Program

I. Rollo F. Maitland (1884-)......Concert Overture

A fine example of straightforward organ-writing by one of Philadelphia's most gifted organists, whose illuminating interpretations of good music have reached a multitude of listeners. The first theme is one of virile majesty; the second of a suave, medolic charm. These are developed with much eloquence, and culminate in a stirring climax. The work is dedicated to Henry S. Fry, a well-known organist of Philadelphia.

II. Edwin Grasse Serenade

A charming lyric fancy from the pen of a well-known New York violinist, composer and organist.

DeBoeck is a professor in the Conservatory at Brussels. This little allegretto reveals a piquant, racy humor, rare indeed in compositions for so mighty an instrument as the ergan.

IV. Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750).......Passacaglia

The Passacaglia was an old Italian dance in 3-4 time, stately in movement, and written on a bass theme of four measures in minor key, which was constantly repeated with an over-varied series of harmonics shifting above it. This is one of Bach's greatest works in which he has used every device of counterpoint in the construction of a series of variations upon the opening pedal theme, proceeding then to erect a massive fugue on the same theme. The work is one of great brilliance.

V. Alphonse Mailly (1833-1918)Invocation

Mailly was one of the best known organists and composers in Belgium. This Invocation is in the quiet mood which the Belgian school of composers know so well how to paint.

VI. Cesar Franck (1822-1890)Chorale, No. 3

This is the last composition of the great Belgian and has been termed the loftiest expression of his religious exaltation. Maily described this work as a tone-picture of the strife between evil and good. Passages of furious agitation, a severe hymn of austere majesty, a tender episode expressing Paith, and the final triumph of Right, as dramatized in the massive chords at the close.

VIII. Alexander Russell......Bells of St. Anne de Beaupre

The Church of St. Anne at Beaupre, Canada, near Quebec, burned recently, but the famous shrine, to which thousands of pilgrims have come annually to seek the miracle of health, was saved. The opening theme is based upon the actual notes played by the chimes—the gathering of the pilgrims—the procession of the faithful—the miracle—the benediction.

X. Camille Saint-Saens (1835-1921)......Marche Heroique

A heroic procession of valiant harmonies, proudly marching to a stirring climax. Originally written for two pianes, this work has been scored for orchestra by the composer and arranged for organ by Guilmant.
