

WE BUILD ON FOUNDATIONS WROUGHT BY OTHERS...

Our fine church building was erected in 1916-1917 and was dedicated just forty years ago, Christmas Sunday 1917. The cost of the building was \$156,000 and it was dedicated debt-free. The cost of replacement today would be at least three quarters of a million dollars.

Those responsible for the planning had courage and vision. They planned a beautiful building with generous provision for the church school and youth work in advance of most church building at that time.

With the passing years methods in religious education have changed. There is need to modernize some of our facilities and to develop the full potential in our building. Our church school is growing. The average enrollment has doubled in the last seven years. We have an increasing number of young couples in the church. Our Cradle Roll now numbers sixty-eight. We have an urgent need for adequate facilities for pre-school children.


OUR PLANS TAKE SHAPE ...


In October 1954 the Board of Christian Education presented to the Board of Trustees a number of detailed recommendations for improvement of the existing church school facilities.


At the Annual Meeting of the church in January 1956 the appointment of a Planning Committee was authorized to make a careful study of the needs and prepare plans and recommendations. This Planning Committee, consisting of seventeen members representative of various aspects of the church program, was appointed by the Board of Trustees in May 1956. The Trustees engaged Mr. T. J. Shefchik, Jr. as architect to work with the committee.

The committee has given careful study to a number of suggestions submitted by the Board of Christian Education, Women's Fellowship and others. Plans have been drawn for improvements in the Church School and youth work facilities, improvements to the kitchen, provision for a new Parlor for the women, and a Youth Chapel.

The proposed remodeling and improvements in the kitchen have been completed, since the women were eager to have these improvements and were prepared to pay for the new equipment to be installed in the kitchen. The new electrical service made necessary by these changes has been installed and paid for through advance contributions to the over-all building program as outlined.







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THESE ARE OUR PLANS . . .

GROUND FLOOR

Fellowship Hall

Completely redecorate. New drapes on east wall adequate to darken room for day-time projection of films. New asphalt tile floor, including hall areas and men's room.

Create two classrooms in the under-croft area with multifold doors and heavy acoustical treatment of ceilings.

Improved lighting throughout—additional fixtures to give adequate lighting. Improved heating and ventilation.

New fixtures and steel partitions in the men's washroom. New heavy-weight rubber treads on stairs leading up from Fellowship Hall, and from vestibule up to main floor.

Under the Sanctuary

Finishing of undeveloped area under the sanctuary and along south side of the building to provide new rooms for preschool children. Three rooms will provide for crib room, toddlers, and three-year-olds. This area was originally designed to provide an apartment for the caretaker.

New cement platform along alley side of church with wide walk leading out to the avenue, making useful new ground floor access to the building and easy access to this new area.

FIRST FLOOR

Salter Hall

Extend floor overhead at level of the second floor hall, about two feet above present balcony floor, to provide for new Youth Chapel.

Partitions to replace all folding doors so as to provide two useful classrooms along east wall for four-year-olds and five-year-olds.

Installation of concealed coat-room facilities along west wall and adequate ventilation to keep the room comfortable at all times.

Kindergarten Room

Complete remodeling to provide attractive Women's Parlor. It is assumed this floor will be carpeted. The lighting will be changed, adequate electrical outlets provided, and acoustical treatment applied to the ceiling.

The Sanctuary

Improved lighting. New switching equipment with rheostat controls. Alterations to fixtures to provide better lighting without glare. Concealed lighting for the choir. Adequate lighting in the Balcony.

New lighting in the Narthex and the Vestibule.

Acoustical treatment of the ceiling in the Narthex and the Vestibule.

SECOND FLOOR

New Youth Chapel in the area above Salter Hall. This will provide worship facilities for the Lower Junior, Junior, and Junior High Departments of the Church School.

This chapel will also provide worship facilities for high school and college youth groups. It will seat 100 persons comfortably.

The window in the ceiling will be perfectly centered in the new Chapel and the beam work on the ceiling will be undisturbed.

Balcony Classrooms

Elimination of all folding doors. Partitions to provide two separate classrooms as on main floor below. Acoustical treatment of ceilings and improved lighting.

Primary Room

Linotile on floor, acoustical treatment of ceiling, and improved lighting.

