

RUPERT SIRCOM — (Biography)

America's most widely heard Organist

Rupert Sircom has brought the majestic music of the organ into hundreds of thousands of American homes through his superb performances on the Radio, having given as many at 500 recitals in a year. He is a member of the American Guild of Organists, and he has been heard in private recital in the finest homes in New York, and in St. Thomas' Chapel.

A native of Boston, he was a pupil of Everett Truette and Lynnwood Farnam, and was early accorded recognition by being appointed organist of the Handel and Haydn Society of Boston, and the Apollo Club of Boston. Here is a musician with a message to deliver, and with the ability to declare himself with emphasis. His playing is essentially of the most classical style, the style in which a fine organ is appreciated at its best.

Before coming to Minneapolis, Mr. Sircom was Staff Organist for the Columbia Broadcasting System. Of late years he has served as Lecturer on Church Music, University of Minnesota; Chorus Master of the Minneapolis Symphony Chorus; Instructor of Church Music, Luther Theological Seminary; and Associate Professor of Organ at Carleton College. On a recent eastern tour, (January, 1942), Mr. Sircom gave a recital in Harvard University Memorial Chapel, under the sponsorship of the Harvard Music Department; played in the Cathedral of the Incarnation, Garden City, Long Island, under the auspices of the American Guild of Organists; and appeared at Grace Episcopal Church, New York City, in which is located one of the largest organs in the world—145 stops. Other appearances include: Trinity Church, Boston; Phillip's Academy, Andover; Harvard Club, Boston; St. Paul's Chapel, New York City; Calvary Cathedral, Sioux Falls, South Dakota; New Old South Church, Boston; Symphony Hall, Boston, 1926—joint recital with Mme. Schumann-Heink.

Mr. Sircom is available for both Lectures on Church Music, and Organ Recitals.
