homes to meet a range of people but the full day outings (roughly 9.30am to 5.30 pm) will be followed by evenings "at home" with your hosts in case you need to relax or rest.

Your last request is difficult to answer. London is expensive, especially central London. Bath people tend not to stay there and so cannot give reliable recommendations. If my experience of places abroad applies to you also I would think a good travel agent over with you might have good advice. If you decide to stay further out from the centre do remember that the underground system is good and I think you can get daily or weekly tickets with unlimited travel which might cut the price if you plan to see a lot each day. In any case cheaper prices out of centre would more than pay for transport.

- Saturday 27th Morning free.
Afternoon: an informal visit to Dyrham - a late 17th century house and deer park. Car transport to be arranged. The house is National Trust property. We can stroll in the park, tour the house and have tea in the Orangery but very much in our own time.
The party will be divided for dinner between the homes of the Fletchers and the Peregrines.
- Sunday 28th 10.30am Service at Central
Lunch at the Manse with Michael and Joan Stolton where there will also be a discussion on church related matters between the Duluth visitors and some members of Central.
Supper will be by invitation.
- Monday 29th Car outing to Marlborough, Avebury and Savernake Forest. Marlborough is an attractive small town, Avebury is a prehistoric site with stone circles - the stones not as huge as Stonehenge but many rate it higher, not least because it is less swamped by tourists. For those who would like, walks of various lengths are possible in Savernake Forest.