Junior Room

Elimination of fireplace and installation of partitions to make two large classrooms.

Men's and Women's Washrooms

New fixtures, steel partitions, etc. to modernize these facilities.

MISCELLANEOUS

Development of limited parking facilities on the lot east of the church.

Installation of adequate ground water drainage around the church to eliminate seepage on ground floor. This will necessitate some changes in landscaping.

Landscaping at west end of church and on lot to the east based on plans prepared by landscape architect.

Elimination of return walls on roof at west end of the church to end trouble caused by snow and ice compacting behind these walls.

Kitchen (This work has been completed.)

New electric bake ovens, electric stoves, stainless steel sinks, dish washer, refrigerator, hooded ventilation over the stoves and ovens and new electrical service for the building adequate for this new equipment and for future needs.

COUNTING THE COST ...

The Master of Men reminds us that in any building program we must first count the cost. Without having done this, the proposed construction of even a Church, dedicated to the glory of God, would be the worst possible kind of folly. So we have counted the cost, and it has been determined that no burdensome debt shall hamper the future work of our church. The major portion of the funds required must be on hand before contracts are let or construction is begun.

The architect has prepared working drawings and specifications with all the detail necessary for submission to contractors for bids and for use in the construction work. On the basis of these detailed drawings and specifications careful estimates of the cost have been prepared. It is estimated that the cost of completion of the work as outlined in our plans will be \$110,000.

At the Annual Meeting of the church held January 15, 1958, the plans and recommendations of the Planning Committee were approved and a campaign authorized to secure the funds to pay for this remodeling and the balance of \$30,000 on the church mortgage. This mortgage covers the money borrowed two years ago to pay for tuckpointing the building and the installation of new boilers. Thus our goal is \$140,000 which will enable us to complete the work outlined and rededicate our improved building debt-free.

The cost of the work already completed in remodeling the kitchen and installing a new electric service for the entire building was \$11,323. This is not included in the estimates mentioned above. This work has been paid for through a gift of \$5,000 by the Women's Fellowship and other advance contributions to the Building Fund. A balance of \$22,733 remains in the Building Fund from advance contributions to be applied on our goal of \$140,000.

The Building Campaign Committee has set up the program on an eighteen-month basis. It is felt that this plan will help many members to contribute more generously than would otherwise be possible. Special Building Fund envelopes will be provided for monthly payments. Those who prefer may make their pledge as a stated sum and designate the schedule of payments they wish to follow.

HOW MUCH SHALL I GIVE? . . .

This is a perfectly normal question, yet one which each individual must answer for himself, prayerfully and thoughtfully. The truth of the matter is, of course, that this program cannot be carried out without sacrifice. For some of us it may mean doing without things which we would like very much to have. It took this kind of sacrifice to provide the building we have. What a privilege it will be—to go without some personal pleasure that our church may have the facilities to strengthen its program for children and young people.

The Committee strongly recommends that we think of our giving in terms of regular monthly contributions, rather than total amounts. The total may seem large, but as we all make regular monthly gifts its attainment becomes relatively easy.







Contractors on Alterations to Pilgrim Congregational Church

Gentlemen:

J. D. Harrold Co.

At a meeting of the trustees of Pilgrim Congregational Church last Friday it appeared that there were a few matters concerning the contracts which should be cleared up.

First, is the matter of insurance carried by each of the contractors. Article XXVII of the General Conditions provides for the contractors to maintain insurance but the minimum limits are not prescribed. The trustees assume that each of the contractors probably maintains coverage at least equal to the minimum limits they have in mind. The trustees therefor request that each of the contractors furnish certificates evidencing personal injury and death liability of \$100,000.00 -- \$300,000.00, property damage of \$50,000.00 -- \$100,000.00, including contractors' protective liability, and full coverage for liability under the Minnesota Workmen's Compensation Law.

Secondly, such contractors as have not already done so are requested to furnish their surety bonds guaranteeing performance.

Thirdly, Article XXIX of the General Conditions provides that the owner shall maintain fire insurance upon the entire structure to 100% of the insurable value. The Church carries \$414,000.00 of fire insurance written on an 80% coinsurance plan, and while arrangements are pending for a new valuation and increase in the coverage, the trustees desire the agreement of each contractor that the existing insurance will be acceptable as substantial compliance by the owner with the requirements of Article XXVIII of the General Specifications.

If these matters are agreeable, will you kindly furnish certificates of insurance and your surety bonds, and return a copy of this letter with your signature indicating approval, so that it may be considered as a part of the contract. Signed contracts will then be executed on behalf of the trustees and delivered to you.

THIS ACREMENT made the 16th day of May in the year Nineteen Hundred and Pifty-eight by and between Joseph D. Harrold, Walter E. Wipson and Reinar V. Gabrielson, Co-partners doing business under the firm name of J. D. Harrold Co., hereinafter called the Contractor, and Pilgrim Congregational Church, hereinafter called the Owner,

WITHERSETH, that the Contractor and the Owner for the considerations hereinafter named agree as follows:

Article 1. Scope of the Work-The Contractor shall furnish all of the materials and perform all of the work shown on the Drawings and dexscribed in the Specifications entitled Alterations to Pilgrim Congregational Church prepared by Thomas J. Shefchik, acting as and in these
Contract Documents entitled the Architect; and shall do everything required by this Agreement, the General Conditions of the Contract, the
Specifications and the Drawings.

Article 2. Fine of Completion -- The work to be performed under this Contract shall be commenced immediately and shall be substantially completed on or before August 15, 1958.

Article 3. The Contract Sum-The Owner shall pay the Contractor for the performance of the Contract, subject to additions and deductions provided therein, in current funds as follows: Forty-four thousand four hundred sixteen dollars (\$44,416.00), being the excunt of the Contractor's Base Bid dated May 7, 1958.

Where the quantities originally contemplated are so changed that application of the agreed unit price to the quantity of work performed is shown to create a hardship to the Owner or the Contractor, there shall be an equitable adjustment of the Contract to prevent such hardship.

Article 4. Progress Payments -- The Owner shall make payments on account of the Contract as provided therein, as follows:

On or about the fifteenth day of each month ninety per cent of the value, based on the Contract prices of labor and materials incorporated in the work and of materials suitably stored at the site thereof up to the first day of that month, as estimated by the Architect, less the aggregate of previous payments; and upon substantial completion of the entire work, a sum sufficient to increase the total payments to ninety per cent of the Contract price.

Article 5. Acceptance and Final Payment--Final payment shall be due thirty days after substantial completion of the work provided the work be then fully completed and the contract fully performed.

Upon receipt of written notice that the work is ready for final inspection and acceptance, the Architect shall promptly make such inspection, and when he finds the work acceptable under the Contract and the Contract fully performed he shall promptly issue a final certificate, over his own signature, stating that the work provided for in this Contract has been completed and is accepted by him under the terms and conditions thereof, and that the entire balance found to be due the Contractor, and noted in said final certificate, is due and payable.

Before issuance of final certificate the Contractor shall submit evidence satisfactory to the Architect that all payrolls, material bills, and other indebtedness connected with the work have been paid.

If after the work has been substantially completed, full completion thereof is materially delayed through no fault of the Contractor, and the Architect so certifies, the Owner shall, upon certificate of the Architect,
and without terminating the Contract, make payment of the balance due
for that portion of the work fully completed and accepted. Such payment
shall be made under the terms and conditions governing final payment,
except that it shall not constitute a waiver of claims.

Article 6. The Contract Documents--The General Conditions of the Contract, the Specifications and the Drawings, together with this Agreement, form the Contract, and they are as fully a part of the Contract as if hereto attached or herein repeated. The following is an enumeration of the Specifications and Drawings:

Division I consists of the following:
Section 1, the General Conditions of the Contract for the Construction of Buildings, Standard Form of the American Institute of Architects, Form A2, Sixth Edition (Rev. 9-1-51), Articles 1 through 44 on pages 1 through 10.

Section 2, Special Conditions, Articles 45 through 56 on typewritten pages 11 and 12.

Division II, General Construction Specifications, consists of Sections 3 through 34 excepting Sections 5, 9, 10, 12, 13, 15, 17, 18, 20, 24, 27, 28 and 30, which are not included.

Addendum G-1 and Addendum G-2.

Plans and Drawings numbered 1 through 5 as listed on the Index Sheet of Division II, all dated July 18, 1957, and bearing revised dates of February 18, 1958 and March 10, 1958.

Dear Reverend Halfaker:

I hasten to answer your letter of October 10th, received this morning. It was nice to hear that the appearance of the remodelled chandeliers was to your satisfaction.

It was somewhat puzzling, though, to hear that there is a high concentration of light from the 500-watt down-lights in the lanterns in the two large center fixtures. It was not so surprising on the side chandeliers, as these are hanging too low to give the light a chance to spread out.

There are three things which influence the light distribution of a reflector-lens combination such as we are using here:

First, the position of the lamp in relation to the lens is the all important thing that controls the light distribution. For maximum spread, the bottom of the 500-watt lamp bulb should be three-fourths of an inch from the lens. (The closer the lamp to the lens, the more spread you will get, up to this three-fourths of an inch distance.) Conversely, the further the lamp from the lens, the more concentrating the distribution. This should be checked, but as this would involve lowering the fixture, that had better wait until one of us can come to Duluth.

Two other possibilities should be checked by Arrowhead prior to our visit. First, was the proper lamp used? This must be a 500-watt lamp to provide maximum spread with the socket positioned as it is

They represent a great improvement. The problem of glare and eyestrain has been completely climinated. There is one problem, however, which I would like very much to discuss with you. I wish that you might see the fixtures as they are installed and observe for yourself a situation which I will try to describe. The fixtures seem to concentrate the light in a small area when we use the bright floods in the bottom part of the fixture. I have discussed this with Phil Johnson of Foster's office and he feels that this might be due in part to the type of reflector that is used and perhaps more because of the type of lense that is in the bottom of the lantern. We have this problem not only with the side fixtures which might perhaps be installed at a slightly higher level but also with the center fixtures which are quite high above the congregation. This problem of light distribution has not raised any comments from members of the congregation as yet and I am not commenting on it to others. I do feel, however, that it is a matter in which it might be possible for us to improve the installation, and if possible I would like to consider this before someone else raises the question. As you recall, no doubt, we do not have the drum fixtures which were ordered for the two vestibules. The fixtures which you sent along at the time you sent our order are the same size as we have installed in the narther whereas we had ordered the 16° drum for these vestibule fixtures. We are using the 14" fixtures temporarily as you suggested. We find, however, that this type of fixture is probably not well suited to these vestibules. As a matter of fact we are quite clear in our decision to try a different type of fixture at these locations and would like to have you hold up shipment of the 16" fixtures until we can discuss this matter further with you. We would like to discuss the possibility of a fixture which would hand down a little days from these ceilings and give not only some direct light but also give reflected light from the ceilings. We have new off-white acoustical ceilings in these areas which would reflect the light effectively and five a much more cheerful appearance to the rooms. Phil has shown me some such fixtures in catalogues of other manufacturers. I would like to look at your catalogue and discuss the possibility of some other fixture which you might able to provide and which would harmonize with our other lighting fixtures as we have them installed.

Dear Rev. Halfaker:

This will confirm the conversations I had with you, Gordon Adams of Arrowhead Electric, and Mr. Johnson and Mr. Charles Foster, regarding the light distribution of the nave chandeliers in your church.

The uneven, or "spotty", distribution is due not to the chandeliers nor to their component parts, but rather to the location and mounting height of the chandeliers in the

To improve this situation we would recommend the following:

(1.) That the six side chandeliers be moved up to the next purlin above their present location. This would accomplish two things: The chandeliers would be automatically raised to their proper mounting height above the pews (in relation to the outlet spacing). This would also help to increase the lighting level in the pews in the center of the church (where no large chandelier is present). If these six chandeliers are moved, as recommended above, then the large down-lights in the lanterns should be increased from 300 watts to 500 watts. You will recall that both of these things were recommended by us originally.

(2.) That the two large chandeliers in the center of the church be raised approximately 6'6" above their present height. These chandeliers are 28'0" on centers, and therefore should be 30'6" above the floor (or 28'0" above the reading plane). I would estimate that they are about 24'0" above the floor at the present time.

P. 2 These suggestions should make for quite a uniform lighting result over the entire pew area, and I hope you may see your way clear to make these changes. Yours very truly, B. M. D. & R., Inc.
